Bell Telephone starts new third number guideline policy

operators will not complete long distance calls placed from a public phone and billed to a third number without verbal approval from someone at the third number.

James West, Southwestern Bell community relations manager, said that since February 1982 operators have been attemping to obtain verbal authorization for charges to a third number on long distance calls placed from public phones. However, if there was no answer or the line was busy, operators completed the call.

West emphasized the new guidelines requiring verbal approval for charging long distance calls to third numbers involve only calls placed from public telephones. "It's a relatively simple

Effective April 1, Southwestern Bell task to trace long distance callers who charge their calls to a third number fron another residence or business telephone," he said. "It becomes more time consuming and difficult, however, to trace the originator of such calls placed from a public phone."

In Texas during 1982, about 600,000 long distance calls were charged illegally to third numbers. Last year Southwestern Bell "was left holding the bag for about \$4.5 million the company was unable to collect," West said.

"These revenue losses eventually are reflected in the cost of customers' basic services," West said, "much in the same manner as most department stores include an amount in the cost of merchandise to help defray losses attributed to shoplifting.'

West said that use of Southwestern

Bell's long distance credit card--the Calling Card--can be a time and money saver for those who place long distance calls from public telephones. The Calling Cards can be secured at no charge from the company.

An additional charge is added to collect and third-number calls since they require operator handling. However, by using a Calling Card, customers can save as much as 50 cents on out-of-state or 75 cents on intrastate long distance calls.

West said Southwestern Bell customers who do not have a long distance credit card may apply for a Calling Card simply by calling the Southwestern Bell business office number listed on their phone bill or in the Customer Guide section in the front of the white pages directory.






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

Rare coins sold locally



The days of treasure-laden Spanish ships crossing the Atlantic have faded into history. Now through International Coins and Currency and Lovell-Collins Jewelry in Floydada, a part of this history is available to today's treasure seekers.

During the 17th and 18th centuries, the Spanish empire was the largest sovereign power in the world. In the New World, which included most of the Americas, Spain extracted large quantities of gold and silver. This was minted into the largest gold and silver coins of all time -- silver Pieces of Eight and gold Doubloons.

These coins are now available in Floydada at Lovell-Collins Jewelry. The coins were recovered from a mystery ship just off the coast of Cornwall, at the southern tip of England.

The "ship without a name" was a 17th century merchantman equipped with cannon and filled with silver treasure coins. It may have been a pirate ship because no Admiralty reported it missing or claimed its treasure.

A store of Spanish silver coins were carried to the bottom of the ocean when the ship was wrecked. Some of these coins were minted during the reign of Phillip III beginning in 1598; many were minted at the Mexico City mint. None of the recovered coins is dated later than 1605, but some of the coins without dates may have been minted up to the year of the wreck, 1618.

These silver coins bear the Spanish royal crest and the outline of the cross. They are exceptionally rare and each come with a perpetual guarantee of authenticity.

Even after three centuries of immersion in ocean water these coins still show great detail. Some collectors have made these treasures the mainstay of their collections and are refusing to part with them under any circumstances.

Coins may be purchased individually, as pendants or as five-coin sets with a presentation case. All purchases will be accompanied by a certificate of authenticity.
