Floydada's annual rodeo kicks off tonight

The 26th annual Floydada Rodeo will be held July 28, 29 and 30 at the Floydada rodeo grounds east of the city. Performances will start at 8:30 each night.

Each night will hold an array of events including bare back riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, girl's barrel racing and team roping. For the younger cowboys and cowgirls, there will be a kids calf scramble each night. The special attractions this year will be a wild cow milking with six teams per night and \$5.00 per man.

The stock is provided by C-T Rodeo Company from Lubbock. The judges are Jess Stone from Crosbyton, Charlie Thompson and possibly Mike Ferguson. Judges are picked by one from the rodeo sponsor, Floydada Rodeo Association, and one by the stock producer, Charlie Thompson. Rules for all rough riding events are eight seconds long, can not touch the animal with your free hand. For bare back and saddle bronc riding you must spur the animal to increase points, spurring is not required for bulls.

The rodeo headquarters is Davis Farm Supply, "The Loft" Western Wear. The phone number is 983-2235. Books open July 27 at 12:00 noon and close at 6:00 p.m. the same day. Admission for this years rodeo is free for children under 12; \$1.50 for children over 12; and \$3.00 for adults.

A dance will be held Friday and Saturday night after each performance on the rodeo grounds slab. The music

will be provided by Roughrider Band from Nazareth.

The rodeo queen will be crowned Saturday night. The contestants are: Cheryl Goen, Angie Hinsley, Lorie Knight and Kellie Pitts.

Cheryl Goen, age 17, is the daughter of Betty Goen. She will be a senior at Floydada High School. Her hobbies include basketball, horseback riding, reading and playing in the band. She was first runner-up in last year's Floydada rodeo queen contest. She is sponsored by Keith Patzer D.C.

Angie Hinsley, daughter of Michael and Linda Hinsley is 13 years old. She has one brother, Chad, and a sister, Amy. Angie will be in the eighth grade and is a Jr. High cheerleader at Floydada Jr. High School. She enjoys playing basketball and is a member of 4-H and is primarily interested in raising steers. She is also a member of the First United Methodist Church. Her sponsor is Floydada Insurance and Real Estate.

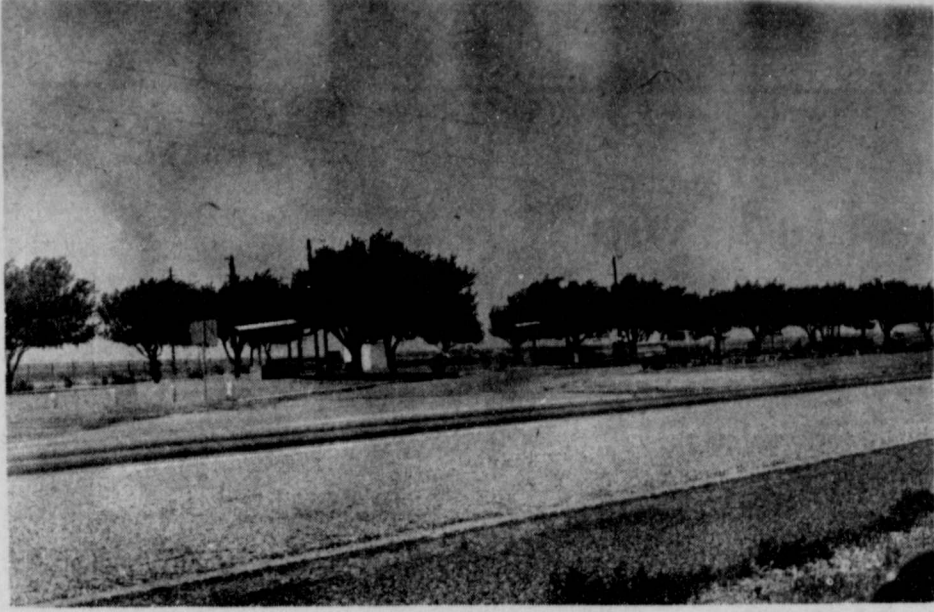

Rehearsals

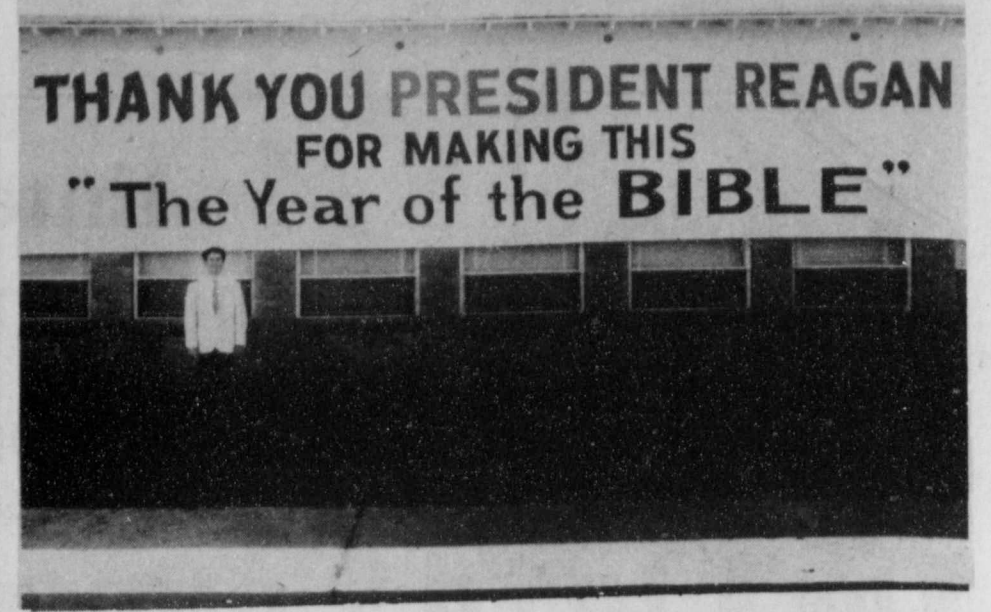

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

We appreciate the fine work your newspaper is doing. We, at the University Church of God, feel that we have a great mission to gather together the area churches to distribute Bibles to the local communities and cities. We are also trying to make the people publicly aware that President Reagan has made 1983 the Year of the Bible.

We would like you to consider placing this story in your newspaper along with the picture.

Local Churches Making Plans to Observe "Year of the Bible"

Several area and local churches plan to observe the presidential proclamation of 1983 as the "Year of the Bible" by distributing "The New Testament in the Simple English Version," said the Rev. Roy Love, pastor of the University Avenue Church of God.

Love is the city coordinator for the National Committee for the Year of the Bible, which was developed early this year to give attention to the emphasis and stimulate related projects by individual denominations, churches, synagogues, fellowships and other groups.

United by a similar spiritual heritage, the national committee includes a broad spectrum of backgrounds and viewpoints including Protestant, Catholic and Jewish clergy and lay leaders. President Ronald Reagan serves as honorary chairman and co-chairmen are Sen. William Armstrong and Congressman Carlos Moorhead, who were the primary sponsors of the resolution calling for the proclamation. Col. Glenn Jones, USAF (ret.) serves as national director for the committee.

Encouraging the reading and study of the Bible is the second phase of the national committee's program, Love said. Resources will be provided by the committee for local participation in the celebration of the proclamation. The Bible distribution planned by the local churches is a part of this phase as well as Bible reading and study emphasis in the individual churches, Love continued.

A lawsuit filed against Reagan by the American Civil Liberties Union may help the committee reach its first goal, which is national awareness of the proclamation.

The suit, filed in Federal District Court in California on behalf of the ACLU's Church/State Project, alleges that a joint resolution of Congress and Reagan's proclamation of 1983 as the Year of the Bible violates the First Amendment prohibition of the establishment of religion, according to reports in the June 26 edition of the "Pentecostal Evangel." Love said.

According to the Plaintiffs, Public Law 97-280 and the proclamation "harm Christians and non-Christians alike because they single out the Bible from all other spiritual and religious teaching as the word of God."

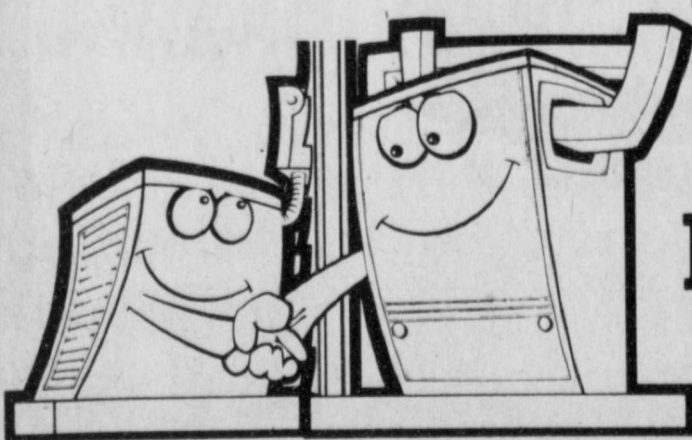

- 1 1/2 cup cold milk

Crust:

Mix ingredients well and press into pan. Bake 20 minutes at 350°. Let cool.

Filling:

Mix cream cheese and sugar until fluffy. Fold in Cool Whip and spread on crust. (Mix pudding separately) Mix puddings until thick and creamy. Make a chocolate layer and a vanilla layer. Pour over cheese mixture and top with remaining Cool Whip. Top with grated Hershey's bar. Put into refrigerator for 24 hours. Best when cold.

Former student becomes teacher

Polly Cardinal has taught many students many things. Things like Shakespear, literature, and loyalty to Floydada High School and America.

Mrs. Cardinal was born July 27, 1917 in Floydada. She has lived here all her life. Her parents were J.W. and Stella (Edwards) Smith. When she was 17 months old her father died. Her mother was remarried to G.R. May. She had three brothers, Dr. W.B. May, John Edwards Smith, and George Reid May, who is still living. Polly and George Reid were very close and still are.

Mrs. Cardinal has always been true to Floydada High School. She graduated here and now is teaching. After high school, she attended Texas Tech University her freshman year of college and then transferred to Texas Women's University in Denton. She attended Tech because it was right after the Depression and it was cheaper. Her dream was always to go to Texas Women's University though.

She met Fred Cardinal one summer while he worked for her mother on the family farm. They dated six months and were married October 12, 1941. The next September he entered the Marine Corp. They were married for four years before they ever spent an anniversary together. Cardinal served three years in the service and 27 months of that was over-seas in the South Pacific.

While her husband was in the service, Polly lived in San Diego, California. She worked in an office at Consolidated which built B-24's. She recalls she didn't like the first year. In fact she says she hated it but soon got over it. She lived with two girls from New York. They became quite close and did many things together. It would always astound her roommates at the people from Floydada she knew who came through. They couldn't understand small town people. Polly spent alot of time at the world famous San Diego zoo. She says she always had time for going to the zoo. She also went to Los Angeles for a week with her roommates. She said she saw shows, stage productions, and many great sights.

After Cardinal got out of the service, they came back to Floydada. Cardinal was working for the railroad so they moved to Slaton for a year. It was then her uncle taught her to be careful and lock her doors at all times. This is a practice she still observes today.

In 1947, the Cardinals moved to Dougherty, Texas where Cardinal started farming. She says the hardest time on the farm was when Cardinal would get hailed out but farming is a free life

and loved living in Dougherty. To the Cardinals, Dougherty is a perfect place to rear a son. Like most farmers wives, Polly hauled wheat and maize to the elevators, cotton to the gin, and plowed a few days but didn't have to do too much of that. Cardinal became sheriff in November 1976. The biggest changes were that he was gone alot more, he kept odd hours, and her students asked alot of questions about him at first, and they moved to town. With him being sheriff, he doesn't cook as much. It has made her more aware of things that happen around the world but she will not think of the danger her husband and son are in. They lived in Dougherty until 1978 when they moved into Floydada.

On November 4, 1951 the Cardinals were blessed with their only child, a son, Louis Reid. Louis Reid became a DPS trooper. He met his wife Susan, in Muleshoe. They have one child, Dusten Reid and one child on the way. They now reside in Post.

Polly Cardinal began her teaching career in 1939. She has been teaching for 28 years, taking 12 years off to raise her son and for World War II. The thing she likes most about teaching is to help prepare a student for a happy, productive life and try to influence him for the right. She also enjoys the association with high school students. She says she likes to study students and teach them one thing to help them in life.

Her biggest dislike about teaching is when she lets herself get behind in paper work. She blames only herself.

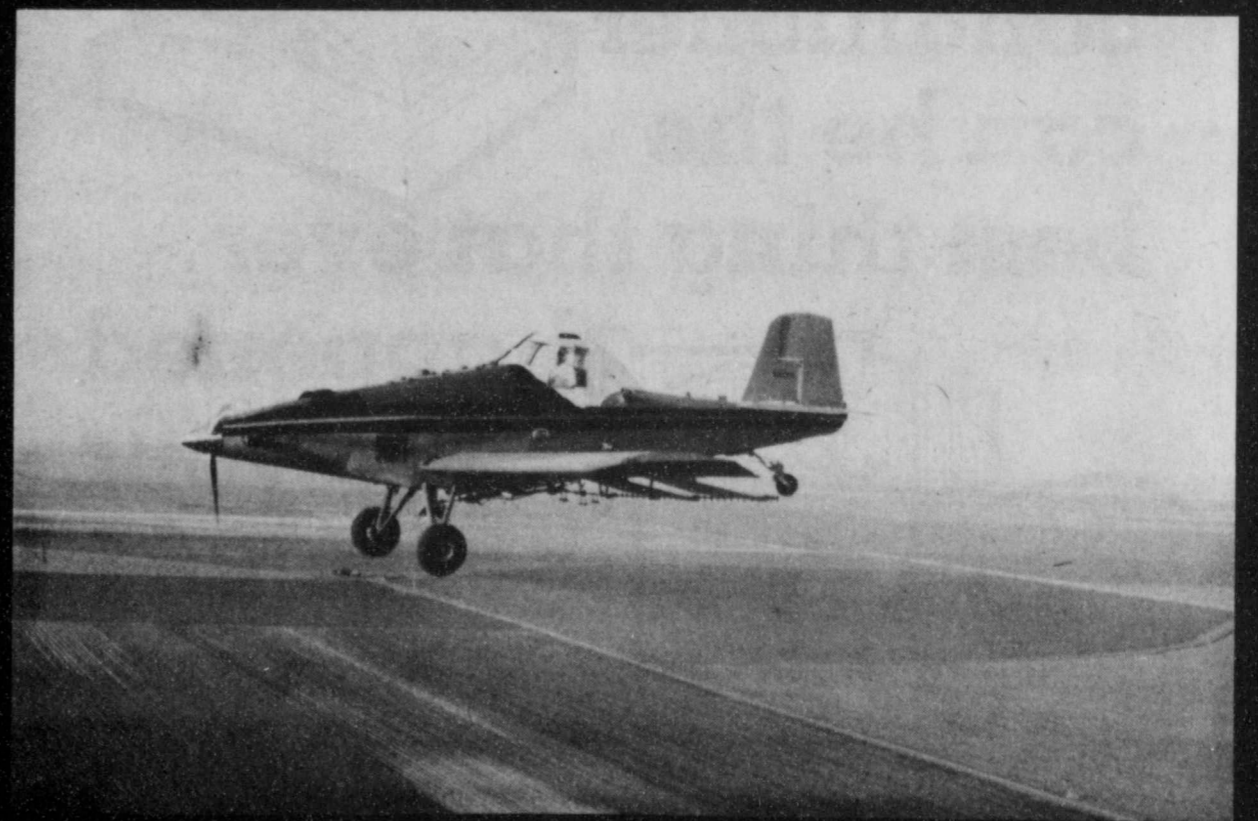

A memorial service was observed in the memory of Coly Lyles.

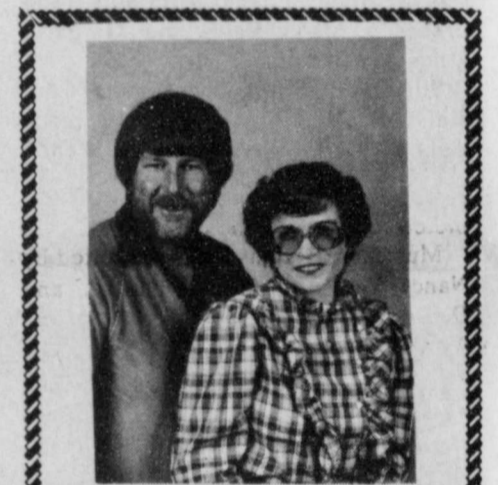
