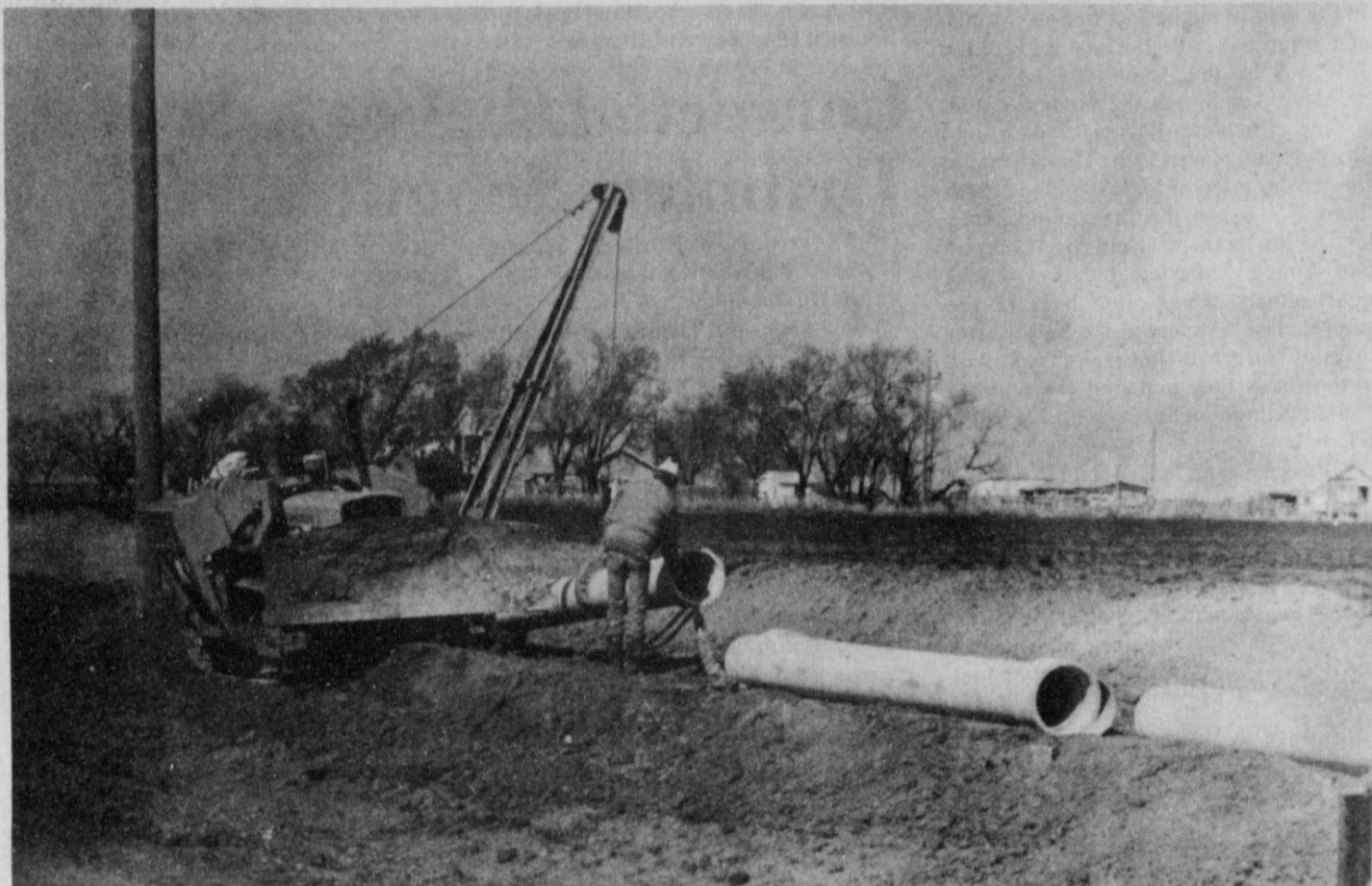

Bell Telephone starts new third number guideline policy

Effective April 1, Southwestern Bell operators will not complete long distance calls placed from a public phone and billed to a third number without verbal approval from someone at the third number.

James West, Southwestern Bell community relations manager, said that since February 1982 operators have been attempting to obtain verbal authorization for charges to a third number on long distance calls placed from public phones. However, if there was no answer or the line was busy, operators completed the call.

West emphasized the new guidelines requiring verbal approval for charging long distance calls to third numbers involve only calls placed from public telephones. "It's a relatively simple

task to trace long distance callers who charge their calls to a third number from another residence or business telephone," he said. "It becomes more time consuming and difficult, however, to trace the originator of such calls placed from a public phone."

In Texas during 1982, about 600,000 long distance calls were charged illegally to third numbers. Last year Southwestern Bell "was left holding the bag for about \$4.5 million the company was unable to collect," West said.

"These revenue losses eventually are reflected in the cost of customers' basic services," West said, "much in the same manner as most department stores include an amount in the cost of merchandise to help defray losses attributed to shoplifting."

West said that use of Southwestern

Bell's long distance credit card—the Calling Card—can be a time and money saver for those who place long distance calls from public telephones. The Calling Cards can be secured at no charge from the company.

An additional charge is added to collect and third-number calls since they require operator handling. However, by using a Calling Card, customers can save as much as 50 cents on out-of-state or 75 cents on intrastate long distance calls.

West said Southwestern Bell customers who do not have a long distance credit card may apply for a Calling Card simply by calling the Southwestern Bell business office number listed on their phone bill or in the Customer Guide section in the front of the white pages directory.

Methodists host prayer program

Bishop Lance Webb will be conducting a series of seminars on the theme "The Powerful Perspectives of Christian Prayer." It begins Sunday and continues through April 3 at the Methodist Church, 203 W. Kentucky.

Webb was born December 10, 1909 in Boaz, New Mexico, son of a pioneer Methodist circuit rider. He married the former Marry Elizabeth Hunt, whose father was also a pioneer Texas preacher and founder and president of McMurry College, Abilene. They have three children and four grandchildren.

He has several degrees including a Bachelor of Arts degree from McMurry College, Abilene and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He did graduate study at Union Theological Seminary in New

York City. He also has received seven honorary doctorate degrees including honorary Doctor of Divinity degrees from McMurry College and Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio.

Webb served as pastor for 12 years (1941-53) of the University Park Methodist Church in Dallas. He began with a small congregation, which grew to 3,200 members when he left for appointment to North Broadway Methodist Church in Columbus, Ohio. He is the author of ten books.

In April 1983 two of his books are to be re-published by Abingdon Press as Festival books. His historical novel, *Onesimus*, was recognized as one of the five finalists for the Gold Medallion Prize Award for Best Fiction in 1982 by the Ecumenical Publishers Association. Bishop Webb has several Spiritual

Formation retreats, seminars and workshops scheduled in various parts of the country. Including preaching and leading seminars in Roswell United Methodist Church in the suburbs of Atlanta, in Huntsville, Alabama and in Canton, Ohio. He has been invited to lead the extended cabinet retreat for the North Texas and Central Texas conferences on the same theme he is using in many of the pastors' retreats.

He has traveled extensively in Europe and conducted mission work in several countries. He was the former member of 17 boards of trustees, including a member of the board of Trustees of Methodist Theological School in Delaware, Ohio. After living in Pompano Beach, Florida for two years, he and his wife Elizabeth have recently moved to Dallas.


