

Summer and "sleeping sick-ess" go hand in hand.

Sleeping sickness is actually type of encephalities trans mitted by infective mosquitoes The popular name is derived from the stupor it sometimes causes among its victims.

Since mosquitoes abound in warm weather, summer is the danger season for mosquitoborne encephalitis. The State Department of Health last year received reports of 57 cases, all of which occurred during the months of summer and early Altogether there are some 75

species of mosquitoes which have been identified in Texas. but encephalitis is spread princhally by just two. The ex perts call them "culex tarsalis" and "culex quinquefaciatus. The latter is sometimes called the household mosquito because it has adapted itself to backyard environments.

The time it takes a mosquito to develop from egg to the blood-hungry adult that plagues you on a summer night epends on the species, the ply, say State Health Department entomolgists. In Texas it can vary from four days to two

Here are some suggestions on ways to minimize mosquito populations in and around your home this summer.

Eliminate all possibilities of water standing and stagnat ing. Clean gutters, pick up old buckets, cans, automobile tires and other objects likely to catever, are general in scope. Since ch and hold rain water. Make soils vary so much in nutrient sure septic tanks or cesspools are covered with earth.

Evaporative coolers and water containers for pets and live-The stock should be drained and refilled weekly. Tree holes should be filled with cement or mor-

andowners in Parmer County near Farwell have joined in a cooperative program for quail production this year, according o W. J. Carruth Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission

Working with County Agent Joe W. Jones, landowners have signed agreements to plant quail from the State game farm, under the direction of the Parmer County Game Management Association. The property now is being inspected by Geme Warden Pat Donnelly, as is required before quail can be released from the hatchery. According to County Agent Jones, the association has bought 125 Game Cooperator signs which will be placed on fences of the landowners participating in the program.

Much of the land involved is in the open range country bor-dering the New Mexico boundary. Approximately 400,000 acres of land is under irrigation in Parmer County, it being one of the principal grain sor ghum producing areas of the



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
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
