Abernathy Edges 'Horns On Last-Minute Field Goal

It was some kinda Texas high school thriller Friday night, as the Longhorns edged the Horns 15-14 on a last-minute field goal. Abernathy quarterback Tony Heath turned a 145-yard rushing performance by Earlee Mathis into a 14-yard punt and a 63-yard punt and in quick succession the Longhorns' unfathomable penalty calls: a first-down completion call a fake extra-point kick... and that's how the Horns won the game by a nine-point margin on the board in the final minutes of a two and a half hour game. The stadium was packed with a couple of thousand fans who looked like an indication on an Antelope of a Longhorn kickoff. Abernathy's first score: a 35-yard field goal by Steve Warren passed to Heath who gathered it in on the extra-point. The officials apparently missed the call and kept the game complete and kept the game going. (And it sure looked like a pass, too—not a lateral.)

Longhorns still led 14-12. That was with 3:39 to play. The Antelopes tried an onside kick, but it didn't travel the prescribed 10 yards, and the Longhorns owned the ball on the Abernathy 45. For one play, Mathis gained three yards on first down, but somehow the ball popped loose on the next play, and Abernathy recovered. Heath went to Barrera, who hauled in the pass before being dragged down by Placido Gonzales at the Lockney 28 (a 30-yard gainer). Quarterback Heath ran on the next play—all the way to the Longhorn six-yard line (a 22-yard pickup). Three runs got to the two-yard stripe, but more importantly got the ball right to the middle of the field and ran the game clock down to one minute. It was just like an extra-point kick for Cuevas, but it counted three, just enough to defeat the Horns. The scoreboard read "Home 15, Visitors 14" and showed 58 seconds to play. An incompletion stopped it with 33 seconds left. Warren passed to Ford, who fielded the football on the first hop and apparent incompletion. But the ball was spotted where Ford went down, the clock kept ticking and...the final score was Abernathy 15, Lockney 14. It was the Longhorns second District 4-AA loss in as many district games. The Antelopes are lin loop play, tied with Floydada behind Idalou, who beat the Whirlwinds 14-7 Friday. Idalou was open last week.

Absentee Voting Deadline Friday

At noon Friday 44 absentee ballots had been cast in the general election. Absentee voting continues until Friday, November 3. Absentee votes can be cast in the county clerk's office in the courthouse in Floydada or a request for an absentee ballot can be made by mail to the county clerk. In addition to those who plan to be out of town on November 7, others may vote by mail who are sick, physically disabled, or expecting a baby around election day. A doctor's certificate will be needed in the last instance. Others who may vote absentee by mail are those with religious beliefs which prevent them from going to the polls on a Saturday, those 65 years old or older, those confined to jail, and those working as poll watcher or election clerk at a precinct other than their own. There are 4,678 registered, qualified voters in Floyd County.

Regrets She Didn't Come To Lockney Sooner

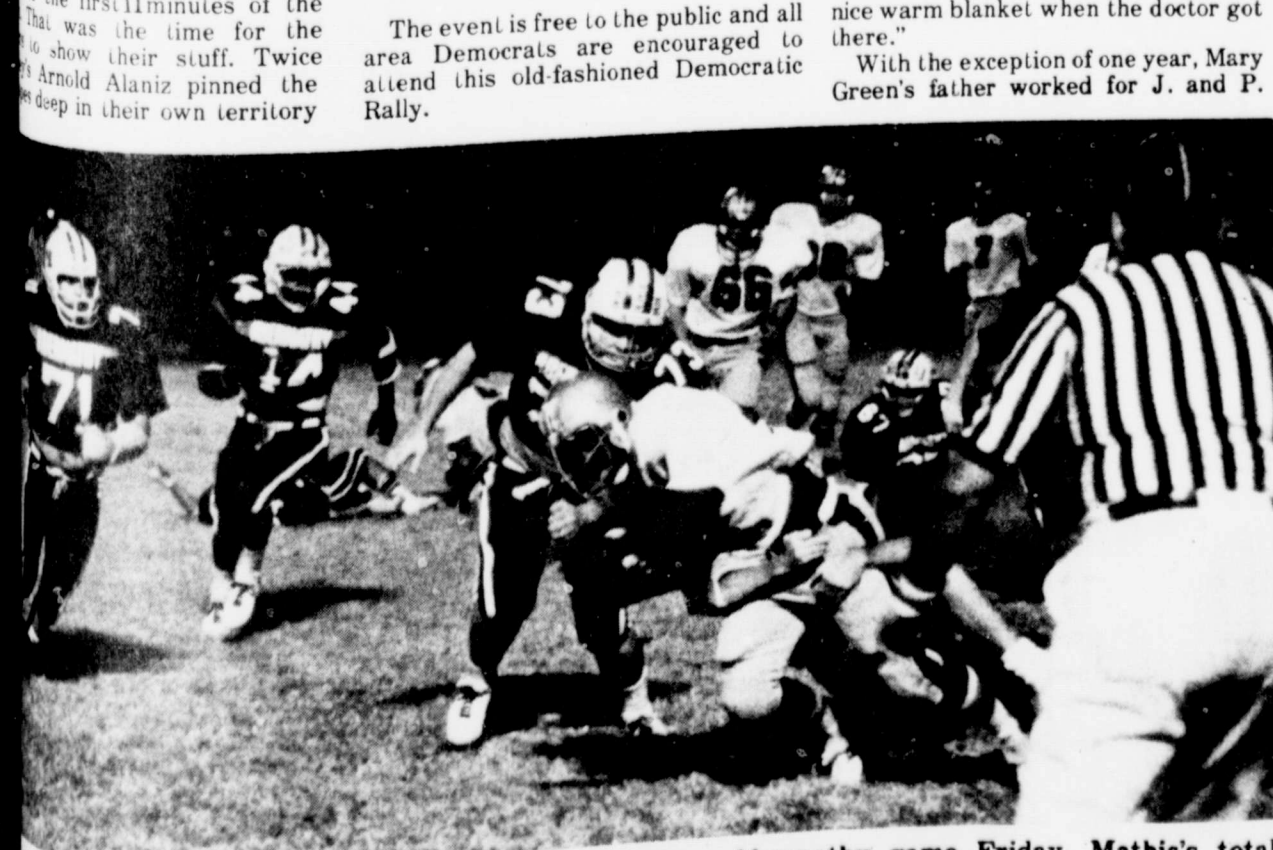
Felicia Applewhite "I am one of the most content and happy persons in the world. I couldn't ask for more," says 91-year-old Mary Green, who will tell you that she lives in the "white cottage across the street west of the Methodist Church parking lot." She will tell you that she loves Texas and that she feels as though she has always lived in Lockney. "My only regret is that I didn't come here in 1956 instead of 1967. I was younger and would have had 10 years more to spend with my family," she says when she mentions her move here from Rhode Island. Her family is the Macon Ulmer family. She has no children other than her daughter, Evelyn Ulmer. Her grandson twins, Jerry and Terry Ulmer operate Texas Insulations Systems in Lockney. "I was pretty lively until the past year," she explains, "but then, of course, I can't hope to feel like Miss America at age 91." She was born one night at 2 o'clock during a blinding snow storm in March 1887. Her father walked over a mile in the storm to the center of Manchester to get the doctor. He roused the doctor and helped him hitch up the horses to the buggy. They were nearly frozen before getting back to the house. "I was already in this world when they arrived. A neighbor had seen the light in the windows and had come over in spite of the storm to see if Mother needed help. She was a Godsend, my mother often said. I was wrapped in a nice warm blanket when the doctor got there." With the exception of one year, Mary Green's father worked for J. and P.

Coats thread company. It was the largest thread company in the world. J and P Coats was known all over Europe as well as America. "There were no electric lights on the streets in those days. A man with his horse and wagon came around at dusk and lit the lights with a lighter of some kind in the end of a long pole. There were no telephones in the homes. There were horse-drawn street cars and there were horse-drawn hacks to be hired at the livery stable." The biggest thrill during summer months was when the father of the four children in the family brought home tickets for all the family to go on the J. and P. Coats employees' excursion to Rocky Point, a sail of a couple of hours down Narragansett Bay to Rocky Point, a beach resort and park. "Beside our sailing trip, our ticket entitled us to a New England shore dinner—a big treat if you like clam chowder and fried clamcakes. We also had steamed clams in the shell to be opened and dipped in butter sauce, baked fish served with sweet potatoes, corn and Boston brown bread. For dessert, we had Indian pudding." The rounds of amusements included the hobby-horse, now called the merry-go-round, and the wax works. Two identical excursion steamboats sailed up and down the Narragansett Bay regularly every summer for years to carry excursions to several popular shore resorts as well as to Rocky Point. "Several years later, when I was in

my late 'teens, a group of my friends were planning to sail to the outmost tip of the Rhode Island Coast, and invited me to go along with them to Sakamot. I was disappointed when I was unable to make the trip. "When the news got to us that night that on the return trip the steamer Makina's boiler exploded just before docking in Providence, I was very thankful that I had missed that outing." It was the worst disaster ever to happen along the Rhode Island coast. Many were scalded to death immediately and many died later. It was the end of the sister-steamers trips down the Bay. "Another of my childhood memories was of Nellie Thackery's candy shop, a tiny building a few minutes' walk from our home. She was a small, plump, elderly lady who loved children. When she had no other customers, she would chat with me and tell me about her own childhood. "Nellie said she owned one hen when she was seven. She ate the eggs herself—one for breakfast every morning. Often she would say that she wasn't hungry and would take that day's egg to the general store and exchange it for a stick of penny candy. Eggs then sold for 12 cents a dozen. "I was Nellie's best customer for one item, penny books of fairy tales. They were the cheapest paper with eight pages of poorly printed words and blurry illustration in the center fold, but I valued them as much as if they were bound in leather with gold edges. I hoarded every penny that I could to buy delightful adventure. "I had to pass over some words at first as I was only seven years old, but I soon improved in my reading because I was wrapped up in the adventure of Aladin and his Lamp, Cinderella, Sleeping Beauty, Jack and the Beanstalk and all the rest of those wonderful tales. "Nellie seemed to be prosperous enough. She lived alone in a pretty good house, and she was able to donate a beautiful bell to her church. "Later on, when we were growing up, my sisters and brother and I enjoyed going to Nellie's shop when the Spanish American War broke out, we went to buy small novelties relating to the war. For a penny, you could buy a small cloth flag on a tiny wooden staff. The boys would wear them on the front of their caps; the girls pinned them on their dresses or jackets. "One other very fascinating item was a card about half the size of a post card with the picture of a battleship on it. Under the picture was printed 'Remember the Maine'. Hanging from the bottom of the picture was about an inch of string. On the back of the card was printed: 'Carefully light the string with a match.' The little spark would travel up the string to the battleship, then an explosion would blow a round burnt hole in the hull of the battleship. I don't know why it didn't set the card afire. "At that time people had no radios or

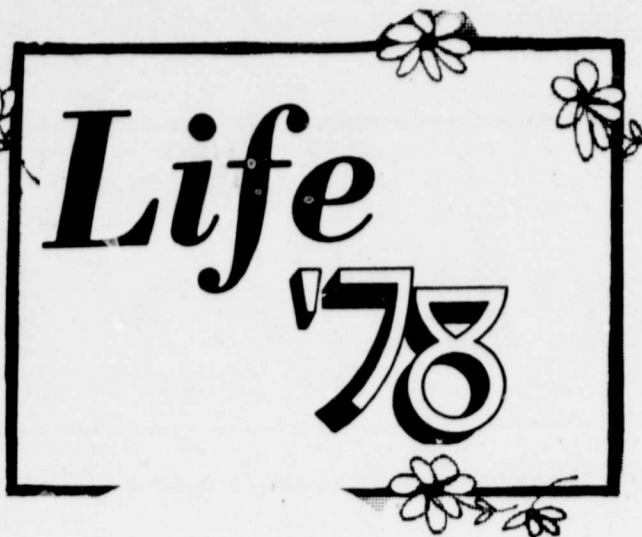

They tell me I am a member of a minority group. Well, minorities are a funny thing. Not the individual members within any given group or even the groups themselves, but those groups or segments of society which are singled out to be called minorities. Blacks, Women, Chicanos, Aged, Homosexuals. That's a strange list of categories to lump under one head: minority groups.

The word minority really means "the smaller number of two aggregates that constitute a whole...the smaller

number of groups who together constitute a larger entity...a group with a particular identity which exists within a larger context or in a population with the majority being another group or identity..."

Now according to these definitions, almost anybody can be a minority, and some people can be several minorities, like a black female senior citizen. But according to the above definition, we could add any other categorical definition—say, obesity. There are plenty of "obese" around and they get discriminated against, too. Maybe they had better organize. Then there are the left-handers, or maybe the uneducated. Don't you think the uneducated have just as much right to the good jobs as the educated? Sure they do. They shouldn't be discriminated against just because they are ignorant through no fault of their own. But you say they should be qualified? What's the matter, are you prejudiced or something? Have you also noticed that the word, minority has taken on a negative-type connotation?

Another thing about that list of categories...Blacks and Women are categories into which one is born, categories which are irreversible, and in which one remains from birth to death. On the other hand, Aged is a category that is a phase of life and one that everyone moves into sooner or later whether he wants to or not. The homosexual is neither a category one is born into or one that everyone moves into naturally. Some say the category is a moral issue, some a mental problem and some a chosen lifestyle. Regardless of one's position, a valid question arises as to who can actually constitute a political minority group. Alcoholics? Habitual Liars? Sunday School teachers?

Does society and its institutional means of promoting its laws (government) have the right to judge morality through its legal system? Well, if the society's legal system does not regulate

television to bring all the news of the war, and all the songs that were sung during war time, but such songs were sung then as in later wars. On Wednesday and Saturday nights when the stores were open late for shopping, at every street corner in town hawkers would be shouting "Come get the latest songs. Only 10 cents the latest songs."

"The boys who were going to war, and the kids on the streets and the whole population were singing 'Good-bye Dolly Gray' and many other ditties."

"I wonder how many people today remember a verse of the old, old song: I have come to say good-bye, Dolly Gray. There's a murmur in the air. You can hear it everywhere. It's the time to do and dare. Dolly Gray. Chorus: Good-bye, Dolly. I must leave you. I can no longer stay. Hark! I hear the bugle calling. Good-bye Dolly Gray."

"One thing that I recall very clearly was my occasional trip to the shopping center with my mother. I was about nine years old. To me, the highlight of the trip was a visit to Lyons Delaney's tea store."

"It was a large store on Main street.

A large, open doorway in summer with the heavenly aroma of fresh-ground coffee wafting out, I remember. Delaney had fresh-brewed coffee and each customer was entitled to a cup of the delicious coffee with real cream and sugar if desired.

"There was also the smell of every kind of spice imaginable."

"When I entered the store, I was in another world. All the exotic smells and scenes fascinated me. First, the long rows of tea bins all laquered in shining black with long slanting covers extending half-way in the front of them. They were all decorated with gold knobs and red dragons coiled among twining gold vines."

"There were such enticing names for the teas in gold letters on each box: Formosa-oolong, Ceylon, Peking, Green Gunpowder, English Breakfast and many more."

"Lyons Delaney himself was usually in the store. He spent a lot of time walking around checking things, and having a word and a smile for everyone. He also kept a sharp eye on the building in the rear of the store where coffee was ground."

"People came from miles around to buy Lyons Delaney's coffee, tea and spice. After each purchase, a customer received a ticket for a free cup of

coffee. Any child with a parent, was given a ticket for a dish of ice cream. I can still smell that coffee and taste that ice cream."

"After having my ice cream treat, I loved to walk up and down the three aisles looking at the large glass jars of sticks of cinnamon, whole cloves, cardamom, anise seeds, pepper corns and the like."

"There were jars of preserved ginger in syrup, candied ginger, preserved cumquats and many other rare treats."

"On the walls were pictures of lovely Oriental ladies with their flowing kimonos and pretty fans."

"On the way out was the mecca that brought kids from all directions when they had a nickel. A great, big vat-I think, my father called it a half a hog's head-was filled with fresh roasted peanuts, the only home grown item sold in this unusual store. On the top of the hog's-head of peanuts were always a few quarts already bagged waiting for hungry customers."

"You may be sure, it was always the crowning treat to take home and enjoy a quart-all for 5 cents."

"Those days were soon over and I was leaving the days of my childhood behind." (More next week.)
