Editor's Note:

Richard Morehead and his wife, Judith, are well known in Floyd and Hale counties. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W.P. Daily operated the hotel (originally called Commercial Hotelnow Lamplighter Inn) for many years. It then was operated by his parents, Ethel Daily Morehead and husband Ed, and currently by Dorothy Morehead Hotchkiss and her husband John.

Morehead retired as Austin Bureau Chief of the Dallas Morning News in 1978, but continued to write occasionally for it and other publications. Last year, Morehead published two books "Richard Morehead's Texas" and "Fifty Years in Texas Politics". Both include reminiscences and observations concerning the South Plains.

Next spring, Eakin Press of Austin will publish another Morehead book: "Dewitt C. Greer: King of the Highway Builders", a biography of the famous long-time chief of the Texas Highway Department and history of its highway development.

Ken Towery, the new owner-publisher of these newspapers, and his wife Louise are people worth knowing -extraordinary folks in many ways.

I've known them for more than a quarter-century--about half as long as I've been coming to Floydada to see my kinfolks and check on our farm just outside town.

Ken Towery's credentials and character entitle him to write for any newspaper or magazine in the world, yet they chose Floyd county because he felt it is in a good country, has fine citizens, and a place where he wants to write his views.

The Towerys are our friends and you will like and admire them. They came from small towns like Knippa and Cuero where Towery won a Pulitzer Prize (the profession's highest award) for exposing scandal in the Veterans Land Program in a newspaper series which resulted in a top state official going to prison for abusing the trust place in him by the voters.

Ken has a special feeling for war veterans, and couldn't tolerate anybody taking unfair advantage of a program intended for their benefit.

At eighteen, Towery was a private in an artillery company defending Corregidor. His pay was \$21 a month when he was taken prisoner by the Japanese and sent to a prison in northern China, where he spend three and one-half horrible years.

Most of the prisoners died of malnutrition and mistreatment. Ken survived by the strength of youth and the will of a higher spirit. He has suffered the physical effects of his imprisonment for forty years. Most of the first seven years after his liberation was spent in hospitals.

This is related because I know from many conversations how deeply the experience affected his belief in this country and his love of family and God. No more patriotic American lives than Ken Towery. He cannot abide disloyal persons or those who fail to appreciate how great it is to be an American.

The Towerys are unabashed conservatives. Ken feels he has made his contribution and still is to the preservation of the American way of life. Its strength has always been rural and small-town America. The Towerys believe in free enterprise and oppose any idea that the government owes its citizens a living.

Towery's interest in sound government became so great that he quit a successful newspaper career, then with the Austin American-Statesman, to assist John Tower in his successful political career and helping Republican presidential candidates, most recently Ronald Reagan. He was a consultant in the 1982 campaign of Republican George Strake for Lieutenant Governor, who lost to the better-known Democrat

With the separation — or "divestiture" — of AT&T now less than a month away. I'd like to use this column to review what will and won't change about your Southwestern Bell Telephone service come January.



Local leather artist begins work during teen years

Bill Gray started "Leatherwork" (as it was then known) in 1950, as an eighth grader in Tucson, Arizona. While attending Lubbock High School and Texas Tech, he made custom belts and other leather articles for several stores in Lubbock.

In 1952 Gray designed a belt unknown to the Lubbock area known as the "buckstitch". Today this design is used in almost all western wear.

He said he got the idea from veteran leather artist Cliff Ketchum, who had operated a saddle shop in Deming, New Mexico, in the 1940's. Ketchum later became known as the "Saddlemaker of the Stars" and later became a motion picture star himself.

One of the most influential people to Gray's work was Al Stohlman, he inspired Gray to try his hand at leather pictures "or preferably called "Leather Pictorials".

One of Gray's earlist leather artworks is an 18"x36" reproduction of the famous Da Vinci depiction of Christ's last night with his Apostles. The art work most outstanding feature are the eyes of Jesus. Gray's shading and relief stamping have given the eyes the effect to follow the viewer, regardless of

This work was presented to the First United Methodist Church in Floydada in October of 1982

One of Gray's most famous pictorials is "The Whirlwind". In 1980, sports cartoonist Dirk West conceived an idea of "The Floydada Whirlwind", which was used in the "Football Gibes" cartoon series. The mighty "Whirlwind" leather art now hangs in Floydada School Superintendent Jerry Can-

Gray said, "The versatility of handcarved leather can be used for mascots, logos, and company trademarks. Just as pewter, brass, copper, and other more widely known mediums, carved leather can be used for wall plaques, awards,

"Embossed and tooled leather articles go back into antiquity" said Gray. "The ancient Egyptians and Aztecs, the artisans of Rome, the book binders of the Middle Ages, our own American Indians, and the saddlemakers of today, all have marveled at the wonders of this ages-old art medium."

Leather pictorials are a relatively new art form and is not widely accepted as

A member of the Lubbock Art Association since last year, Gray hopes to promote leather art as an "expected"

Gray said he can't understand what the difference is in leather art and any

His most recent work he calls the "Many Faces of Duke". This tribute to John Wayne depicts seven of his motion picture portrayals. Gray is still working on the piece and is in the process of painting and dying the

Gray is among a few other artist in the area trying to possibly form a West Texas Leather Artist Association.

Gray said he would like to see leather art included in art classes in public schools. He suggests that anyone interested in learning leather art may buy kits from Tandy Company in



Homemaker's talents vary from cooking to decorating

Myrtle Finley has been a homemaker for a number of years. Over these years she has cultivated a lot of talents. One of these many talents is cooking.

One of her favorite cooking projects now days is cake decorating. She stresses that she only does the decorating for her family, but she enjoys it immensely. She has decorated several wedding cakes and recently decorated a birthday cake for her mother's 88th birthday.

Mrs. Finley also enjoys decorating her home with antiques. She collects antique meat grinders and butter churns. These collections are displayed in her dining room.

Being a very creative lady, her recipe for Gingerbread Cookies may be made into ginger bear or sugar canes. She said these make great Christmas tree ornaments or gifts for school children to take to their Christmas parties.

Her second recipe for Date Nut Cake is great for the holidays because it can be made ahead of time and stored. She said she thinks the cakes always taste better a day or so after baking.

Gingerbread Cookies

- 7 cups sifted flour 3 tsps. ground ginger
- 2 tsps. ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ground all spice 1 tsp. ground cloves
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. soda
- Sift together, set aside. In a large mixing bowl using a mixer
- beat together:
- 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/3 cup shortening
- ²/₃ cup water

Beat in dry ingredients. I prefer mixing by hand. Heavy mixing dough is not good for regular mixers and food processors in my estimation.

Wrap dough in plastic wrap. Refrigerate overnight or until easy to handle. Roll out 1/4 of dough at a time to 1/4" thickness.

Cut cookies as directed below.

Bake at 350° 12-15 minutes or until lightly browned. Loosen gently with spatula. Let remain on baking sheet a few minutes to cool to prevent breaking.

To make Ginger Bears: For each bear cut dough into:

- 1 (3") circle for body
- 1 (21/4") circle for head
- 2 (11/4") circles for ears 4 (1") circles for paws
- Overlap circles (as shown in photo) Decorate with raisins (eyes, mouth) To make Candy Canes:


For each cane cut 9 (1") circles, overlap circles, shaping as a cane. Decorate with cinnamon candies.

Note: The "Bears" and "Canes" can also be made with your favorite tea cake

Date Nut Cake

This cake must be started in a cold oven. Grease and flour a 9x5x3" loaf

- 4 eggs, unbeaten
- 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup oil
- tsp. salt
- 1 cup sifted flour 1 lb. pitted dates
- 4 cups whole pecan halves
- Combine eggs, sugar, oil. Beat well. Add remaining ingredients, mixing
- Place in the prepared pan. Bake in slow oven (300°) 2 hours.
- Makes 1 (3 pound) loaf. Wrap tightly when cool.
- Always tastes better a day or so after





STRATEGIES FOR SHOPPING WITH

Coupons can offer a real bonus for grocery shoppers. They can also cause shoppers to waste their money and time

Coupons entice some shoppers to purchase productes that give more convenience than they need, products they don't ordinarily buy, products with less nutrition for the money spent, and more of a product than can be used in a reasonable amount of time.

Remember the manufacturers use coupons to introduce new products and build brand loyalty, and grocers offer coupons to attract your business to their store. Coupons are alegitimate form of advertising. But, they are not always the best value.

Here are some tips for sucessful shopping with coupons:

Before you go to the store, do your "homework". Study the food advertisements and check your current food supplies. Shopping wisely with coupons requires a high level of priceconsciousness in order to determine whether a product is a good buy or not.

Make a shopping list of the things you need and select coupons for the products on your list.

Once you get to the store, don't buy a product simply because you have a coupon. Compare prices for the item, the item with a coupon, the store brand and the generic brand to determine which is the least expensive. Use the unit prices on the shelves to make this comparison.

Even with a cents-off coupon, a generic or store brand will often be less expensive, although you may want to purchase the national brand for special occasion dishes.

Eliminate "junk" foods if their only value is for redeeming a coupon. Just as with every other food purchase, read the nutritional labels on coupon items.

To make the most of coupons for products you need, combine coupons with store specials for additional sav-

Also, if the store offers double or triple coupons you can usually save more by buying several small packages of the same item rather than one large package, if you have more than one

checkout counter, even with the electronic scanning systems. Make sure you are charged the advertised price rather than the regular price on sale items, and that your coupon savings are accurately







DON'T HESITATE TO USE THE on a poinsettia research project. COLORFUL POINSETTIA

Since 1919 stories unsubstatiated by medical and scientific fact have circulated about the poinsettia at Christmas time, when the plant is at the peak of its popularity.

According to one tale, the two-yearold child of an Army officer stationed in Hawaii died from eating a poinsettia

This unfortunate, unfounded story helped scare people into thinking the poinsettia is poisonous. It has led to the belief that parts of the plant, if ingested by humans or pets, could be lethal.

To scientifically resolve the charges against the poinsetta, and to alleviate public fear, the floral industry launched an intensive investigation.

The Society of American Florists. floriculture's national trade association representing 50,000 industrymen, collaborated with the Ohio State University

The objective was to determine whether there is any foundation to the allegation that Euphorbia pulcherrima (poinsettia) is a poisonous plant.

The study established that when rats were given usually high doses of various portions in the poinsettia, no mortality, no symptoms of toxicity and no changes in dietary intake or general behavior were observed.

The university research has effectively debunked "old wives' tales" that the poinsettia is harmful to human and animal health if parts of the plant are ingested. There ia a possibility that some people are allergic to the plant sap which can cause a rash on some skin



Story' featured 'Vernon's Awareness Week during

A feature Article for National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week December 11-17, 1983

Vernon Huffman (his real name)*, 37, married, father of two, and important to many others as well, had no reason to think he was living his last moments' that Saturday morning in February, 1980, as he headed home after visiting his brother in a neighboring town.

He probably never knew what hit him. The ambulance crew said he died instantly when his small, imported car was hit head-on and compressed into a grotesque heap of twisted metal. The impact didn't just disintegrate the car, it knocked it completely off the highway and down an embankment. A witness estimated that impact speed "was in excess of 70 mph." The family dog also died in the crash, an added insult to a boy and girl whose father would never

come home again. Vernon Huffman's death was no accident. The drunk who killed him had a blatant disregard for the law and for his fellow motorists. He had no driver's license, was driving far in excess of the posted speed limit, and was illegally passing on a hill. As it so often seems with drunk driving crashes, the killer walked away from the crash as easily as he walked away from his social responsibilities that day.

Vernon Huffman is missed no less today. It has been nearly three years since his death, but those he left behind are still numb for the experinece. When asked about their feelings, they respond in a tearful mix of grief and outrage. They talk about the senselessness of his death and society's collective inability to do whatever is necessary to prevent others from suffering a similar fate.

"It's as if no one cars unless it's one of their own. People go through the motions and say 'isn't that awful', but the lesson goes in one ear and out the

The statistics should have us up in arms; drunk driving crashes are the most frequently committed violent crime in the US. Yet, in a strange perversion of usual human values, this form of violence does not stir the same public condemnation as do rapes, knifings, and handgun killings. It seems to have become a tacitly acceptable form of homicide.
