



..FARMERS CONTROL THEIR COOPERATIVES. Cooperatives are controlled by a board of directors elected by farmers who own and use the business. The farmer directors set policies and employ a manager who oversees the day-to-day operation of

FARMERS REALIZE SAVINGS FROM THEIR COOPERATIVES. Cooperatives are run to help members get a better return from farming. Unlike most other businesses, cooperatives are operated in a non-profit manner. Any excess of income over expenses is returned at the end of the year to the farmer member in proportion to the amount of business done

with his cooperative. FARMERS HAVE A VOICE IN THEIR COOPERATIVES. Cooperatives encourage farmer members to attend and actively participate in the annual meeting. Each member exercises his control in the cooperative by voting on business matters and director elections. Over the years, cooperatives have provided one of the best training grounds for the democratic levelopment of leadership in rural

## Cotton Defoliation. Field Storage Info

To Be Presented The recent spell of cool, wet weather created some problems for cotton producers on the Texas High Plains. This spell resulted in the development of an ill-defined condition which covered light to extensive leaf damage in area cotton fields. This problem is especially critical in the irrigated areas of the South Plains where cotton was still in the peak fiber development period. Many producers are now faced with the problem of evaluating the extent of this damage and deciding whether to allow the cotton crop to continue to grow or to terminate growth with the use of harvest aid

A team of specialists from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be at the Lighthouse Electric Cooperative in Floydada at 9 a.m. Tuesday, October 10, and at the Plainview ag center at 8 p.m. Tuesday to discuss the present condition of the crop, consider the pros and cons of applying harvest aid chemicals, examine the economics of defoliation and field storage, and give information on field storage systems and the advantages and disadvantages of module builders. The Floydada meeting will be followed by a field

inspection and light lunch. Area Agronomist-Cotton James Supak, Area Economist Marvin Sartin, both of Lubbock, and Roy Childers, Agricultural Engineer-Cotton Ginning and Mechanization, College Station, will appear on the programs.

WINDBREAK TREE SEEDLINGS AVAILABLE

The Soil Conservation Service in Floydada has received the new price list and application form for windbreak tree seedlings from the Texas Forest Service. The Species of bare root hardwood seedlings available are the American Plum, Green Ash, Mulberry, Osage Orange (Horse Apple), Shumard Oak, and Honeylocust, which must be ordered in quantities of 100 or more and in multiples of 50 of any one species. All orders must be received by February 12, 1979 by the Texas Forest Service. Hardwood shipments will begin about mid-February and continue through the first week in March.

This year containerized conifers of Austrian Pine and Ponderosa Pine will be available. Conifer orders must be for a minimum of 30 tree in multiples of 30 trees. Since the styrofoam containers are fragile they will not be shipped. For Floyd County plantings they must be picked-up at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station FM 1294 Lubbock on March 15, 1979 between 8-5 p.m. with your receipt.

Orders are filled on a first-come first serve basis. No trees are furnished for landscraping or ornamental purposes.
