





On the Farish farm eight rows of each variety was planted side by side on April 28. Farish and Lewis have been watching the demonstration closely as to fruiting and stalk growth. Farish has fertilized the cotton with 60 pounds of anhydrous ammonia and sprayed it three times for insects. This is one of the fields which was hurt by 2, 4-D early in the summer Sand Hill. All five but now little damage can be detected. The cotton appears in varieties, these being fine condition and is loading up well.

Grain Sorghums

Lewis has four farmers participating in the grain sorghum demonstrations, these being Walter Taack of Irick community, L. B. Brandes of Providence, Mal Jarboe of Baker and Kenneth Bean of South Plains. Grain sorghum varieties include Amak R-10, Dekalb, RS-610, Amak R-12, Texas 660, and new variety, RS-608. These will be tested as to yield some harvest time.

Taack planted his grain sorthums on June 18 and side dressed it with 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre when it was one month old.
