Department will sponsor a short course on "Microcomputers In Agriculture. The short course will be held in the science room at the high school.


Dates for the short course are Monday March 7, Monday March 21, and Monday March 28. The short course will be from 7:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. on each night

The 75 percent lean ground beef is also recommended for recipes in which the meat does not have to be browned before adding other ingredients. It reduces the cost of preparing meat loaf,

Use ground beef with high fat in recipes where the meat is browned and the dripping poured off, such as tacos or chili. This will provide a moist and juicy product which cooks faster.

Make note of the amount of ground beef to be purchased. One pound contains about four (3 ounce) servings after it is cooked. To re-package a large amount of beef into smaller servings, re-wrap in moisture proof freezer paper and freeze immediately. If you will be preparing the ground beef in patties, shape the patties prior to freezing them.

Think of the nutritional value of ground beef when you buy. You want the most nutrition you can buy for your money. Ground beef provides complete protein which helps maintain growth and repair of body tissues. Beef is a good source of the B-complex vitamin which helps change food to energy and aids in digestion. It provides iron needed for healthy red blood cells and the transfer of oxygen to cells. Beef also adds zinc which is needed for chemical changes that occur in protein, carbohydrate and fats after digestion and absorption.

Let ground beef be a real bonus for you. Remember it when considering cost, versatility, nutrition and just plain good flavor.




THE LITTLE DRIBBLERS TEAM coached by Robert Stovall (right) is (Front L-R): Frank Suarez, Grant Stovall and Troy



Neighborhood Watch Comments

There are many pretenses, devised by would-be burglars, used to gain access into residences. Among the most common is posing as some type of door-to-door salesman. Even if they actually do have a product for sale, care should be taken in determining the validity of their intentions. Many cities have solicitation ordinances to help deter some of this type of activity.

Floydada has such a solicitation ordinance, whereby door-to-door vendors and solicitors are required by law to register at the city offices prior to canvassing the neighborhoods. In most cases, salesmen are required to obtain a business permit and they also undergo an investigation by law enforcement authorities. In the case of religious and other types of non-profit solicitors, they still must obtain clearance through the city secretary's office to ascertain their legitimate intent.

If a citizen is approached by a door-to-door solicitor, the first question to be asked the salesman should be, "Do you have a permit and clearance from the City of Floydada?" The legitimate caller should be more than happy to present the proper credentials. If it is determined that this clearance has not been obtained, residents are urged to call the police immediately, giving a description of the person, his or her automobile description and license number, product offered, and any other information by which the person or persons can be located and investigated.

Seasonal door-to-door salesmen, such as wood or fruit vendors, seldom acquire the necessary permit and/or clearance. The solicitation ordinance is designed to allow only those with legitimate business from going door-todoor in the neighborhoods. Those without the proper credentials should be turned in at once for two reasons((1) they are selling their goods within the city without a business license, and (2) they may be doing more than just selling their wares -- they may be using a sales come-on as a cover for "casing" neighborhoods for burglary intentions.

Today's burglar is brazen. He oper-

ates openly -- not dressed in dark clothes, nor with the furtive actions of the so-called "cat burglar." In a booklet, furnished by the Ad Council in conjunction with the Crime Prevention Coalition, the following tips are listed as to how some burglars operates:

1. He may drive a truck and dress as a service repairman.

2. He may knock at your door, using various pretenses, to appraise the house for valuable items.

3. Burglars often cruise neighborhoods, looking for absentee owners or such tell-tale signs as newspapers which have not been removed from the front of the house.

4. Another favorite trick is the wrong-number telephone call to find out if the owner is at home before attempting to enter a residence.

5. Quick thefts of purses and other valuables are commonly carried out by burglars who enter an opposite door when the homeowner is seen working outside in his yard.

One of the most important ways of protecting your home, and one of the basic principals of "NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH," is to know your neighbors. Make them fully aware of your family's living habits -- who comes and goes to your house and when. Get to know theirs equally well. When you are familiar with regular visitors, strangers in the neighborhood are easy to spot. If you should notice a stranger who appears to be doing something out of the ordinary, call the police immediately. It is better to be a little "nosey" and safe than to "look the other way" and be sorry!

Citizens who are concerned about the safety and security of their homes and neighborhoods should get involved with FLOYDADA NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH. 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FmHA asked for more flexible loans

The chairman of the National Cotton Council's Special Task Force on Credit recently called for more flexibility in the Farmers Home Administration loan programs.

Testifying before the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Conservation and Credit, Lloyd Cline, Lamesa, Texas, cotton producer, said such flexibility is needed if FmHA and other agencies are to meet the needs of agriculture and handlers and processors.

Cline, who also serves as a Council vice president, recommended that the existing \$100,000 limit on FmHA operating loans and the \$200,000 on guaranteed loans be increased to reflect the size of today's farming operations and sharply higher production costs.

Eligibility for supplemental operating loans under the emergency disaster loan program should be extended for two additional years for borrowers who experienced a natural disaster after December 15, 1979, he said.

Pointing out that borrowers prior to

that date continue to be eligible through fiscal 1984, Cline said equal treatment for both sets of borrowers would remove an inequity. In addition, the change would greatly assist producers who suffered recent disasters such as the one experienced by Texas High Plains growers in 1982.

Cline recommended that the time period over which FmHA may reschedule existing loans be extended from 7

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to possibly 15 years or more.

He also called for provisions to assist related agribusinesses, such as cotton gins, warehouses, and cottonseed crushers, with interim financing needs during implementation of the paymentin-kind program.

This action could be taken through the business and industry loan provisions of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, Cline said.

I am writing to ask Floydada area residents to do themselves and their neighbors a favor: check with the telephone company before digging near posted cable warning signs.

Last year, Southwestern Bill telephone cable repair costs in Texas totaled almost \$5 million for more than 6,000 incidents of cable cuts and damage.

Sometimes, cable damage affects only a few people and can be repaired quickly. All too often, however, cable damage means loss of telephone service to major sections of cities or even entire communities. Cable cuts sometimes isolate hospitals, police and fire departments.

A large number of long distance transcontinental coaxial cables run through Texas. These cables daily carry vital long distance telephone messages and data communications to millions of businesses and people. When those cables are cut, long distance calls are routed in other ways if possible, but a jammed network can result, affecting many callers.

A suggestion for anyone planning digging activities: before plowing, building fences or terraces, installing sprinklers, landscaping or digging, please look for telephone company cable warning signs. Also, please watch out for aerial cable when working with tall equipment.

The cable warning signs display a telephone number that may be called to notify the telephone company of any work planned near cable routes.

When we receive a call, we will promptly send someone to pinpoint the exact cable location. We do bill for damage to our cables, and the repair bills can be quite costly.

Please call before work begins near telephone cable. In Texas, ask the operator for the Enterprie 9800 number to report planned digging activities. If a sign is posted for AT&T Long Lines cable, the number to use is COLLECT (214) 824-4400.

A simple free phone call is the best insurance to help us protect the most convenient and reliable telephone network in the world.


