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

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3. Payment for damage or loss should be collected only after film has been inspected by the System audiovisual consultant.

Patron should bring back to the library any damaged sections of film. Libraries should send damaged film along with the film report to System office when damage warrants it. 5. In the case a borrower

loses a film, he or she will pay the cost of replacing the entire film. Cost of the film is typed inside the film can. 6. The decision to tempo-

rarily withdraw a film in order to obtain replacement footage will be made by the audiovisual consultant. If more than 25% of the footage of a film needs replacement, the decision to either replace footage, replace the entire film, or permanently withdraw it from the collection will be made by the system Audiovisual Consultant. The basis for a decision will be these factors: usage film has received, overall footage, condition including damaged footage, footage replacement cost, overall film cost, discount on replacement print, year of purchase, and year of produc-

Rules For Film Use

1. A 16mm sound projector and experienced operator must be provided by the borrower, unless the lending library has a policy of lending 16mm projectors.

2. Films are to be rewound and returned on library reels in their properly labeled containers.

3. No repairs shall be made by the borrower. If a film breaks during projection, rethread it beyond the break onto the take-up reel, run it, and return it to the Library for repair. Do Not Splice Or Tape Films.

4. A film report must be filled out by the borrower indicating the number of times the film was shown, the number of viewers, and general reactions. This report is enclosed in the film

5. Films may not be shown at events where admission is charged or which are designated for fund-raising or commercial purposes.

6. Library films may not be shown on television without permission from the film distributor, or agency holding the rights to the film Television clearance must be obtained by the borrower. The System office will be happy to supply information about the distributor to the

Sometimes it's hard to believe what you read in the paper. For instance, an article in a newspaper that turned up out there the other day reported that both the House and Senate in Washington are having trouble finding members to serve on their Ethics Committees.

This puzzled me. I thought all members of Congress wanted on committees so if they lived long enough and kept getting re-elected they'd eventually become chairmen and powerful and could hold the job until they retired or were indicted, whichever came first.

Then I got to thinking. It's statesmanship that keeps members from accepting appointment to the Ethics Committee.

For example, you wouldn't expect a

Congressman from the Bronx to serve on the Agriculture Committee. "It wouldn't be fair," he'd say. "I couldn't represent agriculture, that's out of my field. Don't know anything

We've got to stop criticizing Congress. If members don't feel they're qualified in the field of ethics, it's to their credit they decline, in a statesman-like way, to serve on any Ethics




