Second 'Irrigation Rodeo' Opens Saturday Near Hart

Entries continued to come in this week as committees busied themselves with final preparations for the second annual Hart Irrigation Rodeo, which will be unreeled Saturday on the O. L. Beavers farm near Hart. The rodeo is under the sponsorship of the Hart American Legion.

Entrance fees for the rodeo have been established at \$2 and the deadline has been set for Saturday at 9 a. m. All entrants will be admitted to the starting gate free.

Divided into two divisions this year, all entrants above 14 years of age will compete in the adult division while those under 14 will be classified in the junior division. Winners of the adult and junior divisions will compete for the tube setting contest championship.

Rules for the contest will be just as established except for a miss, which will count as a two-second penalty, and a bubble, which will cost the contestant one second.

All contestants will draw for positions. A \$25 cash award will go to the first place winner in the adult division and \$15 and \$10

awards will be presented second and third place winners. In the junior division the first place prize will be a \$10 cash award while \$7.50 will go to the second place contestant and \$5 to the one finishing third.

Plans Nearing Completion For 'Second to None' '54 Fair

A Castro County Fair predicted to be "second to none" will operate on a budget of \$2,120 this fall, it was disclosed at a meeting here Monday night by Robert Estes, chairman of the fair budget committee.

This compares with a budget of \$3,100 for the 1953 event and indicates that the new budget has been trimmed considerably. A great deal of the cut can be accounted for under the heading of "repairs and maintenance before the fair." Less money was allocated for this purpose as less work on both buildings and grounds is contemplated. The biggest amount of the 1954 budget will be taken up by "major repairs after the fair," as \$750 has been allocated for this purpose.

Rounding out the 1954 budget are the following items: utilities, \$60; canvas, \$55; night watchman, \$20; exhibits and livestock prizes, \$250; printing and advertising, \$400; entertainment, \$35; concession prizes, \$300; judges' expenses, \$50; fireworks display, \$100; and miscellaneous, \$100.

Goldman Dyer, chairman of the fair entertainment committee, reported that his committee has made arrangements for the local high school band to give a concert Thursday night, September 16, the first night of the three-day fair. Dyer said an elaborate fireworks display had been ordered and would be staged on the first night of the fair. Funeral Held For Joyce Lancaster, 3rd Auto Fatality

Funeral services for Joyce Ann Lancaster, four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Foy Lancaster who farm in northeast Castro County, were held Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. at the Calvary Baptist Church in Cleburne. Interment was in the Rose Hill Memorial Cemetery there.

Castro County's third traffic fatality of 1954, Joyce Ann was killed Sunday at 7:30 p. m. when she stepped from behind the family car, which was parked on the side of a county road two miles north and two miles east of Dimmitt, into the path of a moving vehicle driven by Raymond Crum of Dimmitt. Crum told investigating Highway Patrolman Joe Culp and Deputy Sheriff J. V. Messenger that he was blinded by the sun and failed to see the girl in time to avoid the accident.

The child's father was checking an irrigation pump when the accident happened. Mrs. Lancaster was in the family car and her daughter was playing around the vehicle. Both parents failed to see the child as she stepped in front of the Crum car.

Crum took the victim to the Castro County Hospital for emergency treatment, but she was pronounced dead on arrival.

Bobcats Rated Tops in District 2-A By 'Experts'; Fields Can't See Why

Castro County, Club members voted to leave the selection of the county's outstanding farmer up to the local Running Water Soil Conservation District, as has been the policy in past years. Several have been mentioned as candidates for the outstanding farmer award and a selection will probably be made within the next week.

Head Coach Leo Fields, speaking before a meeting of the Dimmitt Lions Club Tuesday, voiced considerable concern as well as unhappiness over the selection of the Bobcats to win first place in their district. First Fields stated that he would have 11 men back from a 25-man squad and that eight starting players have been lost through graduation. He added that his team would likely be weakest at the guard and tackle positions.

With the proverbial coach's pessimism and need for a "crying howl," Fields indicated in conclusion that his team may be floundering around in seventh or eighth place in the conference before the season ends. In a more serious vein, however, Fields admitted that with luck his Bobcats may be pretty tough to beat and should rank in the upper half of the eight-team conference. Happy and Sudan have been picked for second and third places, respectively, in District 2-A.

Fields said football gear would be issued to about 70 players Monday morning, the first day of fall football practice. District classifications, according to Fields, have been changed and Dimmitt will remain in Class A at least two more years before moving up to Class AA football. A high school enrollment of 225 is now required before a school can be eligible for AA competition the following year.

\$650 County Goal Set in Dimes Drive

Castro Countians were urged Monday by County Judge Robert Estes to rally to the county's emergency March of Dimes drive for polio funds.

The emergency drive officially got underway in the county Monday with a goal of \$650. Estes was appointed to serve as chairman of the county emergency fund drive.

The county chairman stated Monday, "National funds are depleted due to the sharp increase in polio cases this year. The county is \$295 in the red and is without funds for hospital care of polio victims. Your help is urgently needed and I am sure you will rally to this worthy cause."

Estes and some co-workers were busy Monday afternoon distributing miniature iron lung containers in the Dimmitt area. The drive will continue until sufficient funds are obtained to fight the dread disease on a county scale. One-third of all proceeds will go into the county fund and two-thirds will go to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in New York City. Half of the remainder will be used for research. The national emergency quota is \$20,000,000.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property taxing voters at an election held for that purpose within such district, prescribing the powers of such district; providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as follows:

"Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any county owned hospital, or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, buildings or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness therefor issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospital or hospital facilities; levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five (75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of all taxable property within such district, provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property taxing voters in such county shall vote thereon; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county, and thereafter such county and cities therein shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes; and provided further that, should such Hospital District construct, maintain and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxing voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to pass laws authorizing the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 100,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas repealing Sections 2a of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the time of election in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit: "First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age."

"Second: Idiots and lunatics."

"Third: All paupers supported by any county."

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make."

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount greater than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people, and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years, until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding any collecting any fees, costs or penalties, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause appears, seek a writ of habeas corpus, or other writs, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or percentages of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section, or his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section, to be numbered 63, providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System, in addition to the benefits allowed them under the Teacher Retirement System shall be entitled to credit in the Teacher Retirement System for all services, including prior service and membership service, earned or rendered by them as an appointive officer or employee of the State, or as a teacher or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or supported wholly or partly by the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for crediting to members of either the Teacher Retirement System or the Employees Retirement System of Texas all services rendered, as either a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors; and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the time of election in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, by the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 4. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Sec. 5. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature."

"In addition to the per diem of the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session of the legislature called within one month of the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Sec. 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendments to the State Constitution providing that the salaries of the Governor, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and the Secretary of State, be fixed by the Legislature, and that the per diem of the members of the Legislature be fixed at twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for 120 days only."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution."

Sec. 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be designated Section 51g, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting by ballot shall be placed on said machine, and each voter shall scratch out one of the above provisions for voting by ballot for or against the Constitutional Amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

NEWS LETTER From Your ASC

EMERGENCY WIND EROSION CONTROL PROGRAM

A total of \$44,111.02 has been obligated for practices carried out or to be carried under the Emergency program. Additional funds are available as needed to cover producer's requests for cost-sharing. Producers are reminded to file a request with this office before starting a practice in order that cost-sharing may be approved for the practice.

Stubble mulching, which pays \$1.25 per acre, is the most popular practice at present.

Seeding of grain sorghums, sweet sorghums, sudan grass, millet, barley, oats, or rye after July 10, 1954, and not harvested or grazed will qualify for a payment of \$1.00 per acre drilled or broadcast.

Seed of average purity, and germination should be planted at the following rates per acre: grain sorghum, sweet sorghum, sudan grass in rows—5 to 7 pounds; drilled or broadcast 15 to 18 pounds; millet—10 to 12 pounds; barley, oats or rye—48 to 60 pounds.

COTTON MEASURING

Most cotton farms in the county have been visited by a crop reporter. When the acreage of cotton is determined in this office the producers are notified of the acreage. This work is all being done as rapidly as possible in order that each cotton producer may know whether he has over- or under-planted.

FARM STORAGE FACILITY LOAN PROGRAM

Producers may obtain a loan up to 80 per cent of the actual cost above foundation for the construction of needed storage of farm commodities that will be produced on the farms. The loans bear 4 per cent interest and may be repaid in four annual installments. A paid up insurance policy covering a five year period must be on file for facilities where the amount of the loan is in excess of \$1,000. Producers planning storage construction under this program should not wait until the facility is needed to make application.

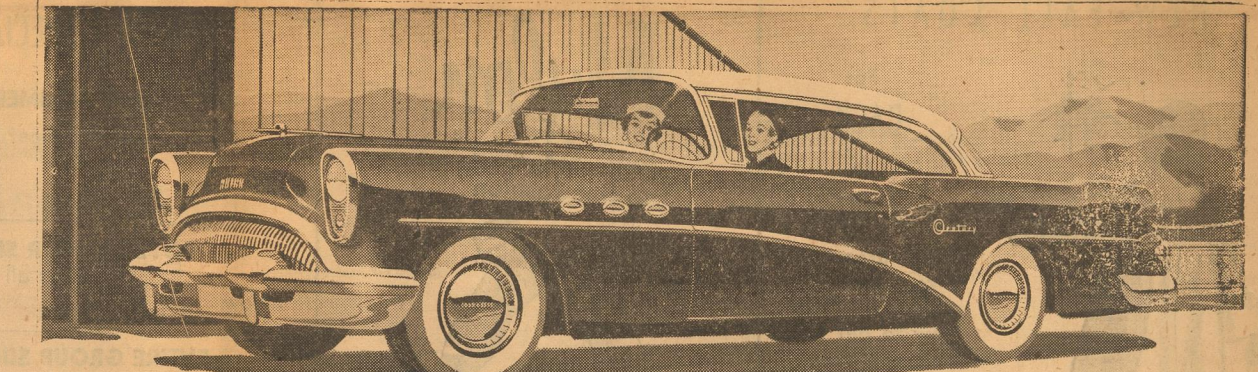

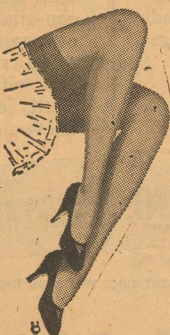

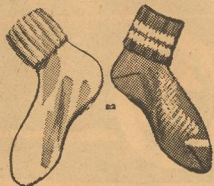

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing an Amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit jurors; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'male' is used in reference to grand or petit jurors, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties where voting machines are used, the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."
Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment by placing a check in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof; creating the State Building Fund; providing for the surplus in the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred annually to the State Building Fund; providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature; providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations; providing for an election thereon; and the proclamation of such election, and the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b, the text of which shall be as follows:
"Section 51-b. (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State official to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate as such State official he shall be so confirmed as a member of the State Building Commission in the same manner that other State officials are confirmed.
(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, and each year thereafter, the Comptroller of Public Accounts shall certify to the State Treasurer the amount of money necessary to pay Confederate pensions for the ensuing calendar year as provided by the constitution and laws of this State. Thereupon each year the State Treasurer shall transfer forthwith from the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund all money except that needed to pay the Confederate pensions as certified by the Comptroller. This provision is self-enacting. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the uses and purposes set forth in subdivision (c) hereof.
(c) Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereafter provided by law, the Commission may acquire necessary real and personal property, salvage and dispose of property unsuitable for State purposes, modernize, remodel, build and equip buildings for State purposes, and negotiate and make contracts necessary to carry out and effectuate the purposes herein mentioned.
The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the Supreme Court and such other courts and State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law.
"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law,

the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the moneys available to it in any one year, for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955.
"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding thirty thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be erected upon battlefields, in cemeteries, or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955.
(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purpose of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.
(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law or laws shall be null and void if they are in violation of the provisions of this amendment.

FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.
Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:
"AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.



Algae in Ditches? Kill It With Sulphate
A problem of current interest to Castro County farmers is the control of algae in irrigation ditches which have been in use for a long period of time during dry years. Algae, according to Castro County Agent Charlie Hudson, may be partially controlled in ditches by the use of copper sulphate, commonly known as blue stone. Blue stone, the county agent adds, should be put in a bag or flour sack and allowed to dissolve in the ditch. When applied at the rate of ten pounds per half mile of ditch, a kill of 75 to 80 per cent of the moss can be expected. Irrigation engineers are experimenting with other materials which may give better control. Announcements on these materials should be forthcoming shortly, according to Hudson. The county agent recommends treatment of ditches in order to conserve water and reduce the labor of irrigation. Johnee Bice Home from USC

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, prohibiting the Legislature from ever lending the credit of the State, or granting any public money, or indebtedness of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State, now authorized, or which hereafter be authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads, or turnpikes within this State; and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this State.

Section 52-b. The Legislature shall have no power or authority to in any month lend the credit of the State or grant any public money to, or assume any indebtedness, present or future, bonded or otherwise, of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State, now authorized, or which hereafter be authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes within this State.

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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year; providing for enactment of laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

SECTION 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended and the same is hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government

of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year."

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 2nd day of November, 1954, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one (21) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 5. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

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Section 13. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 14. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 15. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 16. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 17. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and hold as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide a four year term of office for elective district, county and precinct offices; staggering the terms of such offices by having certain holders of such offices be elected for terms of varying length in the November, 1954, general election; and providing for the necessary proclamation and election.

SECTION 1. That Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 9. There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county who shall be elected by the qualified voters for State and county officers, and who shall hold his office for four years, subject to removal by information or by indictment of a grand jury, and conviction of a petty jury. In case of vacancy, the Judge of the District Court shall have the power to appoint a Clerk, who shall hold until the office can be filled by election."

Section 2. That Section 15 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. There shall be established in each county a County Court, which shall be a court of record; and there shall be elected in each county, by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law of this State; also, a County Clerk, who shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. He shall receive as compensation for his services such fees and perquisites as may be prescribed by law."

Section 3. That Section 18 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 18. Each organized county in the State now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into precincts, not less than four (4) miles in length. Precinct Divisions shall be made by the Commissioners Court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct, there shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, each of whom shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified; provided that in any precinct in which there may be a city of 8,000 or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two Justices of the Peace. Each county shall be divided into four commission precincts in each of which there shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one County Commissioner, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. The County Commissioners so chosen, with the County Judge as presiding officer, shall compose the County Commissioners Court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business, as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed."

Section 4. That Section 29 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 29. There shall be elected for each county, by the qualified voters, a County Clerk, who shall hold his office for four years, who shall be clerk of the County and Commissioners Courts and recorder of the county, whose duties, perquisites and fees of office shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and a vacancy in whose office shall be filled by the Com-

missioners Court, until the next general election; provided, that in counties having a population of less than 8,000 persons there may be an election of a

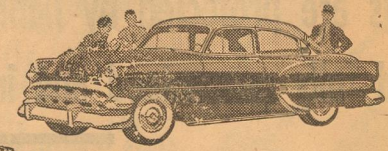
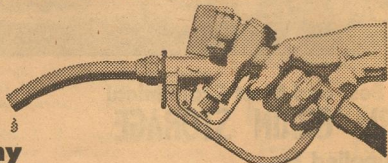
