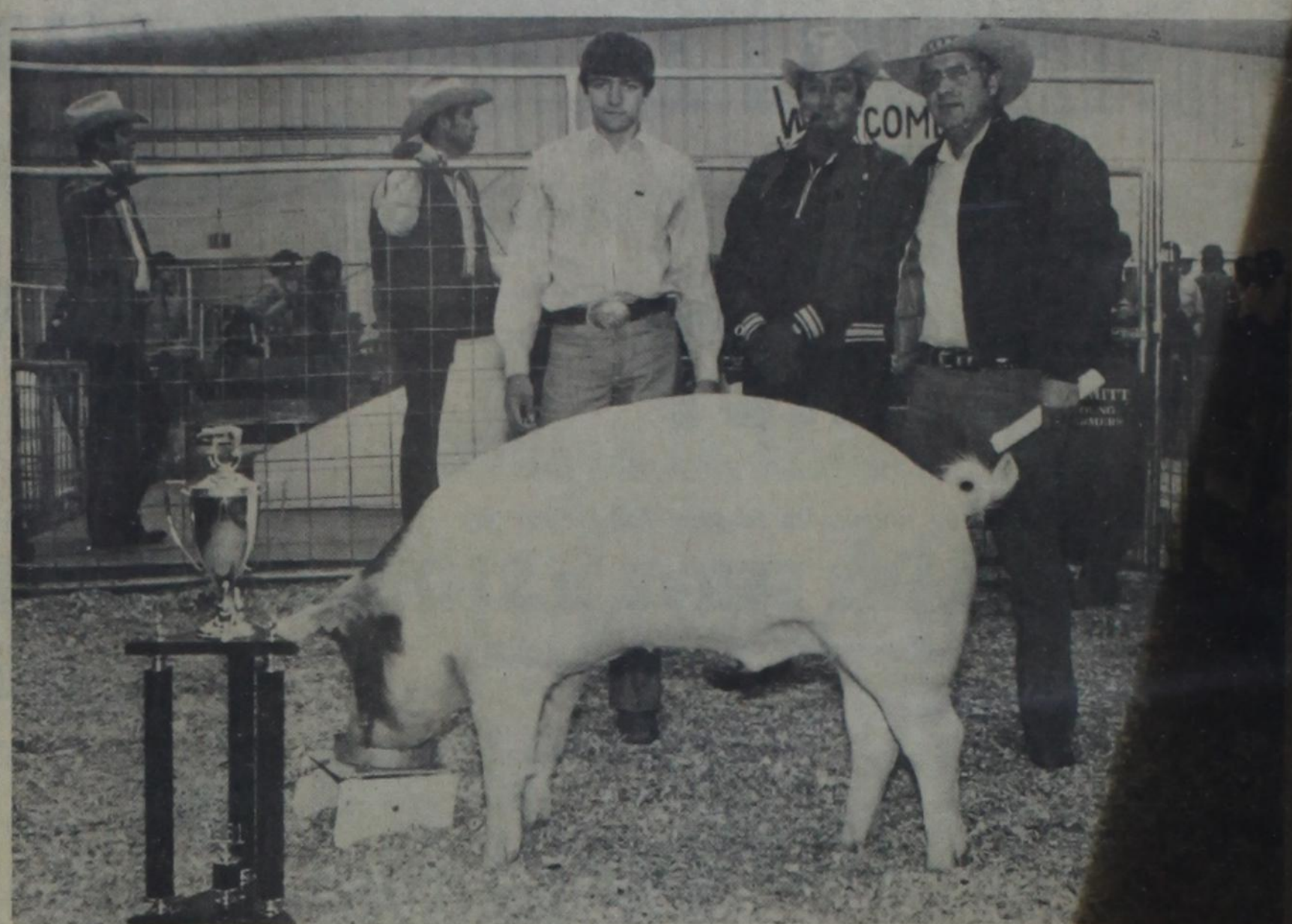

### Muleshoe man to succeed Newsom at local hospital

Marshall Cook, former administrator of West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe, has been hired to succeed Jack Newsom as administrator of Plains Memorial Hospital.

"We had five applications, and two of the applicants, we felt, were extremely qualified," said James Welch, president of the hospital board. "Mr. Cook was one of these."

A highly successful Junior Fat Stock Show climaxed Saturday with the biggest auction sale on record.

The sale hit a grand total of \$159,184.32 on 125 lambs, 125 barrows and 32 steers, according to Stanley Schaeffer & Co., certified public accountants.

It was only the third time in history for the sale to go over the \$150,000 mark. This year's total topped the previous record, set in 1976, of \$154,909, and exceeded last year's total of \$150,854.

As Saturday's sale clipped along at a rate of \$22,740 per hour, bidders opened their hearts as well as their pocketbooks. While \$149,476.73 of the grand total was paid for the 282 show animals that went through the auction ring, another \$9,707.59 went to worthy causes.

Main beneficiary of the sale was Mary Jean Huseman of Nazareth, a County 4-H Gold Star Girl whose leg was amputated at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston Feb. 4. Bidders donated \$5,451 to help pay for her medical expenses and the chemotherapy treatments which she is now undergoing.

The Nazareth Buyers Club bought her cousin Mark's breed champion barrow, then donated it back to be "resold," with the subsequent bids to go entirely to Miss Huseman's medical fund. The barrow "resold" more than 20 times, and by the time the flurry of bidding stopped, the fund topped the \$5,000 mark.

In addition, J. H. Myatt, Charles Nutt and Dan Nelson provided Miss Huseman with a guaranteed bid of \$4 per pound for her 238-lb. Hampshire barrow. Only Lonnie Robb's Grand Champion barrow received a higher per-pound price.

Miss Huseman was on hand Friday to see her barrow win first place in the Middleweight Hampshire class, but she couldn't be present at [See SALE SETS, Page 6]

## Texas corn makes big hit with international buyers

Carl King of Dimmitt got some big surprises in a dozen or more languages at the International Food and Agriculture Trade Show in New Orleans last week.

As president of the Texas Corn Growers Association, he went to the big show to try to line up contracts for white and yellow corn for the 1981 crop year. It was the TCGA's first such venture.

What he got was 14 on-the-spot orders from international buyers for more than 110,000 metric tons of corn to be shipped all over the world.

"The first problem I had was to convince them that I wasn't an exporter, that I was just there to promote Texas corn," King said. "They wanted to place orders right

there."

And they wanted to do it in Greek, Spanish, Chinese, Japanese, Swahili and half a dozen other languages.

Luckily, King said, the international exposition had plenty of interpreters close at hand, and King put the

buyers in contact with grain dealers that are set up for export contracting.

As a result of the TCGA exhibit at the trade exposition, King reported, several international buyers said they intend to send trade teams to [See TEXAS CORN, Page 7]

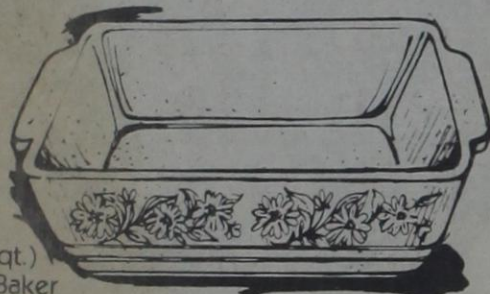

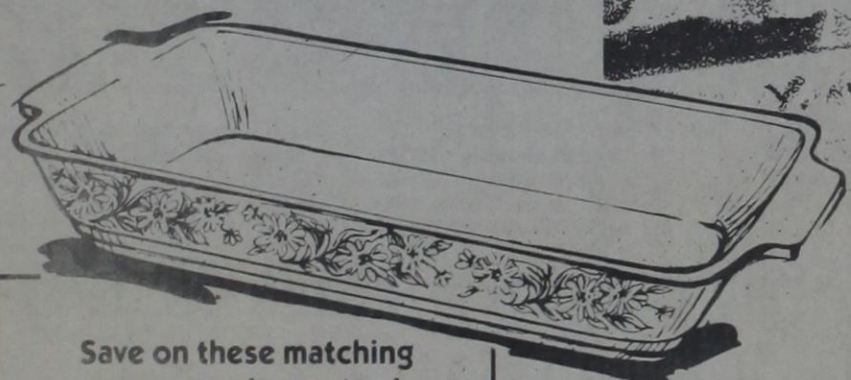

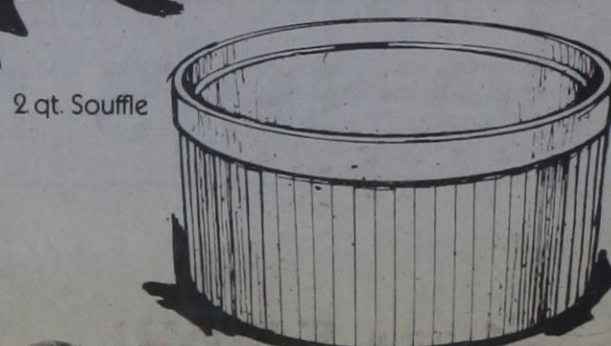

**In precinct boundaries suit**

**County's legal costs likely to top \$45,000**

The Castro County Commissioners' Court Monday approved payment of \$17,469 to attorney Travis Shelton for his legal counsel during the civil suit of Catano, et. al., vs. Castro County, involving county precinct lines.

The county is expected also to have to pay \$28,000 or more in plaintiffs' legal costs, bringing the county's total costs in the suit to more than \$45,000.

Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc. filed the class-action suit in

October 1979, charging that the county's precincts were not balanced in population.

The precinct lines were redrawn last March, with major boundary changes within the City of Dimmitt. The Southwest Voter Registration Education Project, TRLA and Shelton claimed that the plaintiffs' total attorneys' fees were \$39,772.50. However, the county governing board hoped that a settlement of roughly \$28,000 would be considered.

The commissioners asked County Attorney Jimmy Davis to check into the present status of the suit, still pending in federal court.

"The attorney general said that our chances of winning any type of suit are very improbable," County Judge M. L. Simpson reported. He added that any chances for settlement should be strongly urged.

The commissioners also asked Davis to write a resolution authorizing several reserve officers who would work with the Sheriff's Dept.

The resolution must be written to include a specific number of reserve officers from different communities in the county, Davis said, adding that the resolution would probably be patterned after the agreement that Deaf Smith County has with its reserve force.

The reserve officers would be on duty only when called to work or fill in, and would be allowed to ride with a deputy, County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes said.

The county would be responsible for 70 hours of schooling and liability insurance for each reserve officer.

Reserves would have to meet the same requirements as full-time officers but would not receive any pay, Rhynes said.

"I think we can get a lot of good out of the reserves," Rhynes said, adding that they would be especially helpful in case of emergencies, such as tornadoes.

In other business, the county board:

—Considered the upcoming vacancy of the county tax assessor-collector's post when Jerry Heller leaves to become the chief appraiser for the county. The elected official's position cannot be abolished, and the commissioners asked Heller to report if any of the present deputies would be interested in filling the future vacancy. Commissioners were informed that a Hereford man has expressed an interest in the position.

—Decided to advertise for bids on renovation of the county's new steel building to accommodate the appraisal district office. Bids will be opened during the March 9 meeting.

—Confirmed that the county had purchased, with a \$2,500 bid, the office furniture, a pickup and other belongings from the Castro County Housing Authority. The defunct authority planned to use the money to pay withholding tax owed to the Internal Revenue Service.

—Was informed of some difficulty in collecting insurance claims from Blue Cross & Blue Shield.

Through the same "resale" tactic, local buyers donated \$3,118.35 to benefit the children of Dana Wall, a member of the Dimmitt Young Farmers who died last summer. The children are being raised by Wall's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wall.

The Dimmitt FFA Chapter also benefited from the sale, receiving donations of \$1,138.24 to help develop the chapter's "ag farm" south of the airport, where many FFA members raise their show animals.

Also, buyers donated six barrows, three lambs and three steers to Girlstown USA at Whiteface. A happy Girlstown Director Marshall Cooper, who was here for the sale, had to call for a second stock trailer to haul all the donated animals back Saturday night.

For the first time in history, one FFA chapter swept all the championship trophies in the county show. Dimmitt FFA members showed all three Grand Champions, all three Reserve Champions, and took all three showmanship trophies.

Exhibitors of Grand Champions were Mike Anthony in the Steer Division, Lonnie Robb in the Barrow Division and Jerri Ka Clark in the Lamb Division. Anthony received a guaranteed price of \$1,824 for his steer, Robb received \$1,820 for his barrow and Miss Clark received a guaranteed price of \$877.50 for her lamb.

Shane Smithson was one of the biggest winners in the show as he exhibited the Reserve Champions in both the Steer Division and the Lamb Division. Dwayne Smith showed the Reserve Champion barrow. Smithson received guaranteed prices of \$1,772.40 for his steer and \$510 for his lamb, while Smith received a guaranteed price of \$650 for his barrow.

Except for Robb's barrow, the championship animals are all scheduled to be exhibited at the Houston Livestock Show next week. The youngsters will have the option of accepting the bids they receive on their animals in Houston or taking the guaranteed bids they were offered here.

Winners of the coveted showmanship awards were Morris Cole in the Steer Division, Jan Robb in the Barrow Division and Jay Nelson in the Lamb Division.

Providing the "floor prices" for all animals in the show were Bud Hill of Dimmitt, 63.5 cents per pound on steers; Estacado Industries of Sunnyside, 51 cents per pound on lambs; and the Tamba Corp. of Amarillo, 42.5 cents per pound on barrows. The "floor buyers" paid these prices for all animals in the show that went to market. On the top 125 barrows, 125 lambs and 32 steers that qualified for the sale, bidders paid the young exhibitors the difference between the floor prices and their winning bids as bonuses.

Winning bids on steers in Saturday's sale ranged from a low of \$1 per pound to a high of \$1.60 for Anthony's Grand Champion, and averaged about \$1.20 per pound.

On barrows, winning bids ranged from a low of \$1.25 per pound to a high of \$7 for Robb's Grand Champion, and averaged about \$1.90 per pound.

Winning bids on lambs ranged from a low of \$2.50 per pound to \$7.50 for Miss Clark's Grand Champion, and averaged about \$3.34 per pound.

The weather cooperated beautifully Thursday and Friday with balmy days, but the stock show's tradition stayed intact Saturday when a cold front moved through, bringing snow flurries during the auction sale.

[Continued from Page 1] this area later this year to negotiate for white and yellow corn. The TCGA exhibit succeeded beyond King's wildest hopes. The booth registered more visitors than any of the other 150 booths in the show, although the others had some exotic offerings, ranging from candies and nuts to Kosher mutton. "There were food exhibitors from all over the US there, and they would cook food for you right on the spot — shrimp, oysters, frozen and canned meats, packaged Far East foods, etc. It was a fantastic show. "But it turned out that these buyers weren't as interested in the delicacies as they were in corn. They saw our corn samples in the plastic bags, and it really looked good to them. They had never seen white and yellow corn packaged the way we had it, and it really attracted them." King found a ready market for Texas corn in such places as Colombia, Costa Rica, Kenya, Japan, Canada, Sweden and other countries. "We passed out Dimmitt

brochures to buyers from at least a hundred foreign countries," he reported. "They know where we are now, and where the Texas corn-growing region is. "Frito-Lay had a booth, and they borrowed some of our corn to use to help explain what their corn chips are made of. And we borrowed some of their corn chips, and it helped us both a lot in explaining things to these foreign exporters," King added. Gil Moody of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture helped coordinate all Texas exhibits at the international show. The exposition was sponsored by the Ozarks Regional Commission. IN 1978 the state of Maine's 651 libraries (212 public, 418 school, 21 academic) loaned over six million books to the state's one million residents. ## Social Security in Castro County

By JANICE ULMER



Have you ever approached a social security employee with a question concerning someone's benefit? It is quite possible that you left the office without the information. Why is this?

In recent years, Congress passed the Privacy Act and the Freedom of Information Act, among others. These regulations were designed to ensure a balance between individual's privacy rights and the public's right to know.

Under these statutes we are prohibited from releasing information about a beneficiary to a third party except in very specific instances.

For example, social security may disclose information to agencies within the Department of Health and Human Services. However, this is done only when the information is needed by the agency in order to conduct their duties.

Disclosure requests made in the interest of "national security," such as matters

involving espionage, will be considered jointly by the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services and the Social Security Commissioner before the information is released. This policy will also be followed when information is being requested about individuals who invoke "imminent danger to human life" — like hijacking, holding hostages or other acts of terrorism.

Information that would be used for criminal investigations of violent crimes is only released about an individual who has been "indicted or convicted" of the crime.

Finally, individuals have access to their own records. And in the event this information is refused, an individual has the right to appeal the decision.

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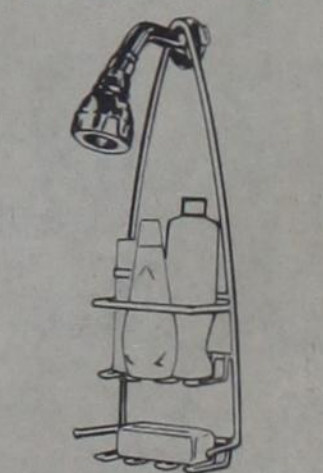

All the rice in China may be going to buy U.S. wheat. When the final figures are in, U.S.D.A. experts who predict that China may "nudge" its way into the top ten U.S. markets for farm goods may have predictably red faces. It seems that China may well end up the third or fourth leading market for U.S. goods, with the October signing of the first grain trade agreement between the U.S. and China adding a tremendous leap to the upward climbing graph. Six to nine million tons of U.S. wheat are part of that bargain with China, which experienced a considerable crop shortfall in 1980 due to dry planting weather and below normal temperatures. That estimate places China's wheat production down 5.5 million tons from its 1979 mark of 60.5 million tons. A government plan for gradual expansion of livestock and poultry production to increase domestic consumption of meats has added additional pressure to China's grain needs.

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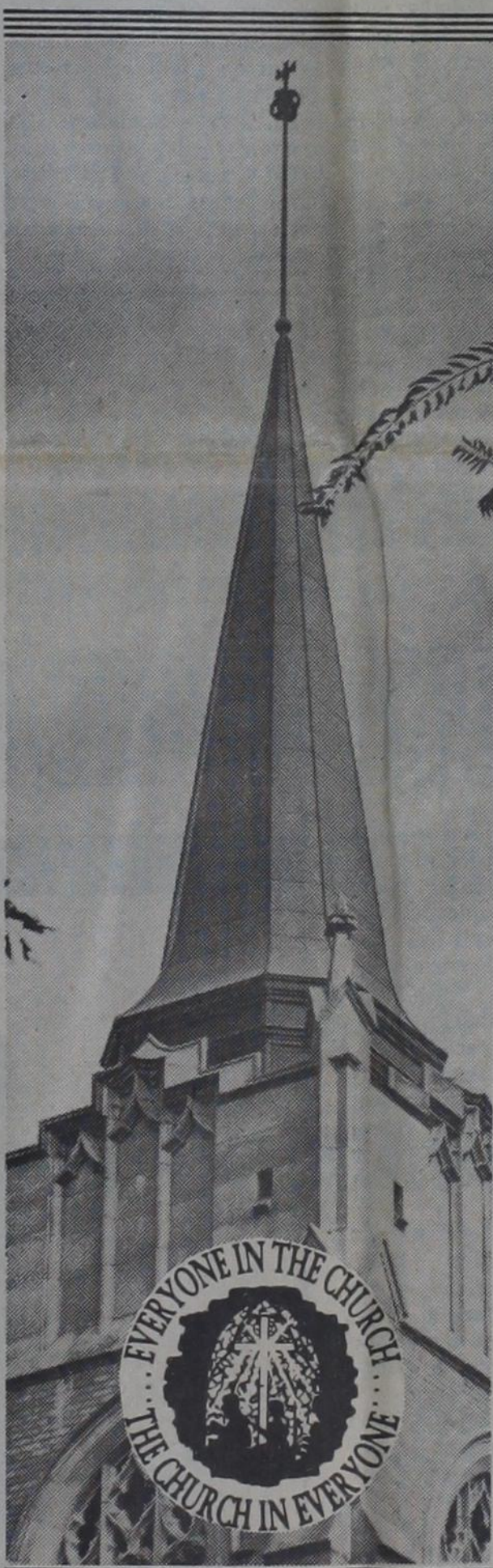
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## A PLACE TO PRAY

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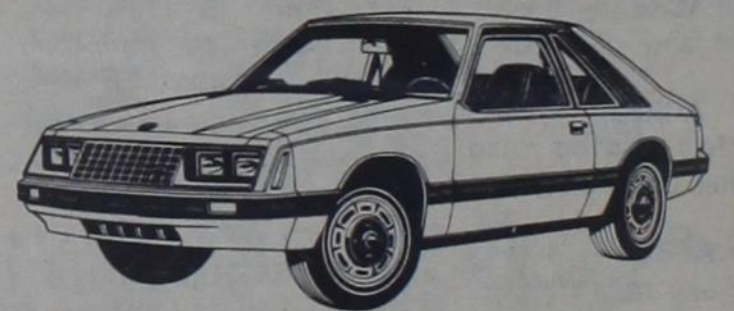

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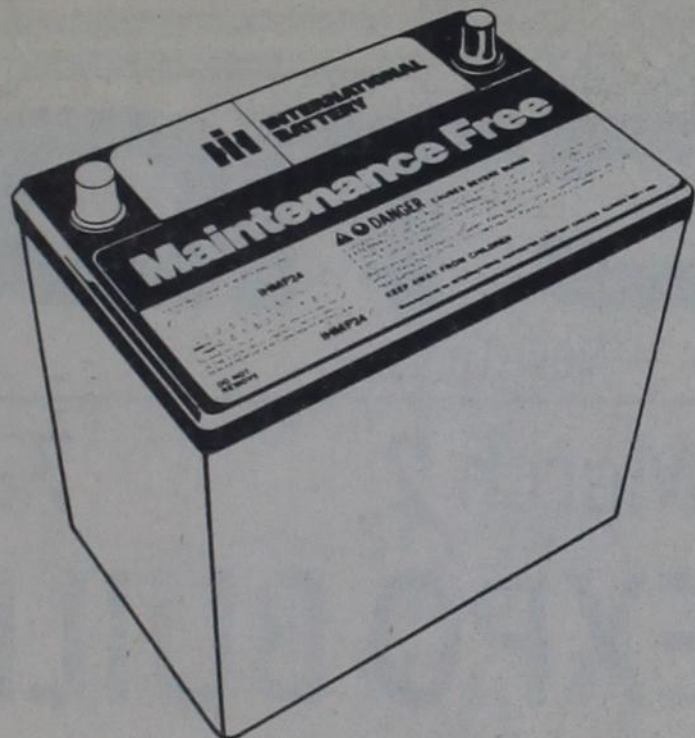

**Loans on small grains available until 3-31**

Castro County farmers may obtain loans on their 1980 wheat, oats and barley until March 31, according to Melvin L. Barton, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Corn, sorghum, cotton and soybean loans are available until May 31. "Many farmers use our commodity loan program to obtain interim operating capital while they bargain or hold their grain for future delivery," Barton said. As of Feb. 24, local farmers had obtained federal price support loans totaling \$2,440,740 on 921,128 bushels of their 1980 grain crops. The loan rates per bushel are: wheat \$3.01, oats \$1.31, barley \$1.85, corn \$2.34, sorghum \$2.15 and soybeans \$4.91. Ordinary loans have a nine-month maturity date at 11.5 percent interest. Barton said wheat and barley may go immediately

**Crop insurance described as 'best buy in farming'**

With a new government subsidy that pays up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying crop insurance; the best buy in farming today may be the few dollars an acre (tax deductible) that it costs to insure all the other dollars invested in producing a crop. This advice comes from Ben A. Jordan Jr., regional director of the recently expanded Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. Jordan suggests that there are no fewer than five sound reasons farmers should consider insurance this year, even if they have never protected their crop investments in the past. First, the new policies offer more protection. Policyholders can insure up to 75 percent of average yields, which in most cases should fully cover the investment in the insured crop plus the cost of the insurance. They can also select, from several choices, the amount they want to be paid for each bushel or pound their crop falls short of the guaranteed protection. Second, the new federal subsidy can reduce the per-acre cost of carrying all-risk insurance by as much as 30 percent. The combination of the subsidy and the tax deduction allowed for insurance premiums means the after-tax cost is only a small fraction of the protection provided. Third, rising production costs mean the dollars and cents risks of crop production this spring will be sharply higher than a year ago. In the event of crop losses, such as many farmers experienced in 1980, the financial consequences could be disastrous. Many farmers who have felt they could afford to farm without some amount of insurance in the past are now wisely reappraising the risks involved, Jordan said. Fourth, the USDA disaster payments program, which some farmers have looked to as a solution for insurance, will end after this crop year. Farmers who elect to carry FCIC insurance in 1981 rather than participate in the disaster payment will be eligible for the 30 percent discount plus, if they do not incur a crop loss, an additional 5 percent premium discount in 1982.
