# Special Olympics students compete at Lubbock

Three Floydada students participated in the Special Olympics competition at Estacado High School in Lubbock May 7. Janie Rios, 12, Armando Rios, 14, and Diane McDonough, 19, each brought home ribbons and medals.

All students entering received a Special Olympic T-shirt. All three participated in the 50 meter dash. Janie had a time of 12.71 seconds and Diane had a time of 26.00 seconds. Armando's time was unavailable at press time.

In the Frisbee throw, Janie won first, Armando placed second and Diane placed third. In the softball throw each student won a medal and a ribbon. Janie Rios won first place, Diane placed second and Armando placed third. These students also participated in the parade of athletes, torch ceremony and the Special Olympics oath. "Let me win, but if I cannot win, let me be brave in the attempt."

Mrs. Bobby Rainer, head coach, has a Texas Coaches Certification in track and field and an International Coaches Certification in track and field. Paula Ratliff, P.E. aide at Andrews Element-

ary, has both the Texas and International certifications in track and field. Mrs. Buddy Hatley, resources aide, has a Texas Certification in track and field and is completing her training for an International Certification.

In an awards assembly, Mrs. Bobby Rainer awarded the students with their ribbons and medals. She said that since the beginning of Special Olympics in 1968, it has become the largest sports training and athletic competition for the mentally retarded in the world.

"Often for the first time these boys and girls have a chance to show their families and communities just how much they can accomplish," she said.

"Special Olympics is a sport in its truest sense. The goal is not to win, but to try, to experience, not to conquer. Special Olympics is unique in that everyone has a chance to win since competition is grouped not only by age and sex divisions, but also by ability divisions. No time is too slow, no distance too small to earn a medal, a ribbon, a hug, a cheer or a sincere 'well done.'

"No records are broken in special Olympics -- except those of courage, determination and sportsmanship."

Special Olympics was established in July of 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver, who is now president of Special

Olympics, Inc. She is still active in all levels of the organization.

"The retarded have been told 'You can't do it,'" Rainer said. "Special Olympics says 'You can do it. All you need is a chance.'"

# Foreign student to depart Floydada for France the 28th next month

Being transplanted thousands of miles from home into a different country with a different language may not appeal to some people, but for Anne Marie Jouault it was an opportunity to learn a new way of life from first hand experience. Anne Marie is the AFS (American Field Service) student at Floydada High School from France.

"For me, it was my dream to come to the United States," she said, "and for a year it has been more than a dream."

"My parents told me if I wanted to go to the United States after I graduated, it would be OK with them. Then I found an article in the newspaper about AFS.

Some kids were telling me about it. They said I would be very interested in it. The next day I called and applied."

Potential AFS students are interviewed and chosen on their being open-minded, ready to listen to people and ready to learn something new.

"It's a great experience because you have all of your relations of your own country. You learn new things, such as how to make friends in a new country. And a new way of life, like family life. You see what is important. It's very exciting to go into a foreign country."

Anne Marie said that language and

the display of affection here were hard for her to get used to.

"In France, I didn't used to hug people. That has been hard for me -- hugging people. At home affection is not as important as it is here.

"It (the language) was hard at the beginning because of the pronunciation. I took six years of English at school. It was just like I had learned nothing. I had to use the dictionary for every five words.

"People had said that Texans speak slow, but I do not agree. At the beginning, I was saying 'Oh my gosh! Can you please slow down?'"

Anne Marie and her family live northwest of France in the region called Brittany. Her father is a dairy farmer near the town of Rennes. Her mother spends most of the time at home helping with the dairy farm. She has three older brothers, two are about to be married. Her host family here is the Rainers: Bobby, Norma Lou, Kay Lynn, and Mary Ann. She compared her family life to the American family life.

"At home, it is more important to have the meals all together. Here, the family meal exists sometimes during the week.

"My dad at home is very interested in reading newspapers and watching TV news. Here nobody does that with international and political concerns. Here I don't speak of things like that, especially with the family."

The school Anne Marie attends in France is a private Catholic school. The school is larger than Floydada having about 2,500-3,000 students.

"Here, it's more relaxed. The teachers expect work from the students, but it is not as strict.

"They also have a friendship with the students. In France I never had these very nice relations with my teachers as I do here."

The high school social relations in France are different than in the United States. In France, they don't have as many individual dates. Instead they go with groups.

"Here it is a little old fashioned. For a date, the boy comes to pick up the girl at her house, opens the door for her, if they eat or go to a movie he pays for her.

"In France, the girl can call the boy and ask him to go dancing with her. The girl pays for herself, the boy pays for himself. The idea of being a gentleman of a lady doesn't exist at all."

Anne Marie said that she wasn't homesick, but she does miss some things from home. She lives near a large town in France. She said that she misses the activities of a large town, the concerts, exhibitions and shopping.

"I like to walk. Here you can walk -- in town, but it is different. I miss a walk in the forest, for example, and being by myself."

She said when she returns to France she will miss "all of my friends here, friendly people. I think I have never had so many friends as here and so good friends."

"I like that idea that people are so friendly. Like when you go into a house, it is just like you are at home. In France, it's more formal, even if you know your friends real good."

Anne Marie will be leaving Floydada June 28. She will tour the United States with more AFS students. She will be home in France by July 12. She said she

would like to return someday.

"I will sure come back, but I don't think I can stay here all of my life. Probably because Floydada is too small. I would come back because Texas itself

and its country are real pretty. I like it -- the sunsets, the canyons and the people. Texas can be proud of its people. They are real friendly and they know how to receive a stranger."

The public is invited to see the art display during regular banking hours: Monday, 9:00 to 5:00; Tuesday through Friday, 9:00 to 3:00.

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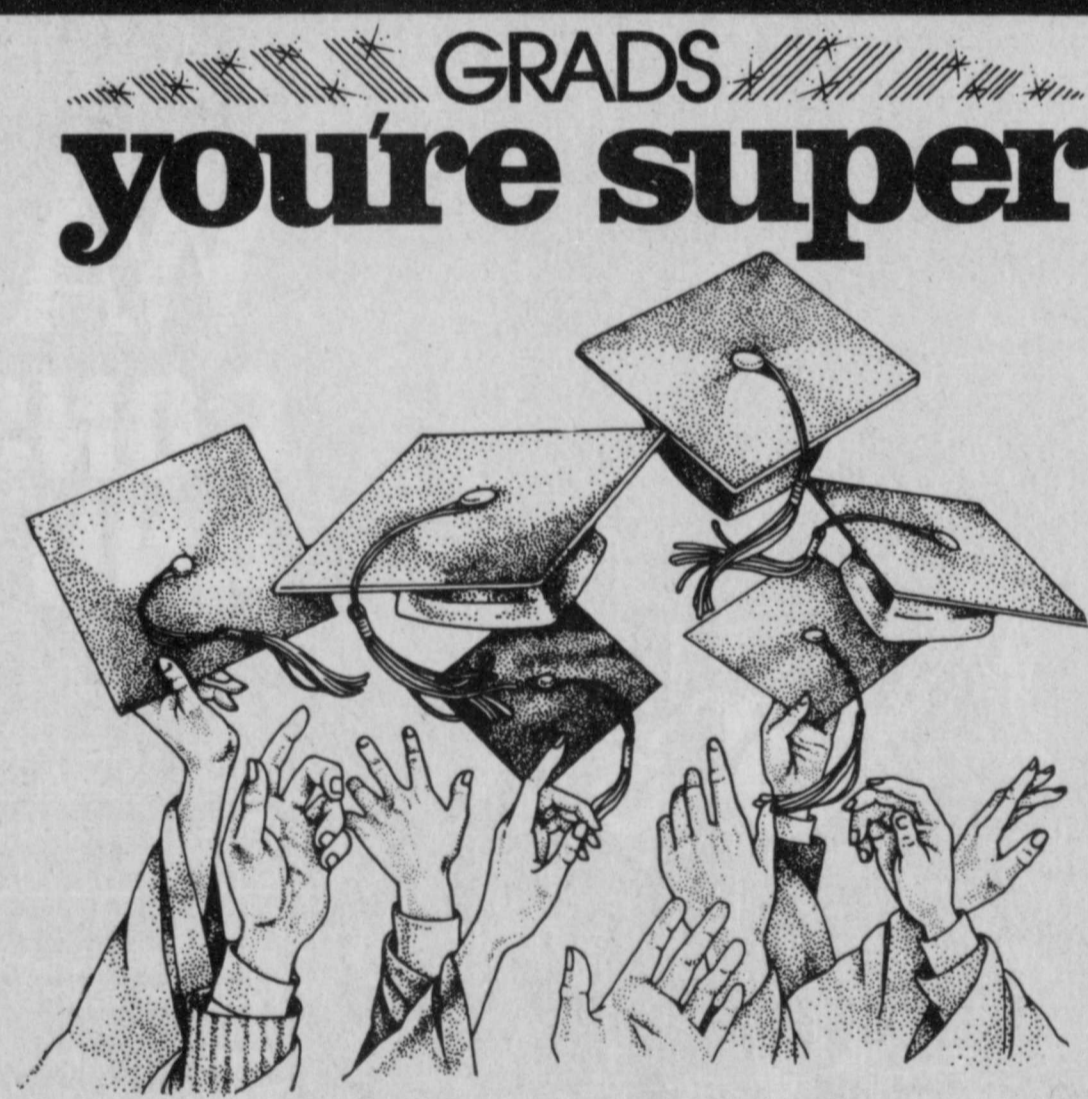

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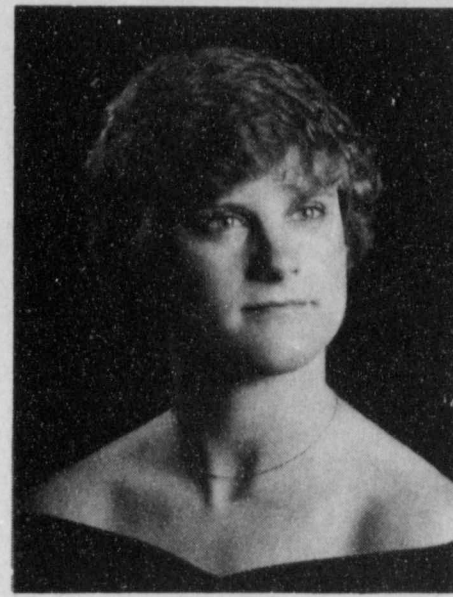
## South Plains News

## Cheese giveaway cut back

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will be giving away less cheese due to a drop in commercial sales.

In ordering a 52 percent cutback in the cheese giveaway program that was started about a year ago, Secretary of Agriculture John Block cited two reasons—needy people who qualify for free cheese normally buy their own, and

some people who are not so needy receive free cheese rather than buy it.

"Evidence that the cheese giveaway program was hurting cheese sales started showing up during the last quarter of 1982," said Dr. Bud Schwart, dairy marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Dur-

ing that quarter commercial sales were down 8 percent from a year earlier. But the real shocker came last February when commercial sales were down a staggering 29 percent from February of 1982."

The cheese giveaway program was started in early 1982 as a means of reducing government stocks of dairy products purchased under the dairy program. More than 50 million pounds of cheese had been given away each month before the cutback.

"Not having outlets for surplus dairy products complicates the problem of what to do about dairy policy," said Schwart. "The USDA has imposed a 50 cents per hundredweight tax on milk producers to try to discourage increased production which has been hurting the dairy industry in recent years. The assessment will pay part of the cost of the dairy program and will hopefully turn milk production around from its persistent upward trend," he noted.

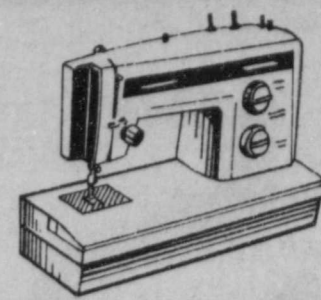

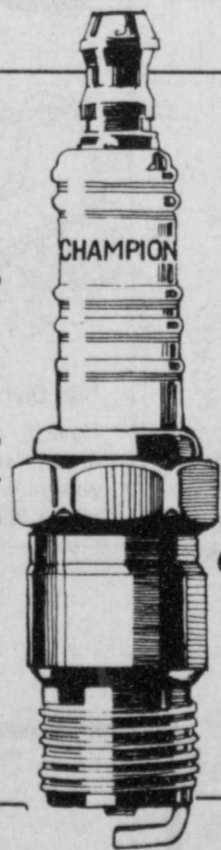
