Cotton Harvest Reaches Halfway Mark

Wendell Tooley, a total of 208,000 acres of cotton were planted in Floyd County this year. How many acres will be harvested and how many bales will be harvested in the county is still anyone's guess.

However, Bob Hambricht of the Texas Employment Commission office said a gin by gin count Tuesday and Wednesday estimated that half the crop was ginned across the scales.

Many bales are stacked in piles... or still on the stalk is yet to be determined. A total of 68,900 bales were reported by ginners Tuesday noon. If this is the crop, then a total of 140,000 bales may be expected for Floyd County this year.

Last year's cotton harvest was a record breaker with a total of 185,000 bales reported. Cotton farmers have been working hard and day for the last two weeks and have made good progress in getting the crop harvested. Some are following the cotton stripper with stalk cutter and plow, and the field's appearance changes from white to brown almost overnight.

The High Plains cotton harvest began when skies cleared last Friday, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services Laboratory.

High Plains Marketing Services Office graded 45,000 samples this week, bringing the season's total to 228,000. This compares to 1,813,000 graded by December 1 last year, Dickson said.

Dominant High Plains grades this year were grade 41 at 15 percent, grade 42 accounted for 20 percent, grade 43 accounted for 37 percent and grade 52 for 20 percent. Twenty-three percent were reduced one grade because of lint according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Five percent was reduced because of grass.

Staple lengths were mostly staple 31 at 28 percent, staple 32 was 38 percent and staple 33 accounted for 19 percent. Micronaire was mostly in the desirable 3.5 - 4.9 range at 80 percent of the total. Twenty percent was lower. Break strength averaged 87,000 pounds per square inch. Cotton prices were steady to firm the week ending November 30.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 around 59.45 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 and 31, mikes 3.5 - 4.9 brought about 54.35 cents. Gins paid growers \$110 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$115 to \$130.

Federal Land Bank Interest Goes To 8 1/2%

Ted D. Jordan, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, announced today that the Federal Land Bank's billing rate on farm and ranch loans and rural residence loans will be increased from 8% to 8 1/2%, effective December 1, 1978. This increase in billing rate will affect 20,000 loans in the total amount of \$1.2 billion.

In making this announcement, Jordan stated, "The rapid acceleration of the cost of money in the recent weeks, with the dramatic 1% increase in the discount rate to an all time high of 9 1/2% and an 11% prime rate being charged by commercial banks, are indications of the significant effect in the average cost of funds to finance the Bank's lending programs." Also, he mentioned that the 8 1/2% rate is a very competitive rate in today's economic climate.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout Texas, and now has

more than \$1.4 billion in loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in Floyd, Briscoe, Motley and parts of Hall counties.

They're scheduled to play Colorado City today at 2 p.m. in the Post freshman tournament.

The Longhorn basketball team notched a 66-44 victory Tuesday night at the expense of the Silverton Owls. Danny Riddle and Joe Rodriguez were the top Lockney pointmakers, with 18 and 14 respectively, but Coach Ed Koester said it was a "total team

effort" with all team members contributing to the win. All 10 members of the varsity team played well, Koester said. Earlee Mathis and Kevin Evans did well in the rebounding department, grabbing eight apiece, and Breck Record played well on defense, leading the team in steals with three.

The varsity 'Horns will see action today (Thursday) in a tournament at Tulia -- they play Slaton in a 5:30-p.m. contest.

Last Friday the Longhorns lost to Bovina by a 49-45 count.

Lady Horns Down Owlettes

The Lady Horns shut out Silverton for the entire first quarter Tuesday in a basketball game played at the Briscoe county seat (it was 13-0 at the first-period buzzer), and went on to win by a 42-32 final score. The Owlettes staged a second-quarter rally and were behind by only 20-14 at halftime. It was a 32-22 Lockney at the end of three quarters.

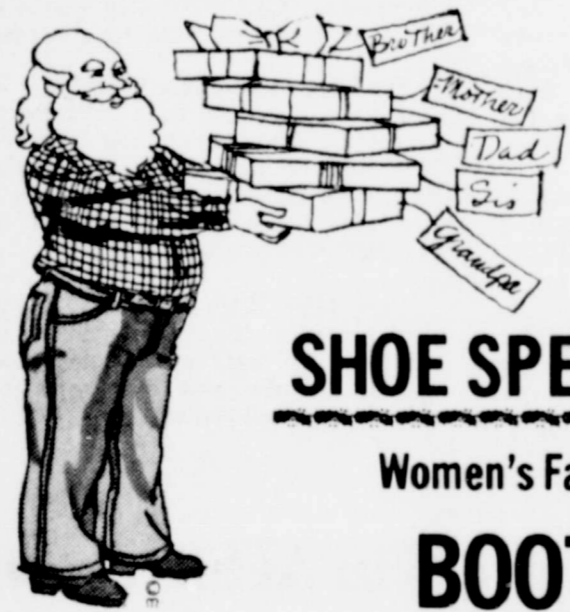

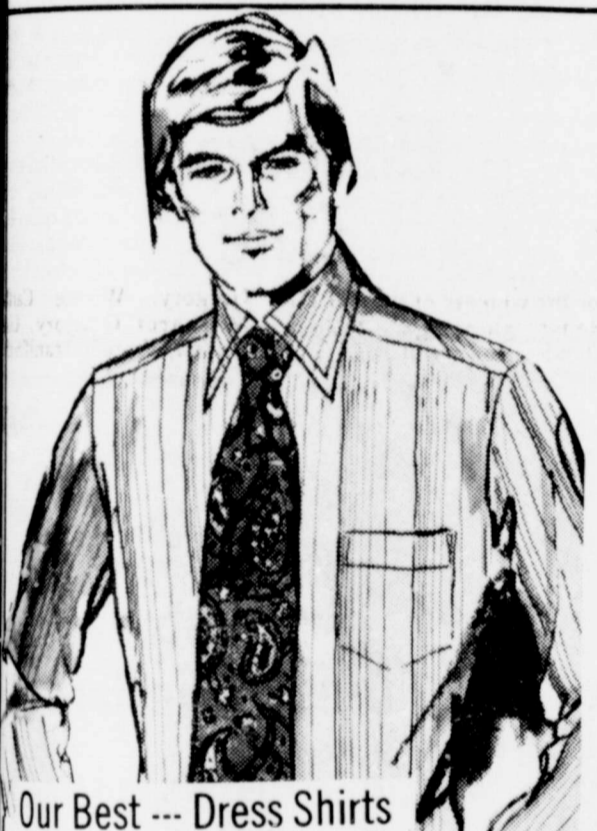

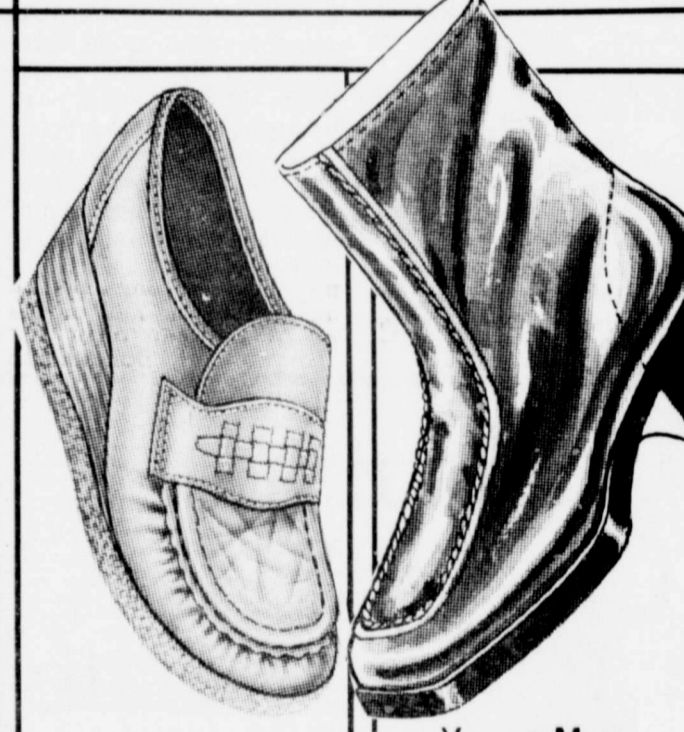

Tips On Buying A Christmas Tree

COLLEGE STATION — Many people still enjoy and appreciate the beauty, color and aroma of a traditional cut Christmas tree. Everett Jamme, landscape horticultural Extension Service, offers some tips to help you select your Yule tree and maintain it in the best possible condition throughout the holiday season.

1. Choose your tree early. Most Christmas trees are cut four or five weeks before they arrive on the lot. The sooner you can get the tree home and into water, the better.
2. Select a full, dense tree that is evenly branched. The branches should be firm and flexible. Shake the branches when selecting to see if needles fall. Fresh, healthy Yule trees do not drop their needles.
3. Select a tree with good green color. This indicates that the choice is fresh, has good needle retention, fragrance, fire resistance and longer holiday beauty.
4. Once you have selected your tree, saw off the lower two inches of the trunk. This will help the tree absorb water which will insure freshness and lasting qualities.
5. Stand the tree in a cool location until you are ready to place it in a tree stand. Then, place it in a tree stand that holds water and keep it filled during the holidays.
6. Place your tree in the coolest location possible, away from the fireplace, radiators and doors.

"While it might seem a great waste to cut down thousands of trees every year just to have something to hang ornaments on at Christmas, we really should criticize this practice," said Jamme.

"The majority of trees for Christmas are grown specifically for that purpose on commercial Christmas tree farms. They are just much a crop as fruits and vegetables.

In addition, we can be just as wasteful with trees as we are with fruits and vegetables, these trees are carefully replanted for future harvests."

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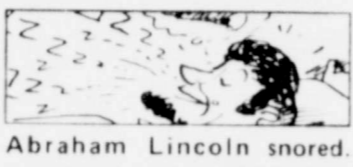

Cattle Brands Needed For A&M Stairway

COLLEGE STATION -- The search continues throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include in another chapter of their history by "burning 'em in" Texas A&M University's "branded stairway." L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project,

said that some 3,500 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center. "County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said. "We now have slightly more than 500 burned in."

There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record. The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate

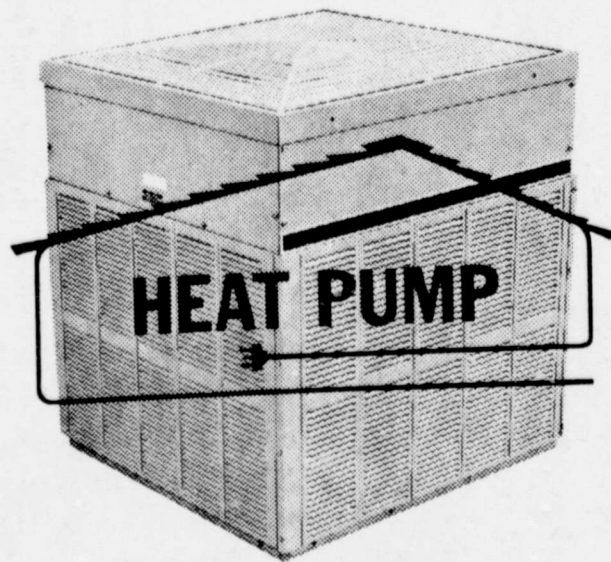

She attended West College and Third Street Church of Christ while living in Lockney with her brother, the late Dell Fuller.

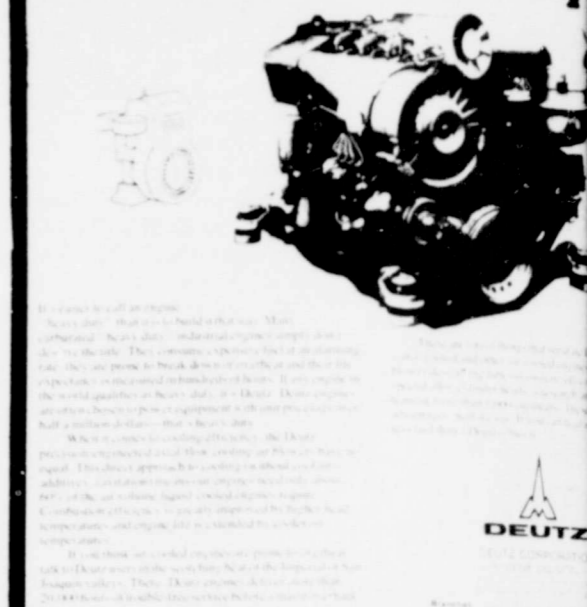

4-H Awards Motivate Youth

Historically, awards as incentives in 4-H have played a significant role in motivating young people to excellence, says Birch Lobban, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Even before the 4-H program formally began in 1914, the private sector saw the importance of recognizing youth for their accomplishments.

In October 1856, for example, young Franklin Spaulding stood proudly by his exhibit of Durton Yellow Corn at the Watertown (New York) Fair as the judges filed past. His months of hard work paid off when he was awarded the \$50 first prize in the state corn contest.

The donor of his award was Horace Greeley, famous newspaper editor and politician.

Following the precedent set by such early supporters of America's youth, about 60 private sector donors will provide incentives to 4-H members this year through national 4-H awards programs, notes Agent Lobban.

Nearly 200,000 4-H'ers will be recognized each year with educational scholarships, trips to National 4-H Congress in Chicago and other events, U.S. savings bonds, stocks and other awards.

These awards are arranged by the National 4-H Council, a nonprofit educational organization using private funds to serve the 4-H work of the Cooperative Extension Service. They recognize excellence at local, state, sectional and national levels in nearly 50 programs areas.

Some of these programs and their sponsors are bicycle, the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co.; dog care and training, Purina Dog Foods Group, Ralston Purina Co.; gardening, Ortho Division, Chemron Chemical Co.; and veterinary science, The Upjohn Co.

Young people in 39 states are eligible for expense-paid trips to the annual 4-H Commodity Marketing Symposium sponsored by the Chicago Board of Trade.

4-H members, plus outstanding clubs and counties in all states, can earn recognition from John Deere in the conservation of natural resources program. And 4-H'ers and clubs are eligible for health awards donated by Eli Lilly and Co. and Kraft, Inc.

Other national 4-H donors offer scholarships for college studies in specified fields: Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho, agriculture; Allied Mills, Inc., animal science; and Champion Valley Farms, Inc., Recipe Division, veterinary medicine.

Five donors provide scholarships and other awards on a regional basis: the Santa Fe Railway System and Gulf Central Pipeline Co., DeKalb AgResearch, Inc., Burlington.

Estimated Tax Installment Due Soon For Corporations

Corporations operating on a calendar year basis must make their fourth quarterly installment payment of 1978 income tax by Friday, December 15, if the corporations have expected tax liabilities of at least \$40 for the year.

These payments must be accompanied by Form 503 and deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The estimated tax and the amount of each installment can be computed on a Form 1120-W which is a worksheet for computing corporation estimated income tax. This form is not filed with the IRS but is retained in the corporation's records.

Supplies of Form 1120-W and a helpful pamphlet, "IRS Publication 542, 'Corporations and the Federal Income Tax,' are available free from local IRS offices.

Waggoner Carr Says Texans Demand Tax Relief
