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



New Method Of Killing Mosquitoes Is Discovered

The new method has been described in the May issue of Public Health Reports, the monthly journal of the U. S. Public Health Service. It conof insecticide in the room during the mosquito season. It was discovered like this:

Scientists at the Communicable Disease Center laboratory in Savannah, Georgia, left work unopened bag of insecticide. Also in the room were some adult mosquitoes on which the scientists had been conducting tests and experiments, as part of the constant international struggle against malaria and

When the scientists reported for work next morning, most of the mosquitoes were dead. Immediately they suspected that the sealed bag of insecticide or rather the fumes from it were responsible for killing the

other forms of mosquito-borne

mosquitoes. In days following they confirmed their theory. They found that the fumes killed the mosquitoes even when the insecticide was enclosed in a paper bag with a polyethlyene liner.
