





In fact there just isn't enough wealthy people to provide all the money our various governments want. Now even the poor folks are catching it. Figures recently released show that the total tax burden per family, both open and hidden taxes, totals almost a third of the family income. For instance A family with a total yearly income of \$4,500 pays \$1,393 in taxes and an \$8,000 income

light to heavy in population numbers. Some fields checked in the Lone Star Community how light infestations while in the Cedar Hill Community heavy infestations are found. Some newly hatched bollworms were found in one field.

Lice or aphids are found in most fields. Wet weather and hot days are ideal for the build up of lice. These infestations should be watched closely and if applying Toxaphene, dieldrin,

such as malathion or parathion can be added to control lice. However, parathion should be used with extreme precautions.

Late planted cotton is just now beginning to make small squares. This is the most critical time. Late planted fields should be watched closely for Fleahoppers so the first crop can be set. This crop will have a better chance of high quality cotton.
