From Small Beginnings...

... Lockney Boys Basketball Boosters Grow

It all started when Mike Bellar, Lockney High School basketball coach in 1977-78, showed Bill Sessom, Roy Ed and C.L. Record the varsity basketball boy's dressing room last year. The players' parents saw an obvious need for improvement in the basketball dressing room. A meeting of varsity and junior-varsity players' parents was called and the need presented. Interested parents operated the concession stand at home basketball games 2 year and solicited donations to spot, paint and install a "whirlpool" in the boys dressing room on the north side of the school gym. The total cost of a dressing-room project was \$2,

980.85, and at the end of the season last year, the players' parents' groups later to be named the Lockney Boys Basketball Boosters, had a deficit of \$214.61. The parents began operating the concession stand again this season to finish paying for the project. The coaching staff, under the leadership of Coach Jim Warren, presented the need for a new paint job for the junior high dressing room. Another school athletic department need was for weights. All of the above have been purchased and donated to the school district by the Boys Basketball Boosters group. Parents of all boys, from sixth through 12th grade, have helped with the concession-work this year, and \$2,417.77 has been raised to pay for the

lockers and other improvements. Donations are being accepted and will be sincerely appreciated. The Basketball Boosters hope to "pay out" this year, but they'll need some donations to accomplish that feat. Sessom was chairman for the group during the 1977-78 season, and Record is this year's chairman. There will be a meeting February 13 following the game with Idalou (final game of the season) for all boys' parents in the junior high cafeteria. Officers for the coming year will be elected. Mr. and Mrs. Record and Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Ford are on the nominating committee and welcome suggestions for nominations for the leadership of the Boys' Basketball Boosters.

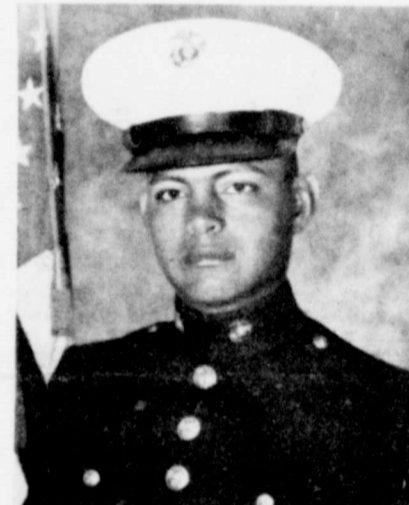

Lockney High School girls notched their second victory of 1979 over Floydada's girls in District 4-AA basket- ball game Tuesday evening in Graves Gym, Floydada. The final score was 37-22, but it was a closer game than that, at least until the fourth quarter, when the Lady Horns outscored the Whirlettes 12-1.

In the final period, the Lady Horns were leading by four when the Whir- lettes were called for a foul in their back court, then slapped with a technical. Karla McCarter calmly put in a trio of free throws, and the Lady Horns in-bounded after the technical and scored again to suddenly lead by nine. Those five quick points enabled the

Lockney girls to go into a semi-delay game and practically shut out the Whirlettes in the final stanza.

Eight of Lockney's 12 final-period points came on free throws. They tried 11 from the line in that period.

Lockney led 7-6 at the end of the first period, 16-10 at halftime, and 25-21 starting that fatal (for the Whirlettes) final eight minutes.

Lockney coach Marsha Sharp said she thought her team played good defense the whole game (a fact made obvious by the score), but weren't that consistent on offense. The 22-point total by the Whirlettes wasn't a season low by Lockney opponents, however. That distinction belongs to Kress, who lost to

the Lady Horns 42-18 in the Tulia Tournament. And Abernathy scored just 21 points against Lockney in the Olton Tournament — but the Lady Horns managed only 18 in that game.

Rebecca Evans was Lockney's top scorer Tuesday night. She netted 11 points. McCarter was close with 10, and Stephanie Turner had six, Penny Sterling four, Susan Fitzgerald three and Tammie Hays two. 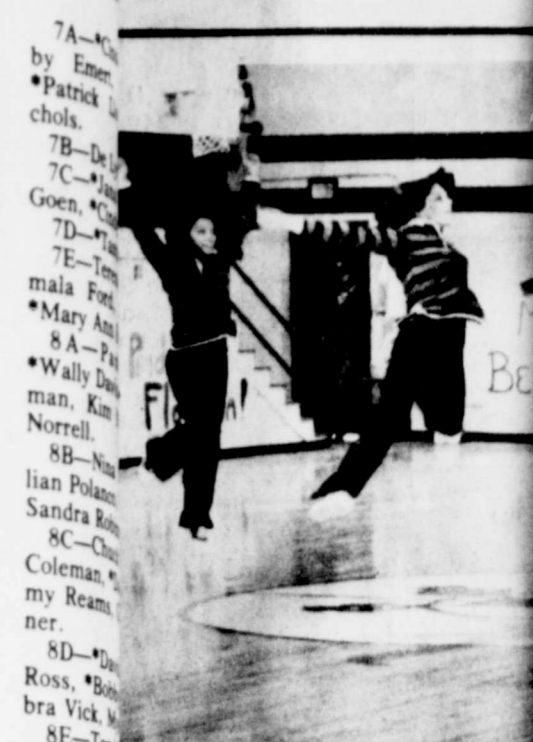

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Hot-Shooting Lady Horns Whip Idalou 49-34 ...

... But Ice-Cold Longhorns Lose 42-34 To Wildcats

The Lockney High School girls' varsity basketballers hit 56 percent of their field-goal attempts, their highest percentage in any game so far this year, and defeated Idalou by a 49-34 margin last Friday in the Idalou gym.

The Lady Horns made 18 of 32 field-goal tries and sank 13 of 22 from the free-throw line. They led the Wildcat girls at the end of every quarter — 10-5, 20-17, 37-26, and 49-34.

Karla McCarter of Lockney was 80 percent for the evening. She sank eight out of ten field-goal tries and didn't go to the line. McCarter's 16 points was good for high-score honors. Rebecca Evans and Penny Sterling scored 11 points each for the Lady Horns.

Coach Marsha Sharp cited the offensive play of McCarter and good team defense as keys to the win. Susan Fitzgerald stepped into a starting role Friday night, replacing Rise Taylor, who is out at least for the remainder of the regular season. Sharp said Fitzgerald did a good job starting in Taylor's place.

The Lady Horn coach also praised Sterling, who came in off the bench and played "extremely well."

The Lockney girls' team wound up the first half of District 4-AA action in second place with a 3-1 record. They lost only to Abernathy, first-half winner with a perfect 4-0 mark.

Idalou defeated Lockney 42-34 in the varsity boys' basketball contest there Friday night. Coach Ed Koester said the 'Horns played better than they have recently — but the Longhorns made only 16 percent of their field goal shots. They put up 62 and made but 10. "Our percentage is still killing us," Koester said.

Joe Rodriguez and Earlee Mathis were the top Longhorn scorers with 14 points each.

Lockney city council called a city election to be held April 5. The terms of aldermen Claude Hammond, J.D. Wood and Lloyd Readhimer were expiring.

The Rev. Luther Kirk was to preach at the Aiken Methodist Church. Members of the Aiken Methodist Church had attended the Sterley Methodist Church the previous week.

New officers of El Progreso Study Club were Mrs. Henry Schacht, president; Mrs. E.M. Quebe, vice president; Mrs. J.C. Kemp, secretary; Mrs. Milton Ashton, treasurer; Mrs. L.M. Honea, critic-parliamentarian; Mrs. Chester Mitchell, reporter.

The "LHS Hit Parade of the Week," as reported in "The Lariat" in the pages of The Beacon, included these songs: 1. "Memories Are Made of This" 2. "Rock and Roll Waltz" 3. "Speedo" 4. "Smoky Pretender" 5. "He" 6. "The Great There's A Valley" 10. "Tuttie Fruttie".

Thursday, February 5, 1953

The West Side Church of Christ was "adding to the front of their church building by enclosing a porch. The room added will provide an entrance room into the main building...."

The Lockney Longhornettes continued their basketball winning streak with victories over Kress, Ralls and Hale Center. They held second place in the district with only one loss, to the powerful New Deal Lionesses. Nancy Holland scored 22 points for the Lockney girls in the 36-35 overtime victory over Kress. Holland was high scorer in the victory over Ralls, too, with 15 points, and in the win over Hale Center, with 14.

The Floyd County Junior Livestock Show was to be held on two days, March 11 and 12. It was the first time for the show to cover a two-day period. The two-day show was "...necessary because of the great difficulty encountered in having the show and sale in one day...."

The roof of Lockney Auto Co. fell in from the weight of a heavy snow combined with ice and water. Estimated loss from the roof collapse was \$15,000.

Friday, February 4, 1949

Earl Cooper resigned as Floyd County deputy sheriff and was employed as a "special officer" for the City of Lockney.

The annual Floyd County Irrigation School was scheduled at the Plains Theatre in Lockney. A special feature was to be the free lunch, served by the Business Men's Club of Lockney.

Mrs. Glen Bowers was the new supervisor of nurses at the Floyd County Co-operative Hospital in Lockney. She succeeded Mrs. Pearl Martin, who resigned.

Two Lockney boys, Calvin Pyle and Bill Thompson, won titles in their weight divisions in Golden Gloves bouts in Amarillo.

Frozen Ponds Dangerous Children's Playground

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their death.

"Ponds around here seldom freeze thick enough to support the weight of even small children," James Cox, soil conservationist with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Floydada, said.

The most dangerous ponds, he stressed, are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges.

"Usually the down-wind edge of the pond will freeze first, and the ice may support a large person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water and on the up-wind side of the pond, the ice is usually very thin," Cox continued.

There is no really safe ice thickness for skating, according to the National Safety Council, because ice conditions are always changing. For example, four inches of new ice can support more weight than four inches of "old ice" that has been subjected to the effects of the sun, refreezing after thawing, wind, and changing water levels under the ice.

Realizing how hard it is to curb the natural curiosity in children, Cox suggested that children be made aware of the dangers of thin ice. He has warning posters available free of charge for this purpose, please come by the SCS office at 208 So. Wall St in Floydada.

"Some pond owners keep a life ring or other floatation device attached to a long rope handy at the pool. A long pole can also be used to rescue victims of broken ice," Cox said.

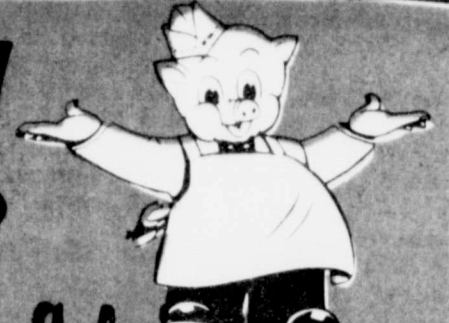

Brad Blenden To Teach Computer Course In Plainview

A micro-computer is limited only by the imagination and capabilities of the programmer, according to Brad Blenden, owner of Brad's "BASIC" Consulting Service in Amarillo.

Blenden is a Lockney High School graduate, son of Mr. and Mrs. Easton Blenden of Lockney. As he pointed out, most micro-computers are programmed in BASIC language, Beginner's All-purpose Symbolic Instruction Code.

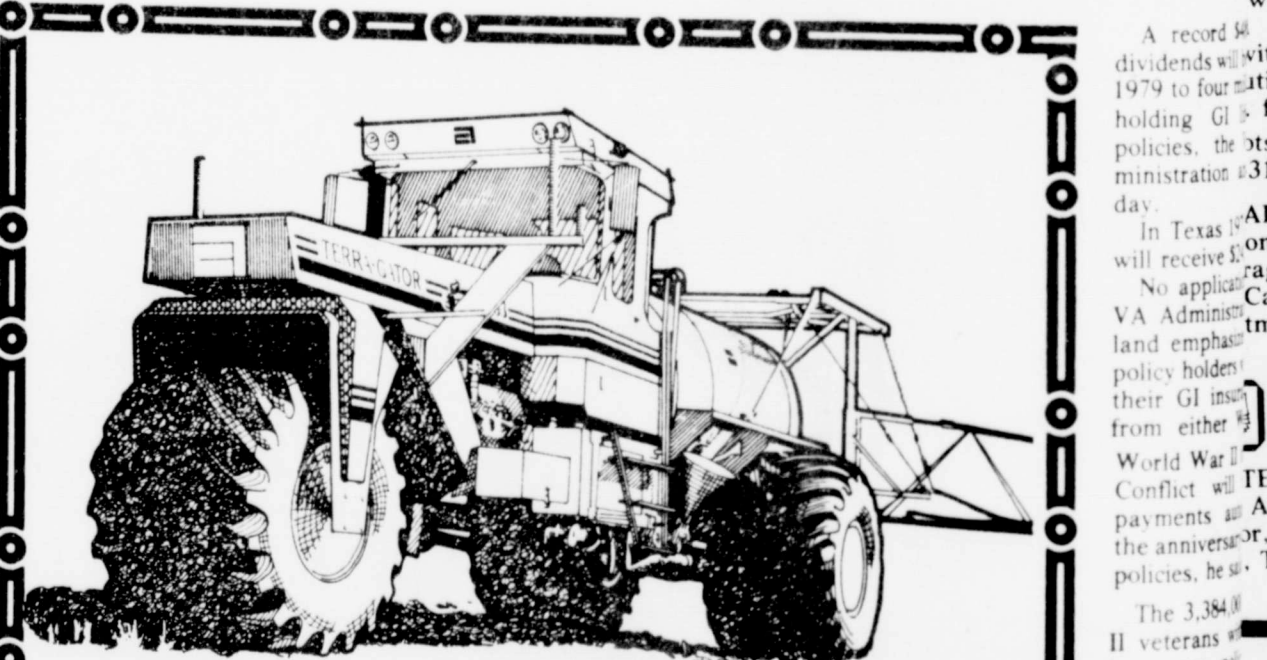

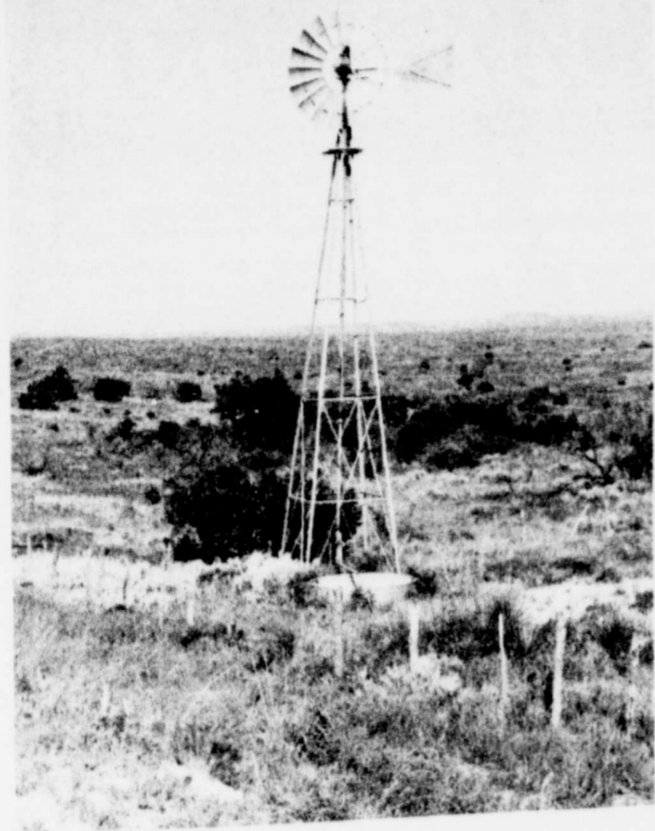
