Board authority to stop waste ot underground water. He recounted the beginning of the water district eight years ago, and said that since 1954 the District had issued a total of 7,000 permits to drill wells, of which 34 percent were replacement wells.

He told something of the District's water recharge program and said that if all water caught in lakes on the Plains could be put back into the underground strata, it would amount to ony 1,260,000 acre feet each year while the yearly withdrawal is close to five million acre feet.

He said that the law under which the Underground Water District was formed forbids the drilling of wells which allow water from a higher strata to seep to a lower strata, the pollution of underground water, or allowing water pumped for irrigation purposes to escape from the field into a road way. lake or land of a neighboring farmer. The minimum fine is \$100 and it increases with each offense.

"The control of waste water is a ticklish situation and we must feel our way," he said. However due to the decline in the water bowl, he said that district officials feel that something must be done to prevent waste. He stated that district records indicate that 1956 was the top production year in the pumping of underground water and that trend has been downward since that time because the water is not as easily available as it has been. He estimated that the High Plains farmers pumped almost six million acre feet of water that


