A mirror reveals the dirt on one's body, but does not cleanse him of it. No one would think of trying to wash his face in a mirror. The law of God is like a mirror. It only shows us our sins but does not cleanse us."

The above statements were recently made on a national TV program by a famous preacher. They are misleading and confusing to many in that they do not go far

It is true that no law by itself will take away sin. Christ's law, the gospel, has connected with it the blood of Christ. (Matt. 26:28; Heb. 10:10.) 
