

## Lockney Wins Four At Floydada

Lockney High School basketball teams scored a four-game sweep of county rival Floydada Tuesday night-

LHS groups won varsity and junior varsity games in both boys' and girls' competition. All four contests were played at Floydada.

Friday (JV game starts at 5 p.m., varsity at 6:30), and Tuesday comes the "big showdown" with Tulia. If the Lockney varsity girls win that one, they're assured of a district playoff spot (they tied for the first-round title).

### HORNS 46, FLOYDADA 39

It was 46-39 in the varsity boys' game. Allen Sterling, Danny Fry and Danny Clark paced the Longhorns with 14, 12 and 11 points respectively. Ray McMahan added five points and Clint Riddle four for the winners.

The Longhorns made 20 of 30 free-throw attempts and 13 of 44 field-goal tries. The Lockney team totalled 46 rebounds, nine assists and seven steals for the night. Top individual rebounders for the 'Horns were Clark (15), Sterling (13) and McMahan (11). Sterling also led in assists, with three, and Clark stole the ball three times for the Longhorns. Mickey Minnitt scored 12, high for the Whirlwinds.

Next basketball action for the Longhorns comes Tuesday night, when they play host to the Tulia Hornets.

### JV HORNS 54, FLOYDADA 43

Lockney's junior varsity boys won 54-43 at Floydada Tuesday. Aaron Wilson and Danny Riddle were top scorers for Lockney with 10 points each. Arnold Alaniz scored eight, Earlee Mathis seven, Howard Moore and Joe Rodriguez six apiece, and Jim Burt five for the Longhorns.

### JV HORNS 49, FLOYDADA 38

The Lockney JV girls' team set the winning mood in the first game Tuesday, downing the Floydada girls 49-38. Stephanie Turner and Cindy Frizzell topped the Lockney scoring effort, netting 20 and 19 points respectively. 10 points by Lupe Gonzales rounded out the Lockney scoring.

### HORNS 50, FLOYDADA 44

Lockney varsity girls also won, but not as big a margin as when the teams met earlier this season. This time, the Lady Horns came out on top 50-44—the first-round Lockney-Floydada girls' game wound up 66-35 Lockney.

The Whirlwinds outscored the Lockney girls 21-14 in field goals, but the Lady Horns made 22 of the 31 free throws they tried. (Floydada went to the line only five times and made just two—Floydada committed 24 fouls, Lockney 10). Late in the game, Floydada was within one point—then the Lockney girls hit six crucial field goals in the final two minutes.

Sheila Hrbacek scored 32 Lockney points. Beverly Barker got 14 for the Lady Horns, and Tammie Carthel added four.

## Lockney Girls Tie For First-Round Basketball Title

Lockney High School's varsity girls' basketball team secured a first-round district 4-AA tie Friday by defeating Idalou 55-49. The Lady Horns, tied with Tulia (at 3-1) for the first-round title, lost only to the Hornetses first time around.

In the victory over Idalou, Sheila Hrbacek was high scorer, netting 23 points for Lockney. Beverly Barker put in 20 and Tammie Carthel 19 for the Lady Horns. Robin Becknell paced Idalou with 20.

A big second quarter was one of the keys to the Lockney victory, Coach Marsha Sharp said. Her team was behind 8-4 at the end of the first period, they outscored Idalou 24-13 in that second quarter. They upped their lead to 44-29 at the end of the third stanza, but still had to hit some important free throws in the final period to insure the victory—matter of fact, the Lockney girls didn't score a single field goal in the fourth quarter, although they sank 11 free throws.

## Film To Be Shown Sunday At First Baptist

"CORRIE: Behind the Scenes with THE HIDING PLACE," a new full-length color release from World Wide Pictures, will be shown at the First Baptist Church, 401 S. Main, Lockney, on Sunday, January 30. A single showing is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

THE HIDING PLACE, a true story filmed in Holland and other European locations, is based on the experiences of Corrie ten Boom, who, with her father, sister, and brother, provided refuge for countless Jewish families. A secret room was constructed in their home as a hiding place for use during Gestapo raids. The ten Booms' activities were discovered, and they were sent to prisons and concentration camps.

According to Kenneth Bliss, Director of Distribution for World Wide Pictures, THE HIDING PLACE has been extremely well-received, both by audiences and film critics. "CORRIE" was produced to give people who have seen THE HIDING PLACE or read her many best-selling books an opportunity to hear her share many of her memories about her life in Holland, her family, and her lifetime of service to others.

Bliss added that the film "offers a great lesson in the perseverance of a personal faith in a very dark and trying period of world history. Corrie ten Boom, now in her eighties, has a

tremendous vitality, a deep spiritual commitment, and a profound love for her fellow man. We believe we have succeeded in transmitting a part of her zest, personality, and source of strength through this film."

Bliss noted that the film includes "interesting sidelights on the experiences of the cast and crew during the filming of THE HIDING PLACE."

The Reverend John Jenkins, pastor of The First Baptist Church stresses that the showing of "CORRIE" is open to the public free of charge. "We encourage families to plan to attend together, for what we believe will be a memorable experience," he concluded.

## Learn To Drive Safer; Reduce Insurance 10%

Lockney Rotary Club is planning to sponsor a "Safety Driving School" for interested drivers (25 years old or older) in the community that are interested in safer driving, preserving life, protecting property, and reducing insurance rates by 10% for the next three years. (This will substitute for the reduction for those under 25 years of age who failed to have driver education in high school.)

This course will be under the direction of a qualified instructor of the Texas Highway Department and will be a three-night, eight-hour course. It will be on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights of a week selected. Monday and Tuesday nights will be three-hour courses, and Thursday will be a two-hour session. Each session will begin at 7 p.m.

Everyone who completes the school will be issued a certificate entitling him to the reduced insurance rate on his automobile. The 10% reduction applies to collision and liability but does not include comprehensive coverage. Husband-and-wife teams are encouraged, especially where two or more vehicles are in one family.

To enroll, contact one of these members of the Lockney Rotary Club immediately: Boyce Mosley, Art Barker, Hugh Daniel or Pat Frizzell. The fee will be \$5 per person taking the course and will be in advance. All fees received by the club or club members will be receipted. Actual date of the school (probably late February or early March) will be announced soon.

### Well Production Drop Predicted

**AUSTIN** — Production of water from Floyd County wells is expected to decrease by 43 per cent in the next 44 years, according to a newly-released report by the Texas Water Development Board.

Report 211, titled "Analytical Study of the Ogallala Aquifer in Floyd County," also predicts that only 58 per cent of the present amount of water in the aquifer will be left by the year 2000 and only 38 per cent by 2020.

These predictions, the report stresses, are based on the past and present trends, and that the future could be quite different if trends change. The most determi-

native factor, the TWDB adds, may be the decisions of the water users themselves.

Over the past three decades, withdrawal of ground water has exceeded the natural recharge ability of the aquifer. The report's three authors said that if the over-

draft continues, the aquifer ultimately will be depleted to the point where it will not be economically feasible to pump water for irrigation.

Nowhere in the county is the water expected to be exhausted, but yields of wells will decrease and expense of irriga-

tion pumpage will climb as the increased lifts will require more energy to bring the water to the surface.

Pumping lifts in wells in the county now range from less than 100 to 425 feet. The report predicts that wells will in-

crease to 450 feet in some areas of the county by 2000 and 475 feet by 2020.

### Texas Legislator Questions Solvency of Teacher Funds

**AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)** — A Kerrville legislator Monday called the chief lobbyist for Texas teachers a "con man" and said the Teacher Retirement System may be in serious financial trouble.

Rep. Jim Nugent, D-Kerrville, distributed to House members last week an annual report of the Teacher Retirement System showing the fund \$13.3 million in the red at the end of fiscal 1975.

Rep. Gibson Lewis, D-Fort Worth, asked for clarification of the statement during Monday's brief House session.

"You can assure Mr. Lewis and the other members it is my intention to clarify the statements that con man Callie Smith over at the TSTA gave the House last session," Nugent responded.

Smith is the executive director of the Texas State Teachers Association,

which is seeking an increase in retirement benefits this session.

"I think it would be reasonable to state there is not enough money in the Teacher Retirement Fund at present to fund existing earned benefits of the teachers of Texas," Nugent told reporters. "They have been taking more out of it than they are putting in it, sort of like social security and New York City."

Nugent sponsored a bill last session to increase retirement benefits for teachers and said Smith assured him at the time the retirement program was actually sound. He said he repeated those assurances to the House, and the legislation passed.

"I now find that I was conned," Nugent said.

The Kerrville legislator said TSTA's political arm last year purchased adver-

tising in newspapers in his district supporting his opponent.

"But rather than dealing with the politics of it, I'd rather you deal with the facts," he told reporters.

The House and Senate met only briefly Monday, then began the first full round of hearings on pending legislation.

The Senate State Affairs Committee quickly sent to subcommittee a proposal by Sen. Walter Mengden, R-Houston, putting a right to work provision in the bill of rights of the Texas Constitution.

The hurried vote was taken before Texas AFL-CIO President Harry Hubbard was allowed to speak against the proposal, but the committee later backtracked and permitted Hubbard to read a statement opposing the right to work amendment.

the recessive C/F gene. Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene. At the present time, no cure for Cystic Fibrosis is known.

**NEW STATE 4-H SPECIALIST NAMED**—Earl Leonard "Lynn" Copeland has been named to the position of state 4-H and youth specialist by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He will have primary responsibility for implementing the 4-H Affirmative Action program and for developing volunteer leadership. Copeland, a native of Dallas, has served with the Extension Service since 1974 as an area resource development specialist with headquarters at Stephenville.

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### Certified Public Accountants Offer Tax Course

Area taxpayers will have a chance to review the new Federal income tax forms and changes in the Federal tax laws in a two-night course to be taught February 1 and 3, 1977.

The course, offered from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. each night, is sponsored by the Lubbock Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, the Internal Revenue Service, Floyd County's two newspapers, the Floydada and Lockney School Districts, as a public service.

The course will alert you to changes in the tax law resulting from the Tax Reform Act of 1976 and will alert you to some deductions which you might otherwise overlook.

Each registrant will receive the Internal Revenue Service publication, "Your Federal Income Tax," an informative 160-page booklet which details many tax deductions, forms, and filing requirements in easy-to-understand terms.

Instruction will be by local members of the Lubbock Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants. Classes are conducted in an informal man-

ner, with plenty of time for questions from registrants. The local classes will be held at Floydada High School.

In addition, there will be classes offered in Lubbock, Roosevelt and Littlefield. Information regarding those

locations is available through the newspaper in the location.

Instructors are volunteer Certified Public Accountants who are experienced in tax return preparation. The Internal Revenue Service furnishes the course mater-

ial, including the booklet, "Your Federal Income Tax." A cost of \$1.00 per person or \$1.50 per couple will be charged for the course.

The IRS emphasized that if any information on the label is incorrect, the taxpayer should make corrections right on the label.

Married taxpayers filing a joint return should check to see that two social security numbers appear on the label. If only one social security number is shown, the other spouse's number should be entered on the appropriate line.

According to the IRS, taxpayers can also ensure a faster refund by mailing their return in the coded envelope also included with the tax package.

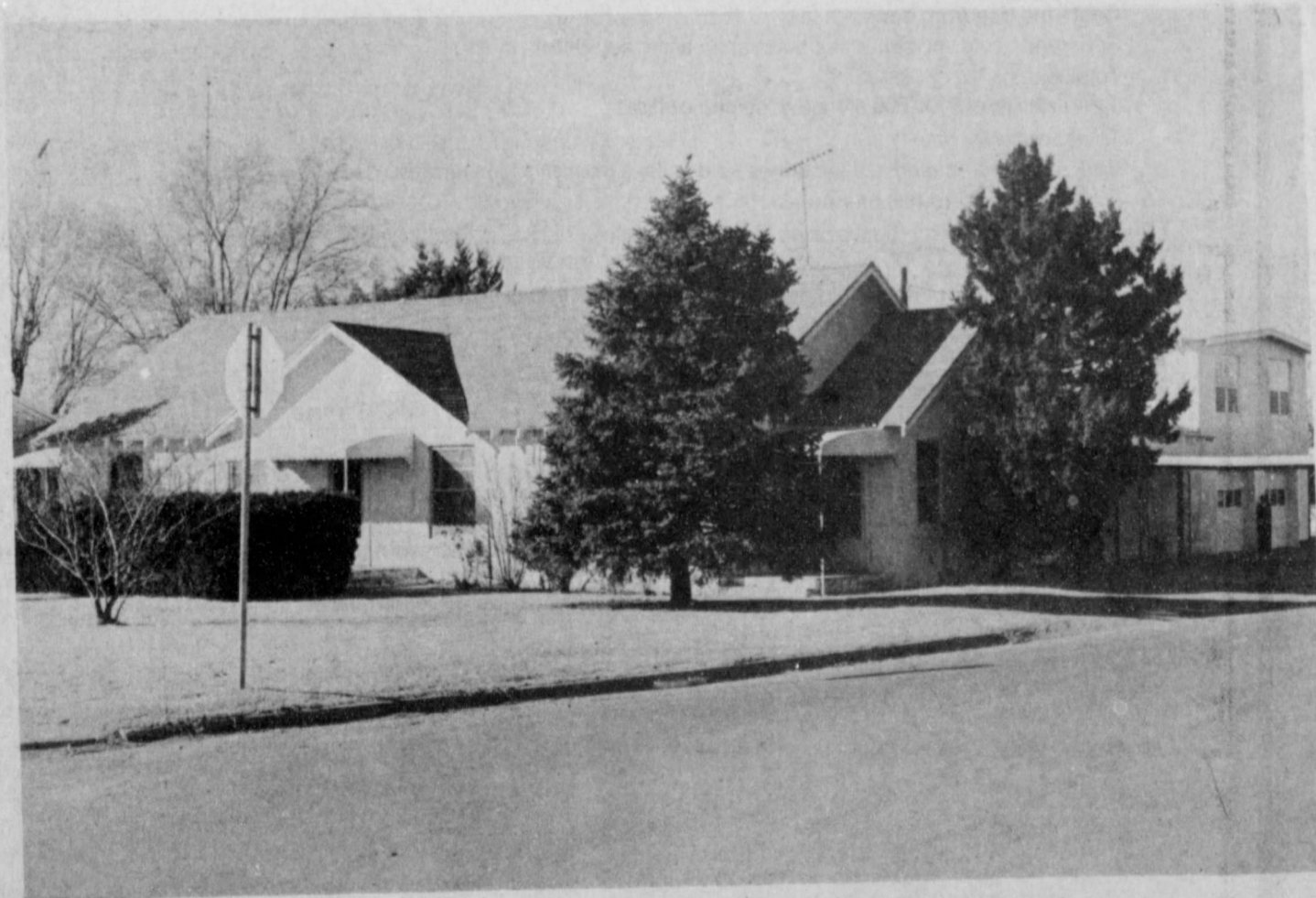

# VA News

Veterans living in Texas who are insured under government life insurance policies issued during World War I, II and the Korean Conflict will receive \$20,290,000 in dividends during 1977 Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director, announced today.

The dividends are being paid to holders of World War I U.S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI), World War II National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies and Veterans Special Life Insurance (VSLI) policies.

Coker explained the total 1977 dividend payments is attributed chiefly to higher

interest earnings on the VA-administered insurance funds.

The national average dividend being paid to 114,452 World War I veterans with participating policies is \$202. Some 3.5 million World War II veterans will receive dividends averaging \$104. Korean Conflict veterans with current policies total 554,382. Their average dividend is \$22.

The average SGLI dividend for 5,502 World War I veterans living in Texas is \$211. NSLI policyholders in Texas total 174,210. They will receive dividends averaging \$107. There are 22,625 VSLI policyholders in Tex-

as. Their dividend is \$20. "Veterans expecting checks need not contact the VA," Coker said. "Dividends will be paid automatically on anniversary dates of the policies."

Coker explained that dividends vary depending on plan of policy, amount of coverage, age of the insured and age of the policy.

More than half of the 1.2 million annual income questionnaires mailed with Veterans Administration pension checks November 1 have been returned, Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, said today. The remaining 500,000 should have been received by the VA before January 1, if pension benefits are to be continued.

The questionnaires are required each year to determine continued eligibility for VA pensions, which are bas-

ed on financial need. More than 2.7 million veterans and survivors are on the VA pension rolls.

Those who failed to return the questionnaire by January 1, will, in lieu of receiving their January check on February 1, receive a letter from the VA explaining why their pension payments have been suspended.

Pensions are paid to veterans and widows of veterans with non-service-connected disabilities. Amount of the monthly stipend is based on the annual income of the recipient, according to law.

Annual income limitations also govern amounts of dependency and indemnity compensation payments to certain parents of veterans who died of service-connected causes.

Pensioners 72 years of age or older, who have been on

the VA rolls for two successive years, are exempt from filing will receive questionnaires because of cost-of-living increases in annuities, Coker added.

Complete information on the VA pension program is available from any VA office, veterans county service officer, or veterans organization service officer.

The current price is \$281.50 a ton.
