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


Dear Editor:







Cotton Defoliation

The use of defoliants can be good aid to cotton harvest if used properly. True defoliants can be safely applied when 50 to 60 per cent of the bolls are open. Dessicants can be used when at least 80 per cent of the cotton is open. Harvest aid chemicals if applied too early will tend to run staple length. The staple length is made in the first 30 days of the bolls growth. For further information on harvest aid chemicals pick up a Cotton Defoliation guide in the County Agent's of-
