Boats Must Be Registered By March 1, 1960

Details of the requirements for motorboat owners to register their boats and have a registration number have been received by County Assessor-Collector T. T. Hamilton from the State Highway Department.

In addition to the safety requirements the motor boat own er must attach the registration number of his boat to each side of the bow of his boat.

Motorboats of 10 horsepower six pounds, seven ounces and and less are not required to was display a number; however it is pointed out in the commu-nication from Highway Engi-neer D. C. Greer that if the small boat owner desires a number he may have it but will be required to pay a fee depending on the class of motorboat involved. The minimum fee is \$1 for three years. This is for Class A boats less than 16 feet in length.

The boat owner fills out the blank and sends it along with the proper fee to the Texas Highway Department, Austin Texas.




