Watch For Moth And Carpet Beetles

Now that we keep our nouses warm all year, the pests that damage wool rugs and carpets can thrive as well in the winter as in the summer.

Thorough cleaning and cor-rect spray treatment will protect carpets and rugs from clothes noths and carpet beetles. Regular care with the vacuum cleaner is the first step. It prevents dust, lint and hair from ac-cumulating and offering extra food for the pests. It can remove the insects themselves and their eggs. 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




