COTTON HARVESTING

In starting back to harvest cotton it will pay us to wait until we are sure we can still produce a good grade of cotton. Cotton defoliants or dessicants will need spaced up maturity if the cotton is still immature. They should be applied with care. True defoliants should be used when 50 to 60% of the cotton is open and dessicants when 80 to 90% open.

FIRE PREVENTION
