Vote On Dissolvement of Weed Control District

Citizens who have been paying weed control district taxes on land located in Floyd County and outside the city limits of Floydada or Lockney will vote on whether to keep or dispose of the

Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District when they vote in the November 7 election. A separate ballot will be printed for this purpose.

Through the years some land owners have protested paying the three cents per acre to the weed control district, and requested that such an election be held. By incorporating the election in the General Election about \$1500 election costs can be saved.

In 1978 the county tax-assessor-collector assessed \$18,796.34 for the weed control district. David Duvak is supervisor of the district, Bennie Golightly secretary. The district was organized in 1957, at about 1,000 acres in right-of-way and barrow ditches are sprayed for weeds each year.

Troop 206 Scouts Best At Camporee

Lockney Boy Scout Troop #206 attended the District Camporee Saturday and Sunday at Haynes near Silvertown and came away with two of only four "Merit and Honor" given at the camporee.

The patrol of Troop 206 scored out of a possible 400 points

to win the highest award. Troop 206's Red Raider Patrol was third with 353 points. A Dimmitt patrol was second and a group from Plainview fourth in the competition.

The Lockney troop again lived up to its reputation as the "Blue Ribbon Troop" of the Haynes District, a title it's held for 15 years.

The Bobcat Patrol, under the leadership of Senior Patrol Leader Mike Arellano received, believe it or not, 63 points out of a possible 60 (they got a three-point bonus for excellence) in "campfire inspection." Other areas of competition at the Camporee included firebuilding, woodcutting, tent pitching, compass, plant identification, lashing, and knot relay. David Balderas was the patrol leader for the Red Raider Patrol.

All Camporee activities were directed by the patrol leaders, who are members of the Scout Troops represented. Scoutmasters, Assistant Scoutmasters and other adult leaders are not involved. Some 130 Boy Scouts were at the Camporee.

Of nine Troop 206 Scouts at the Camporee, only three were seasoned Scouts. Six were Tenderfoot Scouts.

NEW SCOUTMASTER
Joe Rodriguez is the new Scoutmaster of Troop 206. Rodriguez has succeeded Jesse Garza, who was Scoutmaster of the troop for 19 years. Garza will be Executive Scoutmaster Advisor for the troop. Robert Delgado is Assistant Scoutmaster. Both Delgado and Rodriguez started Scouting while Garza was Scoutmaster, and both attained the rank of Star Scout. Rodriguez is a member of the Order of the Arrow and holder of the Religion Award.

Felipe Galicia is the Scout Troop Committee Chairman. Other committee members are Margarito Arellano Sr., Celso Delgado Sr., Toribio Rodriguez, and Henry Segovia (R.I.). The troop is sponsored by the Lockney Lions Club.

It's that time of the year again—time for the mid-October melee known as the Lockney-Floydada football game, with all the accompanying madness. The pre-game activities can't be likened to the Texas-Oklahoma game weekend in Dallas (this is serious—they're just joking around in Big D), but many citizens of both Floyd County cities have football on their minds this week, including some who can't tell a quarterback sneak from a safety blitz. The meeting of the arch-rivals starts at 7:30 p.m. in the Lockney stadium.

The Longhorns, under head coach Jim Warren, have won four games and lost a couple so far in the season. They're ranked 85th among Texas class-AA teams by the John M. Harris Rating System, having dropped three notches from the previous week even though they defeated Dimmitt Friday night.

Coach L.G. Wilson's Floydada Whirlwinds sprang to number 36 in the Harris Ratings this week (all the way from number 63) by defeating Wellington, ranked ninth in class A last week. (The Skyrockets dropped to number 13 in the ratings this week.) The Whirlwinds are 5-1 this year.

Floydada's only loss came at the hands of Muleshoe, by the score of 27-7 in the second week of the 1978 campaign. They've beaten Dimmitt, 7-6; Post, 21-0; Olton, 24-7; Littlefield, 17-7; and Wellington, 19-14.

In only one game has the Longhorn defense allowed more than one touchdown (Olton managed two). They've posted three shutouts and allowed only one second-half touchdown all year long. The Longhorns have defeated Post, 10-0; Littlefield, 10-7; Seymour, 16-0; and Dimmitt, 7-0; They've lost to Friona, 7-6; and Olton, 17-8.

But the first one that really counts (some might say the ONLY one that really counts) is tomorrow's game, the initial contest of the 1978 District 4-AA campaign. The Whirlwinds will rely on the likes of quarterback Todd Vickers, number-one receiver Kary Helms, running backs Mac Collins and Junior Arredondo, and top-notch defensemen Greg Jones and Ricky Luna in their effort to capture the county championship and post a 1-0 district record.

The Longhorns hope to keep on playing their outstanding brand of defense while the offense continues to improve. They scored just seven points last week at Dimmitt, but the first-quarter scoring drive was crisp and the passing game improved. Mental mistakes stymied several scoring opportunities.

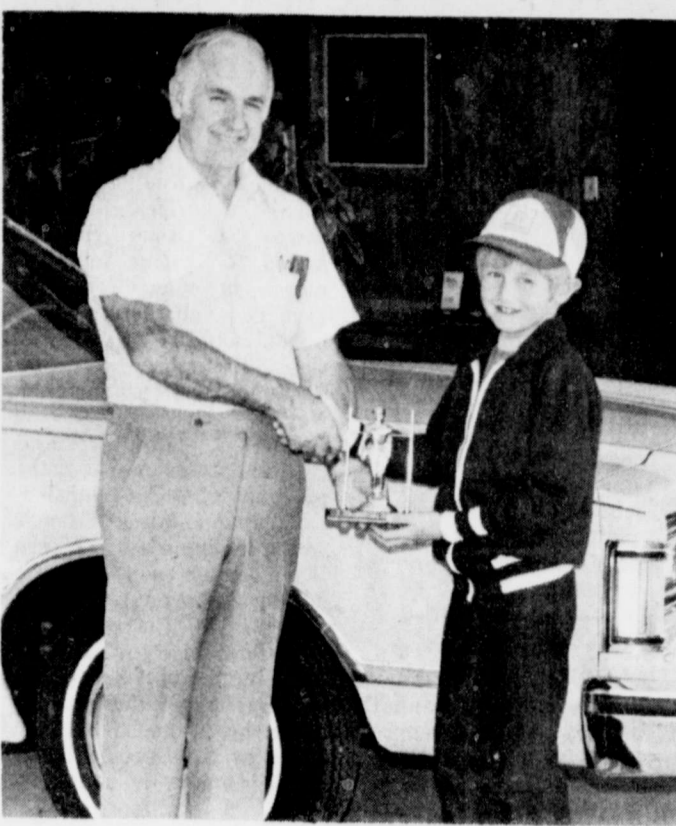

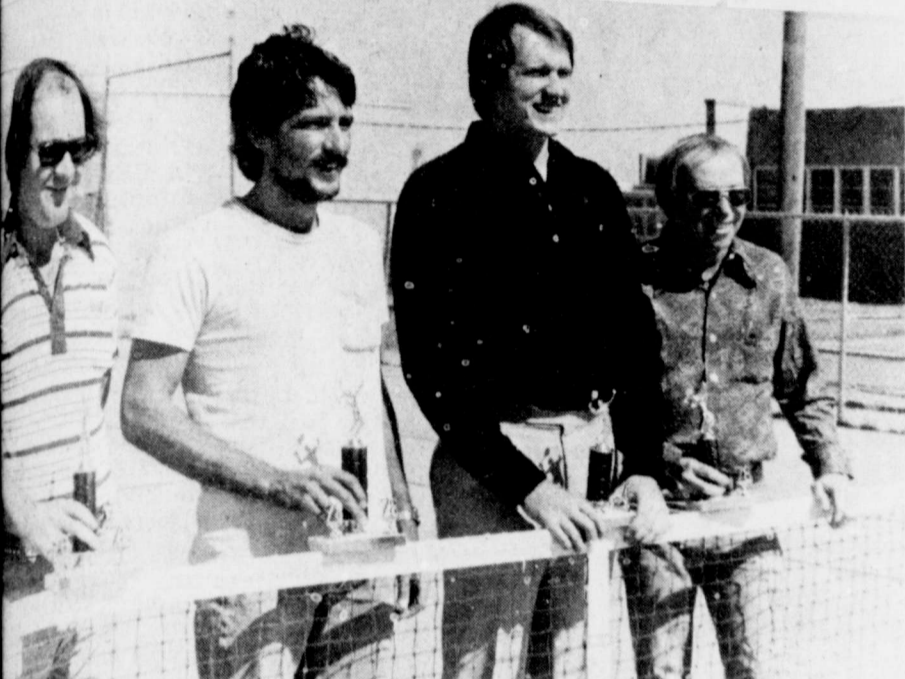

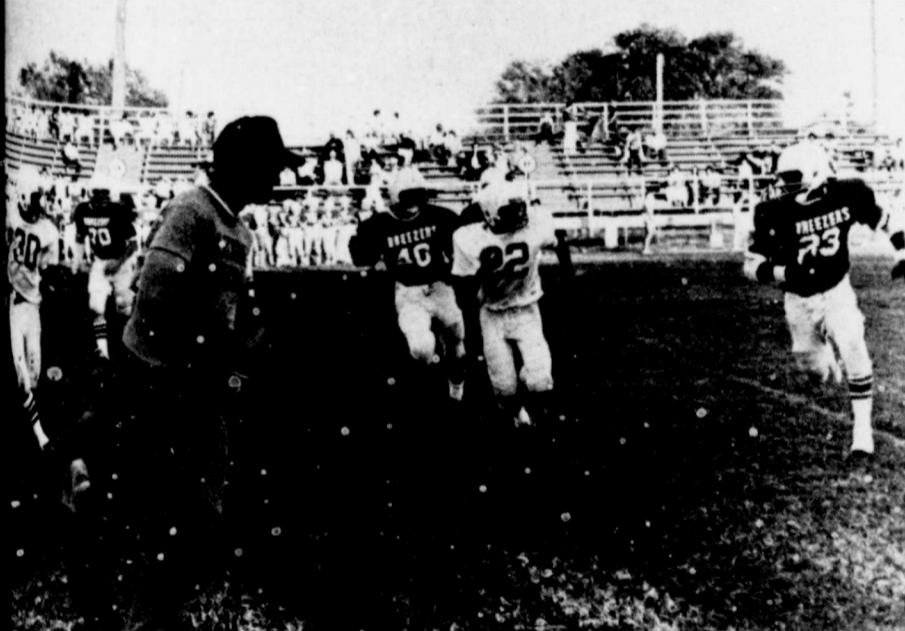
Letter to the Editor

Farabee Favors Amendments Two and Three

State Senator Ray Farabee today endorsed Proposed Constitutional Amendments Number Two and Number Three, Farabee said, "We urge all Texans to give favorable consideration to Proposed Amendments Two and Three on the November 7th ballot."

Amendment Number Two provides a new tool for attracting industry to Texas which will be particularly helpful to smaller cities and

rural areas. Safeguards included in the law provide that no city or county issuing the revenue bonds can tax its citizens for repayment. In fact, that statement

must be printed on the bonds. Amendment Number Three authorizes cities and towns to issue revenue bonds for public improvements in connection with local redevelopment. These bonds would be repaid from the additional revenue produced by the improvements. Neither the credit of the government nor its general revenue can be used to make payment of these bonds.

Farabee stated, "These two amendments will insure that Texans will enjoy a healthy economy and can compete with other states that allow this type of public financing." Forty-six states already have industrial revenue bonds and a number of states have provided for tax increment financing.
