Commissioners Allocate Revenue Fund

In their regular monthly meeting Monday, Floyd County Commissioners approved allocation of some current revenue sharing funds.

A total of \$40,000 was given the four commissioners for operation of their precincts, \$7,336 was designated for permanent improvements, \$52,537 was put in the jail construction fund, \$1,000

was given to the Floyd County Museum, \$1,000 to the Floyd Day Care Center, \$3,200 to the Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center.

In other business the commissioners deputized Marilyn Holcomb as deputy in the County Clerk's office and

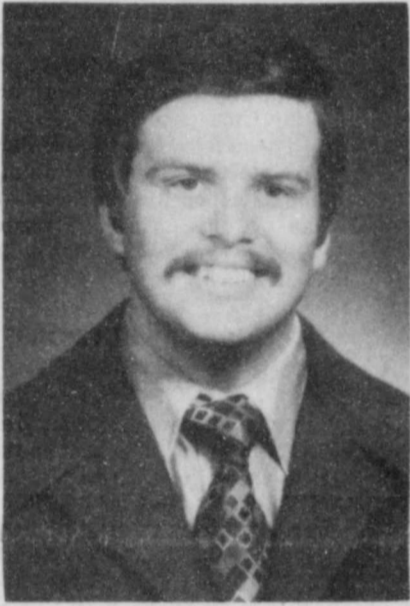
Beverly C. Poteet in the Sheriff's office. They also canvassed and approved the amendment election.

The court also endorsed the concept of a regional detention facility in Lubbock for juveniles, and pledged Floyd county's Texas Youth Council funds to the operation of the facility.

NO ACTION ON CANNERY

Although some 25 persons met with the commissioners, no action was taken on reinstating the Floydada cannery next summer.

All commissioners were present with county judge J.K. Holms presiding.



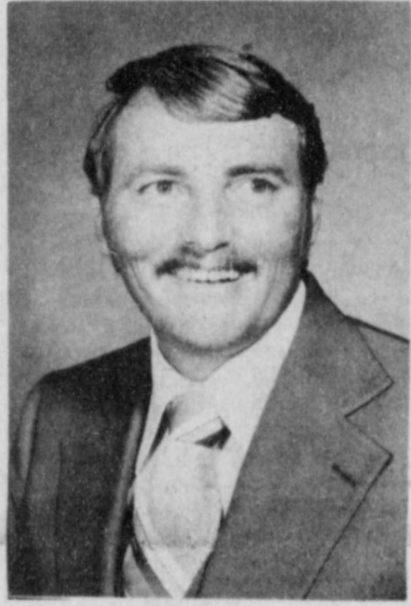
Barry Feriend

The Rev. and Mrs. Richard N. Horn are Southern Baptist missionaries to Japan, stationed in Urawa-shi where they have been serving as field evangelists with a local church since 1975. He will assume the position of Director of the Communications Service for the Japan Baptist Mission.

Appointed by the Foreign Mission Board in October 1972, they arrived in Japan in July 1973 for two years of intensive study of Japanese.

A native of Texas, Horn spent his early years in Crosbyton and also lived in Dimmitt and Bovina. He is a graduate of Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, Texas. During his junior and senior years in college, he was part-time pastor of a church in Croton, Texas, and later was pastor of churches in Spur, Texas, two years and Burley, Idaho, five years.

With only two days of basketball workouts behind them, the Lockney Longhorns dropped a 67-47 decision to Silvertown Tuesday night. It was the first game of the season for the 'Horns, but the Owls had worked out for a couple of weeks, according to Lockney coach Mike Bellar, and had already played a game.

Bellar said he thought the team had an outstanding effort in the opening game, especially since they'd only had two workouts. The 'Horns ran well and shot well on the "wide-open offense" Bellar plans to run this season.

Lockney led by two points (17-15) at the end of the first quarter, but the Owls took a 32-27 lead at halftime.

Sheila Hrbacek's 24 points paced the Lockney varsity effort. Bonita McDonald scored six points for Lockney, Stephanie Turner netted four, and Melinda Wilson made two. Twila Wood scored 34 for Silvertown.

Coach Marsha Sharp said the contest was "...the best-played opening game since I've been in Lockney..." The Lady Horns hit 14 of 18 free-throw attempts and fouled only nine times. Silvertown was 0 for 2 from the line and fouled 18 times. But the Lady Horns hit only 33 per cent on field-goal tries, and that was the difference, Coach Sharp said.

Lockney Hospital Officials Attend THA Forum

Lockney General Hospital Administrator Gayle Fortenberry and hospital board of directors president H. E. Frizzell attended a Texas Hospital Association forum on "National Guidelines for Health Planning" Friday in Austin, and Mrs. Fortenberry reported that "Texas wants the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to let the state settle their own health care problems without interference from the national government."

THA president O. Ray Hurst announced a determined effort to "send an avalanche of correspondence to Washington during the next ten days." Hurst said that 80 to 90 per cent of all Texas hospitals would lose services of various types if proposed HEW "guidelines" are implemented. Thousands of letters have already been sent to Washington, Hurst said, but there is urgent need to continue the campaign. Hurst said in a letter to administrators, "Not only should the hospital story be told, but the public you serve should be encouraged to communicate to the appropriate leaders and HEW to point out the personal problems that would result with curtailment of hospital services."

Mrs. Fortenberry has urged the public in Lockney to write their congressmen and the HEW. Announced deadline for communication to reach the HEW is November 22, so everyone is urged to write now—don't delay. Mrs. Fortenberry has said that the Lockney hospital could be closed down if all the proposed HEW guidelines are made

final. The HEW address is Office of Planning, Evaluation and Regulation, Health Resources Administration, Center Building, Room 10-22, 3700 East-West Highway, Hyattsville, Maryland 20782.

Mrs. Fortenberry returned with a copy of a letter from Congressman Jack Hightower to Daniel I. Zwick of the Health Resources Administration which begins: "Dear Mr. Zwick: Having carefully studied and evaluated the proposed National Guidelines for Health Planning, I have concluded that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare personnel have seen too many television episodes of medical center..."

A THA survey reveals that very few Texas hospitals with less than 100 beds (and few with 100 beds or more) will be able to meet any of the proposed "guidelines."

Three Die In Auto-Tractor Collision

Three Lockney residents were killed outright, another critically injured when their late model Pinto auto crashed into the front of a John Deere Tractor about 7:45 Friday night on highway 54, about four miles east of Petersburg.

Killed in the crash were Jim and Edna Harris and Mary Lopez, all of Lockney. Velma Alaniz, 21, remains in critical condition in Methodist Hospital.

According to DPS patrolman Bill Dawson, a Petersburg resident Buddy Smith was driving east when he was struck by a seizure and his pickup ran off the south side of the road, off the east end of a culvert where a dirt road intersects the pavement.

A nearby farmer Eddie Fullingim borrowed a tractor and was attempting to pull the pickup out of the ditch when the auto crashed the front of the tractor in the

east bound lane. Fullingim and others trying to aid Smith were near the pickup when the crash occurred.

Mr. and Mrs. Harris were in the front seat of the auto, the women in the rear seat. Although it was dark at the time of the accident Dawson said that the tractor's lights were burning and a pickup had been parked near the tractor with flashing lights to warn oncoming traffic.

Emergency units from Lockney and Floydada worked for about an hour getting the victims out of the auto.

Caprock Ambulance Service of Floydada carried the deceased victims to Floydada.

Justice of the Peace H.E. Porter declared the victims dead at the scene of the accident. They probably died at the moment of impact.

All three women were employed at Lockney Gen-

eral Hospital. They were returning to Lockney from Lubbock, where Mrs. Harris

and Mrs. Alaniz had registered for a dietary supervisors school.

Idalou Downs 'Horns 41-6

Idalou High School's number-three-ranked Wildcats ran their season win-loss record to 10-0 Friday night with a 41-6 victory over the Lockney Longhorns.

The Longhorns had a moment of glory—actually it lasted an entire quarter—when they scored early, four plays into the game, and made a 6-0 lead stand until three plays deep in the second period.

The Lockney score came as a result of a pass from quarterback Billy Sessom to wingback Danny Wilson on the 'Horns' first play from scrimmage (that play covered 36 yards and put the Longhorns on the Idalou 32-yard line) and, three plays later, a 31-yard touchdown scamper by—guess who?—Danny Clark. Clark ran to his right, cut back against the grain, and he was g-o-n-e. The PAT kick hit the upright and fell outside the "good zone."

The rest of the first period, the teams swapped punts across the middle field area. But after the second Lockney punt of the evening, one that rolled to the Idalou 24-yard line late in the first quarter, the Wildcats put together a TD drive that featured a 15-yard carry by Larry Murphy, a 20-yard play pass from quarterback Paige Burelsmith to Buckles Bryant, and another 19-yard tote by Murphy for the touchdown. Murphy literally ran over Clark, the last Lockney defender near the goal line, putting the Longhorns' premier running back out of the lineup for a while and perhaps hampering Clark's effectiveness for the rest of the evening. Clark sustained a shoulder injury (a severe bruise) and gained only 41 yards the rest of the game. Idalou missed the kick, leaving the score knotted at 6-6.

Longhorn fumble on the kickoff return put the 'Cats in good shape at the Lockney 35-yard line, and they capitalized by driving for another touchdown, nine plays and less than three minutes after their initial score. Murphy got that one, too, on a two-yard dive. Danny Weems kicked the 'Cats to a 13-7 lead with 8:17 left in the second period.

Bryant was largely responsible for the Wildcats' next TD—he picked off a Lockney pass at his own eight-yard line and several plays later latched onto a Burelsmith aerial for 55 yards and another Idalou score. The kick made it 20-6.

The 'Cats poured it on in the last

half, scoring three more TDs while holding the Longhorns in their end of the field until late in the final period. The Longhorns engineered a late drive that stalled when they ran out of downs at the Idalou four-yard line.

Murphy scored again on the third play of the second half—he went 76 yards for another Wildcat TD, and Weems kicked it to 27-6. Another Idalou six-pointer came after the 'Horns failed to get a punt away from near midfield and the 'Cats drove 42 yards in six plays, the final 25 steps coming on a Burelsmith-to-Brian Bradshaw pass. It was 34-6 after Weems' kick. The last Idalou scoring drive also covered 42 yards and came after a turnover. Clark, hurting from the shoulder injury, couldn't reach a pitch-out and the 'Cats recovered the fumble at Lockney's 42. Alan Emery, in at quarterback for the 'Cats, kept spun

away from tacklers at the line of scrimmage, and went 38 yards for the TD.

Lockney's late drive started at the Longhorn 38 after a short Idalou punt. A personal foul assessment on the punt moved the 'Horns into Idalou territory for the first time since the Lockney touchdown, and Sessom connected with Danny Wilson on a pass play that gave the 'Horns a first down at the Idalou 35. Joe Rodriguez ran to the 29, then Sessom found end Lyndal Stapp open for a 22-yard gainer at the Idalou seven. A couple of carries by Clark put the 'Horns on the two-yard stripe, but a third-down Clark tote was stopped for minus-three yards, and Sessom's fourth-down keeper ended four yards shy of the goal line.

Clark gained "only" 72 yards Friday night, ending the season with 1,730 yards, according to LHS coach Jim Warren.

Jr. Lee Wins Football Contest

The \$10 first prize in the final Beacon football contest of the year went to Carl Lee Jr. of Lockney. Junior missed four games, as did three other contestants, and picked Idalou to win and indicated a 38-point total in the tie breaker.

He edged second-place winner Juan Garcia, also of Lockney, by eight points in the tie breaker. Garcia missed four and picked Idalou, but he guessed 30 points in the tie breaker section and won the \$6 second prize.

T.L. Holland of Floydada was third with a 26-point tie breaker estimate

and the correct tie breaker winner. Homer Ragland Jr. of Lockney missed four games but picked Lockney to win in the tie breaker. Contestants who missed five games were Dora Garcia, Anne Lee, David Turbeville, Roy Saucedo, Lela Warren and Retha Wofford of Lockney and Jim Curtsinger of Lubbock.

All contestants in the final contest missed the two tie games (WTSU-Colorado State, 21-21, and Palo Duro-Caprock, 6-6). Other tough ones were (winners listed first) Dumas-Borger, Tahoka-Frenship, Navy-Georgia Tech, and Arkansas-A&M.

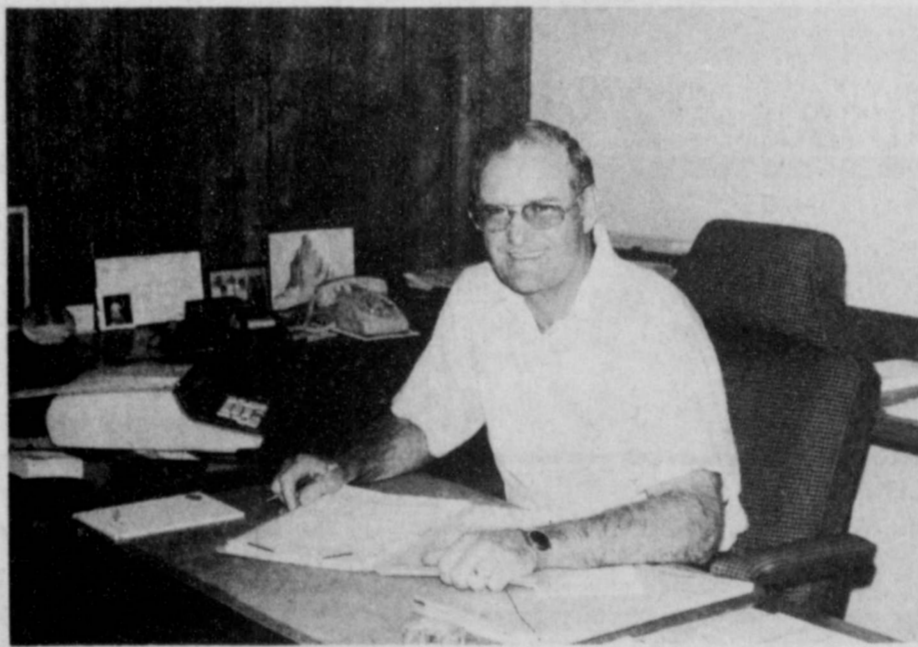

COLLEGE STATION—To mail-order Christmas gifts, first study the catalog with care, says Mrs. Linda McCormack, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "Through large mail-order chains, the consumer can choose from greater selections of merchandise than most stores offer, and often the same item features several price ranges," she points out. "However, the consumer still must decide which buy is best," she cautions. She recommends three steps for deciding: Read the ads very carefully and compare features. Make a list of features that cannot be compared simply by looking at the advertisements. You may want to examine these features at a local retail establishment. Try to determine the differences in the item advertised. Know why they exist, and decide how important they are.



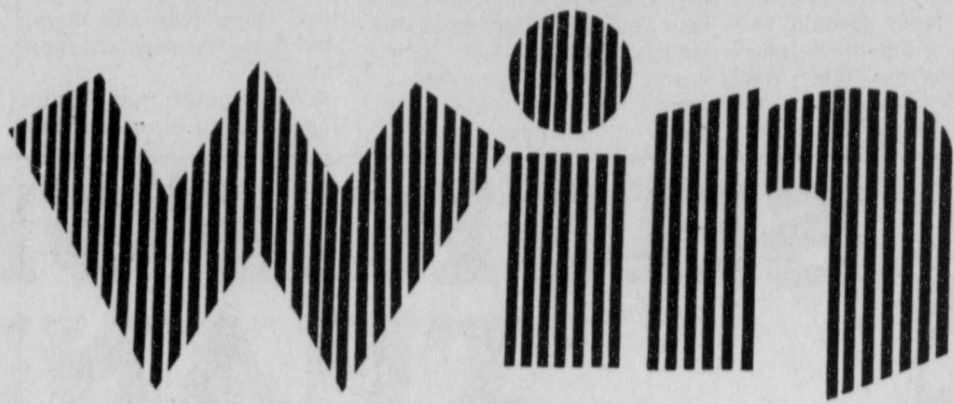

Carter Energy Bill To Hurt Texas Farmers

WASHINGTON—Congressman Jim Collins, a member of the House Conference Committee on Energy, today warned his colleagues that the already hard pressed American farmer could expect nothing but more trouble if Congress does not change the Tax section of President Carter's Energy Bill.

"By choosing to increase taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel, oil, and natural gas the Carter Administration is forcing the American farmer to bear the major burden of its energy conservation program," the Congressman from Dallas said. "Costs for fertilizer and pesticides will

rise dramatically, thus greatly increasing the costs farmers will have to face. At a time when a farmer can only get \$1.23 for a bushel of corn that cost him \$2.10 to produce, these federally mandated cost increases are inexorable."

Collins noted that studies done by Iowa State University demonstrate that agricultural production would only decrease by 5 percent from current levels if the President's bill is enacted. He also pointed out that the impact of doubled fuel costs on food prices would be no more than a 13 percent boost, of which the farmers' share would be little or nothing.

The President's tax bill will have an even more severe impact on the Texas farmer than farmers in other regions of the country," Collins declared. "Besides increased production costs, Texas farmers, like the rest of Texas residents, will have to pay an estimated 25 percent of the total nationwide tax burden imposed by the entire Energy Bill."

The Third District Congressman stated that he planned to ask the Energy Conference Committee to agree to a special exemption from the energy conservation taxes for oil and gas used in the manufacture of agricultural chemicals. The Senate passed a similar amendment last week, however, it will be up to the House/Senate Conference as to whether the exemption is included in the final bill.
