Doyle Turner retires after 32 years of service

A familiar face at the Post Office is missing. After 32 years at the Floydada Post Office, Doyle Turner decided to take his early retirement.

Born March 17, 1930 in Floydada, Doyle Turner has lived most of his 53 years here in Floydada.

A 1948 graduate of Floydada High School, he attended Draughons Business College and then went to work for a geophysical company until he began working for the Post Office in 1951.

Mr. Turner has worked under five different Postmasters. In 1951 when he first started working there as a temporary mail carrier, Mrs. Lon Smith was the Postmaster. After Mrs. Smith left, Jack Henry was the Postmaster, then Starkes Green, Alva D. Fultz and the present Postmaster, Ed Wester.

From 1956 until 1965 Mr. Turner was a postal clerk. In 1965 he was made assistant Postmaster. He held this position until 1973 when he was shifted to foreman of mails and delivery. In

The Turners have two children, Craig of Abilene and Brenda Turner Kinast of New Deal who has a 12 week old son, Kyle Lynn.

He said he feels like he will "really enjoy his retirement after punching a time clock for 32 years."

He said he would like to thank all the past and present postal employees, especially Ed Wester and said he would also like to "thank all the townspeople for being so nice."

"I've enjoyed all of my customers and enjoyed waiting on them."

Most of all Mr. Turner said he "wishes all of the other postal employees the best of luck and hope they get to retire someday."

1975 his title was changed once more to superintendent of postal operations.

He said "ninety percent of his years at the post office were really enjoyable. There were a few years when the post office was changing over from the Post Office Department to the present U.S. Postal Service that were hectic but for the most part they were pleasant."

When asked what one thing sticks in his mind about the post office, he recalls the time it was coming a blizzard and he was carrying the mail. "back then the mailmen had relay boxes and on this particular day I had to wait for the mail for that box, so I opened up the box and sat inside to get out of the cold."

One other incident that Mr. Turner said stuck in his mind was the time a local woman ran her automobile through the front of the post office.

Now that he has retired, he and his wife Dorothy hope to be able to travel some.

Two convicted in tractor theft here

Last August David Campbell went out to get in his John Deere 4440 tractor and it wasn't there.

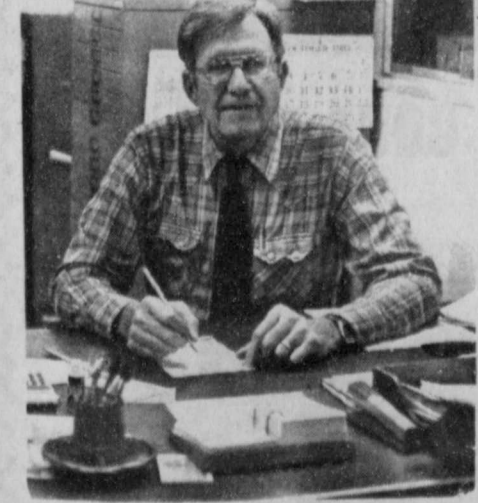

How to protect children from crime

The following article is a public service by the Floyd County Hesperian and the Lockney Beacon through the cooperation of John R. "Randy" Hollums, District Attorney and the Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of this county and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

Parents should teach their children basic, common-sense precautions and work with school officials and the PTA to initiate crime prevention strategies in and around schools. *Give your child a healthy suspicion for strangers. A stranger is anyone a child's parents don't know, even if the person knows the child's name or "seems like a friend." *Children should never accept food,

gifts, or an automobile ride from a stranger and should never play around public restrooms.

*Teach your children never to open the door to a stranger and never to enter a stranger's home. If your child is selling Girl Scout cookies, Easter Seals, or Christmas cards door-to-door, make sure he or she is accompanied by at least one friend.

*If a stranger bothers your child, the child should take note of the stranger's appearance, his clothing, and the color and license number of his car. Call the police IMMEDIATELY.

Know the length of time it takes your child to walk to and from school. Be aware of the schedule for any extra-curricular activities after school. Immediately check any delay in arrival home. Check out the safest route to and from school and instruct your children to follow that route. If possible, have them walk with others; there is safety in numbers. If your children are to arrive home after dark, arrange to meet them.

Parents of young children might consider organizing "child safety patrols" if child harassment becomes a serious problem. These patrols are composed of parents or concerned adults who walk the streets when school opens and closes each day.

Know your children's playmates and where they congregate. Visit the school and become acquainted with teachers and school officials. You may learn of delinquent behavior before it becomes a serious problem. Give the school instructions to release your children only to persons you have designated in writing.

Tell your children never to admit being home alone, whether to someone on the phone or to someone at the door. If your child is alone and the person asks where you are, the child should simply say that you can't come to the phone or the door right now. Teach your children to give as little information to a stranger as possible. Be sure your baby-sitter is a responsible person and capable of acting in an emergency.

Children should be encouraged to talk with their parents any time they have a problem, whether the problem is with a stranger, friend, or relative. Remind your children that the police officer is a friend who can be called on any time help is needed.

Keep children safe on Halloween this year

Miniature monsters will soon invade the neighborhoods and the cry, "Trick or Treat", will be heard throughout the land.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Motorist and parents need to take precautions to protect children and prevent disasters this Halloween."

He stated, "I would suggest house or block parties for the kids. Children will invade many neighborhoods in spite of past unfavorable incidents, and he offered the following safety rules to help protect the kids."

Cawthon said, "Small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating be confined to their own neighborhood. Costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping and non-flammable. Facial make-up should be used instead of masks or hoods that restrict vision."

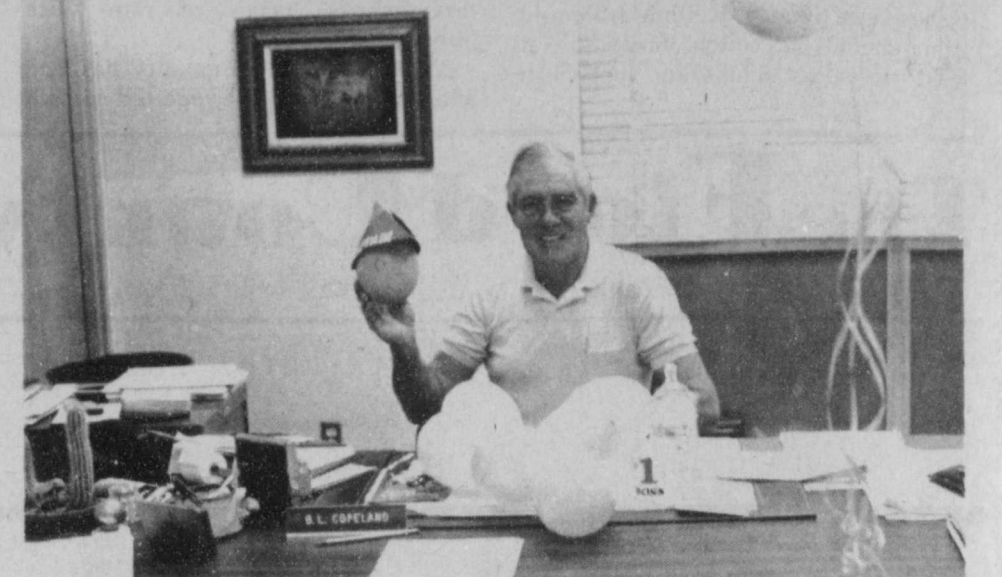
Trick or treaters should not eat unwrapped candy until the parents inspect it and fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces to be sure nothing has been placed inside it.

Children should be told to look in all

directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by a child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks when possible.

Motorist are advised to use extra caution in residential areas and look for children crossing streets in a haphazard manner.

Major Cawthon said, "732 pedestrians were killed and 6,367 injured in Texas during 1982. A pedestrian's chance of getting killed or injured are increased at night. If parents and motorists join together and think of children's safety, Halloween 1983 can be a safe and enjoyable evening for everyone."

Robertson harvests bumper crop

When B.A. Robertson began harvesting pumpkins in 1956, he was — as far as he can recollect — the first commercial pumpkin farmer in West Texas. Back then, people from all over Floyd County would come to see his fields of gold-orange orbs, standing around as if in wait for the Great Pumpkin.

Robertson, 79, started with three acres at the request of a Dallas friend who wanted to sell pumpkins at his roadside stands. By the time Robertson retired, he was raising 110 acres and had sold pumpkins as far north as Wichita and as far west as Phoenix.

Other farmers, taking Robertson's lead, also began sowing their fields with pumpkin seeds. Acreage grew until pumpkins became a good business in parts of West Texas—at least for one month of the year. Though statewide totals are not available, Bailey County, west of Robertson's home in Floydada, is expected to harvest 10-15 million pounds this season. Pumpkins are still raised in Floyd as well as Deaf Smith, Parmer and Lamb counties.

Many of these pumpkins are sold in-state, most to become jack-o-lanterns. Eighty percent of the fresh market pumpkins harvested in the United States are sold at Halloween, and the Texas variety is no exception. The remaining "pie pumpkins," some as small as four or five pounds, are sold for food.

Though any size pumpkin is edible, small ones have sweeter, more finely textured meat and a distinctive flavor that cannot be matched by canned pumpkin. According to Texas Department of Agriculture home economists, the extra effort that it takes to prepare the fresh product will yield worthwhile results. Here is how to do it.

If pumpkins are to be carved, their meat can be removed and set aside for cooking. Place the meat in a large saucepan and cook it in a small amount of water for 25-30 minutes or until it is very tender. Drain the pumpkin, and mash it well or puree it in an electric blender. Pumpkins bought strictly for food can be baked in the oven. Wash the rind well and cut it in half. Place the cut sides down on a 15x10x1-inch jellyroll

pan and bake for 45 minutes or until the meat is fork tender. Cool for 10 minutes, peel, discard the seeds and puree the pulp. Three pounds of fresh pumpkin will yield about three cups of cooked, mashed pulp.

Try your fresh pumpkin in a recipe that kids are bound to enjoy.

Domestic Guidelines

by Mary True

Once again it is time to care for fireplaces and chimney checkup annually. Hot gasses that escape through cracks in a fireplace can harm you and may even cause a fire. Check the chimney for loose bricks and mortar and the flue lining (the passage through which the air and gasses travel) for cracks.

Make repairs before using your fireplace. Be sure that the damper at the top of the fireplace closes tightly; otherwise, warm air will escape when the fireplace is idle. Soot and creosote accumulations should be cleaned up from the flue each year. Do this by pulling a weighted sack of straw up and down the flue. Seal the front of the fireplace before you begin, to keep the mess contained.

Black, sooty stains on the fireplace face is usually caused from overloading the fireplace. Whether brick, stone or other masonry products are used, remove soot deposits by washing with either of two solutions:

- One half cup vinegar, one-eighth cup detergent and one gallon water
- For more stubborn stains, use one to two cups trisodium phosphate, one-half cup household bleach, one-eighth cup detergent, and one gallon water.

Apply either solution with a stiff (natural or plastic bristle) scrub brush.

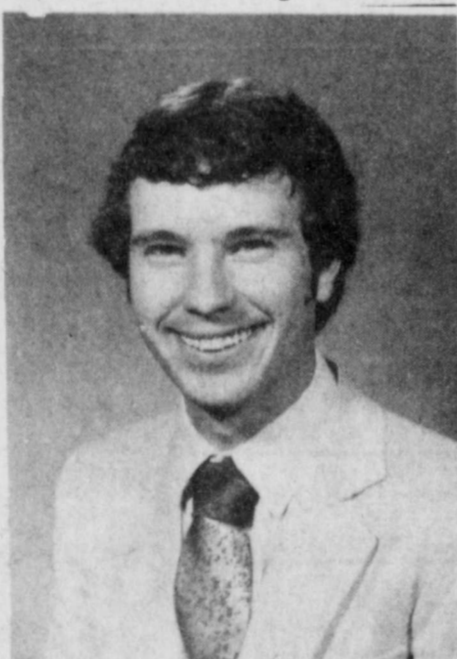
Kelly Warren recognized

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Coaches Comments

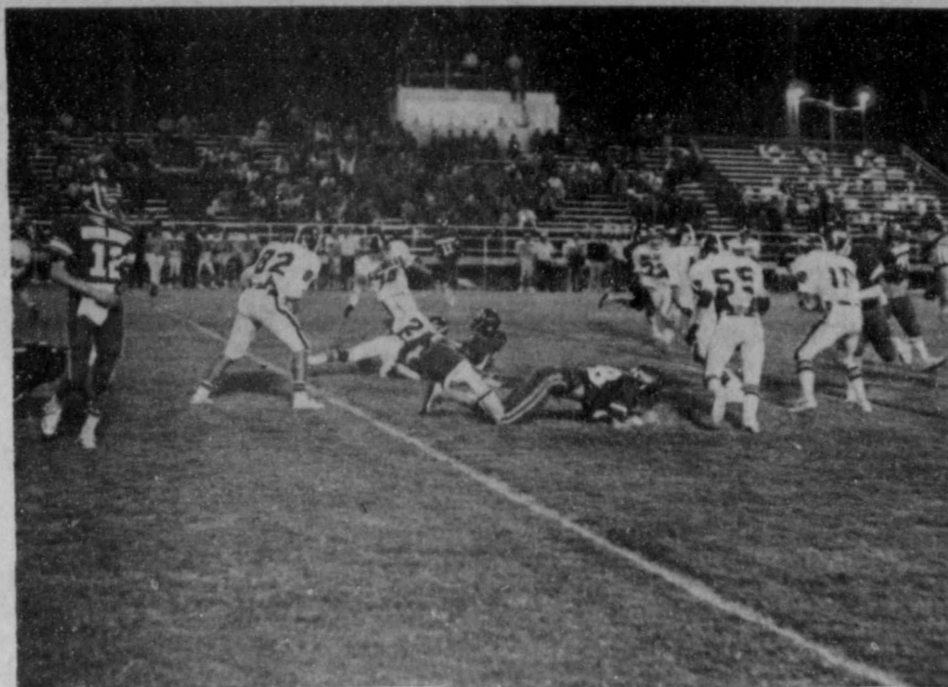

A&M Extension Center offers computer workshop

What can a computer do for my farm operation? What kind of software would I need? Is such software currently available or would I have to write my own? What type of computer would I need?

If you've been asking yourself these or other similar questions, you now have a chance to have them answered.

Hay feeding necessitated early

May producers have been forced to start feeding hay earlier than usual due to dry weather which will result in a reduce hay supply for winter needs. The corn and milo harvest is approaching and the stover left after harvest offers a source of livestock feed, especially when it is chemically treated to improve its nutritional qualities.

There has been considerable research conducted to determine the effect of various chemical treatment techniques on forage analysis and subsequent digestibility by beef cattle. One process

that looks promising is ammoniation which generally results in doubling the curde protein, improving dry matter digestibility by 10-15% and increasing dry matter intake by 15-20%.

The process is relatively simple. The forage is covered with 6 mil plastic sheeting and sealed by placing dirt over the plastic at the base of the forage. Ammonia is injected under the plastic with a hose. It is recommended that the hose outlet be placed near the center of the forage for good distribution of the ammonia. Practically any type of forage package such as round bales, square bales or stacks can be treated since gaseous ammonia penetrates well.

The level of ammonia recommended is 2.5-3.0% by weight, so it is important

The forage should be kept covered for at least 2 weeks in warm weather and up to 45 days in cold weather to get optimal chemical reaction. Keep the forage covered until 4-5 days before it is to be fed, then uncover it and allow it to aerate.

The gaseous ammonia combines with water in the forage to form ammonium hydroxide which reacts chemically with the plant tissues to break the lignin-cellulose bonds and solubilizes the hemicellulose to make the carbohydrate content of the forage more digestible.

AUTUMN ALERT: BROWN PATCH IN LAWNS

With the cooler temperatures, and rainy weather of fall, homeowners should be on the look out for brown patch in St. Augustinegrass and bermudagrass lawns.

Brown patch, a fungal disease, occurs on most common lawn grasses in early spring and late fall when night temperatures are cool.

The most common symptom is circular patches in lawns that may be from one to 50 feet in diameter. Other symptoms include a series of smaller patches or individual yellow leaves within the turf canopy. In all instances, grass blades can be pulled easily from their attachment point on stolons because of the fungus' action.

Brown patch develops most rapidly when air temperature is between 75 and 85 degrees F. and free moisture is present. This explains why the disease is more of a problem in the spring and fall when days are warm and nights are cool.

Some lawns are affected almost every

year while others are damaged only occasionally. Applying a fungicide will prevent the disease in areas that are chronically affected. Terraclor PCNB is the most commonly used fungicide for brown patch control and will usually give season-long control. Apply it when you first find evidence of brown patch damage.

Effects from brown patch can be lessened by avoiding excessive rates of fertilizers, mowing regularly to avoid organic matter buildup on the lawn's surface, and proper watering. Good cultural practices and use of fungicides when needed will prevent disease development that damages the appearance of the lawn.
