Anybody who makes \$75,000 by goins fishin' must be doing something right. Rick Clunn has--and obviously is.

It explains many of the reasons why Clunn won the 1976 and 1977 B.A.S.S. Masters Classic (fishing) championships. mittee.


For instance, Clunn does a lot of fishing homework before he ever sees the water. He studies the weather to establish a probable pattern. He checks the water temperature, clarity and the lake level. Detailed records of his fishing experiences help him calculate seasonal patterns. He records weather, water and bottom conditions, lure used. Referring to these notes, Clunn can estimate the bass action under similar conditions. He spends hours studying topographic maps, learning the depths and bottom contours of a lake. He can eliminate much of the fishless water this way, without wasting any time on

Observation, concentration and confidence play a big part in Clunn's championship style. He remembers how he retrieved his lure, especially if he's trying something different. Small bass are often "stragglers," and a school may not be far away. Heron and egret concentrated in an area may mean baitfish, and that may mean bass. Off-beat tactics with plastic worms can sometimes fool the bass; retrieving quickly, or using it as a topwater lure. Clunn with the other. thinks positive and pays attention to detail--it pays

Cadiz went aground in March off the coast of France resulting in the worst ecological disaster in history involving an oil spill. He called in U.S. experts and visited the site of the disaster. The following is an account of his visit and the conclusions he reached.]
