Around the County

County Agent's Column

By Doyle Warren County Extension Agent

Homeowners, as well as our farmers, face many problems with the "plantinggrowing season." Keeping a landscape around the home is no easy chore. Water, fertilizer, herbicides, insecticides, and fungicides, even though good tools to be used, create problems for home "green thumbers." Care should be taken to follow the directions on the labels of pesticides that are used around the home. Most are extremely poisonous, so consider this in using and storing them.

The recent rains were great, but not anywhere near sufficient for our drought-stressed plants. Heavy applications of water on a ten to fourteen day schedule is still needed to maintain lawn and shrubs during the growing season. The rain was a start, but stay with a good schedule.

Fertilizer applications need to be made about every six weeks. Apply fertilizers to lawns at the rate of two pounds of actual nitrogen

Lawns need at least one application of phosphate per year. Established lawns seem to do better with a complete lawn fertilizer including trace elements. Important: Follow the directions on the label for fertilizers containing weed killers. Do not over apply. "Myth Killer": Fertilizing a lawn means that you actually use less applied water. The well fertilized lawn utilizes the moisture better by deep rooting and a healthy condition.

Now is the time to control bagworms. Close inspection of infected trees and shrubs will reveal very minute worms inside a protective cover. These small bagworms hatch from the old bags left on the tree during winter. Young worms spin silken sacs and attach small bits of leaves, twigs, and needles to the outside. The bagworm carries this sac wherever it goes. In a few weeks the worm will be almost impossible to kill.

wherever it goes. In a few weeks the worm will be almost impossible to kill. The insecticides left on the market recommended for use are usually very effective against these very tiny worms. They are less effective as the worms grow larger. Malathion, sevin, diazinion, and dipel are available locally. Follow label instructions for mixing and application.

White grubs are damaging many lawns. The grub cuts the grass just under the soil line, leaving the exposed portion to die. Chlordane and diazinion are recommended for control. Follow label directions.

Social Security Answer Column

Question: Is it true that some young people get social security benefits just for being in school and have never worked under social security?

Answer: Yes and no. Such benefits go to dependents of retired, disabled, or deceased workers who remain in school up to age 22. The benefits are based on the work records of the parents, and recognizes that so long as a child remains in school and is unmarried there is stil some dependency involved. Of course, like all social security benefits, they would be affected by any earnings the student has over the annual earnings limit, a test the law provides to measure whether depen-

dency actually exists.


