Parallel benches of 8, 12 cy. Parallel benches of 8, 12, and 16 rows (40 inch rows) are being used to study the ef-fects of different depths of soil removal on crop yields. These benches will also be used in a comparison study of crops grown on benches, contoured land, and slopes. Water applied will all be metered and moisture blocks will be used to determine time of irrigation. Grain sorghum is being grown on these benches and the adjoin-ing slopes in 1959 and it now appears that the benches will outyield the slopes by a considerable margin.

Irrigation studies for the coming year will include time of irrigation on cotton and grain sorghum, skip row irrigation and determination of time of irrigation with moisture blocks.
