## In-service held at hospital

Karen Redwine, nursing administrator from Garland, Texas held a program on "DRG, Maintenance of Medical Records" last Thursday night at Caprock Hospital.

Molly Stringer and Betty Baker of the Caprock nursing staff served refreshments furnished by the dietary department of Caprock Hospital.

Beginning October 1, 1983 all Medicare payments will be paid by a new system called D.R.G. (Diagnostic Rating Groups.) The new method will use a fixed pricing and paying of medical services rendered. This applies only to the hospital and not to doctors.

Congress passed the new Medicare bill due to the spiraling cost of medical bills. The government predicts by 1985

Medicare costs to the government would reach 50 billion dollars.

With the development of this new fixed payment, the general thrust of care will be changed. The average hospital confinement will be shortened due to this new program. More emphasis will be put on home care and the patient will be prepared to leave the hospital as soon as possible.

On September 21, Mrs. Helen Cox from Texas Tech University will present a program on "Planning for the care of patients." This in-service will be held from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. in the dining room of the Caprock Hospital.

It has been a J. I. Case tractor dealership, a De Soto, Plymouth dealership and International truck dealer as well as parts store and gas station.  
J. M. Daniel bought the building from George Finkner in 1941 and started a Chrysler, Plymouth dealership

with a mechanic shop in back.  
It was in this back shop that C. O. Woody's dad along with Pete Roe, and L. B. Stewart Sr. worked as mechanics.  
In the early 1960's two young men asked if they might lease the shop to work on a race car. They were Don Hardy and Kelly Chadwick. It was there in that little shop that Don Hardy turned out his first race car.  
The building was owned and the business operated by the Daniels' until June of 1982 when Rex and Edmond

Brown bought the building and continued the parts business.  
In June of 1983, Woody proposed to open the shop once again.  
Woody was born in Dougherty and raised in Floydada. He served in the United States Army for 10 years. In 1960 he married Rilla Sue Duncan of Floydada. They have four children, Duncan, Carrie, Pam and Zora.  
Woody was a motorpool sergeant in the army and has worked as a mechanic for J. I. Case tractor, and John Deere.

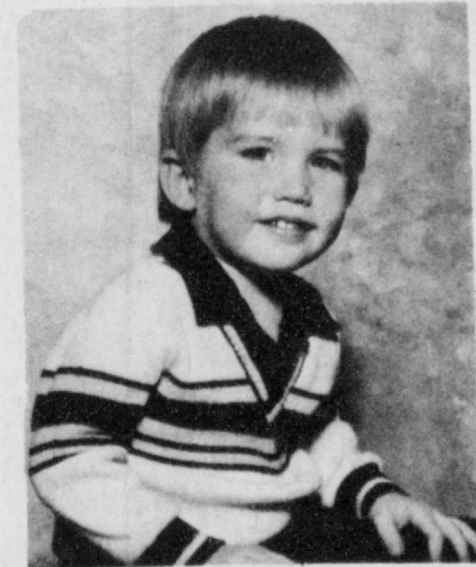

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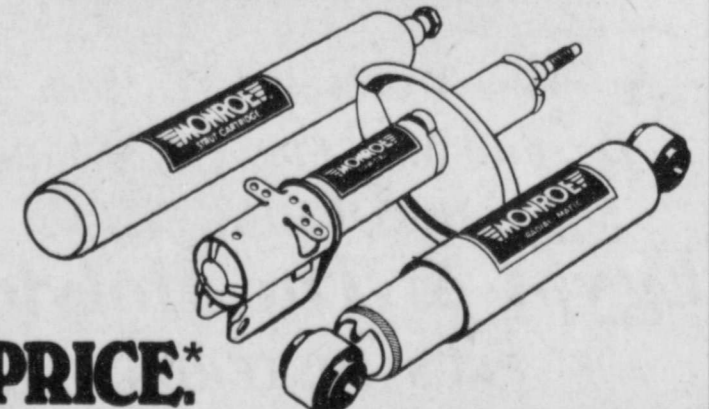

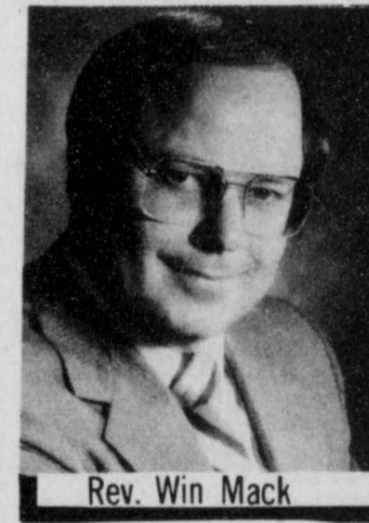
## Holmes infant honored

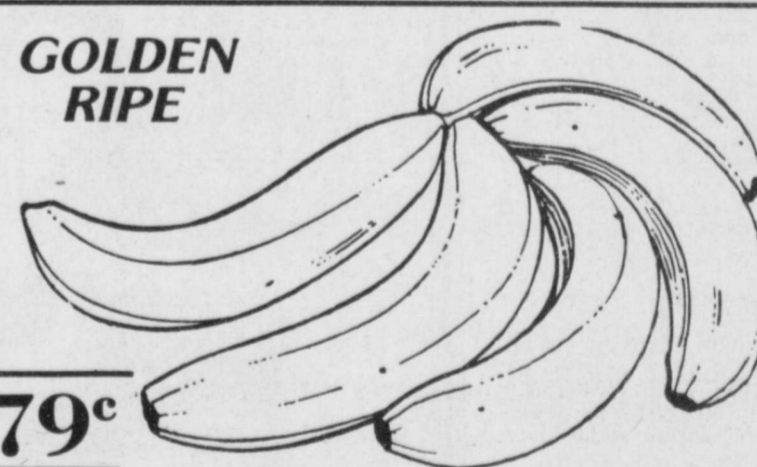

A farmer at the meeting had the audacity to suggest there wouldn't be any shortage if the co-op would stop furnishing water to all the cattlemen. 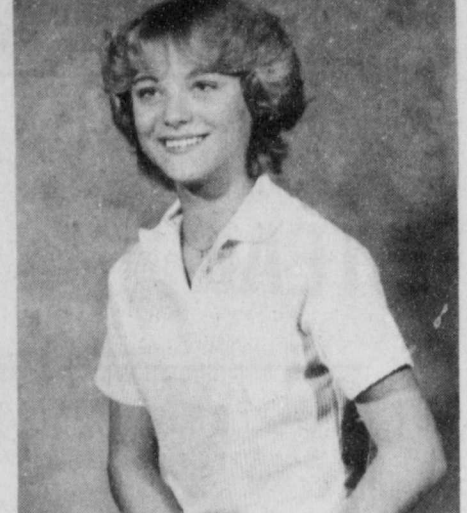

# FARM NEWS

## Pest Management Newsletter

General Situation

Hot, dry conditions are speeding the drying of grain crops. Sorghum ranges from milk state to hard dough. Bollworm infestations in cotton are spotty.

### Cotton

Some producers refuse to shut down those wells! Let's look at this logically fella's. At this time, thumb-sized bolls and smaller fruit will not make significant yield contributions regardless of the weather. Watering now means that the plants are going to "go vegetative" for a few days, delaying maturity of the crop we already have. It also means that we are liable to pick up a bunch of green junk with the stripper, leading to stained lint and higher ginning costs. And, as some growers are finding out, it means bollworms. Since water is not free, I've yet to figure out how watering now can pay.

If you have watered in the past two weeks, I strongly suggest you check for bollworms. The only place I'm finding many worms now is in late irrigated cotton, but I'm finding plenty of worms there (up to 30,000 worms per acre).

When you look for worms, you'll have to look a little harder than usual. Most of the worms are located on bolls at this time, and even the very tiny worms are drilling into those bolls. This makes them very difficult to find.

The location of those worms has a couple of additional effects. In many fields, beneficial insect numbers are very good, but the beneficials don't

seem to be doing their job. This is probably because they are not visiting the same parts of the plants as the worms are. Also, if the worms stay hidden on or in the bolls for several days at a time, more than one insecticide application may be required to control them.

Again, if you have watered recently, check your fields. At this time we have a relatively small amount of acreage which is attractive to a relatively large number of bollworm moths, and this adds up to bollworm trouble.

### Sorghum

Headworms and spider mites continue to be the main pests of sorghum. I have seen no fields with headworm problems in the past week. That may be because I have not had occasion to check the right fields. I know there are some worms out there. Producers should continue to check for headworms until hard dough stage.

Spider mites continue to be present in many fields at this time. During the past week I have begun to notice that some of the mites are tan colored. This probably means that they are entering diapause (preparing to overwinter). With this in mind, I would expect the expansion of mite populations to cease soon.

### Use of public roads reviewed

The Texas Department of Agriculture is working closely with the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation to develop new regulations insuring that farm implements won't be banned from using public roads.

The new regulations are necessary to clarify a state law that qualifies Texas to receive federal highway assistance from the new federal gasoline tax. The new law is unclear whether the traditional exemption from width limitations for agricultural implements, which has been a part of highway law since its inception, still applies. Without the new regulations, farmers would be required to buy permits at a cost of \$480 per year for each overwide implement they needed to move on a public road.

"Farmers often have to travel short distances on public roads just reach their fields, and to get from one field to another, because there is no other way to get there. They simply have to have this exemption to get their farming done. They've always been allowed to use the roads this way, and we're confident that the new regulations will preserve that right," said Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

The confusion over the agricultural exemption stems from HB 1602, which the legislature passed to expand the maximum width of commercial vehicles traveling on public highways from eight feet to eight and a half feet. The change was mandated by the federal government as a part of the Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982, which added a five cent per gallon tax of gasoline to be used for construction and maintenance of highways.

"It is clear from the record that the legislature intended to keep the exemption for overwide farm implements as a part of the law, and we are working with the Texas Highway Department to find an administrative solution to the problem," Hightower said. "We've been in touch with Governor Mark White, Highway Commission Chairman Robert Lanier, and many interested legislators, all of whom want to find a solution that maintains a farmer's right to use a public road to reach his fields. This is a problem no one really intended to create, and all parties are eager to resolve it as quickly as possible. Based on our conversations during the past few days, I feel certain we'll get the job done." Hightower said.

## Farm Safety Week

September 18-24, 1983

A farm/ranch is a good place to bring up children. But where else would a child be exposed to workplace hazards or help with work at such a young age? Help safeguard agriculture's future: Protect children from harm—educate them to work, drive, play and live safely.

- Keep kids off of and away from farm equipment. No extra riders!
- Keep guns, chemical products, medications, matches, tools and such inaccessible to small children.
- Keep play areas free of hazards. Enclose preschoolers' play area to keep them from wandering out to the road, barn, field, pond, etc.
- Teach children how to swim. Don't allow them to swim alone.
- Before allowing a youngster to bike on public roads, make sure he/she knows the rules of the road and can handle the bike capably. The bike must be in good shape and have required lighting and safety devices.
- Make shop, grain bins, animal quarters, silos, chemical storage and such places off-limits to youngsters. Lock or bar entry. Remove keys from motorized equipment so kids can't start it (and thieves can't easily drive it away).
- When giving a young person a new chore or job, train then supervise him/her until you're sure he/she can do it safely.
- Encourage youths to take part in safety activities of local youth groups and schools. Involve them in home and farm hazard hunts, fire inspections, and such.
