



# **City Council awards bids** to High Plains and Pesina

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, February 14th at 7:30 in the City Council meeting room at City Hall. The meeting was called to order with the invocation. The council then approved the minutes of the last regular meeting.

DUSTY BURLESON

The first order of business was the consideration of bids of Seal Coating of paved streets within the city limits. Bids were submitted by High Plains of Plainview, Fred Lipham of Floydada. Lipham Construction of Aspermont, and Appian Corporation of Hereford. Bill McMorries and Associates, Inc. tabulated the bids. High Plains bid was 51 cents a square yard for single seal. For 43,000 square yards it would cost \$21,930. A single strip seal in 54 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards it would cost \$4,320. The combined total is \$26,250 and it would be completed in 60 days.

Fred Lipham's bid was for 511/2 cents a square yard for single seal. For 43,000 square yards the cost woul be \$22,145. The single strip seal is 52 cents a square yard. 8,000 square yards would cost \$4,160. This total price is \$26,305. The days to complete the job is estimated at

Lipham Construction made a bid of 57 cents a square vard for single seal. It would cost \$24,510 for 43,000 square yards. A single strip seal bid is 81 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards it would cost \$6,480. The total cost would be \$30,990 and would be completed in 40 days.

The final bid submitted for consideration was made by Appian Corporation. For a single seal it would cost 65 cents a square yard. 43,000 square yards would cost \$27,950. A single strip seal bid was

70 cents a square yard. For 8,000 square yards the cost would be \$5,600. Their total is \$33,550 with a completion of 60 days.

A motion was made by Leroy Burns and seconded by Boone Adams to accept the bid submitted by High Plains. Vote: all for.

The council then considered bids on the demolition of the Robert Zambrano residence on Lot 9, Block 103, of the original addition. This house is located at 301 East Tennessee Street. Bids were submitted by Delfino Pesina for \$485. Ted Lopez, Jr.'s bid was for \$425. Vernon Wickman submitted a bid for \$750. Bid number 4 was by Alberto Marmalejo for \$550. A. Morales made a bid for \$645. A trio of Mike Reeves, Terry Reeves, and Bobby Smith made a bid of \$750. The final bid was submitted by Bennie Doggett Construction for \$1,250. Along with tearing down the house, they must also clear away the debris, and tear down the trees around

Ted Lopez Jr. was awarded the bid, but because of lack of the proper equipment, Delfino Pesina received the bid. It will be complete in 30 days.



# LANDSCAPE AND GARDENING

TIME FOR MAJOR PRUNING IF NEEDED

The last days of winter just before the greening of new spring growth is pruning time for many plants in the home landscape. Pruning is perhaps the least understood and most abused of all the many gardening chores. Incorrect pruning results in poor growth, improper growth, unnatural plant forms, poor flower and fruit production, and often the death of the plant.

A well planned landscape which is planned to reduce plant maintenance will eliminate much unnecessary pruning. Most gardeners tend to place oversized plants in undersized locations.

It is a common mistake to find a young and innocent pyracantha placed beneath or near a low window area of a home, the proud gardener not knowing that this innocent plant will ultimately grow 15 feet high and wide. Also unknown to most gardeners is the fact that the more one prunes a plant the more it grows.

Pruning stimulates growth, thus pruning becomes a time consuming and often unwelcomed garden chore.

The wise gardener chooses dwarfs or semi-dwarfs to plant near the home, at entrance areas, near the patio, and in planter boxes. Compact dwarfs such as dwarf yaupon, Indian hawthorne, dwarf Chinese holly, dwarf pyracantha, dwarf pittosporum, dwarf nandina, and many others will never need pruning.

Large plants should be given ample growing room at their mature size. Such plants are correctly used as background or screening material or planted on large walls without windows, never to be pruned. Avoiding pruning not only eliminates work but also allows the plant to take its natural form.

Unfortunately, the rounded flowing forms of pyracantha, eleagnus, primerose, jessamine, and spiraea are destroyed by pruning shears.

The gardener should prune with a good reason for pruning. Just to be pruning because it's pruning season is not a good reason for pruning. Reasons for pruning may include to correct

winter damage and to correct overgrown plants, which are usually in too small of an area.

Plants may be pruned to increase flower production, with roses and crape myrtle being examples. Fruit trees are pruned to increase new growth and fruit formation. Pruning an old plant will rejuvenate it and cause it to grow.

A good example of an old plant often calling for rejunvenation is nandina with its old leggy stems. A severe pruning of nandina will induce a flush of new growth.

Clipped hedges, of course, call for a regular pruning. The gardener looking for low maintenance in the landscape should never establish a clipped or formal hedge but instead allow the hedge to take its natural form.

The gardener is often confused as to the best time for pruning, and rightly so, as different types of plants are pruned at different seasons. Basically, pruning times may be grouped as follows:

Spring flowering plants such as azalea, dogwood, quince, and spiraea should be pruned once they complete their peak bloom in the spring. Evergreens such as junipers and hollies should be pruned in the winter.

Summer flowering shrubs and trees such as althea, crape myrtle, and mimosa call for a dormant season or winter pruning. Hybrid tea roses should be pruned just prior to spring growth in late February.

Berrying ornamentals such as hollies and pyracantha produce berries on old or second-year growth, thus the gardener must allow the growth to age to have berries. A continual removal of new growth on these plants eliminates potential berries.

Pruning also goes along with transplanting, which is a dormant or winter season chore. When moving a plant, always prune back the branches so as to compensate for the loss of the root system.

# HOME ECONOMICS TODAY **By Mary True**

# BLANKET CARE

Blankets last longest and give the best service when they are kept clean. A clean blanket has a fluffy nap that traps warmth, and it is less likely to suffer insect damage than a soiled blanket.

Always read care instructions before cleaning a blanket. Some may specify dry cleaning. Blankets that are labeled "handwash only" may be dry-cleaned. Electric blankets on the other hand, can only be laundered; dry-cleaning damages the insulation on the wiring. Some wool blankets are specially treated for machine washability. When available, follow the laundry instructions on the care label for any blanket.

In general, washable blankets can be laundered in the following manner. Pretreat spots or a soiled binding with a liquid detergent or a paste of water and granular detergent. Wash only one large blanket at a time.

Set the washer for a warm wash and cold rinse. After the washer has filled, add detergent. If a granular product is used, agitate to dissolve. Stop the washer and distribute the blanket loosely and evenly around the agitator. Soak for ten to fifteen minutes. Then use a one minute gentle wash cycle. Let the water pump out and after a one minute spin, slowly advance the timer to the deep rinse. Rinse for one to two minutes and allow the washer to finish the wash cycle automatically.

# Family enjoys lamb roast

This is stock show week and the three primary show animals are beef, pork, and lambs. Most everyone in this area is familiar with cooking beef and pork but lamb is a rarity in West Texas. One person who does cook lamb however is Margie Womack.

Margie began cooking with lamb about fifteen years ago when she and her husband Bill and four sons, Ricky, Joe, Jay and Tracy began raising them. Lamb has become one of the family's favorite foods, except for Margie. She says she is too close to the pets to eat one. According to Bill, the real lamb cooker in the family is Tracy because he uses different spices.

The secret to cooking this expensive cut of meat is to cook it very slow and to use low heat. Margie says the slower you cook it, the better it is. Lamb, which is very low in cholesteral, can be used like any other meat, just experiment.

The recipe Margie is sharing is a lamb shoulder roast:

4 lbs. boned and rolled lamb shoulder 2 sticks celerv

salt and pepper Rub meat with a cut clove of garlic.

pinch of ginger

1 bayleaf

Brown meat in a small amount of fat in a heavy casserole. Add four tablespoons water and a little salt. Add chopped celery, onion, tomatoes, ginger and bayleaf. Cover and cook very gently for 21/2 hours
