How Does One Know If One Is Drunk?

Today's officers use a machine or gadget that is called a Breathalyzer. The Highway Patrol has owned such a

machine for years and know how to use

Recently county deputy Jim Gollahar completed a 40 hour course in San Antonio to learn how to operate

the Breathalyzer. If the Breathalyzer registers 0.10% breath alcohol content, the driver is declared DWI (driving while intox-

cated) and charged. Of course many times there is no doubt about how drunk a person is because the arresting officer first notices him as his car weaves back and forth across the road. However, the DWI case will stand up in court if





TEXAS PECANS---Texas pecans will be smaller than usual this fall due to the severe dry weather, but the crop will still be of high quality, points out a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This year's crop should average 25 to 26 million pounds compared to average production of about 40 million pounds. The 1978 Texas crop was plagued by a severe winter, heavy pecan nut casebearer damage in the spring, and a season-long drouth.

SODSEEDING TO STRETCH PASTURES-Overseeding pastures with winter grasses (sodseeding) can provide for additional fall, winter and early spring grazing, contends a forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. With sodseeding, oats, wheat, barley or rye are seeded into an undisturbed perennial grass pasture in late September or early October. Plenty of fertilizer is needed along with fall and winter rainfall for





Commissioners Approve County Budget

In the 2 o'clock budget hearing Monday afternoon Floyd Commissioners approved a \$990,218 budget and set the tax rate at 95 cents per \$100 valuation. There is no tax increase for Floyd tax payers over last year's budget.

Commissioner Bob Jarrett served as chairman of the meeting in the absence of County Judge J.K. Holmes, who was on vacation.

The Commissioners paid the \$636 hospital bill of Murray (Boley) Jones at the request of Caprock Hospital board president Doyle Walls. Jones had an emergency operation while in the county jail. The Commissioners are seeking the ruling of the State Attorney General so they will have some guidance should the situation ever arise again.

The Commisssioners voted to discontinue the services of Redd Pest Control and West Chemical Company. They also voted not to approve deputation of Weldon Emert, Rickie Pernell and Thomas Wylie as reserve deputies.

A few people met with the Commissioners about how the next period's Government Revenue Sharing money would be spent. The Commissioners decided to use \$40,000 for precinct work, \$3,200 for the Plainview Mental Health and Retardation Center, \$1,000

for the Floyd County Day Care Center, \$1,000 for the Floyd County Museum and \$62,144 for the jail construction

GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE REPORT Going into September the salary of Floyd County's two Justices of the Peace was \$339 a month and \$125 a month for travel each. The first of September the Commissioners gave each JP a \$125.00 per month raise.

JP of Precincts 1 and 4 H.E. Porter had petitioned to the Grievance Committee a request for an additional \$125.00 per month salary increase and that his \$125 per month travel allowance be added to his salary.

The Grievance Committee approved the petition, which was then presented to the Commissioner's Court. This means that Porter will now receive \$714 per month and no travel pay. JP of Precincts 2 and 3 R.H. Ford will receive \$464 per month and \$125 per month travel pay.

The Grievance Committee based its unanimous decision to give Porter the. \$125.00 per month raise because his work load is larger than that of Ford's. Porter collected over \$26,000 worth of fines last year while Ford collected over \$5,000 in fines.

THE GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE LAW

In 1971 the State Legislature created the formation of a Grievance Committee in each county. This committee has final say, even over the Commissioner's Court. Any person who feels that he has been treated unfairly can petition a meeting of the Grievance Committee.

Three citizens are selected on the committee as their names are drawn at random from a recent Grand Jury list. The other six members are the County Sheriff, County Tax Assessor-Collector, County Treasurer, County Clerk, District Clerk, and the County Attor-

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

"The Tax Relief Amendment'

(H.I.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas lot is as follows: Constitution allowing the tangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing



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

A local district may choose the first alternative for upper elementary classes, the second for primary, and a wealthy district might consistently provide the smaller ratio.

School officials constantly face similar priority choices: If a high school principal elects to offer advanced math to 16 students, other classes must carry a larger load to compensate: if a senior class sponsor is given an extra conference period, this creates a class period with no students, so other classes

must carry the load. A district may decide not to provide such "extras," or may provide them and overload some classes, or may pay salaries of additional staff out of local funds to protect pupilteacher ratios.

SB 1 changes the formula for personnel units based on attendance in grades K-3 from one personnel unit per 19 students to one per 18.5 students. This "improvement" actually produces only one more teacher for every two 700-student elementary schools.

The second change apparently came in response to the notion that large classes are created by local administrators. Districts are required to use 95 percent of personnel units earned in kindergarten and first grade, and 80 percent earned in second and third grades, solely for instructional services.

However, the mandate was diluted by a specification that aides, librarians, special education teachers, and special area teachers (music, art, physical education) could be counted toward satisfying the requirement. A district already hiring such specialists achieved no significant increase in staffing for primary grades,

Comparison of pre-1975 school financing with 1975 and 1977 legislative efforts produces additional evidence that SB 1 does not create smaller

Before 1975, districts received personnel units by category: Classroom teachers, principals, counselors, aides, etc. Classroom teacher units were allocated at a 25 to 1 ratio.

The new system replaced the multicategory plan with an all-inclusive "personnel unit" allocated on an approximate 19.5 to 1 ratio. But the apparent smaller ratio was not a bona fide reduction; it merely offset losses occurring when categories for support staff were eliminated.

Regarding legislative intent, the "proof of the pudding" is the legal stipulation that local districts must assign enough teachers to classroom instruction to maintain a 25 to 1 ratiothe same ratio required three years

Has no progress been made? Clearly, the current finance system is better than the pre-1975 model. Improvements have occurred in many areas of Texas public school education; however, reduction in class size may not accomplish as much as some ex-





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

SORGHUM TEAM TO CULTIVATE SOME EUROPEAN MARKETS

Lubbock, Tex .-- The drive to expand grain sorghum sales overseas will continue in September as a sorghum promotion team leaves for Europe. Led by Elbert Harp, Executive Director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, the team will depart Sept. 16 to work in the seven European countries showing the most interest in purchasing grain sorghum.

With Harp will be Dr. Reed Richardson of Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas and Ben Baisdon of Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin, Texas. Dr. Richardson is a livestock nutritionist and will be dealing with problems of nutrition in livestock and

Mr. Baisdon is Director of Marketing For Texas Dept. of Agriculture and will assist Harp in planning ways to remove trade restrictions on sorghum and of development of better marketing news services to keep foreign buyers informed of price relationships between sorghum and other grains.

The team will hold conferences to discuss feeding programs and problems. The men will work in England, Scotland, Germany, Norway, Poland, Romania, and Spain. They will present research data concerning nutritional value of grain sorghum. Emphasis will continue to be placed on the difference in U.S. No. 2 yellow sorghum and the high tannin, (bird resistant,) sorghum being shipped from other coun-






