Frozen Ponds Dangerous Children's Playground

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their

"Ponds around here seldom freeze thick enough to support the weight of even small children," James Cox, soil conservationist with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Floydada, said.

The most dangerous ponds, he stressed, are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges.

"Usually the down-wind edge of the pond will freeze first, and the ice may support a large person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water and on the up-wind side of the pond, the ice is usually very thin," Cox continued.
