

# **Brice** Allen Named Conservation Farmer In Crosby County

(Editor's note: The following story concerning Brice Allen irrigate peas at a time when his cotton does not need water. Brice Allen has been selected by Crosbyton Lions Club as their nominee for Crosby County's outstanding conservation farmer for 1959. Lee Suther, county agent, introduced him at Lions luncheon Wednesday.

Allen is making good progress with his conservation plan on 800 acres he operates 10 miles northeast of Crosbylond and rents the rest.

On the 480 acres Allen owns, he (1) levelled 66 acres to save rainfall and improve irrigation effiency (2) uses rotation of cotton and small grains.

This latter rotation practice is to have cotton on the land no more than two years in succession. This maintains soil organic matter and furnishes residues for erosion protection.

Tries Winter Peas

(3) Uses nitrogen fertilizers on feed stubble to offset nitrogen tie-up due to decomposition, and uses nitrogen on small grains for maximum produc-

(4) In July, 1959, he planted six acres of Austrian winter peas for soil improvement. These had formed a solid had formed a solid ground cover by early Decemwith nitrogen modules.

Allen uses tandem disc to chop peas into the soil surface. He expects benefits from organic matter and nitrogen formation. Allen thinks this has good possibilities because he can

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Has Livestock There are several other things which Allen practices on both program, maintaining 30 head of grade Hereford cows. On small grain pasture, he uses a system of rotation grazing, thus allowing pasture to regain its growth while being rested.

Last year, he grew six acres of Sudex which furnished grazing for four head of cattle for about six weeks.

A unique practice of Allen's is to maintain a strip of small ton. He owns 480 acres of this grains at the lower end of irrigation furrows. This strip col lects runoff from rainfall and any irrigation tail water that may occur, and carries it to a flatter portion of the field where it can spread out and soak into the ground.

This keeps water out of the road ditch and prevents erosion in the field.

Designs Recharge System Allen has designed his own recharge system on two irrigation wells. These wells are located in lakes which are occasionally flooded by runoff

When flooding occurs, Allen is able to drain this water into the water bearing sands by using his irrigation well. He has drained up to 200 surface

An eye opener to Soviet Premier Krushchev on his U. S. visit should be the spectacular use of energy in American homes and factories, and in transportation. The above chart compares American and Soviet energy production, and projects the comparison to 1965. Russia is second to the U. S. in total energy output, but is behind at least a dozen Free World countries in per capita energy use. The Soviet recently has announced vast new programs to expand energy output with a 1965 goal as shown here. Despite these programs, America can maintain "energy supremacy" for the foreseeable future, says the Independent Petroleum Association of America. Petroleum fuels, oil and natural gas, provided 69 percent of U.S. energy needs in 1957 and by 1965 will be filling 72 percent of our requirements.


