Cotton Burrs Lots of top quality organic matter is going to waste at many gins in the county. Cotton burrs applied at the rate of 4 to 5 tons per acre can bring about a yield increase of 20 to 25 pounds of lint cotton per acre per ton of burrs. The use of some form of nitrogen with the burrs can increase yields up to 160 pounds of lint per acre. From 40 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per ecre applied with the burrs has proven to be a

good practice. The burrs if at all possible, should be worked into the top
