Parents Are **Blamed** For **Child Troubles**

Almost two-thirds of the responses from newspaper readbelief that the greatest problem the fat gets too hot the doughof children is lack of parental care, guidance and discipline. Governor Price Daniel an-

nounced this today in disclosing first results of a state-wide newspaper public opinion poll onducted by the Governor's committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

The Committee had requested readers to send their opinions on the ten greatest problems facing Texas children and outh, and most newspapers winted the poll as a public rvice.

A tabulation of the first 1,000 replies to the poll revealed that 63 per cent considered lack of parental care and guidance the top problem. Three-fifths of this group specifically cited lax parental control, while twofifths cited lack of spiritual training and church attendance. Dr. Guy D. Newman of Brownwood, chairman of the Governor's Committee, presented re-sults of the poll to the Gover-

Under problems relating to parental care and guidance, specific complaints most often repeated were lack of spiritua training; poor church attend ance; poor parental examples not giving child enough respon sibility; lack of discipline and obedience to parents; lack of family unity and teamwork, lack of parental responsibility; too much freedom with cars. lack of teaching respect to

Other problems mentioned in der of frequency were:

Lack of educational oppor unities, 10 per cent; too much time and too little work, 9 per cent; working mothers, 5 per cent; poor public influences such as lewd and violent shows obscene literature, alcohol and 3½ per cent
