Courts Near Completion ; Tennis Club Needs Donations

The Lockney Tennis Club is continuing the fund-raising effort to fulfill its obligation to pay for the club's share of the new tennis courts northwest of Lockney Elementary School. The new surfaced, lighted, fenced, windscreensed courts are ready for use as soon as they pass inspection. Approval is expected today or tomorrow.

The tennis club has collected about \$3,500 cash for the courts, and an

additional (approximately) \$1,100 has been committed, but they need about \$1,000 more to fulfill their obligation.

Skater and skateboarders have been requested not to use their vehicles on the new courts because they can damage the court surface.

Hospitals Praise Briscoe

Texas Hospital Association (THA) President O. Ray Hurst issued a statement today on behalf of all hospitals in the State praising Governor Dolph Briscoe for championing their struggle against proposed federal regulations that would curtail or eliminate many services now available to Texas patients.

Hurst said, "The citizens and hospitals of the State owe Governor Briscoe a debt of gratitude for his involvement in opposing the proposed National Guidelines for Health Planning. Governor Briscoe headed a Texas delegation this week to Washington. The delegation had meetings with Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) Secretary Joseph Califano, Under Secretary for Health Hale Champion and Health Resources Administration Administrator Dr. Henry Foley."

The Texas delegation was composed of representatives from the Texas Hospital Association, the Texas Medical Association and the State Health Hospital Association, the Texas Medical Association and the State Health Coordinating Council. Congressman Jack Brooks of Beaumont assisted with the meetings.

Hurst went on to say, "in all of the

meetings officials of HEW indicated that the response from citizens of Texas to these proposed guidelines has been overwhelming. In fact, HEW has employed an outside firm to tabulate these responses."

It was indicated by Hurst that during these meetings Briscoe made a very strong plea for hospitals in Texas. The Governor pointed out to HEW officials the rural nature of most of Texas and the importance of having hospitals readily available to all citizens of the State.

In conclusion, Hurst stated that, "in all the meetings HEW officials indicated that the 'Guidelines' would be revised to take into consideration the particular problems in Texas."

In addition to praising Briscoe, Hurst lauded the assistance given by Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Senator John Tower and the 24 Congressmen from Texas. Appreciation was also expressed to the tens of thousands of citizens across the State who have taken time to voice their concerns over these proposed National Guidelines for Health Planning.

The Texas Hospital Association is the Austin based trade association for over 700 hospitals and health care institutions in Texas.

In her announcement statement she says,

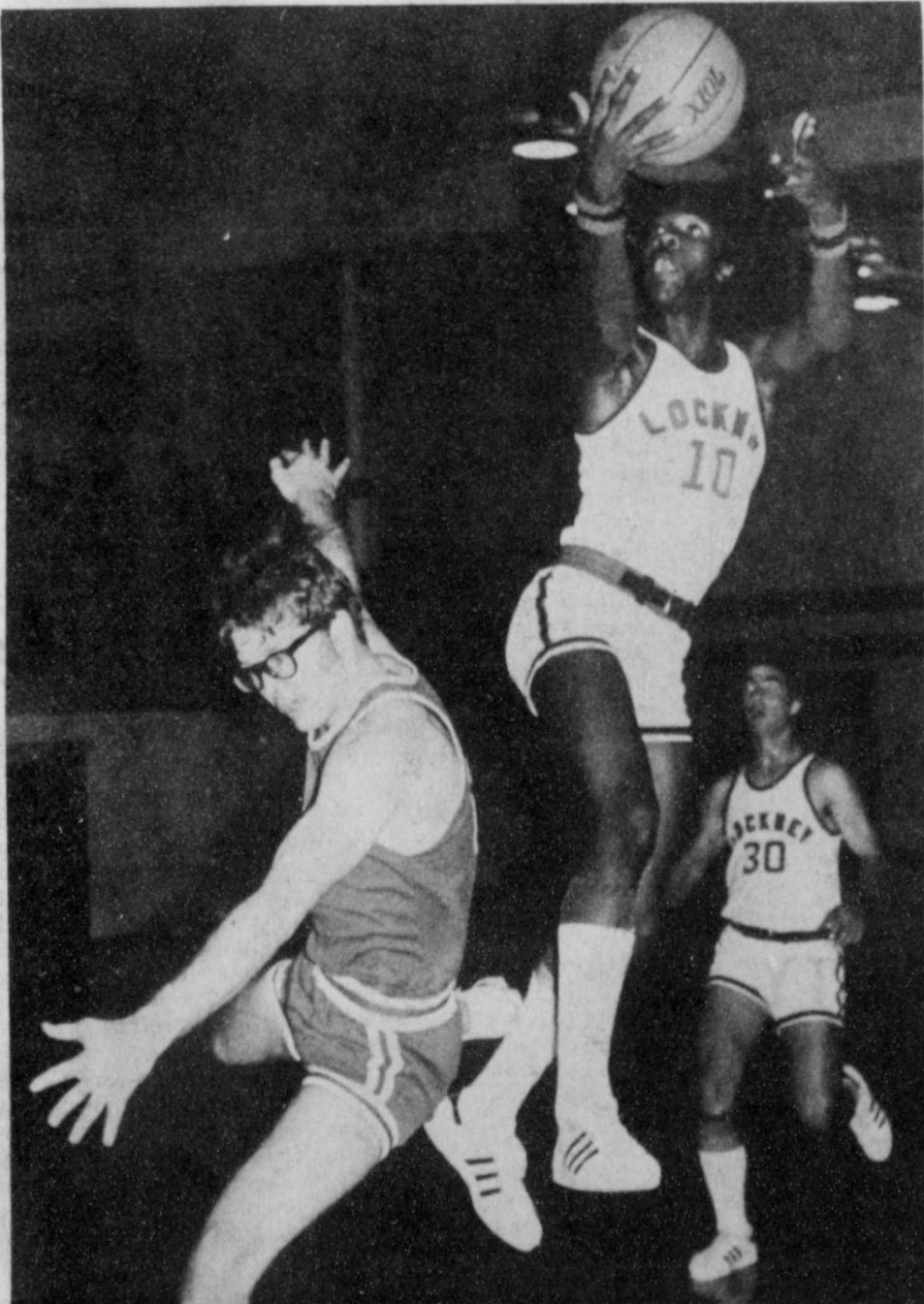

ment; the Longhorns took third-place honors three last year. There's a full slate of games Monday at Muleshoe, when both varsity teams and both JV outfits tangle with the Mules.

Cagers Sweep Valley

Lockney basketball teams swept three games from Valley High School Monday night—the junior varsity Lady Horns won 40-24, the varsity girls bested Valley 39-30, and the varsity Longhorns beat'em 58-50 after going off to an early 12-0 lead.

JV GIRLS

The Lockney JV girls played "four really tough quarters" coach Carol Helms said, in outclassing Valley 40-24.

Julie Frizzell was Lockney's scoring leader with 14 points. Gay Frizzell also cracked the double-figure mark with 11. Penny Sterling put in nine for the Lady Horn JV, and Tammie Hayes added six.

LADY HORNS

Good defense by the Lockney guards was the key to the Lady Horns' victory in the varsity girls' game, coach Marsha Sharp said. They held Valley to 10 points in the second half, and the LHS forwards managed 19 in the final two periods. It was 20-20 at halftime in the low-scoring game. The Lady Horns led 31-26 at the end of the third quarter.

Sheila Hrbacek scored 16 to lead Lockney in that department. Sherise Price was high for Valley with 18. Rebecca Evans added to Lockney's score with eight points, Stephanie Turner managed six and Melinda Wilson two, and Bonita McDonald came in off the Lockney bench and scored seven points in "clutch situations," Sharp said.

LONGHORNS

The 'Horns had a 15-1 lead over Valley at the end of the first period, but the Patriots whittled away at that lead, reducing it to 39-19 at halftime, 44-32 at the end of the third, and 58-50 at the final buzzer.

Danny Clark's 23 points pace the Longhorns, and Joe Rodriguez had 10. Howard Moore scored eight, Danny Riddley seven, Ray McMahan six, and Jim Hurt four for LHS. Valley's Davidson managed 17.

The 'Horns suffered only six turnovers in the game, and that, along with good rebounding, was the key to the victory, coach Mike Bellar said.

Win In Lubbock

Coach Marsha Sharp's Lady Horns notched their tenth basketball victory of the season (they've lost only twice) Tuesday night by defeating Lubbock Christ The King 55-52.

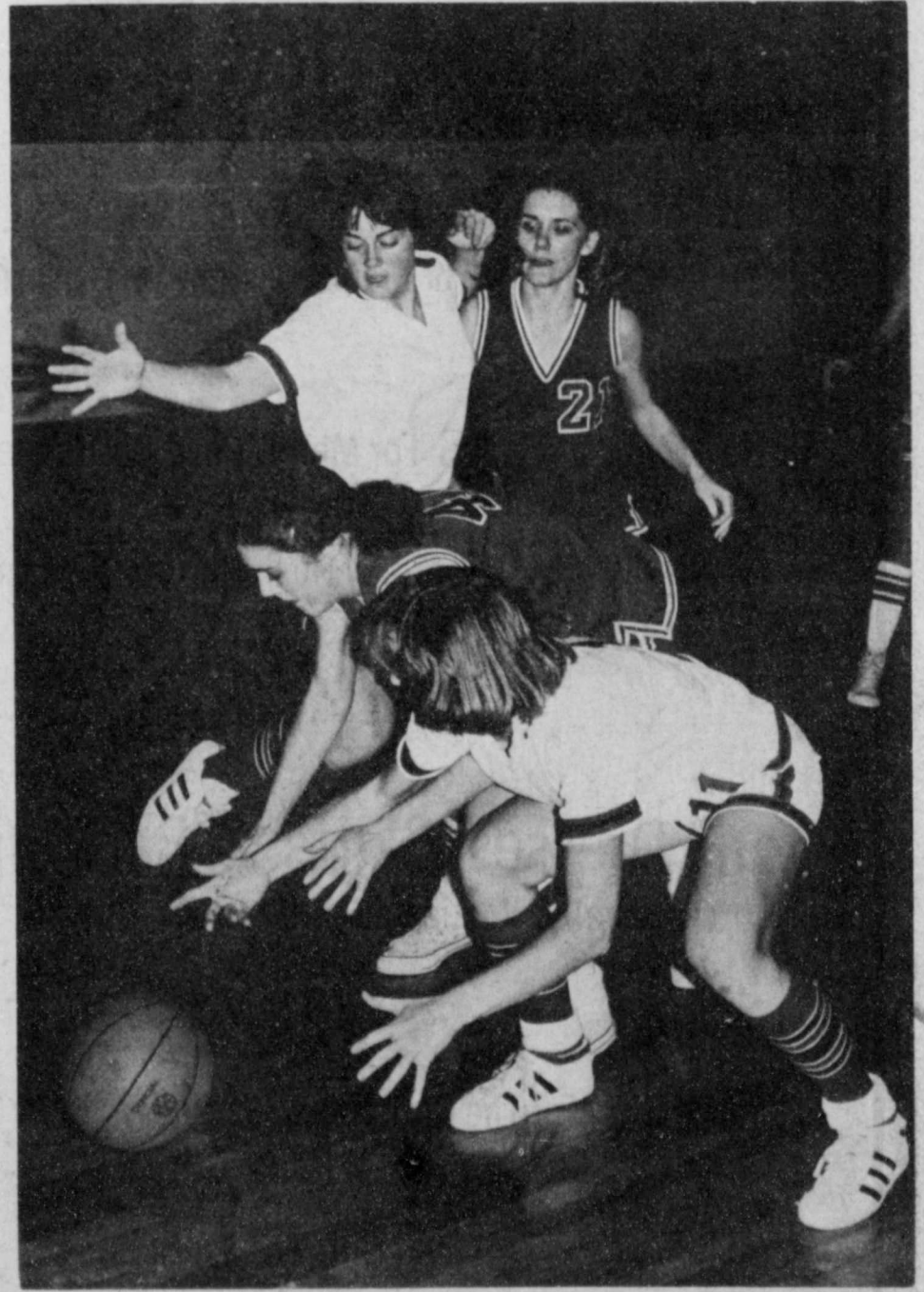
Sheila Hrbacek scored 32 points for Lockney, but high-point honors for the game went to Carrie Mosser, who accounted for all but eight of CTK's points. Also scoring points for the Lady Horns were Bonita McDonald, who made nine; Stephanie Turner, who scored eight; and Melinda Wilson and Rebecca Evans, who contributed two each.

Coach Sharp said Mosser was probably the best shooter the Lockney girls had faced all year, and CTK probably showed the best forward defense the Lady Horns had come up against.

CTK WINS BOYS' GAME

The Longhorns suffered a cold-shooting third quarter (they scored only six points) and fell to Christ The King 64-56. It was close until then—the score was 16-16 at the end of the first quarter and 33-33 at the half. And the 'Horns outscored the Trojans 17-14 in the final period, but it wasn't enough to overcome the 6-17 third-period. "You just can't score six points in a quarter and win a high-school basketball game," coach Mike Bellar said. But Bellar praised his players' hustle and determination: "We ran a full-court press, we got the turnovers, we got the shots, but we just couldn't hit the basket," he said.

Ray McMahan was high-point man for Lockney, scoring 21. Howard Moore scored 12, Danny Clark 11, Jim Hurt six, Danny Riddley four, and Joe Rodriguez two for the Longhorns. Jimmy Durham netted 22 for CTK.

Homesewing Terrycloth Fashions

COLLEGE STATION -- Terrycloth's "step" out of the bathtub into the world of fashion brings fabric variety to homesewers, and it poses two problems, but they have solutions, a clothing specialist says.

Today's terrycloth enters the fashion scene as a knitted or woven fabric in a variety of weights and fiber contents. Some is 100 percent cotton, but much is a blend of fibers, such as cotton/polyester, triacetate/nylon, polyester/acrylic or cotton/nylon.

For added versatility, some terrycloth has shirred velour on one side or a coating of slick water-repellent fiber, such as polyurethane.

Although it is easy to sew, terrycloth creates two challenges: how to keep surface loops from catching on the front pronged "toes" of a sewing machine pressure foot and how to prevent shedding or raveling of loops from cut edges, says Mrs. Lecky Culp with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To keep loops from catching, use a special pressure

foot or adapt a regular one, she advises.

Some machines are equipped with a foot such as a roller foot that has a flat continuous front. To adapt a regular foot so it will have a continuous front, wrap the protruding "toes" with masking tape.

To prevent shedding or raveling of loops from cut edges, make seams that enclose the raw edges, the specialist suggests. Flat-fell seams are one example.

Also, homesewers can greatly reduce raveling by using a special stitch to make a seam finish on cut edges. A close zigzag stitch or an overcast stitch are two examples.

On the fashion front, terry cloth is enjoying year-round popularity as it meets growing demands for active and leisure sportswear, Mrs. Culp says.

Spurred by the energy issues, terrycloth's impact is partly due to its warmth, absorbency and ability to breathe. Because it is also easy care and not too expensive, it is fast taking its place as a fashion frontrunner, she adds.

New Texas Almanac Features West Texas

One of America's most spectacularly scenic and remote regions, Texas West of the Pecos is featured in the new 1978-79 Texas Almanac, published by A.H. Belo Corp. which also publishes The Dallas Morning News.

In a special article in this edition, Frank X. Tolbert, author and veteran Dallas News columnist who has been wandering around the Trans Pecos since childhood, calls it "an absolutely unique region" of Texas approximately the physical size of Florida but with less than half a million persons, most of them crowded in El Paso.

Other articles in this featured section include "The Big Bend of Texas," by Mrs. Lee G. Bennett, Marfa teacher; "The Guadalupe Mountains" and "The Davis Mountains, a Land of Contrast," by Dr. Barton H. Warnock, chairman of the Biology Department of Sul Ross State University of Alpine.

The articles are generously illustrated with full color photographs. El Capitan, the dramatic peak in Guadalupe Mountains National Park, is featured on the cover of the Texas Almanac.

Persons interested in traveling to other sections of Texas may be guided by reports on places to visit in Texas West, Texas Heartlands, Texas Woodlands, Texas Gulf Coast and Metropolitan Texas.

Another section of the state is described in a report on "The Texas Blackland Prairies," written by S.H.

Whitehurst, superintendent of the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center at Dallas. This area reaches more than 300 miles from the Texas Oklahoma border to the vicinity of San Antonio.

The history of the Texas Election Bureau, which has been assembling, tabulating and distributing unofficial results of Texas' statewide elections immediately after voting for more than half a century, is told by Robert L. Johnson, manager of the bureau for 40 years.

Other features of the 1978-79 edition of the Texas Almanac include The Constitution of Texas, a section which has been a valuable document for use in schoolrooms and courtrooms for many years; and "Gardening in Texas," a guide for home gardeners throughout the state.

In addition, there is the usual enormous assemblage of data pertaining to nearly all aspects of living and working in Texas.

The new almanac may be purchased at the Office and Art Supply Center in Floydada and Beacon Office Supply in Lockney.

Holiday Traffic Accidents May Claim 71 Lives

AUSTIN—Colonel Wil- son E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents in Texas during the combined Christ- mas and New Year week- ends will claim 71 lives.

He noted, however, that some of the deaths could be prevented if motorists would drive carefully and participate in the state's "Light the Way for a Safe Holiday" program.

Speir said 41 deaths are likely to occur in the Christ- mas period from 6 p.m. Friday, December 23, through midnight Monday, December 26.

Another 30 traffic fatali- ties are estimated for the New Year, holiday which extends from 6 p.m. Friday, December 30, through mid- night Monday, January 2, 1978.

The "Light the Way for a Safe Holiday" program calls on all motorists in Texas to drive with their low-beam

headlights turned on in the daytime, as well as night, during the Christmas and New Year weekends.

"We feel this 'Light the Way' program, particularly with wide-spread participat- ion on the part of drivers, will serve as a very mean- ingful reminder to others to drive safely," Speir said.

The DPS director observ- ed that traffic deaths in Texas are currently running about 11 per cent over 1976, with much of this increase caused by the fact that three out of four motorists are violating the 55 mile speed limit.

"On the interstate high- ways where nine out of ten vehicles exceed 55, traffic fatalities are up approximat- ely 47 per cent from a year ago," the DPS director add- ed.

During the "Light the Way for a Safe Holiday" program, Speir urged mot- orists to hold their speed down and refrain from drinking if driving. He also urged drivers to keep their vehi- cles under control at all times and avoid following too closely.

Floyd County Shares Texas Travel Dollars

AUSTIN, Tex. — Floyd County received \$769,500 of the State's \$6,075,952,000 travel receipts in 1976, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Devel- opment Agency has dis- closed.

The 1976 figures reflect an increase of seven percent in travel receipts over 1975 when Floyd County's travel business accounted for \$720,000.

In addition to gross re- cepts, the study found that Floyd County in 1976 had 23 of the state's 227,258 travel- related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$133,000.

It also estimated \$30,600 in state and \$7,100 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1976.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington D.C., an in- dependent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sec- tors.

It was based on the Cen- ter's Travel Economic Im- pact Model which breaks out a state's share of the nation- al travel market on a county- by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips a- way from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it

includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes.

It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending en route, and that at his destination.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estimated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1976 figures, however, show Tex- as back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can deter- mine where, within their boundaries, travel dollars are spent and travel-related jobs exist," said Frank Hild- brand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Devel- opment Agency.

"Now we can trace trav- el's considerable economic impact on a county-by- county basis, observe chang- ing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning in- dustry."

CORPORATION ESTIMATED TAX DEPOSIT

DUE

Corporations operating on a calendar year basis for tax purposes must make their fourth quarterly installment payment of 1977 income tax by Thursday, December 15.

These payments should be accompanied by Form 503, "Federal Tax Deposit, Corporation Income Taxes," and deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The deposit due by December 15 should be enough to cover 100 percent of the 1977 estimated tax. The estimated tax and the amount of each installment can be computed on a Form 1120-W, which is a worksheet for computing corporation estimated tax. This form is not filed with the IRS, but retained in the corporation's records.

Supplies of Form 503, Form 1120-W, and a helpful pamphlet, IRS Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax," are available free from local IRS offices.

Estimate the "life-cycle cost" before buying any major appliance. Life-cycle cost is the purchase price of the appliance plus the operating cost during its average lifespan. Ask the dealer or manufacturer for this information, says Dr. Carolyn McKinney, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Commissioners Ask Governor To Declare Floyd County Disaster Area

Floyd County Commissioners approved the writing of a letter to Governor Briscoe seeking a declaration of Floyd County as a disaster area due to severe hail damage to crops in parts of the county this year. The action came Monday in their regular monthly meeting.

The declaration would mean Floyd farmers could borrow money through the Farmers Home Administration at lower interest rates.

In the letter to the Governor, the Commissioners cited the following amounts of production losses due to hail: 50 to 59 percent losses, 40 farms; 40 to 49 percent losses, 310 farms; 30 to 39 percent losses, 290 farms; 20 to 29 percent losses, 120 farms; less than 20 percent losses, 40 farms; minor losses 30 farms.

NEW RADAR FOR HIGHWAY PATROL

The Commissioners agreed to buy a new radar unit for the local Highway Patrol at a cost of \$2,985. A sum of \$600 will be allowed trade in on the old unit. The Commissioners also agreed to buy the Highway Patrol a new type-writer and a measure master wheel for

\$34.95. The wheel measures skid marks and other information in regard to highway accidents.

MONEY IN THE BANK

The Commissioners also approved renewing \$104,239.46 of Government Revenue money in the Floydada First National Bank for profit on certificates of deposit interest.

There is also \$86,369.00 revenue money in the bank not drawing interest. All but \$36,000 of this has been designated for use by the precincts.

The county has \$110,000 of tax money drawing interest on a six month basis in the bank also.

JAMES HALE NEW DEPUTY

The Commissioners approved James Hale as county deputy to work out of the Floydada office. He succeeds Ellis Butler who has reportedly gone to work for an oil company. Hale's salary will be \$700 month and 15 cents per mile for travel.

All Commissioners were present at the Monday meeting.

Wind Moves Greenbugs

Bushland, Texas—People are looking for ways to utilize wind energy, but greenbugs, aphids that injure wheat and sorghum have been doing it for years. Norris Daniels, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Entomologist from the USDA Center at Bushland found this out by trapping the little critters for 24 years. Daniels figured that knowing characteristics of the pest would aid in developing effective control measures. In this study, he was interested in finding out if and when greenbugs migrated with the wind. Greenbugs have an inherent survival mechanism. When food gets scarce a small percentage of the insects develop wings. These wings are not much good for flying, but they get the bugs airborne so they can take advantage of wind.

The traps were two 16-inch square pieces of cardboard mounted 6 feet above the ground. A 10 by 10 inch area in the center of the trap was treated with a paste that stayed sticky in winter and did not run in summer. The traps were 13 miles north of Bushland on rangeland. One trap faced north and the other south. The traps were 6 miles from a wheat field and 3 miles from the nearest grain sorghum field. Greenbugs were counted twice a month during most of the year, but every day when aphids were migrating. Sticky material was replaced when traps became too dirty or full of insects for easy counting. The number of greenbugs in the traps were compared to greenbugs in wheat and sorghum fields from six adjoining counties.

During the 24 years from 1953 to 1976, 3290 greenbugs were caught in the traps. Sixty-three percent were caught on the trap facing south, and 37 percent on the trap facing north. The scientist said his study showed that greenbugs definitely did move from place to place in the wind. He also figured their movement was dependent on wind direction. "Most of our wind blows from the southwest and my study showed that airborne greenbugs were being moved north," Daniels said.

From 1953 to 1967 greenbugs were caught in March and April and again in the fall. All of them had wings. Those years greenbugs fed on wheat in the winter and survived on western wheat grass in the summer. The entomologist explains that his traps caught the aphids moving from mature wheat to western wheat grass in the spring. In the fall the opposite migration was taking place. Greenbugs suck juices from certain plants and must have something green or they will perish," Daniels said. As expected in years with heavy infestation on wheat a lot of the pests were airborne looking for a summer home.

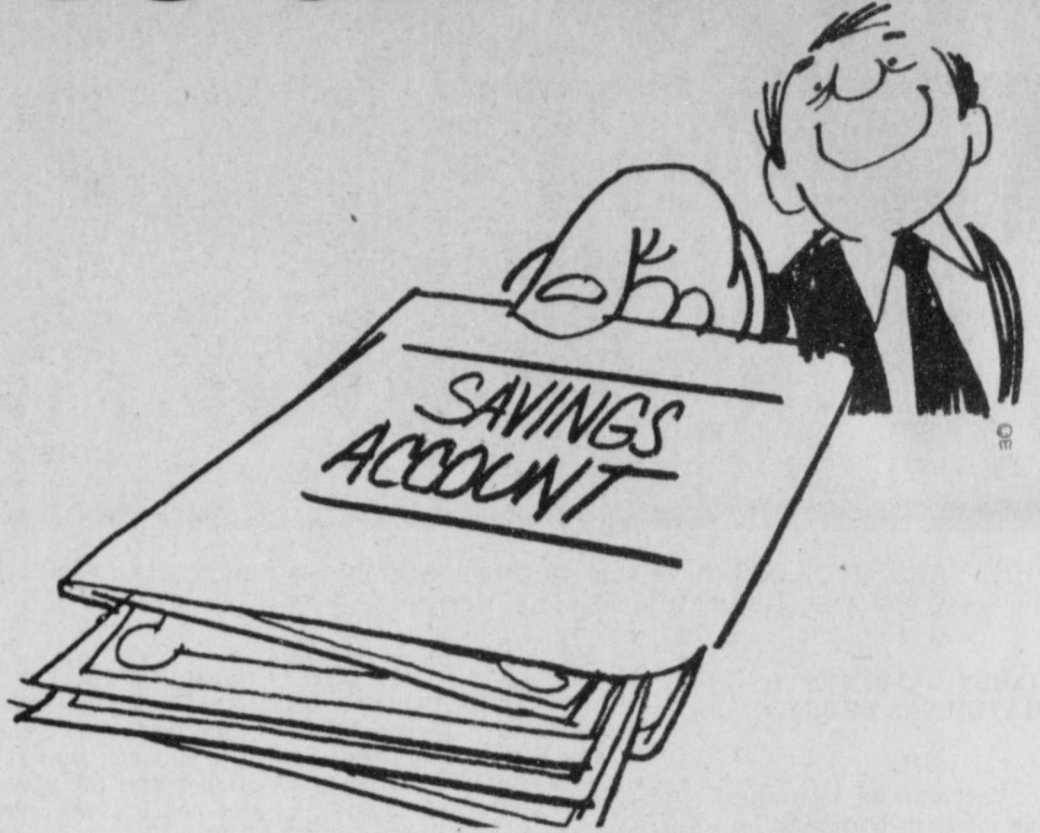
In 1968 the situation changed. A new biotype of

the greenbug developed and the pest was able to live on both wheat and sorghum. That year up to 15,000 greenbugs per plant infested nearby sorghum fields. This was four to five times the number that ever infested wheat. Farmers were caught off guard and heavy damage occurred to sorghum. With the big population looking for a winter home Daniels caught 2908 greenbugs in August when sorghum started to mature. Something else was different. About 215 of the critters were wingless. In addition to sorghum the hungry aphids fed on Johnsongrass all over the Southern High Plains. There were Johnsongrass plants near the traps and Daniels figures that wingless aphids were blown a few hundred feet to the traps.

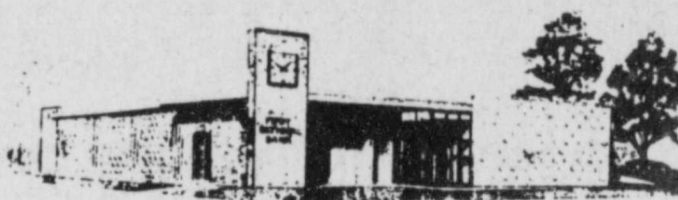
High numbers of greenbugs were caught in August during 1969 and 1970 when severe infestations again developed on sorghum. None were caught in the spring. Since 1970 infestations in wheat fields have been as high or higher than prior to 1968. Infestations on sorghum since 1971 has been much less than 1968, 1969 and 1970. Since 1971 only seven greenbugs were caught.

Daniels explains all his data by stating that prior to 1968 greenbugs migrated in the spring and fall from wheat to rangeland and back to wheat. In 1968, 1969, and 1970, tremendous greenbug populations developed on sorghum and great migrations occurred in August as sorghum matured. From 1971 to 1976, populations were lower on sorghum, but greenbugs moved short distances from sorghum to nearby wheat. There was little need to migrate to rangeland where the traps were located. "This information tells us about the life history of greenbugs, but as yet has not helped control the pest," Daniels said.

Freshman Cagers Grab Consolation Trophy

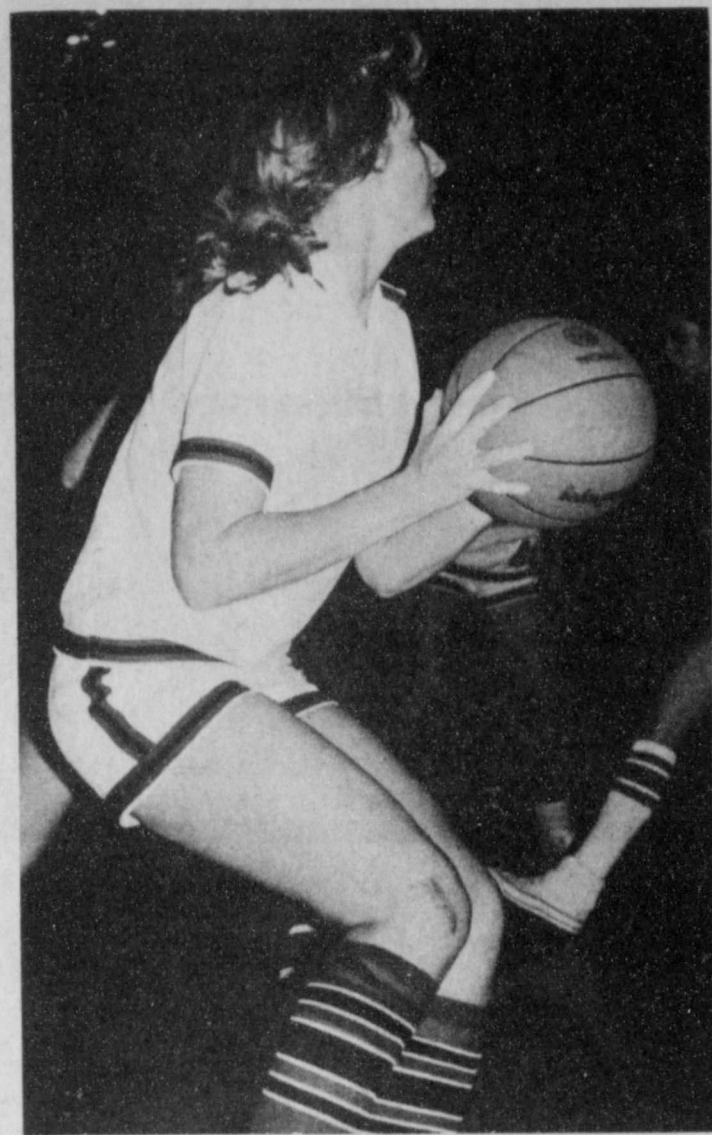
