





15-Cent Stamps Here

A new postage stamp that bears the letter "A" instead of a denomination has been placed on sale at the Lockney Post Office and all postal branches, Postmaster Douglas Meriwether announced today.

The stamp's value is 15 cents and corresponds with the new 15-cents postage rate for one ounce of first-class domestic mail which went into effect at 12:01 a.m. Monday, May 29. The new first-class rate was approv-

ed Friday, May 19 by the Postal Service Governors.

The stamp design features an eagle with the legend "U.S. Postage" beneath it. The letter "A" appears beside the eagle. The eagle and lettering are white, on an orange background.

The Postal Service printed the stamps in 1975-76 when similar uncertainty existed regarding its last rate case. At that time, it also printed and put into use two non-denominated 1975 Christmas stamps.

The "A" stamps are available in sheets, coils and booklets, Postmaster riwether said. Embossed stamped

envelopes, bearing "A" in lieu of a denomination, also may be purchased. The "A" stamps and envelopes, along with stamps and postal stationery items already in the Postal Service inventory, are sufficient to meet mailers' needs until deliveries begin of postal items with denominations matching the new rate, Postmaster Meriwether stressed.

In addition to the non-denominated stamps, he said, many mailers will find it convenient to use existing low-value stamps in combination with the 13cents stamps to meet the new firstclass rate for letters weighing an ounce or less.

The charge for each additional ounce or letter mail over one ounce is 13 cents. Therefore, mailers can affix "A" stamps in combination with as many 13-cents stamps as necessary to letters weighing more than an ounce. A short supply of 2-cents stamps are available for your immediate needs. Customers are encouraged to revalue thier old 13-cents for a future date, Meriwether said.

A member of Reverend Sun Myung Moon's "Unification Church" was questioned Tuesday afternoon by Lockney police after a complaint by an East Fourth Street resident




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Said Butler: "I'm pleased to be back in Lockney. We've always considered it a second home because the people were so nice when we were here before."

(Editor's note: The following is from a pamphlet given us by a member of the Unification Church Tuesday. We attempted to interview the young man, but the only information he would give was to confirm that the Unification Church is the organization founded by "Reverend Moon"--and the pamphlet from which the following is taken.)

WHO WE ARE

The Unification Church was founded in 1954 in Korea by Sun Myung Moon. Over a long course of prayer and study, Rev. Moon discovered a series of principles which yielded great insight into the deep questions of human life and faith: The nature of God, the origin of suffering the purpose of creation and life. As a Christian, he explored many of the puzzling problems of Bible interpretation and found a pattern in the Bible according to which God has been conducting His providence through history and even in the present-day world. In the light of these principles, the deeper meanings of the Bible could be clearly seen, as well as the purpose of all religions.

Because he tried to share his enriched understanding with Christians, Rev. Moon was imprisoned several times in Communist North Korea and severely tortured. Finally he endured nearly three years in a prison camp before United Nations forces released him along with other prisoners, and he was free to return to the south. At that time he organized The Holy Spirit Association for the Unification of World Christianity. (The Unification Church) based on the principles revealed to him during his years of search.

The Unification Church does not aim to be another denomination. On the contrary, it seeks to deepen faith and commitment among all Christians. In this way, the barriers produced by varying Bible interpretations can be overcome. Christian unity can be brought about when all act as one body giving wholehearted devotion and energy toward fulfilling God's will-loving Him and serving others.

It is the idea of The Unification Church to end God's grief and man's suffering by giving ourselves completely in love and service. In bringing not only ourselves, but our families, churches, nations and the whole world to live in this way, we can indeed bring God's Kingdom on earth as Jesus taught us to pray.

From its small beginning in Seoul in 1954, The Unification Church has grown to include active movements in more than 40 nations, and in every state and over 120 cities in the United States along. Members come from a great variety of backgrounds and experiences, and are of all ages and walks of life.
