# Murder suspect indicted

LITTLEFIELD — Eddie Rowton, a 44-year-old convicted rapist, was indicted Thursday for capital murder in the 1992 killing of a former neighbor, 5-year-old Shawnlee Perry of Earth.

Lamb County District Attorney Mark Yarbrough said he plans to seek the death penalty.

Rowton is currently serving a 35-year sentence at a state prison in Angleton for the assault and rape of a New Mexico woman in Bailey County.

Shawnlee disappeared from her backyard on May 7, 1992. Her body was found by a farmer two months later in a field five miles from her home.

### Reform school riot

ACAPULCO, Mexico — Some kids apparently never learn.

Demanding the right to smoke, drink and have sex, inmates at a juvenile reform school rioted and took a top official hostage last week in exchange for their freedom.

The riot began when several youths burned bedding in their cells at the state juvenile reform school in the Guerrero state capital of Chilpancingo, 50 miles south of Acapulco.

School director Luis Antonio said the youths were demanding the right to cigarettes, alcohol and conjugal visits.

Police and prison guards released 23

Two days later, police had recaptured 17 of the youths.

After a long and sometimes wandering search, the City of Muleshoe hired an administrative assistant to help promote economic development.

# Boll weevil meeting draws large crowd

Local farmers met for the second time in less than a month to discuss the threatening problems the boll weevil may cause on the local cotton industry.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service sponsored a boll weevil educational seminar Thursday at the Bailey County Coliseum.


Dozens of farmers from Bailey, Lamb, Parmer, Castro and Deaf Smith counties turned out to listen to different specialists and cotton producers tell their stories and forecast the future of the cotton industry if the boll weevil is not controlled.

Jim Leser, an extension entomologist from Lubbock, explained to the audience that in the past, boll weevils were not a serious problem because the winters acted as a natural killing agent.

However, the mild winters the South Plains have experienced lately are creating the increased potential of vast infestation of the weevil, according to Leser.

"In the mid to late 1980s we had strong winters and only an average 6-percent winter survival rate of the weevil," said Leser. "In the last seven

Water from a burst pipe flooded the girls dressing room at the junior high and seeped under the gymnasium floor. Apparently warped beyond repair, the gym floor looks like a giant washboard.

A school custodian discovered the damage the morning of April 1. A one-inch pipe in a boiler room in the west end of the gym had apparently burst sometime the night before.

# Golden Spread Electric breaks ground for Mustang Station

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc., headquartered in Amarillo, opened a new chapter in its proud history of service to customers in Texas and Oklahoma when it broke ground on April 2 for Mustang Station, a \$145 million electric generating plant near Denver City.

The first phase of the 486megawatt plant will produce some 285 megawatts and is expected to be in service in the spring of 1999. The secondphase addition will begin production in January of 2000. Mustang Station will be fueled by natural gas and will eventually require about 20 employ-

"This state-of-the-art facility will equip us to meet the needs of our member-consumers for years to come," said Robert W. Bryant, president of Golden Spread EC. "It truly is a power plant for the 21st century."

The primary customers for Mustang Station will be the 100,000 member-consumers served by the 11 Golden Spread member cooperatives in the South Plains and panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma.

Golden Spread's subsidiary, GS Electric Generating Cooperative, will purchase a 50-percent interest in Mustang Station when the generating units are completed. Denver City Energy Associates is the plant developer and will own 50 percent upon completion. Denver City Energy Associates is an


equal partnership formed by Quixx Corp. of Amarillo, an affiliate of Southwestern Public Service Co. and LS Power, an independent power producer based in New Jersey.

Golden Spread, organized in 1984, is one of the first generation and transmission (G&T) cooperatives to move from formation to generation without the assistance of federal financing.

At a time when electric utility restructuring is moving forward at the federal and state level, with the Texas Legislature expected to consider restructuring during the 1999 legislative session, Golden Spread is adopting innovative approaches to power supply. It's new power supply portfolio and

member sales agreements are designed to lower costs for consumers and enhance the competitive position of the electric cooperative and its members. Mustang Station is critical to Golden Spread's future success as a competitive electric supplier in the marketplace.

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# Businesses need to turn in unclaimed money

AUSTIN-Businesses and financial institutions will have a three-month opportunity to turn unclaimed money over to the state, without fear of being penalized for past mistakes, according to the State ful for three to five years. Comptroller's Office.

"From March 2 through June 1, the Comptroller's office will accept any unclaimed funds turned in by businesses, and I will not impose any penalty or interest on businesses that report unclaimed property during this period," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

The law requires businesses royalty payments. and financial institutions to turn abandoned cash and other assets over to the state when efforts to locate the rightful owners have been unsuccess-

Examples of unclaimed property include: uncashed dividends and payroll or cashier's checks; abandoned stocks, bonds, and mutual funds; credit balances, utility deposits and other refunds; inactive bank accounts; contents of abandoned safe deposit boxes; and mineral interests or

"After June 1, however, penalty and interest will once again be assessed against businesses, that fail to report unclaimed property," Sharp said.

Businesses that are holding unclaimed funds should send the money to: Comptroller of Public Accounts, Unclaimed Property, PO Box 12019, Austin, Texas 78711-2019.

"We've got people that live in the community that can sell Muleshoe," Fisher said. "They're the ones that are committed to living and owning a business in the community."









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

# **Taxpayers** can file for extension

Taxpayers who can't file their federal tax return on time can get an extension, according to tax officials.

Taxpayers can receive an extra four months if they mail Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," to the Internal Revenue Service by April 15.

More than 11 million North Texans will wait until the last minute to file their tax returns. In fact, the IRS estimates 278,600 that North Texans will file for extensions.

According to IRS district director Glenn Henderson, the automatic extension is only an extension of time to file the tax return. It does not, however, give the person extra time to pay the taxes due on the return. Henderson added that Texans need to estimate the amount of tax they will owe and send that with the Form 4868.

Texans who are able to file by the April 15 deadline, but who can't pay the tax due can request a monthly payment plan when they file. To request the payment plan, attach Form 9465 to the front of their tax return and show the amount they propose to pay each month and on what day. To set up the installment payment plan, the IRS charges a \$43 fee..

"To reduce interest and penalty charges, people should pay as much as they can when they mail the extension or installment agreement forms," Henderson said.

Anyone who finds that they owe money this year may want to consider adjusting their W-4 "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate" at work to have more money taken out each payday, IRS officials recommended.





# **Emergency farm loans for Bailey, Cochran counties**

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by the severe winter storm that occurred Dec. 22 - 25, 1997 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office sor Joyce M. Thompson said. located on 115 E. Ave. D. in Muleshoe.

Bailey and Cochran Counties have recently been named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman as eligible for loans to cover a portion of the actual production losses resulting from the severe winter storm.

Farmers may be eligible for Monday through Friday. up to 80 percent of their actual losses for the operating loan needed to continue in business or\$500,000, whichever is less.

For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," county supervi-

Farmers participating in Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds for those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans will be accepted until Oct. 5, 1998. Farmers should apply as soon as possible. The FSA office in Muleshoe is open from 8 to 5

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living.

years, we recorded a 25-percent survival rate per year. After this past winter, we are seeing close to a 50-percent survival rate. The weevil can survive in 32-degree weather. It takes getting into the 20s and staying there for a while to make an impact on their population."

Leser explained to the farmers that now, before the insects heavily infest the area, is the time to act. He gave tips on controlling the insect by decreasing overwintering habitat and decreasing the weevil's food supply late in the season.

"You are at an advantage because right now you are ahead of the game," said Lesser. "Most of the areas throughout Texas took a wait-and-see approach. If you chose, you can be progressive, pro-active rather than reactive."

A farmer from the Lubbock area, Steve Jones, shared with the crowd how being reactive against the boll weevil has basically taken him out of the cotton growing business.

Jones said his production has decreased about 100 pounds an acre per year since 1994, yet the cost of trying to control the boll weevil had increased from \$72 to \$100 per acre. The increased cost and the decrease in return has forced Jones to convert his farm over to growing mainly corn and alfalfa.

Changing over to more heavily water dependent crops, such as corn, is not an option for many South Plains farmers, especially ones with dryland

Parmer, Castro and Deaf Smith counties are trying to be proactive and stop the boll weevil before it becomes a problem.

Cotton producers have banned together and petitioned the state to designate the five counties as an individual boll weevil eradication zone.

"We have to keep cotton as a viable crop, that is why it is important to act now," said Mark Williams, a chairman of the Parmer County Producers and the Northwest Boll Weevil Committee.

Williams stressed to the crowd that they all need to pull together now when they could prevent boll weevil infestation, rather than later when they are forced to attempt to control it.

"We will spend far less That is exactly why many money as an eradication zone producers in Bailey, Lamb, than we would spend trying to control it own our own. We won't get this done if we don't all work together."

The five counties will find out in early May if the state has granted them permission to form their own eradication

Once permission has been granted from the state, farmers in each of the five counties will vote on rather or not the new zone will become official


