UNION OF CHURCH AND STATE

Martin Luther was not only active in trying to reform the Roman Catholic Church, he also translated the Bible into the German language. In his efforts to swing away from the formalities and human works of Roman Catholicism, he went to the opposite extreme and advocated

Romans 3:28 says, "Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith without the deeds of the law." The passage means one is justified by faith in Christ and his gospel without the deeds of the law of Moses. Luther thought it meant one is justified without any deeds or works on the part of the sinner, even obeying the gospel of Christ and translated the verse "man is justified by faith only". This is how the doctrine of "faith only" came to be taught by so many protestant

"Epistle of Straw"

Luther left the book of James out of his translation and called it an "epistle of straw" because James 2:24 reads, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only." It is easy to see how his misunderstanding of Romans 3:28 created the false doctrine of "saivation by faith only".


