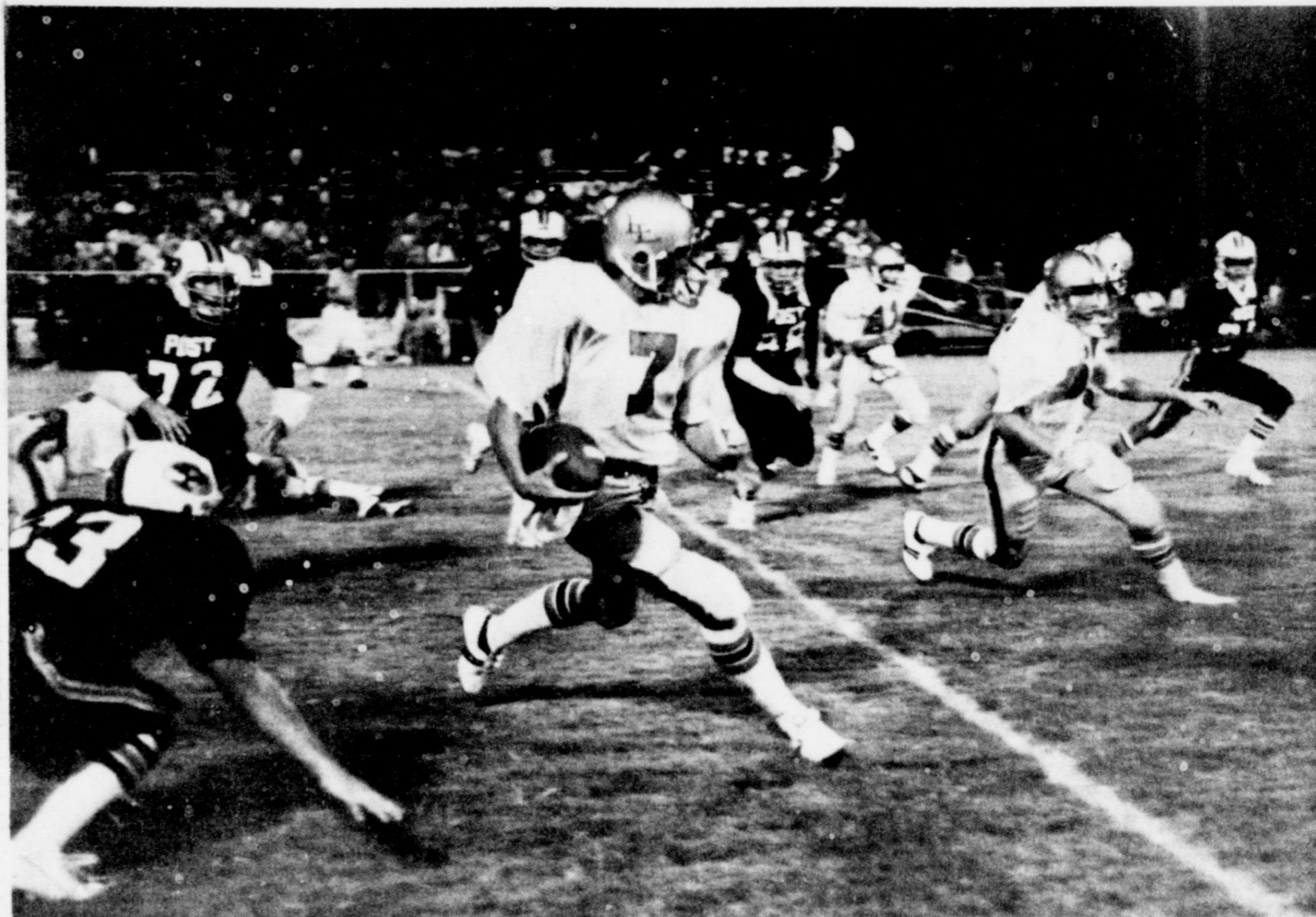


Longhorns Win Number One

Floyd Farm Bureau Elects Directors, Passes Resolutions

Floyd Farm Bureau members elected directors and passed resolutions Thursday night at the county farm bureau meeting.

Alvin McCombs was elected president and Bill Colston was elected vice president.

Two resolutions were adopted, one regarding the farm bureau's role in the community and another regarding the farm bureau's relationship with the county government.

The farm bureau will support the parity concept to that policy and which was recommended by the county resolutions committee, also voted down by a 22-17 margin, also after a long discussion.

Schwertner and Mickey Dot Hammonds spoke in favor of the parity resolutions. Albert Sheele and Paul Schaet spoke against.

Hammonds said of the resolution introduced by Schwertner, "I think this resolution should be passed. If we are going to farm under the present farm program, we need parity..."

Scheele was against the resolution, saying if parity measures were enacted "...the government would completely...control us..."

Resolutions passed by the Floyd Farm Bureau included these recommended by the resolutions committee:

- STATE**
- "We recommend that we reaffirm the policy to be strongly against a state income tax."
- "We recommend that the third paragraph of page 9 (of the policy book) under Marketing and Promotion be changed to read as follows: "We will encourage and support voluntary promotion programs to increase sales and consumption of farm and ranch products. We will oppose compulsory check-off programs... compulsory" shall mean any which does not allow the individual to apply for and obtain a refund anytime after the point of sale, regardless of vote which might create such "check-off" authority."
- COUNTY**
- "We recommend that a 4-way sign be installed at the intersection of FM Highway 378 and FM Highway 784 in Sandhill."
- "We recommend that we reaffirm the need for caution lights to be installed at the Fort Worth-Denver railroad crossing 5 1/2 miles north of Lockney on FM Highway 378."
- "We recommend that all state and national resolutions passed by Floyd County annual convention be sent to all counties in District II for their consideration."

County Budget Hearing Monday

Floyd County Commissioners will meet Monday and the annual budget hearing is scheduled for 2 p.m. The Commissioners will set the proposed budget and there is also a budget hearing on what to do with some \$107,344 revenue money to come in from October 1, 1978 through September 30, 1979.

Other items on the day's agenda include sheriff's deputations, report of grievance committee and at 11 a.m. Doyle Walls, president of the Caprock Hospital board will meet with the Commissioners.

Friday is ladies' day at the fair, starting at 9:30 a.m. Other Friday events include a sheep breeders, show at 2 p.m. and gospel singing, returning after several years' absence, at 7 p.m.

Saturday, there will be the junior showmanship contest and livestock show, children's pet show, the arts and crafts show and sale, tractor driving contest and, back for the second year, the Old Fiddlers Contest from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the entertainment building.

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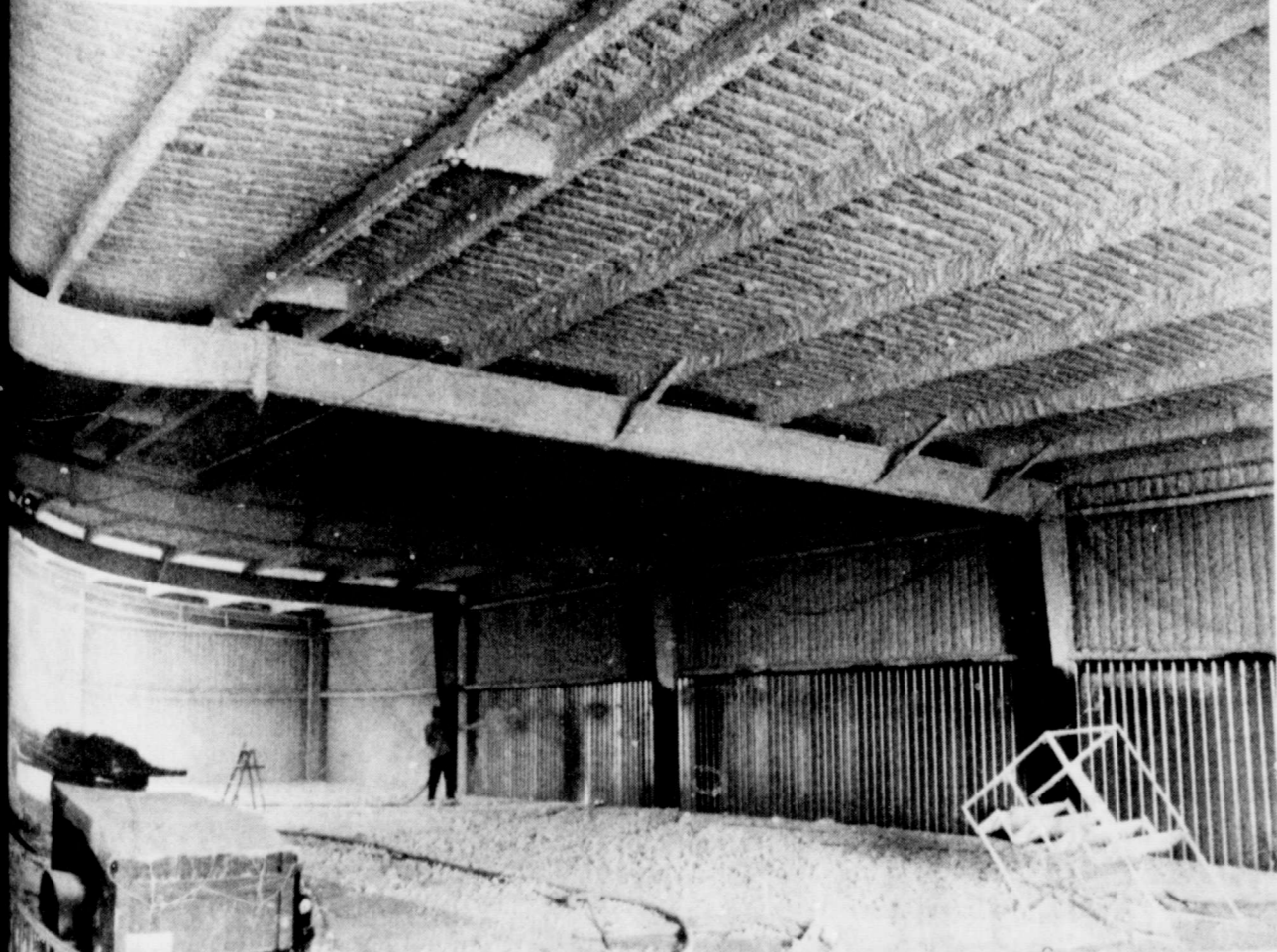
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THE ENTERTAINMENT BUILDING at the fairgrounds in Lockney is being insulated, which starts Thursday.

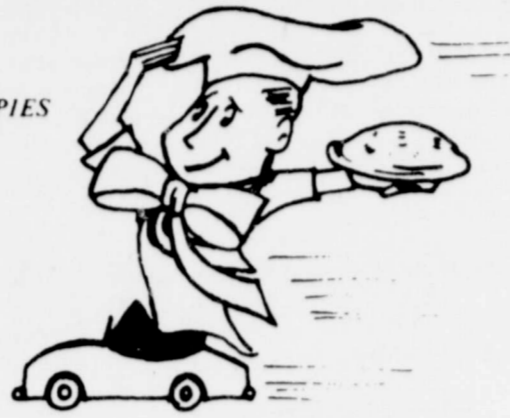

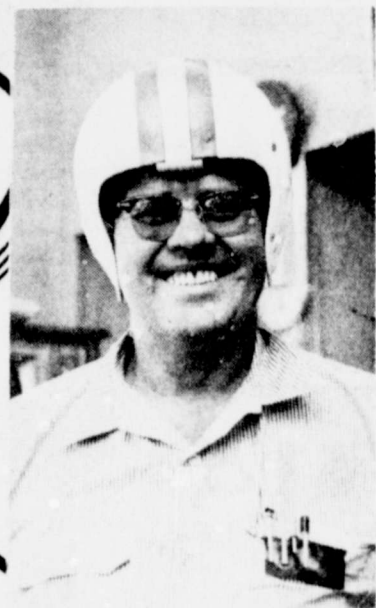

High costs add to farmer woes

WASHINGTON — A sobering fact of life for farmers, many of them enjoying substantially higher prices than a year ago, is their list of expenses for producing the nation's food and fiber.

Despite two successive months of decline in prices farmers get for commodities they produce, the Agriculture Department says those prices in August were still 20 percent above their year-ago mark.

Further, USDA said last week in a monthly price report, costs of items farmers buy to produce leveled off in August. Compared with Aug. 1977, however, production items were up about 9.7 percent.

A closer look at the report shows that only two farm production items cost less last month than they did a year ago — fertilizer and agricultural chemicals such as pesticides and weedkillers.

The costs of other items listed in the production category were up from a year ago. Those included feed, feeder livestock, seed, fuels and energy, farm and motor supplies, cars and trucks, tractors and self-propelled machinery, building and fencing materials and farm services and cash rent.

Examination of some of the less-obvious items farmers buy illustrates why many of them who patch up old tractors, make do with battered pickup trucks and grain harvesters still complain of rising production costs.

Although steel fence posts still cost \$2.33 each, for example, a roll of barbed wire now costs an average of \$28 a roll against \$26.90 a year ago, the report said.

An aluminum scoop shovel that cost \$14.50 a year ago now is \$16.30.

One 10-inch adjustable end wrench is about \$7.69 against \$7.12 in August last year, and a heavy-duty soldering iron is \$17.30, compared with \$15.40.

Farmers who raise produce and other commodities that require bagging and packaging also have felt the pinch.

A dozen one-bushel stove baskets now cost \$12.70 against \$11.60 a year ago, and burlap bags are \$3.70 per 100, up from \$3.1 last year.

Feeder livestock represent a mixed sort of expense for farmers since these animals are produced by some who are themselves producers and some who are not.

Feeder cattle and sheep August averaged 44 pounds against 37 pounds earlier. Feeder pigs averaged 100 pounds, up from 93 pounds in August last year.

FERTILIZE FOR QUALITY FALL HAY—High quality hay can be produced in the fall with good moisture and plenty of fertilizer, says a forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Apply nitrogen fertilizer at the rate of at least 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre (150 pounds of ammonium nitrate). Levels of production, protein and digestibility of fall-produced pasture and hay can be near spring levels if sufficient fertilizer is applied and timely rains fall.

Thirty-Seven Persons Employed In Caprock Plan A

Lockney's Jerry Cannon is director of the Plan A teaching techniques for the schools of Lockney, Floydada, Petersburg, South Plains, Dougherty, Jayton and Girard. Headquarters for the teaching system is in the Della Plains School at Floydada.

Five people work in the office, there are 23 teachers and ten aides. The teachers and aides work in their home schools.

Plan A operates on a \$460,000 budget that comes from the government. No local tax money is used. A total of 585 students are taught in Plan A. On the state level there are 600,000 students and 18,300 special education teachers.

Cannon says, "public education is the responsibility of the state for the purpose of providing all students the opportunity to develop to their fullest individual potential."

Cannon added: "One of the main features of the plan is to recognize that many handicapped students don't need to stay in a self-contained classroom all day."

FIELD DAY TUESDAY

HALFWAY—More than 30 unreleased varieties of cotton, among which may be the best choices for South Plains cotton producers in the future, will be in the spotlight Sept. 12 at the 69th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for Lubbock and Halfway.

The stop at the regional cotton variety test site here is one of five major exhibits on the hour-long field day tour, said Dr. Levon L. Ray, cotton geneticist and assistant resident director of the experiment station. Other stops will illustrate research being conducted to help South Plains and Panhandle producers with weed control, mobile trickle irrigation systems, labor management, and corn irrigation.

The annual field day alternates between the TAES facilities at Lubbock and Halfway. This year the event will be at the site here, 14 miles west of Plainview, explained J. Joe Writhe, research assistant who is field day chairman. It is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the High Plains Research Foundation, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; the Science Education Administration of the U.S. Department of Agri-

culture and the National Weather Service.

Beginning at 1 p.m., guests will be able to take tractor-drawn trailer tours of the 320-acre research site to closely view the newest developments in crop research. During the featured stops, scientists from the Experiment Station and specialists from the Extension Service will discuss the research and answer questions from agricultural producers, homeowners and gardeners.

The cotton variety tests at Halfway are designed to provide information that will help growers choose the variety which will assure them maximum profit, Ray said. Sixty-six varieties are being tested under limited irrigation. These include most of the varieties grown on the High Plains and more than 30 unreleased varieties. They represent the work of 17 different private cotton breeders, Ray noted.

"Cotton variety selection is a key to profitable cotton production," Ray said. "The selection of the wrong variety — for example, a susceptible variety in a disease-prone situation or a variety with an inferior fiber — can be costly."

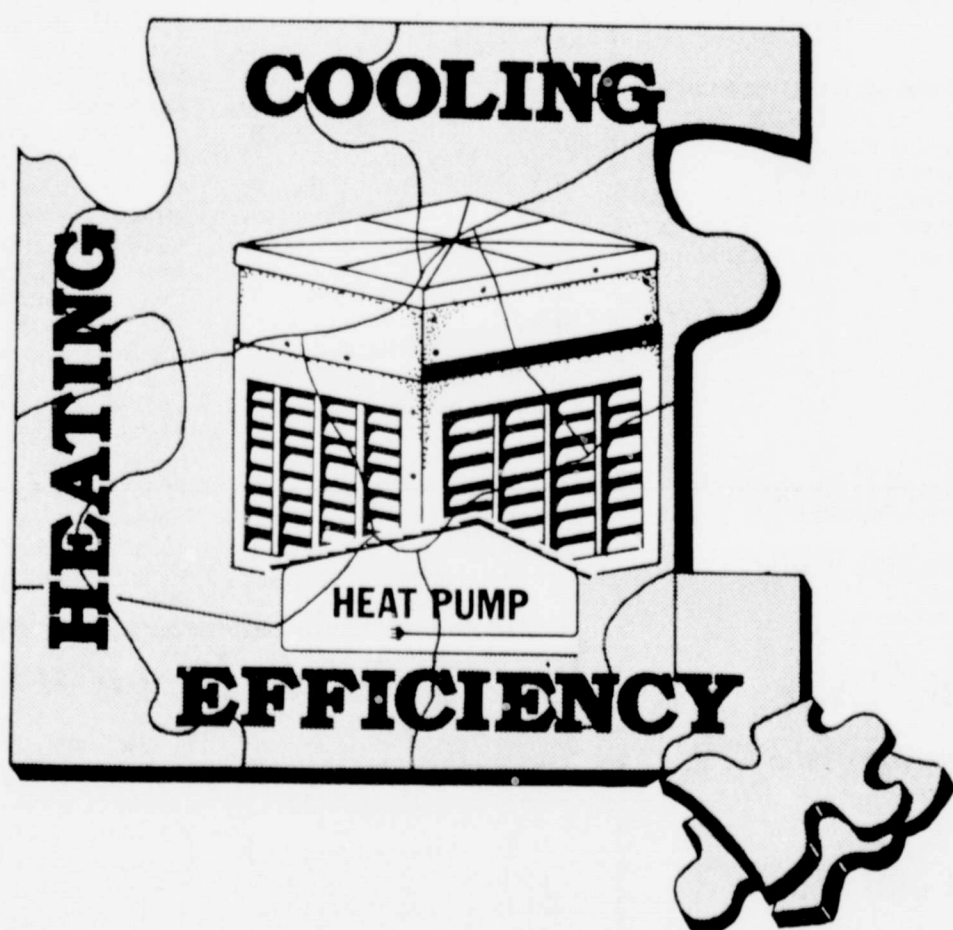
"Every year, new and generally improved varieties come on the market, so growers must keep current

from their crop."

Among the improvements being sought in new varieties, the TAES geneticist said, are disease resistance, better fiber quality and better stripper-harvesting characteristics, including less trash in the harvested cotton.

At the Halfway test site, 18 varieties are being evaluated for performance in narrow rows and 10 varieties

MATCH AMMO WITH GUN

LUBBOCK—A fire arm should be used only with the specific ammunition for which it is intended and every firearm, no matter where it was produced, is marked in some manner to indicate the proper cartridge or shell for use in that particular gun.

It is dangerous to attempt to utilize any other load than the one for which the gun has been chambered and inscribed.

There are many combinations of firearms and ammunition that will mix such as a 20-gauge shotshell sliding down a 12-gauge barrel causing a blockage and explosion when the 12-gauge shell goes off.

Such mixing of shells may result in split barrels or ruptured cartridge cases which may release products of combustion with possible serious injury to the shooter or bystander. There is also the possibility of a bullet remaining in the bore and forming an obstruction.

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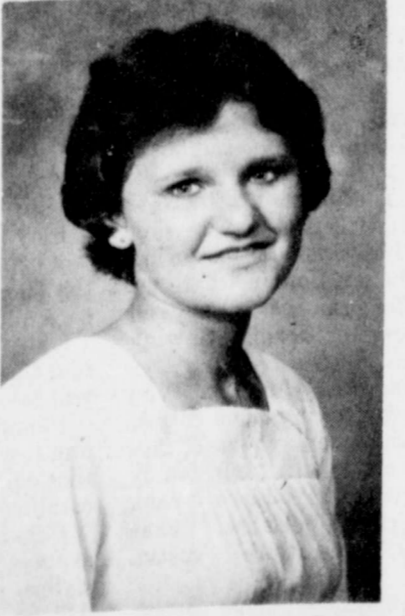
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
