#### Voice For The Voiceless

Last month in Telephone Talk I mentioned the successful launching of Echo, the communication satellite in orbit 1,000 miles above the earth.

Now I have news of still another product of communications research. It's a new artificial larynx to help people with impaired vocal chords to speak again.

This electionic larynx is really a "new voice" for people who have lost the use of their vocal chords. When hold against the throat, this 7-ounce device (looks something like a flashlight) replaces the vibrations of normal vocal chords to produce speech. It is being offered on a non-profit basis.

In an age of great scientific achievements such as space satellite communication, the Bell solar battery and transistors (all pioneered by Bell scientists), it's reassuring to know that telephone research has not overlooked human needs in the search for better communication



### **Earning Rules Changed For Social Security**

As before, held the now held than they do now. As before, held the now he however, a person is considered Hill, 1,115 retired if he or she is not earning more than \$1200 per year. A beneficiary who earns more than \$1200 oses only \$1 of benefits for every \$2 that he earns between \$1200 loses only \$1 of benefits for earnings above \$1500, he loves \$1 of his benefits.

Under the rules in effect before 1961, a beneficiary who earned over \$1200 in a year would lose a whole month's benefit check for every \$80, or fraction of \$80 by which his earnings exceed \$1200. So, if his earnings were over \$2080, he would lose all benefit checks for the year.

However, under both the old and the new rules, a beneficiary can be paid his full benefit check for any month in which he neither works for wages of more than \$100 nor renders substantial services in self-employment. It does not matter how high his total earnings for the year may go, he will still be paid his checks for those months.

If you're past retirement age, but have not yet applied for your social security benefits because your earnings are too high, get in touch with your security office now. 



#### **Home Making** Hints

by Phyllis Roggendorff County Home Demonstration Agent

How Much Turkey? Homemakers shopping for turkey often ask how much to buy I hope these suggestions will help

you if this is your problem. Small turkeys have a larger percentage of bone than do the larger birds. Allow 3/4 to 1 pound of ready-to-cook turkey for each serving — if the bird weighs less than 12 pounds. Allow ½ to ¾ pound per serving if the bird weighs 12 pounds or more.

If you are expecting your family and guests to have big appetities, you may need to allow more than one serving per person. Too, you may want planned left-overs to take care of some extra holiday meals. If so, make allowances as you shop.

Many fields are showing heavy infestation of leaf rust. This disease is caused by a fungus para-The disease attacks leaves care of elderly lady at Memphis, producing small, round orange Texas. Mrs. Bob Muncy, Phone red pustules. This disease can red pustules. This disease can occur anytime of the year. Generally, the disease appears in early

spring during moderately cool weather and adequate moisture. We have had a heavy buildup of rust in Floyd County. The rust will continue to cause damage until the temperature gets below 60 degrees F. The rust will be killed during cold weather and becomes dormant below 60 degrees F, however much colder

weather will kill the disease. Severely infested fields of wheat which show many dead leaves may have a high percent-age of winter kill due to the weakened condition of the plants.

There is no practical means of controlling rust at the present time except planting tolerant varieties. The only varieties available at the present time are Quanah and Ponco. Crockett is susceptible during seedling stage but develops resistance from the root stage to maturity.






