

Election coming Saturday

Absentee voting was reported higher than normal for the city, school and hospital elections slated Saturday.

Most attention in the county has been focused on the election for three members to the Castro County Hospital District board. Three incumbents, James Welch, Charles Rickerd and Desi Pesina, are facing challenges by Dr. B. D. Murphy, Ettie McDermitt, Garland Coleman and Mike Foskey.

Eight persons have filed for the two spots open on the Dim-

mitt School Board. Incumbent Glenn Odom will be joined by Johnny Hucks, Richard Hunter, Kellie Proffitt, Cheryl Pybus, Randy Schumacher, Teddy Smithson and Carter Townsend. Board President Charles Wales decided not to seek re-election, retiring after serving on the board for 12 years.

In the Dimmitt city race, Mayor Wayne Collins and Municipal Judge Ferne Jones are unopposed. Four persons, incumbent David Hays, former City Manager Garnett Holland, Jim Naylor and Jack Thompson are seeking two positions open on the Board of Aldermen. The spot left vacant when Collins was moved to the Mayor's seat after former Mayor R. L. Fleming moved, and Hays' position, are open.

Joe Bailey is the only candidate on the ballot for Mayor in Hart as Bill Ritter is retiring from the seat. William D. Bell and Elizor Castillo are running for the seat on the City Council left open with the retirement of Jerrie Horton from the council.

Incumbents Larry Lee and Elias Martinez are joined on the Hart School Board ballot by Freddy Uphaw, Ricky Mitchell and Benny Martinez for the three available seats. Jerry Kittrell opted not to seek re-election.

In the Nazareth School

Board race, Board President Allen Dobmeier is joined by former board member Hubert Backus and newcomer Mary Lynn Olvera in the race for the two positions available. Six-year veteran Denis Huseman is not seeking re-election.

Polls open at 7 a.m. Saturday, with all voting in Dimmitt at the City Hall; Hart voters may cast ballots at Farmers State Bank; and Nazareth voters will go to the polls at the NHS Homemaking room. Polls close at 7 p.m. Saturday.

Abecedarians are spotted

Enormous flocks of abecedarians have been spotted in the vicinity of Richardson Elementary in Dimmitt.

Life with the IRS

Jacksons set for life with tax deposit forms

There are many horror stories — the closer you get to April 15, the more there are, it seems — about taxpayer deal-

ings with the Internal Revenue Service.

Add the story of Al and Dorothy Jackson to your list. The Jacksons are now fixed virtually for life with IRS tax deposit forms.

They just wanted one book of 12 forms for 1985.

They now have 50 books of 12 forms each, plus 14 temporary forms.

The Jacksons would like to give them away, or do something else (ah, the possibilities that come to mind!) with them, but they are all encoded with the Cobb's Department Store name and tax identification number — useless for anyone but Cobb's.

"We just wanted one form," Mrs. Jackson understated. "I wrote the IRS on Jan. 6, and requested some forms. I hadn't heard from them by Jan. 24, so I called the Austin office. They said they couldn't mail me one before the end of the month, and I would have to pay a penalty.

"We got a blank form from one of the CPA's here in town, and we made our deposit before the end of the month," Mrs. Jackson said. "Then, on Feb. 10, we got the 14 blank, temporary forms in two separate envelopes."

The temporary forms included a cover letter from an IRS computer, that said:

"Sorry for the delay in mailing your coupon booklets. It may be 30 days before your booklet is received. Please do not reorder coupons until this time frame has elapsed.

"We have enclosed blank coupons for your use until the preprinted coupon booklets have been received."

Well, the preprinted coupon books have been received, and received, and received...

"Right after we got the blank forms, we got two separate shipments of three books each," Mrs. Jackson said. "Then, the first week of March, we got 13 books, each in separate envelopes, on the same day. I just shrieked when the mailman brought them in, so the next time we got some more, I guess the word had spread at the Post Office, because the mailman just kind of backed off and threw them on the counter."

He threw 31 envelopes, each containing a booklet of 12 forms, on March 26.

"We haven't gotten any more since then," Mrs. Jackson said. "I called the IRS that afternoon, and asked the girls I talked to what to do with all of this. She said there is not much we could do — I suggested burning them, but she didn't think that was a good idea."

City eyes \$1.7 million budget

In a "workshop" meeting closed to the public, the Dimmitt City Aldermen discussed the proposed budget for the 1985-86 fiscal year that starts May 1.

Although an agenda was posted designating the session as the Aldermen's "official" meeting, the meeting had not been called to order at 8:30 p.m. when City Manager Paul Catoe told the *News*, "The Mayor (Wayne Collins) said we are going to be discussing personnel matters, and there won't be anything for you tonight."

Catoe then re-entered the mayor's office where the closed session was held.

Catoe did, however, provide the *News* with a copy of the proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year after reminding the *News*, "This is just the proposal—nothing on here is definite."

The city estimates it will receive \$282,227 from the tax roll, an increase of just over \$4,000 from the 1984-85 FY. The city also anticipates all receipts will total \$1.7 million, an increase of over \$230,000 from the current FY.

However, disbursements are expected to climb to \$1.67 million, up from \$1.33 million last year. The disbursements include several capital outlay items that must yet be approved by the aldermen, including a proposed computer system that would cost the city at least \$19,494 next year if the aldermen go along with Catoe's plan to buy a computer system under a lease-purchase arrangement.

Collins told the *News* Tuesday, however, the aldermen

may not go along with Catoe's plan to purchase an entire system for the city, but, instead, may plug into the IBM "main frame" unit at the Dim-

mitt School Administration building.

The Castro Co. Tax Appraisal District recently signed an agreement to use the DISD unit, which is connected by telephone lines to terminals at the CCTAD offices just east of the City Hall.

DISD Business Manager Gene King told the *News* Tuesday, "We would sure be interested in working out some type of arrangement with the city. When we bought the IBM system, the (DISD) School Board urged us to get in touch with all government entities that might be interested, including the Appraisal District,

Eight are indicted

The Castro County Grand Jury handed down eight indictments and one no-bill in the March 27 session.

Moses Vasquez, 17, of Dimmitt was indicted for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle in a March 26 incident in which a pickup was taken from David Hill. District/County Attorney Jimmy Davis said the charges may later be enhanced, since Vasquez has been arraigned on charges of burglary and felony criminal mischief.

Richard Earl Ewing, 26, of Dimmitt was indicted on charges of aggravated assault in a Feb. 13 incident in which he allegedly broke the nose of a young woman by striking her with a folding chair and his fists. The incident was reported to have happened at the People's Place in east Dimmitt.

Larry Wheeler, 43, and his wife, Lou, reported to be of Lubbock, and formerly of Dimmitt, were both indicted on charges of felony criminal mischief for \$2,000-worth of damage done to a house they had been leasing on Northwest Fifth Street in Dimmitt. The

Bobcat Relays set Saturday

Lubbock Christian and Friona are the favorites in the fourth annual Bobcat Relays Saturday at Dimmitt High School.

13 girls teams, 11 boys units and six JV boys squads are expected to participate, with field events and track preliminaries starting at 9 a.m. Saturday. Finals begin at 2:30 Saturday afternoon. There is no charge for admission.

Last year, Shallowater won the boys division, while the Bobbies won their own meet. Lubbock Christian is expected to present strong challenges in the relays, "and I think they have two really good sprinters," said Dimmitt coach George Razor. "Friona has a lot of depth, good relay teams — they're really strong."

Friona's top threat is Lacy Osborne in the 800, with an area-best time of 2:26. Marie Presch of Bovina will probably be the top individual in the meet, with a solid chance to take first place in the 100 meter dash, the 100 yard low hurdles, and the shot, discus and long jump.

The top local threats are Cara Odom (400) and Stephanie Killingsworth (200)

Other girls squads include Hale Center, Farwell, Ralls, Shallowater, Petersburg, Muleshoe, Olton, Kress, LCHS.

Quick service a Pulse advantage

In almost the time of a pulse beat, a banking transaction can travel hundreds of miles through the newly installed Pulse system at the First State Bank of Dimmitt.

Card holders making a transaction at the Pulse center in Dimmitt punch in information which is relayed by phone lines to the regional center in Richardson. Computers there consult with the local bank's computer, then the information is transmitted from Richardson's computers back to the Pulse machine in Dimmitt — all in about 20 seconds.

It gets more complicated if you make a transaction away from the town in which your card was issued. For example, if a Dimmitt card holder made a withdrawal through a Pulse machine in Hereford, the information would be relayed to Pulse headquarters in Houston, then switched to the Richardson regional center, which would talk to the Dimmitt bank's computer. The figures would travel back to Richardson's computers, back to Houston, and then to the Pulse machine in Hereford. This time the delay would be about 30 seconds.

Transactions that can be made include deposits to savings or checking accounts, withdrawals from savings or checking accounts, transfer of funds from savings to checking or from checking to savings, or just finding out your current balance.

A worry that many potential card users express is "What happens if my card is lost or stolen?"

"Nothing," says FSB vice president Mike Littlefield, "as long as proper precautions are taken to safeguard the cardholder's PIN (personal identification number)."

Littlefield advises cardholders to memorize their PIN as soon as they receive it and then store it in a safe place. PIN numbers are only distributed in person at the bank.

"But under no circumstances should the PIN be kept with the Pulse card," he emphasized.

The Pulse machine has a special feature that will retrieve cards reported stolen if they are placed in a machine. Also, cards accidentally left in a machine after a transaction will be automatically "swallowed" after 30 seconds. They may be retrieved from the bank the next business day.

PIN numbers are correlated with the individual card numbers only through a special process in the regional computers. PIN and card numbers are also entirely separate from numbers assigned to local checking or savings accounts.

A receipt is issued for each transaction that is handled through the Pulse machine, and each is recorded on an audit tape. Deposit amounts entered on the machine's keyboard will be stamped twice on the outside of the special deposit envelope and later checked for correlation with the amount actually deposited.

The machine will not permit withdrawal of more funds than are shown in an account, and not more than \$200 in a single withdrawal, nor more than \$300 in a 24-hour period.



Coins may not be handled by the system at all, either in deposits or withdrawals. Also, withdrawals may be made only in increments of 10's, such as \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, etc. Only \$10- and \$20-bills are dispensed.

A special sign alerting out-of-town cardholders to the Pulse machine in Dimmitt will be placed near the bank on North US 385. Pulse has over 3,100 locations in Texas,

Oklahoma, Louisiana and New Mexico.

Local service is free, while a 75-cent charge is added to the monthly statement for any out-of-town transactions.

Littlefield said that about 700 local customers have applied for the new Pulse cards, but not all have come to the bank to get their PIN. He added that a free demonstration of how the machine works is included.

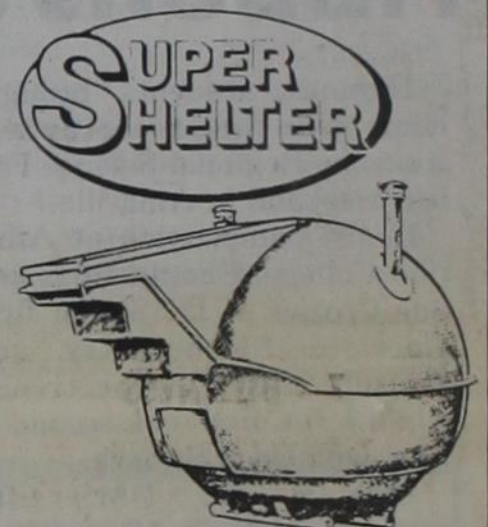

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING A DANGEROUS BUILDING WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR A PROCEDURE FOR THE ABATEMENT AND/OR REMOVAL OF SUCH BUILDINGS; SETTING FORTH STANDARDS FOR VACATING, REPAIRING, AND DEMOLISHING BUILDINGS OR STRUCTURES; PROVIDING FOR RECOVERY OF COST OF REPAIR OR DEMOLITION OF DANGEROUS BUILDINGS; PROVIDING FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE AND ITS TERMS AND CONDITIONS, CONTAINING A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

The following sections of the ordinance are also hereby published in the Castro County News as specified in Section X.

ENFORCEMENT OF THE ORDER OF THE BUILDING OFFICIAL OR THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

A. GENERAL. After any order of the Building Official or the Board of Aldermen made pursuant to this code shall become final, no person to whom such order is directed shall fail, neglect or refuse to obey any such order. Any such person who fails to comply with any such order is guilty of a misdemeanor.

B. FAILURE TO OBEY ORDER. If, after any order of the Building Official or the Board of Aldermen made pursuant to this code has become final, the person to whom such order is directed shall fail, neglect or refuse to obey such order, the Building Official may, after consulting with the City Manager, either cause such person to be prosecuted through proper legal procedures or initiate action to abate such building as a public nuisance. If the person or persons in question are found guilty of refusing to comply with the appropriate order, they may be fined from \$1.00 to \$200.00 per occurrence. Each day that the person or persons refuse to comply with the order, may be considered a separate offense.

C. FAILURE TO COMMENCE WORK. Whenever the required repair or demolition is not commenced within 30 days after any final notice and order issued under this code becomes effective, the following actions may be taken by the City.

1. The Building Official will make certain that the building is therefore posted to guarantee that no person will occupy or enter the building, except for the purpose of either repair or demolition after appropriate permits are obtained.

2. The Building Official may also request that the City Manager place the item on the agenda for further discussion by the Members of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen to determine whether the City may order the building repaired by an outside contractor, or demolished. Members of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen will make all final decisions with regard to the final disposition of the building or structures.

E. INTERFERENCE WITH REPAIR OR DEMOLITION WORK PROHIBITED. In the event that the person or persons who have been ordered to repair or demolish the building or structure fails to comply to the terms of the final order, then in such event the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen will exercise their right to determine the proper course of action. Once actual repair or demolition work begins, as authorized by the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen, no person shall obstruct, impede, or interfere with any officer, employee, contractor, or authorized representative of the jurisdiction. Any person who shall obstruct, impede or interfere, as above described, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The applicant proposes to continue operation of a cattle feedlot, increase the number of animals contained therein from 5,000 to 25,000 head, and reduce the feedlot and associated area from 300 to 200 acres. The cattle holding pens and associated area cover approximately 200 acres. Wastewater and rainfall runoff from the area is routed into a playa lake with a capacity of approximately 180 acre-feet which is located completely on the permittee's land. Disposal of the wastewater and runoff is by natural evaporation; however, if necessary, facilities are available to irrigate approximately 1600 acres of farmland. Manure generated at this site is to be disposed of on cropland as a fertilizer and soil amendment. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The cattle feedlot is approximately 6 miles west of the City of Dimmitt via State Highway 86 and 1.5 miles south of the intersection of FM Road 1055 and State Highway 86 in Castro County, Texas. The feedlot, retention facilities and land used for disposal are within the watershed of an unnamed draw which drains into the North Fork of Running Water Draw; thence into the White River; thence into the White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC 341 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

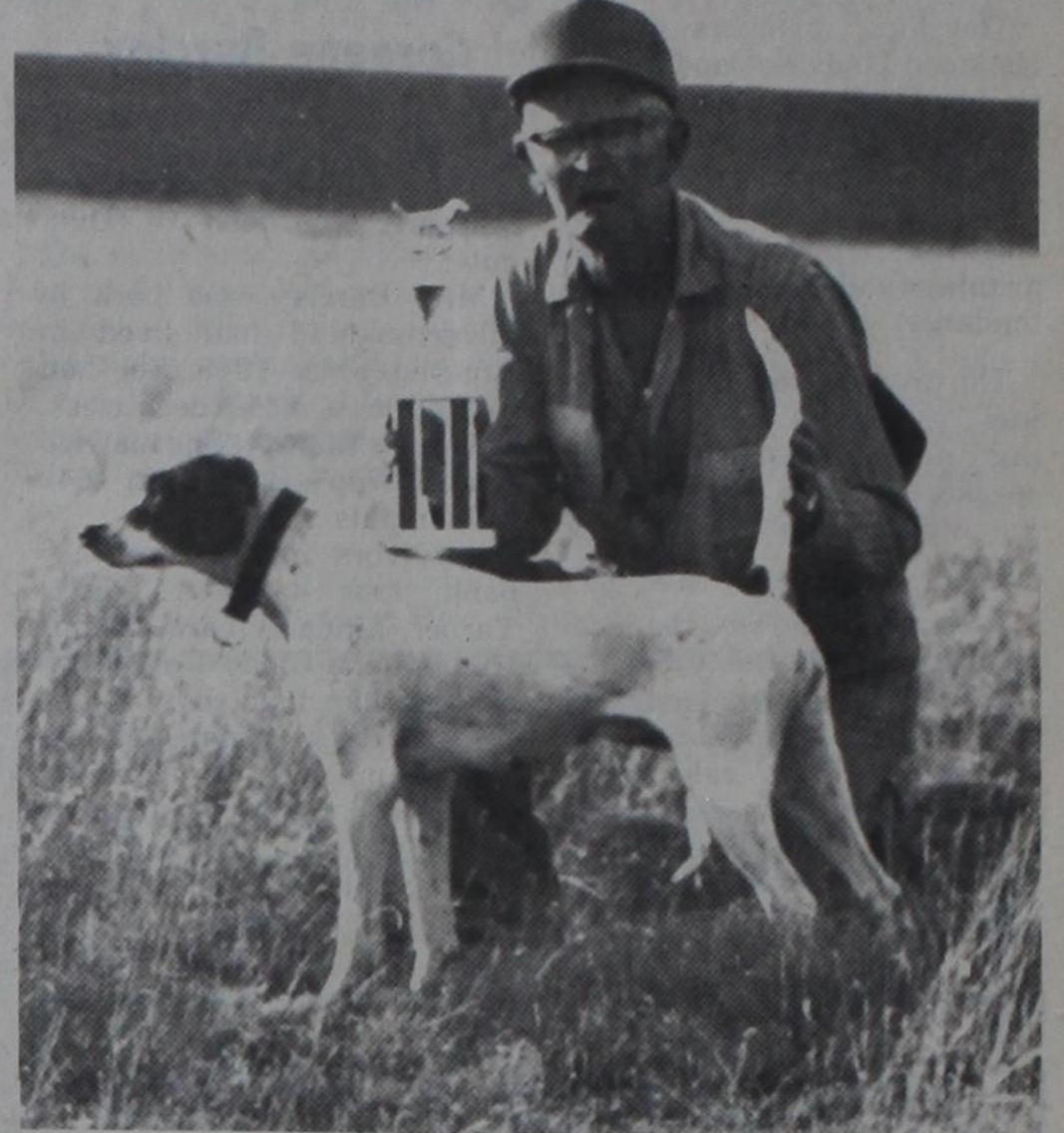
third with 798 points.

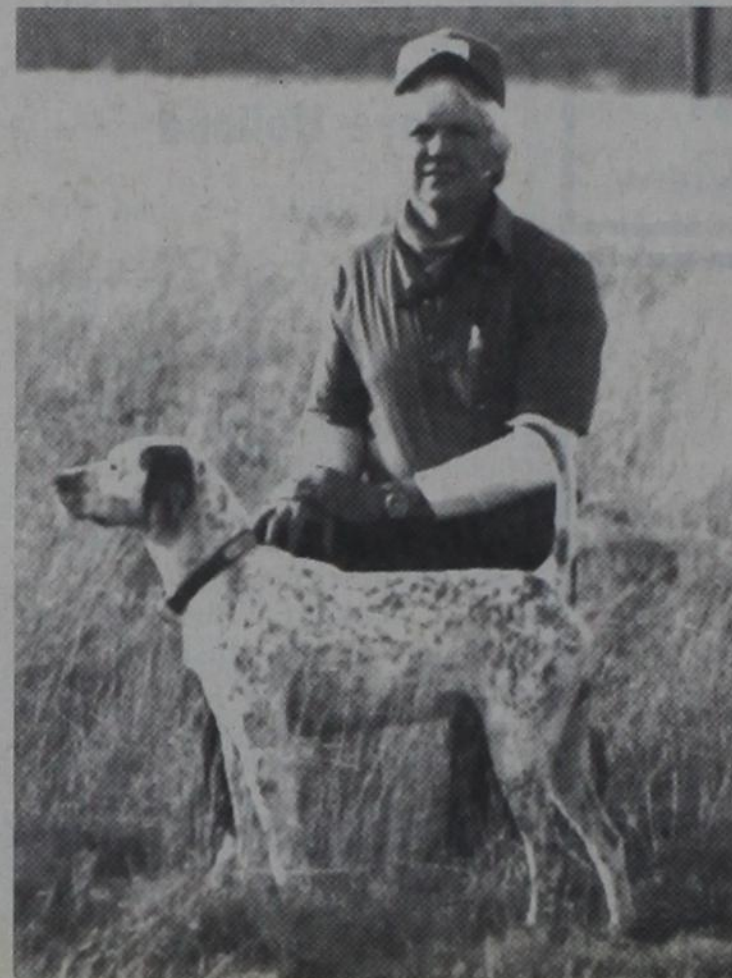

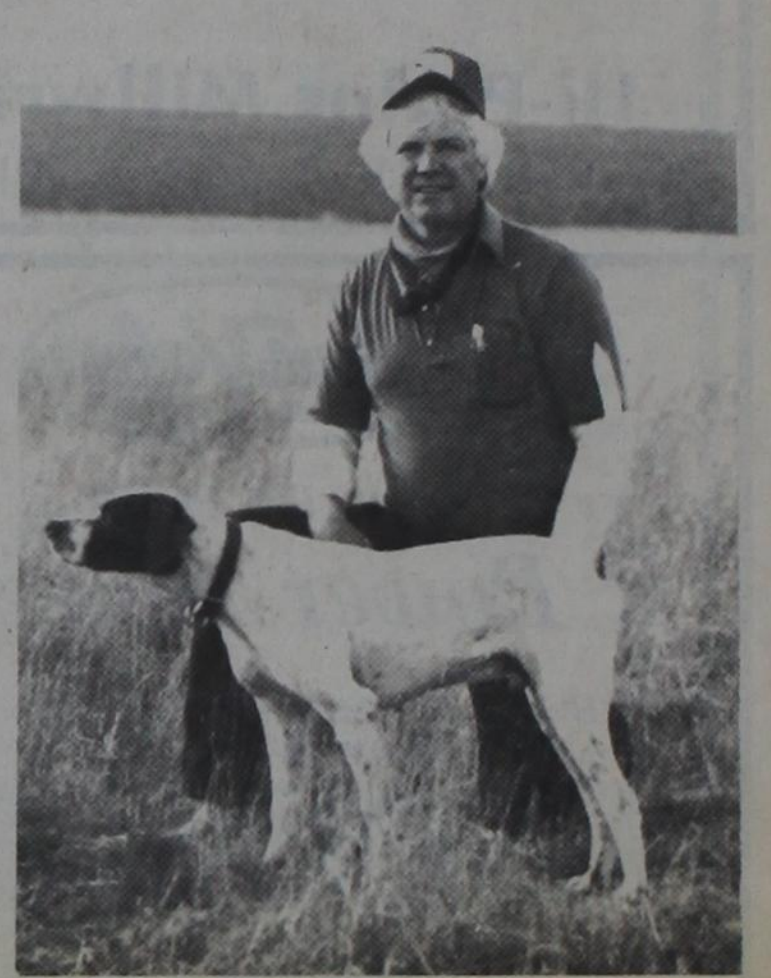

KEITH LOWE WITH POINTER 'DUKE' ... placed third in Sunday's trials

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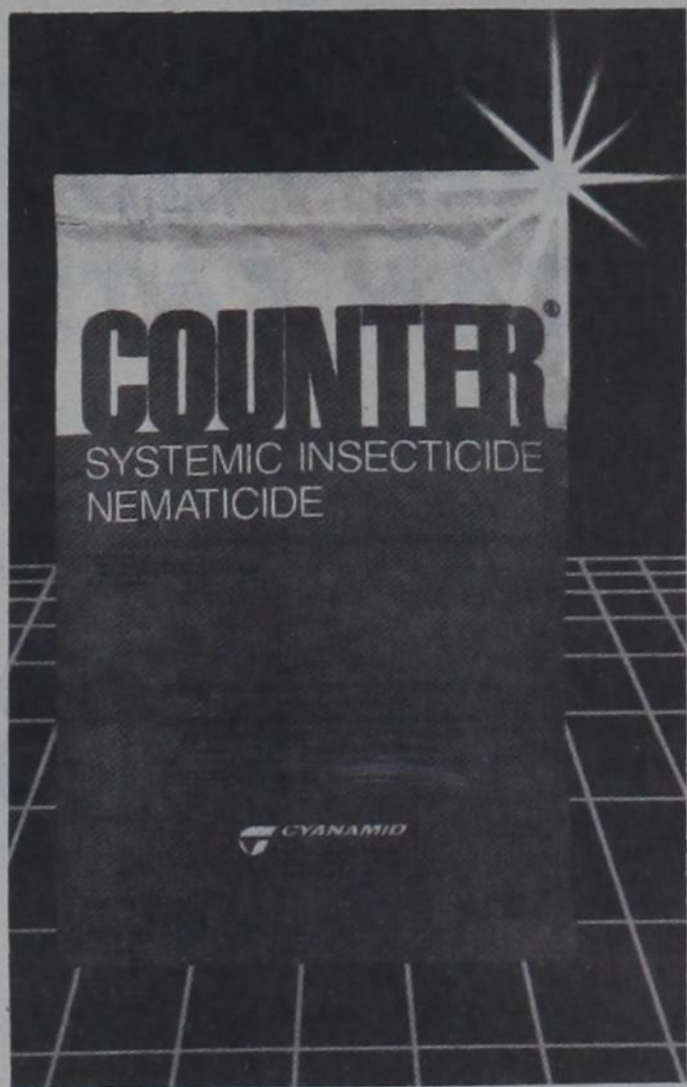

city and county. It would lower the cost to them, to the school, and to taxpayers all over."

The CCTAD is currently paying \$10,000 annually for use of the schools main system, but the DISD is the CCTAD's biggest customer, placing the two in a "trading dollars" situation.

"Paul has been looking at this particular system for quite some time," Collins said in reference to the NCR TOWER system Catoe has proposed in the budget. The lump-sum cost for the hardware is \$28,257, with an additional \$18,195 minimum for software, and an additional \$2,610 for freight, paper goods, site preparation and a phone jack for the modem.

"I feel we'll go along with something," Collins said, "but I don't know if we'll go along with that (Catoe's proposal)."

Another large capital outlay item in the proposed budget is \$20,000 that would be used to match 10% of a \$200,000 grant that has been applied for from the Federal Aviation Administration.

The \$220,000, if received, would be used to lengthen the runways and to extend the taxiway to the south end of the runway.

Currently, the taxiway goes only to the north end of the 4,000-ft. runway.

Also coming out of the 1985-86 FY budget is \$37,265 for the proposed paving project, \$8,820 for the Fire Dept.,

\$8,710 for the Police Dept., \$10,000 for the city's one-third of a new ambulance at Plains Memorial Hospital, an additional \$755 for equipment in the Aged and Public Health Dept., and \$3,000 for new dumpsters.

Also included in the proposed budget is \$88,046 the city administration feels will be on hand from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds during the year and \$27,790 in accrued interest income from RS funds from previous years.

The proposed RS budget, which will be heard in public for the first time next Monday, includes \$700 for the Mayor's Beautification Council, \$5,000 for the Castro County Economic Development Commission, \$3,200 for the Central Plains MH/MR Center, plus funds for the ambulance, most of the money for the matching funds for the airport expansion, \$28,642 for seal coating work, and \$50,000 for drainage work in the city. Those items equal the \$115,836 anticipated available from the RS funds during the upcoming fiscal year.

Collins said the aldermen were "fairly receptive" to the capital outlay items listed and the budget as a whole during the closed session, and added the aldermen did not believe there would be a need for any type of tax increase, with an anticipated surplus of \$29,496 in the proposed 1985-86 FY budget.

"I don't know if we'll go along with any pay increases, though," Collins said. "We have a five percent pay increase in the budget, and I just don't know how that will turn out."

FAT COWS HAVE MORE CALVES

Cows in good condition have higher pregnancy rates, wean heavier calves and are ready to rebreed sooner, notes a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A cow's body condition can be scored on the basis of fat cover over the spine, ribs, hook bones and pin bones. On a scale of one to nine, cows scoring a five or higher have been found to have higher pregnancy rates than those with lower scores.

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

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

Ralston says leaf rust near epidemic

Castro county wheat growers need to keep a sharp lookout for leaf rust disease on their crop this spring.

Conditions seem to be right this year for a major leaf rust problem over much of the state according to County Agent Seth Ralston.

Leaf rust is caused by a fungus and appears as small, round orange spots on the leaves. A heavy infection will defoliate the plant and interfere with grain development.

Many wheat varieties are susceptible to leaf rust fungus, but the incidence of the organism varies greatly from year to year, Ralston noted.

One of the best practices for dealing with leaf rust is to plant resistant varieties or at least several different varieties of wheat each year. Then, if the disease becomes a problem, not all varieties may be affected. Producers that plant all their wheat acreage to a

susceptible variety generally suffer the greatest losses when a leaf rust epidemic hits.

With good yield prospects this spring because of favorable moisture conditions, producers will need to consider applying a fungicide to their wheat if leaf rust becomes a threat, Ralston said. Using a fungicide is a good alternative if the potential yield exceeds 40 bushels per acre.

Two types of fungicides are available that vary in effectiveness and cost, Ralston explained. The systemic type, Bayleton, is quite effective but expensive. Protectant type fungicides such as Manzate 200 and Dithane M-45 are less expensive but are effective for only a short period.

Time of fungicide application is also critical, Ralston emphasized. A producer must consider the susceptibility of the variety being grown, the potential for continued disease development, and the growth

stage of the crop. Generally, the flag leaf should be protected from the time it is formed until the grain is filled.

When the threat of leaf rust is great and potential yields exceed 60 bushels per acre, growers should apply a fungicide prior to the development of the flag leaf. In this case, the systemic type fungicide should be applied at the time of jointing and again as the flag leaf begins to unfold. With protectant type fungicides, additional applications may be needed to get the same level of control, Ralston said.

Actual control level depends on how well the fungicide application is timed, how well it is applied and the seriousness of the rust problem. Fungicides are almost always applied by air, and best results are achieved when the correct dosage is made in five gallons of water per acre.

Producers expecting a good wheat harvest this spring should be able to get a good return on money spent on fungicides to control leaf rust, assuming there are no other limiting factors, Ralston said.

At the West Texas State University Judging Contest, the Dairy Products team of Cinnamon Cox, Jerry McMillon, Ricky McKay and Laura Nelson placed second overall. Cox placed second, McMillon fifth and McKay tenth in the individual competition.

In Meat Judging, the team of Doug Nelson, Karen Nelson, Bruce Bryant and Danny Dutton placed fifth overall, while Doug Nelson took second place

in the individual competition.

Also at WTSU, the land judging team of Robert Green, Garry Leatherwood, Mark West and Todd Bradley placed second in the Plainview District standings.

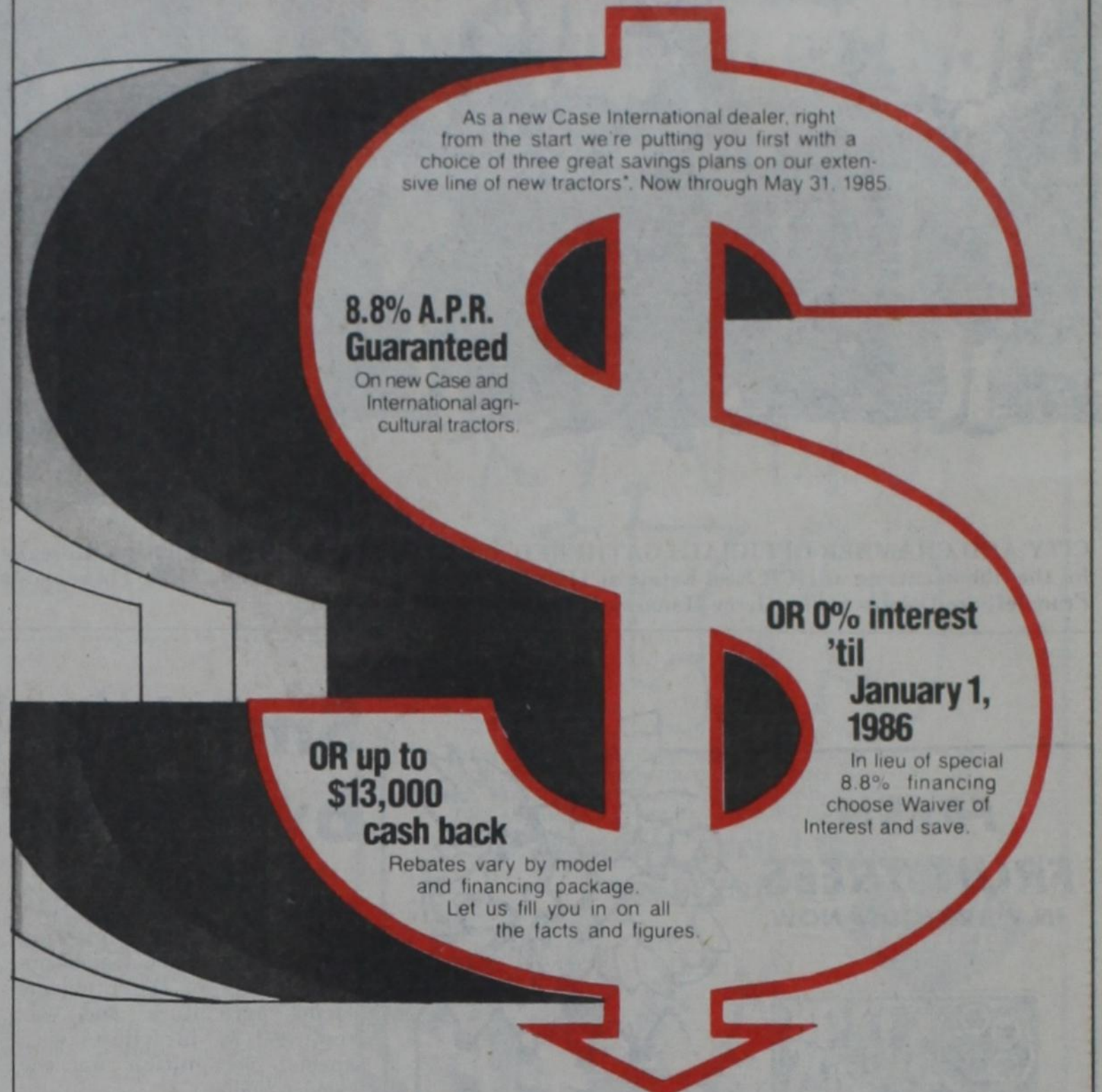

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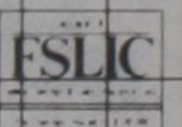

Smith is honored by state Senate

Panhandle-area vegetable farmer David Smith of Hart recently joined in a growing campaign to make legislators more aware of the problems facing agriculture, and was rewarded for his efforts with special recognition on the Senate floor.

Smith, who farms 4,000 acres in Castro County, conferred with members of the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee March 27 to update them on agriculture issues in the Panhandle. He told them agriculture must be handled with care if it is to survive its current economic crisis.

After the meeting, Subcommittee Chairman Bill Sarpalius, D-Canyon, took Smith to the Senate and introduced a resolution honoring Smith for his contributions to agriculture. Sarpalius' resolution passed unanimously, and Smith received additional congratulations from Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Sarpalius said later that agriculture will get fair treatment in Texas if producers continue to educate lawmakers about the unique problems facing farmers and ranchers.

"We need people like David Smith to come to Austin more often and discuss agriculture issues with the Legislature," Sarpalius said. "Let's face it. The Legislature is becoming an urban body. If we're going to be responsible to agriculture, we're going to have to listen closely to the people involved in farming and ranching."

Sarpalius said Smith is ideally suited for the task. The senator pointed to Smith's efforts with the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Association and the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council.

Smith currently is on the insurance board of the statewide association and is a former president of the Panhandle-area organization. He also has been active in government organizations, serving on the Governor's Select Committee on Farmworkers Insurance and Texas Dept. of Agriculture

Steering Committee on Food and Fiber Processing.

He recently added to that list of accomplishments by agreeing to serve as a director of the High Plains Research Foundation and the Texas Tech University Plant and Soil Sciences Advisory Committee.

Smith resides in Hart with his wife, Patricia; his two sons, Dennis and Zachary; and his daughter, Shelley.

Estimated taxes due by April 15

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to file estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says. The due date for the first quarterly estimated tax payment for 1985 is April 15.

You are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax if you have income not subject to withholding of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$400 on next year's return. The IRS states that you are also liable if you expect to owe at least \$400 and your gross income is more than:

- \$20,000 if you file as single, head of household, or qualifying widow or widower.

- \$10,000 if you are married, can file a joint declaration, and both of you have received wages for 1985.

- \$5,000 if you are married and cannot file a joint declaration.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments, and there is a substantial penalty for underpayment of estimated taxes.

For 1985 returns, the three other estimated tax installment dates are: June 17, Sept. 16, and Jan. 15, 1986.

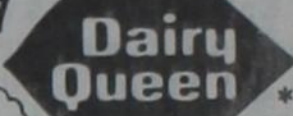

Information gathered will be relayed to Sen. Sarpalius by his staff.

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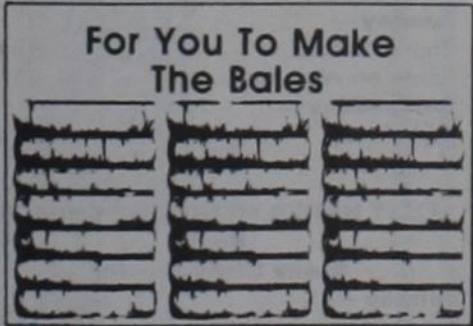

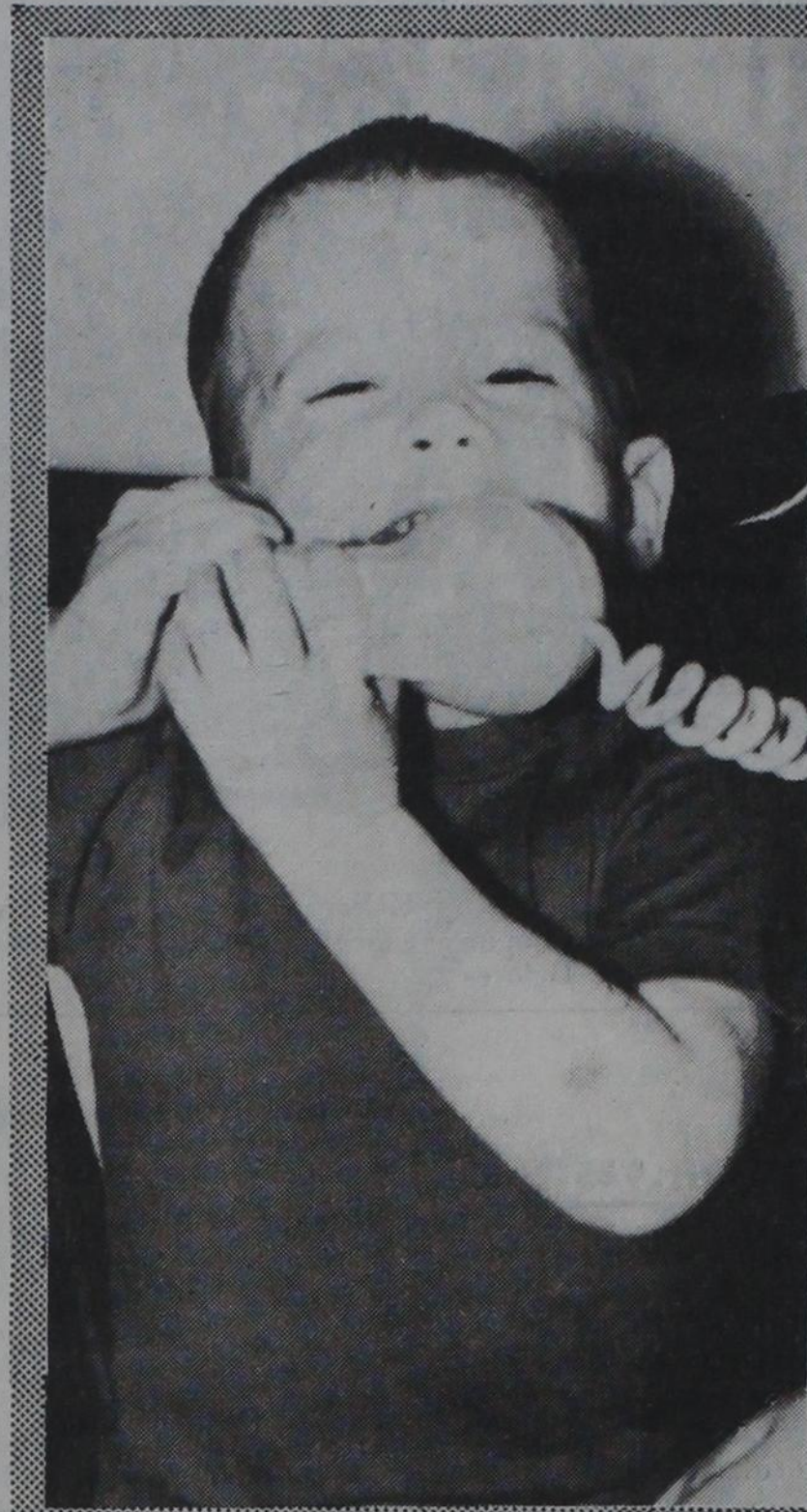

Time to start lawn care is now

This time of year, home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season just around the corner.

County Agent Seth Ralston suggests three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start—scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Scalping a lawn in early spring serves to revitalize it and promote early spring growth, Ralston pointed out.

"Begin the operation by lowering the lawnmower blade to 1/2 inch to one inch below the normal setting," Ralston said. "Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing."

Ralston also recommends keeping the lawnmower blade lowered until midsummer.

After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium) to

promote leaf and root growth, Ralston advises. Use one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 12 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or eight pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the early summer and fall.

For a dark green lawn, Ralston suggests applying nitrogen every 50 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from becoming a problem, apply a preemergence herbicide (weed killer) containing benefin, dacthal or bensulide in early spring, Ralston said, after the grass has recovered from winter.

Applying a preemergence herbicide too early this year could further weaken turfgrasses injured by winter conditions. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use, but, as with all herbicides, should be used only according label instructions.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn, Ralston said.
