11 LHS Students Qualify For Regional Competition

Lockney High School students qualified for regional Interscholastic League competition in ten events by placing high in district UIL competition.

LITERARY EVENTS

In the literary meet, held Saturday at Lockney High School, local students qualified for regional with three first-

place efforts, two seconds, and a third. Bound for the regional meet Saturday in Lubbock are Rosemary Ulmer, who won the District 4-AA ready writing competition; Ronee Thornton, first in district prose reading; and the LHS debate team of Jim Burt and Edward Jones, first-place winners in the district meet.

Melinda Wilson, who was second in district poetry interpretation, and Patsy Burt, second in editorial writing, also qualified for the regional meet, as did Kevin Stennett, who was third in science.

TRACK AND FIELD

Beverly Barker became the first Lockney High School girl ever to qualify for regional track competition when she placed second in the district triple jump last weekend at Tulia. Barker's distance was 35 feet even. She's also a regional alternate in the half-mile event, where she was third in district in 2:33.0, her best time of the year.

The Lockney girls' mile relay team also took third place in district (and a regional alternate nod) with a 4:24.2 effort. Members of the relay team are Karla Sherman, Karla McCarter, Susan Gonzales and Barker.

Lockney's Danny Clark goes to regional in two events, the long jump in which he jumped 22' 1/4" to win the district meet, and the 330-yard intermediate hurdles, in which he placed second in district with a 40.4-second time. Clark is regional alternate in the 120-yard high hurdles, with a third-place (15.2) finish at the district meet, and a member of the regional alternate LHS mile relay team. Other members of the team are Danny Delgado, Danny Wilson and David Lee. The mile team finished third in the district meet with a time of 3:34.2, best of the year for the Lockney relayers.

Half-miler Oscar Garza was also named a regional alternate—he placed third in the district meet with a 2:04.3 clocking.

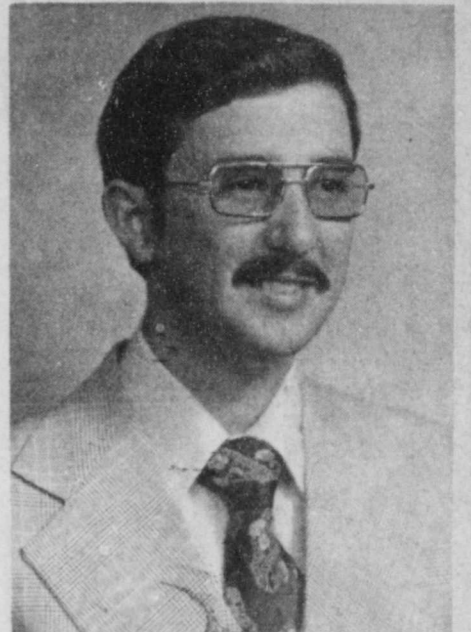
TENNIS

Drawing For Lake Lots May 7

A public drawing will be held Saturday, May 7, 1977, at the housing area on the north side of Lake Mackenzie to determine the taxpayer who receives first choice of lots. The drawing will begin at 1:00 p.m., and those eligible to take part in the drawing are the people and businesses who pay taxes to the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

The procedure to be followed for the drawing prescribes that each person, business or taxpayer who wishes to enter into the drawing will sign a letter of intent with one of the banks in the Water District. The letter of intent will state (1) that \$400.00 will be deposited to the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Recreation Fund if the taxpayer's name is drawn. At the time a person signs the letter of intent the money will be held and cannot be touched unless (A) the taxpayer's name is drawn, at which time the money becomes the money of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, or (B) the taxpayer's name is not drawn. At this

time the letter will be returned to same along with the taxpayer's money. The letter of intent will also state (2) that when the taxpayer's name is drawn, he will indicate on the master plat the lot of his choice. The person or proxy of person drawn must be present within five minutes or the name will be placed aside and another name drawn in its place.

Each taxpayer who is interested in a lot should visit Lake Mackenzie to familiarize himself with the layout of the lots. If you would call for an appointment, someone will go over the lots with you so you will know the exact locations of the lots you are interested in. The phone number at the lake is 806 633-4318.

The drawing will proceed until (A) all lots are leased, or (B) all names have been drawn.

In the case of the latter, the remaining lots will be held for a period of fourteen days for lease on a first-come, first-served basis to the taxpayers of the Authority. After the

fourteen days have elapsed, the remaining lots will go on the first-come, first-served basis to the general public.

Terms of the lease agreement, plat maps, escrow agreement will be available to interested people at the following locations: First National Bank, Lockney; First National Bank, Floydada; First National Bank and First State Bank, Tulia; First State Bank, Silverton; Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority office at the dam.

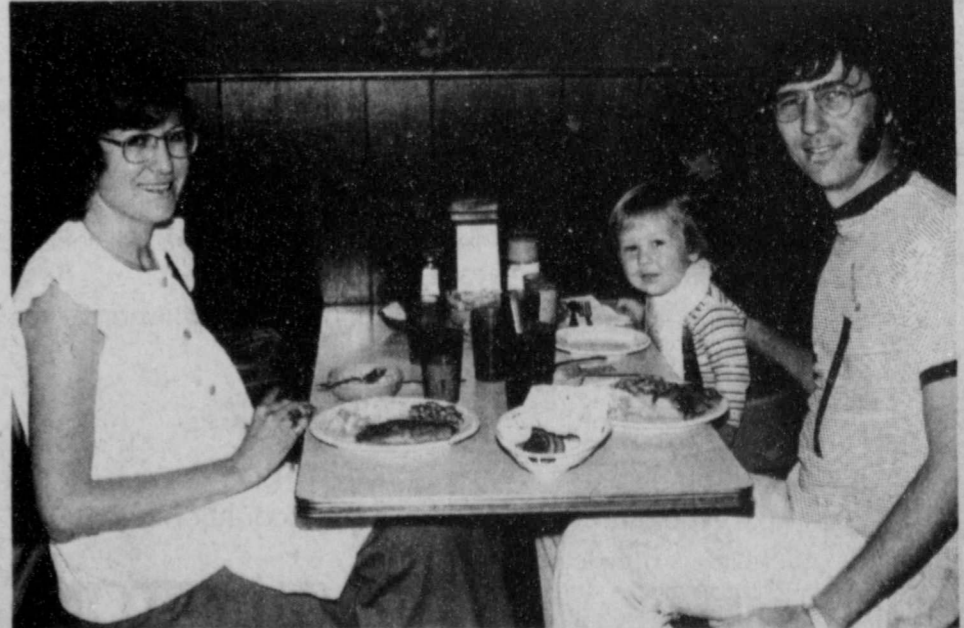

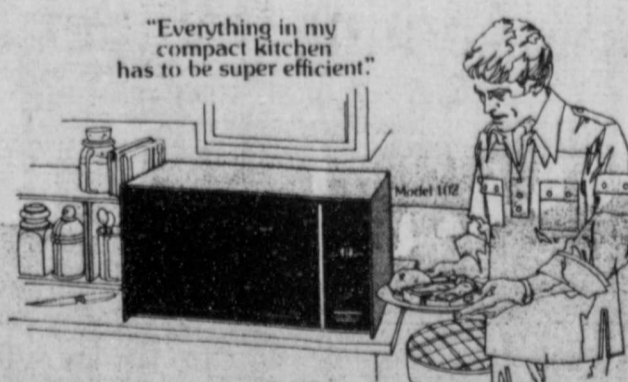

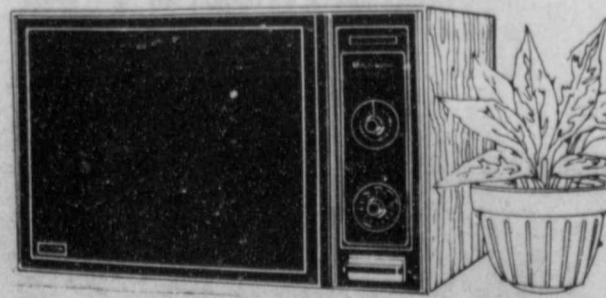

What Farm Program?

The farm program announced by Secretary Bergland has drawn a wave of protest from the farming areas, with the wheat farmers taking the lead in the protests.

It may be that Secretary Bergland proposed the best farm program he thought might get through Congress. Maybe his program was whacked by President Carter. Whatever the reason, the new program falls far short of attacking the basic problem which is that the farmers of this country are forced to sell their products for less than it costs to produce them.

The White House would peg wheat at a loan figure of \$2.25 a bushel and a market price of \$2.47 to \$2.60 a bushel. When wheat costs \$3.50 and up to grow, these figures are far short of an answer.

The wheat farmer is taking it on the chin because there is a surplus of wheat and the politicians seem to think that there is no emergency as long as this country has enough wheat in the bins to keep the price of wheat products down for consumers.

Back in 1946 when wheat was \$2.50 a bushel, a loaf of bread was 15 cents. Bread kept going up, but wheat didn't. Now, with wheat at \$2.60 the price of bread is about 52 cents and the farmer gets less than a nickel of it.

This nation went along for years thinking that it had an inexhaustible supply of oil and gas. We kept right on thinking this until 1973 when the Arab embargo on foreign oil jolted us into the realization that we no longer had any surplus and that we would never again see cheap fuel. The shock of adjusting to this has not been overcome.

But if we think that a fuel shortage is traumatic, wait until we have a food shortage. The United States has gone along for generations under the impression that cheap food was some sort of a birthright. It has been that way solely because the American farmer has become more efficient, using implements and tools and chemicals to boost the production of food so that farmers are five per cent of the population yet are feeding everybody with food to spare.

At the rate things are going, it won't last long. Farmers cannot sell their products at a loss forever. When enough go broke and get out of the food production business, there will indeed be a shortage.

If we come to the point where the control of land is vested in a few giant corporations, the era will end when the food producer asks meekly what others will give for his products. The producer, likely to be some giant corporation, will set the price of food.

And people will long for the good old days when they spent only 17 per cent of their income for food, then griped about it. They will be spending 40 per cent, as Europeans do, or maybe more.

Exercise "Iron Hand"

His unit was airlifted to Camp Shelby, Miss., as part of a 1,100 member active duty support force. More than 3,000 Marine Corps Reservists from 12 states were activated for the unannounced exercise.

The exercise included an amphibious raid on a small island near Gulfport, Miss., and stressed coordinated air and artillery fire support for infantry units.

"Iron Hand" was the largest mobilization of the Marine Corps Reserve since the Korean War.

He attended Texas Technical University, Lubbock, and joined the Marine Corps in September 1967.

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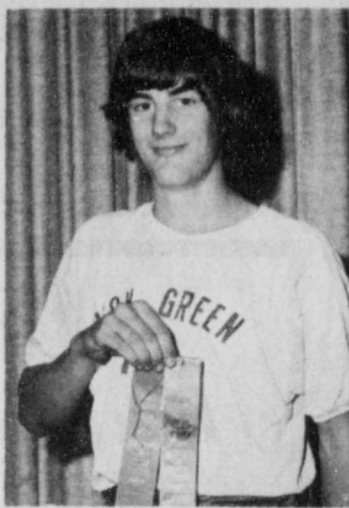
Floyd 4-H'ers Top Shots In District Contest

School Plan A Program Receives \$215,124.81

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$215,124.81 Office of Education grant to Floyd County. The allotment of these funds for fiscal year 1978 is under the provisions of Part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, Public Law 89-10, as amended. These funds will provide services for children residing in low-income areas and

State-operated or supported institutions for neglected and delinquent children, who have need for special educational assistance in order that their level of educational attainment may be raised to that appropriate for children of their age. These funds shall become

available on July 1, 1977. The State Department of Education will distribute the county amounts to the school districts in accordance with Federal Regulations. Each school district is guaranteed no less than 85 percent of its fiscal year 1977 allocation.

Four Rural Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of March 1977 according to Sergeant Ken Evans, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1977 shows a total of 11 accidents resulting in no persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for March, 1977 shows a total of 467 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 293 persons injured, as compared to March, 1976, with 448 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 261 persons injured. This was 19 more accidents, eight more killed, and

32 more injured in 1977 at the same period of time.

The 23 traffic deaths for the month of March, 1977 occurred in the following counties: Four each in Jack; three each in Young and Potter; and one each in Clay, Garza, Hockley, Lubbock, Montague, Wise, Carson, Deaf Smith, and Hartley.

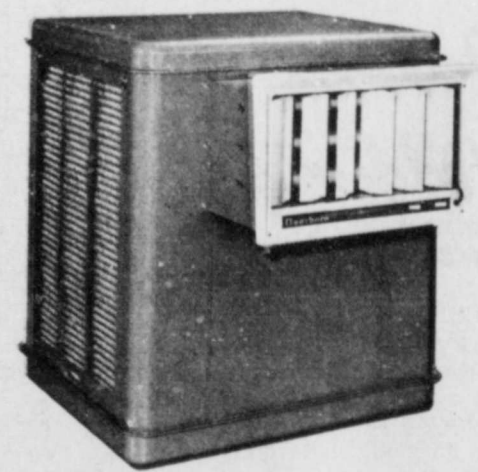

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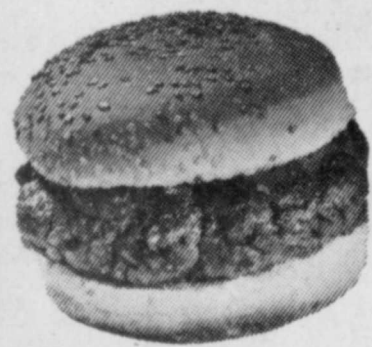
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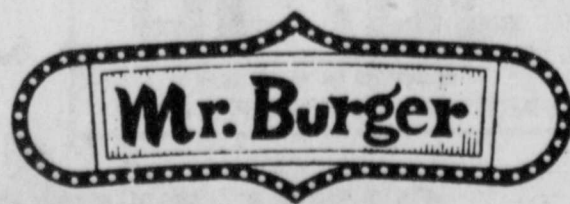
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WOODWORK

THIS, my friends, is the season for green beans and ham and interminable recognitions of visiting dignitaries. In other words, this is the banquet season, particularly for organizations related to the public schools, because they all have to get their annual banquets in before the semester ends.

We have no quarrel with banquets recognizing students for achievement in the various fields of endeavor, because these people need to be appreciated for their accomplishments during the last year. But sometimes attending these affairs can be a bit of a drag, mainly because there are so many people who get this deserved recognition.

At some of these banquets, particularly the chamber and civic club type which are not related to schools, you can wear out your hand clapping for folks who are recognized. Even when the master of ceremonies tries desperately to shorten things, it may not work out. For example, the emcee may suggest that the audience "please hold your applause until all the guests (or coaches, or players) have been introduced." But then the second or third person introduced has something very clever to say as he stands, and the crowd breaks out in spontaneous applause. Then as the next 37 people are introduced, everybody applauds each time because they don't want to hurt the feelings of all these others, since they have clapped for one person.

Most banquets don't need speakers because they are long enough without them. By the time all the special awards and presentations are made, the crowd has enjoyed sitting down about all it can, and this puts an unfair burden on both the speaker and audience.

And so far as those green beans are concerned, they are always there. There are many things I could say about green beans, but I have been warned by members of my family that I make too big a thing out of them, and besides, if I can't say something nice, don't say anything. The nicest thing I can say about green beans is that nobody ever tries to serve them at breakfast.

I mentioned to a friend that I might write a column on banquets and apparently his experience has been a bit different from mine. He complains that the banquet fare is okay, so long as the cooks don't try to get too fancy. He says when they stick to the basics, it usually works out okay, but when they try to serve something like pheasant under glass or roast rump of caribou, they invariably make a mess of it.

I don't know what kind of banquets he has been going to. All I ever get is green beans and ham...and iced tea. I can drink tea, especially if it's either that or choke to death,

but I really prefer water, which is never served at banquets. About the only way to get water at a banquet is at the point of a gun.

In spite of all this griping I've done, I still like banquets, because they do serve some good food — usually the meat, potatoes and hot rolls are excellent.

And besides, we newspaper people learned long ago that if you carry a camera in your hand, they'll usually let you in free, whether there is any film in it or not.

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Quitaque Sniper Incident Erupts

QUITAQUE (Special)—Dozens of lawmen huddled at a ranchhouse and in the darkness of night about five miles south of here Monday, as an apparent lone sniper held them at bay with what was believed to be a small caliber rifle.

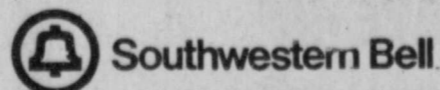

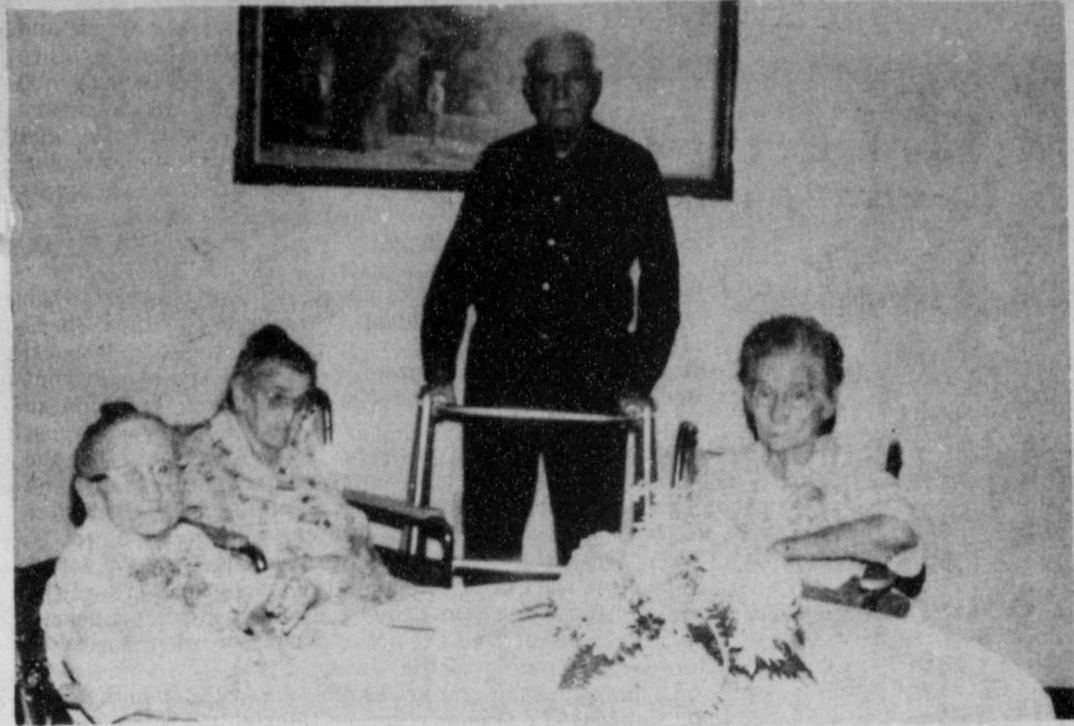

Some people will argue it won't work, it'd leave the world's countries quarreling and snarling and ready to grab each other by the throat, with every nation arming itself to the teeth. We couldn't have that.

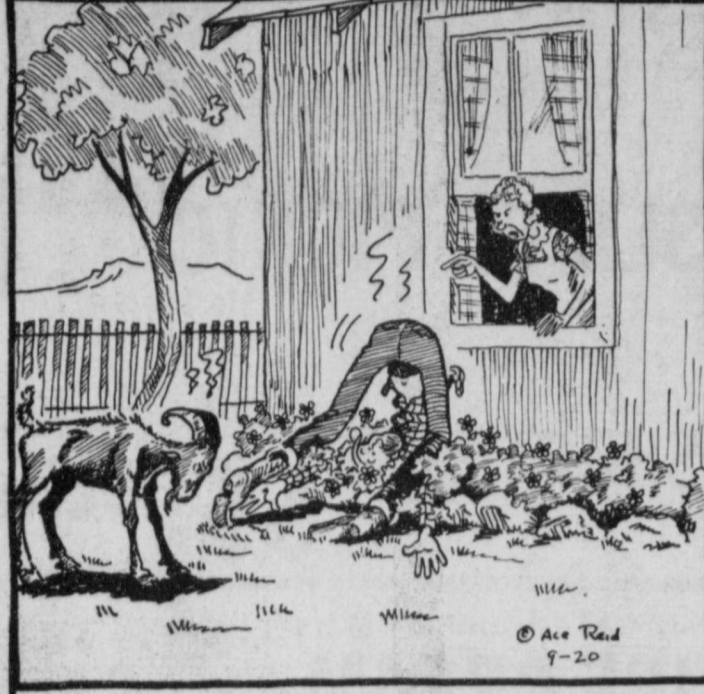

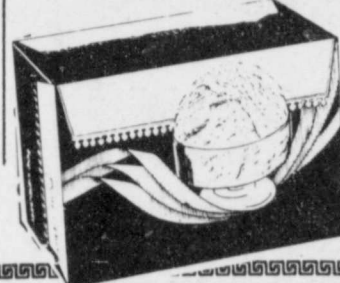

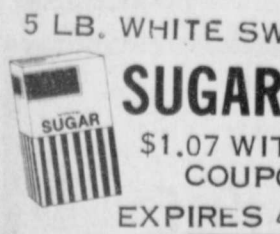
