

In the barley research program, eleven varieties are be-ing tested. They are Kearney, Dicktoo, Pueblo, Harbine, Wintex. Rogers, Cordova, Missouri Early Beardless and Kenbar. Iwo varieties are experimental. The fertilizer experiments on wheat are definitely showing

response to nitrogen. The wheat and barley tests are being conducted in cooperation with the Texas A & M Extension Division. Seed was furnished by the Bushland U. S. D. A. Station.

Thrips are still increasing in parts of the county and doing damage to cotton. The damage can be noticed by examining the leaves for thrips. If the leaves are cupped and silver colored on the bottom side, thrips are doing damage.

Many Arizona Cypress trees re dying because of blight This disease is first noticed by the tips of small branches turn ing brown, eventually this spreads throughout the trees. Blight can be controlled with 90% Sulfur and 10 per cent Copper dust.

Grain Sorghum Fertilization Many people are wondering if nitrogen can be placed on 40" centers for grain sorghum fertilization. Research shows us that this time of the year when soil temperatures are high that just as good results can be obtained on 40" centers as compared to 20" centers are recommended. It has been proven that the highest return per dollar invested for fertilizer on grain sorghum is about 80 lbs. of actual nitrogen either applied before planting edeas a side dress application.

Home Making Hints

A tender broiled steak makes any meal or picnic a real occasion. Do your steaks always turn out tender? If not, your difficulty may be in the selection of the steak for broiling. Choose a tender cut of meat.

These are: porterhouse, T-bone, sirloin and club. Rib steak is a fairly good choice also and usually costs less. Have the steak cut from 1 to 2 inches thick depending upon your preference. It will be less tender I less than one inch thick. Look for a well marbled

teak. Marbling is fat inter spread with the lean. A well marbled steak will usually be tender and juicy when broiled -if it came from a young beef animal. The food shopper has no way of judging this last point but federal meat graders do, and the shopper can use the U.S. grades as a guide in selecting meat.

USDA prime and choice grades provide steaks which are best for broiling. If the meat is Federally graded it will have a purple shield stamped on the fat covering. The choice grade is the most common.




