PRESSURIZING TELEPHONE CABLES

One of the main projects of the Telephone Company at this time is the pressurizing of exchange cable, both aerial and underground. The reason for this pressurization is to make our cables storm proof. The Company has spent millions of dollars stormproafing long distance cable, but still have high rate of trouble in local cable every time a storm hits.

The standard requirement is six pounds of pressure at end of underground cables: two pounds end pressure for aerial cable. Six pounds pressure in underground cable will protect against 12 feet of water. This pressure is provided by pumping dried air into cables. Alarm system installed in the cables tells us at our testboard if pressure drops below desired level.

This pressure in cables helps keep water from seeping in and when a leak does occur, it is easier to find by using a "bubble-bath" spray on cable. Escaping air blows bubbles and locates the leaks quickly.

Simply this, that this is just one of the many things that is coming about to give you the best telephone service possible at the lowest rate possible.
