

Quail Season May Open One Month Early

Austin. - Many Texans may have the opportunity of shooting quail 30 days before the regular open season this year, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He says he will recommend to the Commission meeting in Austin October 23, that quail season be opened in a number of counties under regulatory authority effective November 1, and extending to January 16. The season under the general laws is December 1 to January

However, reports from over the State indicate a tremendous quail population in some areas this year. Biologists on the ground recognize that there will be a heavy die-off because of lack of food unless many of the birds are harvested. In some of these areas some of the birds already are compet ing with rodents for food. Many towns in south-west Texas report that quail are coming on to the lawns in the City, looking for grass seed.

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
