**Banquet to conclude Stock Show**

As we go to press, the 40th Annual Floyd County 4-H and FFA Junior Livestock Show is going into its final stages with the premium sale following the buyers' luncheon. Thursday night's Award Banquet will climax the chain of events that began Saturday with the local shows held at Lockney and Floydada.

The many long hours that have gone into the feeding and care of an animal come together for careful scrutiny under the experienced eye of the judge. Some of the competition is stronger than any encountered by the youngsters in the past. It may cause brothers and sisters to vie against each other, brothers

against brothers, or sisters against sisters.

Exhibitors come in many size packages. But their courage and determination is very apparent by the end of the show. And they can smile and accept their ribbon or smile and congratulate the exhibitor with a better animal.

This year's show was dedicated to the memory of Dusty Burleson. Burleson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Burleson who was killed in an automobile accident in December, 1983. He had been a regular exhibitor for many years. He was an agriculture major at Clarendon Junior College at the time of his untimely death.

This year's steering committee elected to change the time of showing barrows to Monday evening at 5:00 p.m. in an attempt to allow more business people the opportunity to attend. The show was a success in that direction.

Kelli LaBaume took the show with her lightweight cross winning grand champion. Michael Leatherman won reserve grand champion with a heavyweight duroc. The barrows were judged by Ed Stanley, an FFA teacher of Dimmitt.

Nominations for the showmanship award in the barrow division to be presented at the Farm Bureau Awards Banquet tonight include: Gary Bigham, Kelli LaBaume, Earl Broseh, Christy Pruitt, Wyman Rexrode, Keith Hancock, Romeo Araujo, Chad Williams, Ricky Brotherton, Shannon Barbee, Kip Holt, and Pam Richardson.

Dr. John McNeil, livestock specialist of A&M Extension Service in Amarillo, was the lamb judge. Two medium-weight hampshires took the top honors in this classification. Eric Anderson exhibited the grand champion and Hunter Smith the reserve grand champion.

Those to be considered for showmanship award in the lamb show are: Terri Bailey, Hunter Smith, Karyn Foster, Haney Robertson, Heather Holt, Shannon Shurbet, and Earl Broseh.

Chad Golden exhibited a medium heavyweight cross for the grand champion steer. Libby Williams showed an Angus steer for the reserve grand champion. Richard Spencer, County Extension Agent from Robie judged the steers.

Showmen who have been nominated for the showmanship award of steers are: Kristy Dawdy, Shannon Edwards, Earl Broseh, Bill Sherman, Matt Williams, and Jennifer Crow.

Tonight's banquet will be held in the Lockney cafeteria for all the FFA and 4-H participants and their parents, beginning at 7:00 p.m. This banquet, sponsored annually by Floyd County Farm Bureau for nearly a quarter century, will recognize the top herds-men, showmen, and sweetheart for the show.

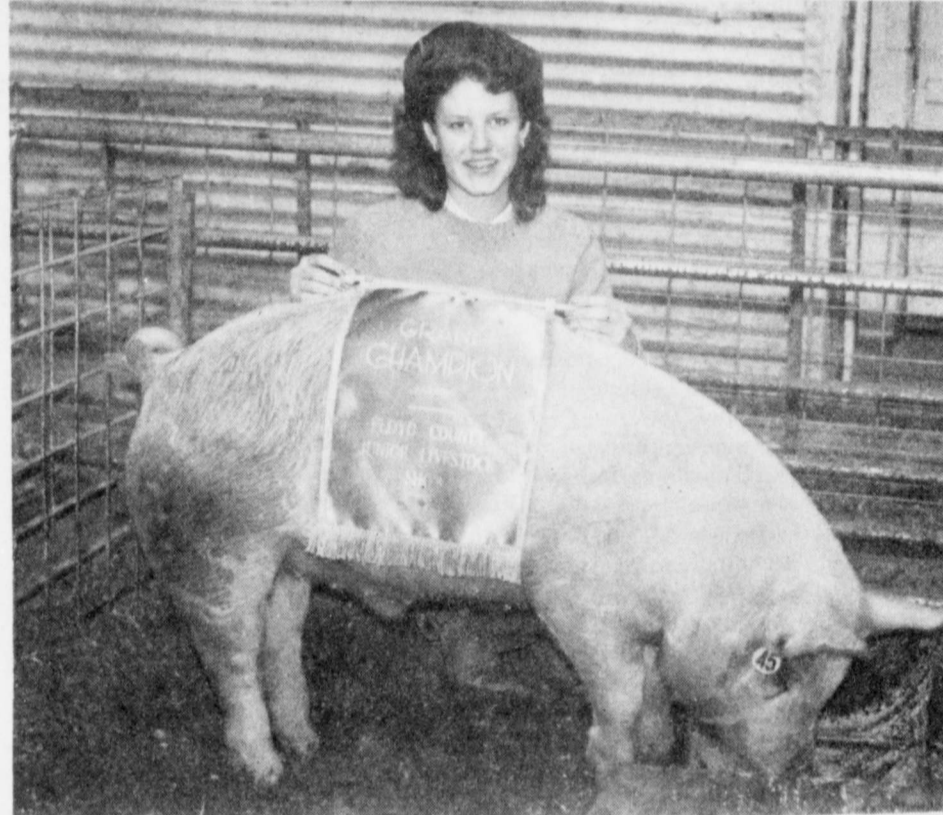

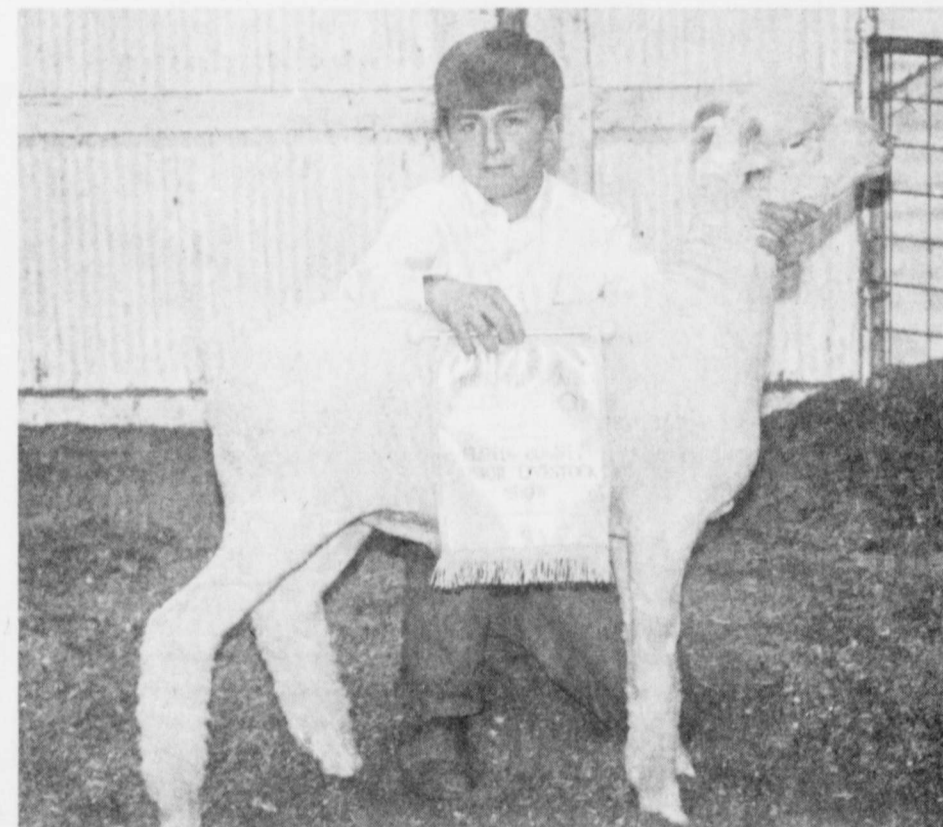

**City Council awards bids to High Plains and Pesina**

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, February 14th at 7:30 in the City Council meeting room at City Hall.

The meeting was called to order with the invocation. The council then approved the minutes of the last regular meeting.

The first order of business was the consideration of bids of Seal Coating of paved streets within the city limits. Bids were submitted by High Plains of Plainview, Fred Lipham of Floydada, Lipham Construction of Aspermont, and Aprian Corporation of Hereford. Bill R. McMorries and Associates, Inc. tabulated the bids. High Plains bid was 51 cents a square yard for single seal. For 43,000 square yards it would cost \$21,930. A single strip seal in 54 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards it would cost \$4,320. The combined total is \$26,250 and it would be completed in 60 days.

Fred Lipham's bid was for 51 1/2 cents a square yard for single seal. For 43,000 square yards the cost would be \$22,145. The single strip seal is 52 cents a square yard. 8,000 square yards would cost \$4,160. This total price is \$26,305. The days to complete the job is estimated at 30.

Lipham Construction made a bid of 57 cents a square yard for single seal. It would cost \$24,510 for 43,000 square yards. A single strip seal bid is 81 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards it would cost \$6,480. The total cost would be \$30,990 and would be completed in 40 days.

The final bid submitted for consideration was made by Aprian Corporation. For a single seal it would cost 65 cents a square yard. 43,000 square yards would cost \$27,950. A single strip seal bid was

70 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards the cost would be \$5,600. Their total is \$33,550 with a completion of 60 days.

A motion was made by Leroy Burns and seconded by Boone Adams to accept the bid submitted by High Plains. Vote: all for.

The council then considered bids on the demolition of the Robert Zambrano residence on Lot 9, Block 103, of the original addition. This house is located at 301 East Tennessee Street. Bids were submitted by Delfino Pesina for \$485, Ted Lopez, Jr.'s bid was for \$425, Vernon Wickman submitted a bid for \$750. Bid number 4 was by Alberto Marmalejo for \$550. A. Morales made a bid for \$645. A trio of Mike Reeves, Terry Reeves, and Bobby Smith made a bid of \$750. The final bid was submitted by Bennie Doggett Construction for \$1,250. Along with tearing down the house, they must also clear away the debris, and tear down the trees around it.

Ted Lopez Jr. was awarded the bid, but because of lack of the proper equipment, Delfino Pesina received the bid. It will be complete in 30 days.

The council then held an open hearing concerning the uses of Revenue Sharing money for the budget year of April 1, 1984 to March 31, 1985. It was presented to the council to have \$15,900 excess from the budget year of April 1, 1983 to March 31, 1984. The council will receive \$45,000 plus \$700 interest. \$15,794 will be spent on a maintainer payment, the seal coating will cost \$40,000 at its completion. The council wishes to pave the alley behind Hale's Department Store and Norrell Tractor

**Drug conviction draws ten year sentence for Floydada man**

Julio Ambrose Flores of Floydada was sentenced to ten years confinement in the Texas Institute Corrections by Judge George Miller. He was found guilty by 12 jurors during the February 13 trial held in the 10th District Court of Floyd County.

Flores, who was charged with delivery of a controlled substance was defended by attorneys Sam Medina and Tommy J. Turner of Lubbock. The

prosecuting attorney for the trial was Floyd County District Attorney Randy Hollams.

He was arrested on November 9, 1983 by D.P.S. Narcotics officers Rodriguez and Radall. Flores was held in the Floyd County Jail for approximately two weeks. Bond was originally set for \$75,000. Flores was finally released on a \$10,000 bond.

Parts for \$5,600. They also plan to donate \$500 to the Day Care Center. These total expenditures are \$61,900.

The Council then declared April 7, 1984 to be the day elections will be held to fill three council seats. The term of office will be two years. The places are held now by Leroy Burns, Don Green, and Boone Adams. John Key West was appointed election judge. The alternate election judge has yet to be decided upon.

The next order of business for the council was to decide on installing an electric door opener for the Fire Departments overhead door. This door is used to fill up the fire trucks and is so tall they cannot keep rollers on the door. The council decided to check into this new door but decided it should have a manual disconnect on it in case of electrical power loss.

The council then discussed purchasing lumber and etc. needed to finish the basement at the Fire Department. The basement would be used as an Emergency Operations Center in case of a disaster. The labor would be provided by members of the fire department. The council decided to make the decision when they held their budget meeting.

Lighthouse Electric Coop has asked permission from the council to drill a well outside the city limits and pipe the water into the city limits. The water would be used to water the Lighthouse yard. This water line would not be connected to the city system. The council decided they would need a letter of request from Lighthouse before they can act.

Walter Wood of Prudential Insurance met with the council to present a new life insurance policy. The policy would entitle city employees to receive group life insurance as a benefit. This policy in three months would be worth two times their annual income. The council decided to reject this policy.

The council then made the necessary adjustments in the 1983-84 budget. Discussion was then held about the bills for January. The council voted to pay them.

New matters brought up to the council included a report that Floydada will receive its first water from Lake Mackenzie in approximately 30 days. The council then discussed the \$750 liability insurance policy purchased to cover construction at the airport. The policy, which lasts for one year, will provide half a million dollars in coverage. The council ratified this policy.

Being there was no more business for the council, the meeting was adjourned.

## Family enjoys lamb roast

This is stock show week and the three primary show animals are beef, pork, and lambs. Most everyone in this area is familiar with cooking beef and pork but lamb is a rarity in West Texas. One person who does cook lamb however is Margie Womack.

Margie began cooking with lamb about fifteen years ago when she and her husband Bill and four sons, Ricky, Joe, Jay and Tracy began raising them. Lamb has become one of the family's favorite foods, except for Margie. She says she is too close to the pets to eat one. According to Bill, the real lamb cooker in the family is Tracy because he uses different spices.

The secret to cooking this expensive cut of meat is to cook it very slow and to use low heat. Margie says the slower you cook it, the better it is. Lamb, which is very low in cholesterol, can be used like any other meat, just experiment.

The recipe Margie is sharing is a lamb shoulder roast:

- 4 lbs. boned and rolled lamb shoulder
- 2 sticks celery
- 1 large onion
- 8 oz. cooked tomatoes

- pinch of ginger
- 1 bayleaf
- salt and pepper

Rub meat with a cut clove of garlic. Brown meat in a small amount of fat in a heavy casserole. Add four tablespoons water and a little salt. Add chopped celery, onion, tomatoes, ginger and bayleaf. Cover and cook very gently for 2 1/2 hours
