### Playoff Tuesday In Olton

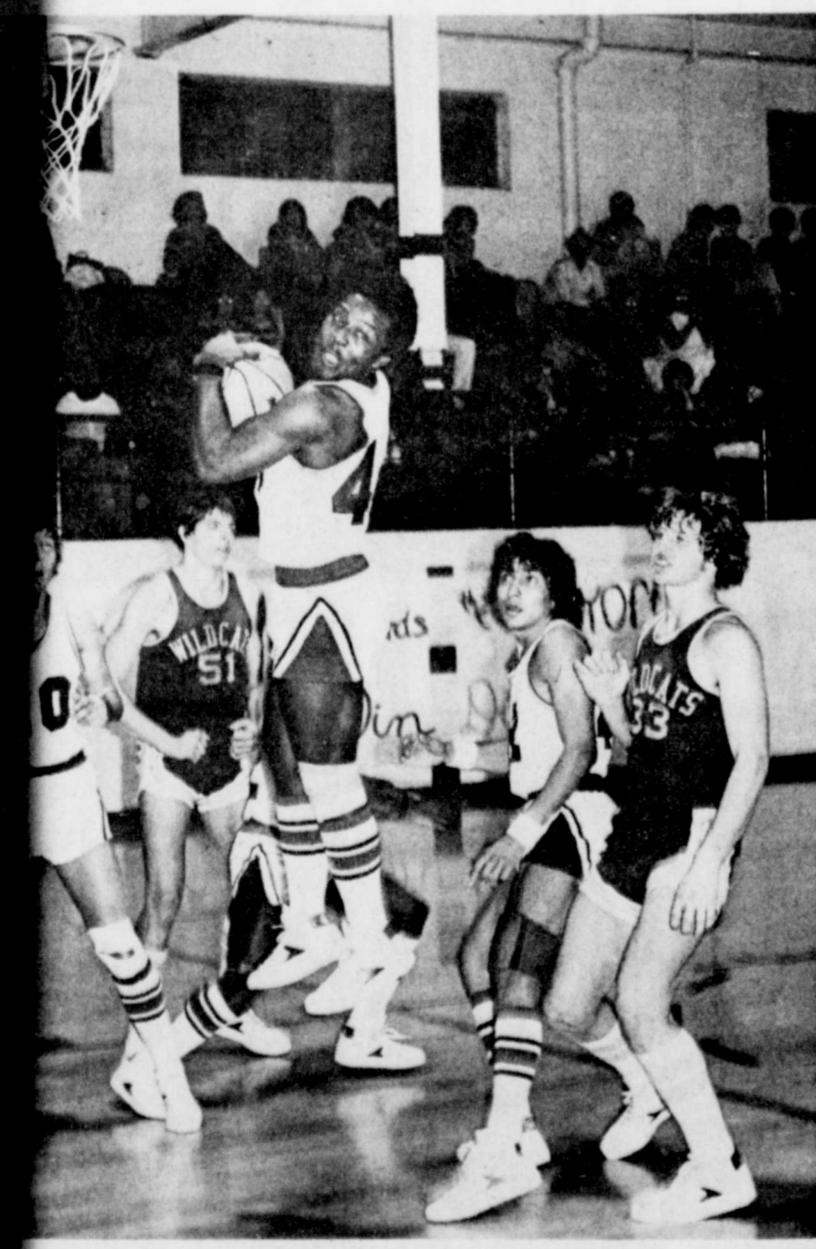

The Lady Horns of Lockney High School won the second-half crown in District 4-AA girls' basketball, defeating first-half winner Abernathy Friday night and downing Idalou Tuesday to post a 4-0 record in the second round.

The Lockney girls and the Lady Lopes will meet in a one-game playoff contest to determine the conference winner.

**LOCKNEY 48, ABERNATHY 46**

The game at Abernathy Friday night was a thriller — probably the most exciting game the Lady Horns have played all year, according to their coach, Marsha Sharp. (They lost to Abernathy by one point in an overtime game in the first district go-round.)

The Lockney team had one of its better offensive nights Friday, Sharp said. They hit 20 of 34 field-goal attempts for a 59-percent average, but didn't fare as well at the free-throw line, where they sank only eight of 21.

What may have made the difference in the game was the fact that the Lady Horns committed hardly any fouls (just nine in the whole game), and Abernathy didn't get into a one-and-one situation in the second half.

And it was a "super defensive effort" in the fourth quarter, when they allowed Abernathy only three points. Abernathy was up by one (43-42) at the end of the third period. They held a one-point (29-28) lead at halftime, too. Lockney led 12-9 at the end of the first quarter.

Rebecca Evans played better offensively than she had all year, Sharp said. Evans scored 20 points.

Penny Sterling continued to show improvement and notched 10 points; Stephanie Turner and Karla McCarter showed lots of poise and leadership and scored eight and seven points respectively; and Tammie Hayes got on the boards really well and scored three points.

**LOCKNEY 41, IDALOU 26**

A big third quarter helped the Lady Horns nail down the second-half title Tuesday night in the Lockney gym. Leading by only three points (16-13) at

halftime, they outscored Idalou 16-5 in the third and wound up winning 41-26.

Lockney played "pretty good defense," especially in that third period, Sharp said, but she was still concerned about the Lady Horns' free-throw shooting — they went nine for 25 Tuesday.

Scoring for Lockney Tuesday were Evans, 13 points; Turner, 12 (in her best offensive game in a long time. Sharp said); Hayes, eight; McCarter and Sterling, four each.

As in previous years, the Lockney Chamber of Commerce will provide the ribbons and prize money for the Lockney show. Top exhibitors in each swine and sheep class will be paid \$6 for first place, \$5 for second, \$4 for third,

\$3 for fourth and \$2 for fifth. In the steer classes, \$10 goes to first-place exhibitors, \$8 for second, \$6 for third, \$4 for fourth and \$2 for fifth. Grand champion and reserve champion exhibitors get an additional \$10 and \$5 respectively.

Trophies will be given this year (instead of rosettes) to the champion exhibitors. H.E. Frizzell, Eddie Teeter, Austin Beedy, Kenneth Holt, Dan Bayley, Kenneth Brosech and George Sparkman are the sheep trophy donors. Donating the steer trophies are Jerry Williams and L.N. Johnson, and the swine trophy donors are Warren Mathis and Mr. and Mrs. Berl Rogers.

### BEACON LIGHTS

THIS APPEARED recently in "The Leaguer," the official publication of the University Interscholastic League, and was reprinted in Bill Ellis' column in "The Friona Star". We probably need to read it here, too—

From time to time, fans tend to forget that sports events are sponsored by the school, and that the home team can get into trouble if they do not conduct themselves properly.

1. There is no such thing as a "right" to participate in athletics. Math, history, English, and certain other courses are mandated by the state authorities, and each student has a "right" to be exposed to them. But as a participant in athletics, a youngster must follow rules or his "privilege" will be taken away from him.

2. Your team does not belong to the community. It belongs to the school. And that school has voluntarily agreed to abide by a certain set of rules, so that all athletes may compete under the same standards.

If these rules offend any special-interest groups to the point where they cannot conduct themselves in a rational manner, then, by all means, these persons should direct all their energies toward some other level of athletics, but NOT the high school level.

3. All high school athletes make mistakes. They are not perfect, and never will be. While these mistakes make high school athletics unpredictable and interesting, it is sad to hear so-called fans boo youngsters at an athletic event.

4. Your coach is also a teacher. In fact, he is a teacher first, and coach second. When misguided people try to reverse this order, the athletic program is in the first stages of collapse.

Nobody wants to see a program fail. In many cases, failure can be attributed to unrelenting, merciless pressure by well-meaning fans. Most of the time, these fans played little or no part in the building of the program. Small wonder that the high school coaching profession has the highest turnover of any coaching level.

5. Make an attempt to learn the rules of the game and then leave the officials alone. Much time is spent in training these officials so that a contest can proceed smoothly.

The spectator who constantly criticizes game officials is ignorant of the rules under which the game is played. Psychologists have also stated that persons with inferiority feelings tend to vent their frustrations on game officials.

6. Finally, keep in mind that you are a guest of the school. While winning is certainly an admirable goal, victory is hollow if it comes at the expense of morals, ethics and just plain common sense.

Do not become the laughing stock of your community. Be a loyal, sensible, thinking spectator. Ask yourself this question, "What would this crowd be like if everyone acted the way I do?"

Hundreds of county FFA and 4-H members have exhibited animals in the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show during its 24 years history. Memories of yesteryear will flash back for them next week as they serve as officials for the 25th annual Floyd County stock show or watch as their offspring parade well-groomed animals into the show ring.

Doors at the show barn in southeast Floydada are scheduled to swing open at 2 p.m. this Sunday. Weighing of barrows is slated for 2 o'clock and all barrows must be in place by 6 p.m.

Monday's agenda starts with steer weighing at 7 a.m. One hour later, lambs are to be weighed, classified, and toothed. Steers must be in place by 9 o'clock Monday mornings and will be classified at 10 a.m.

**JUDGING TWO DAYS**

Judging officially begins at 2 p.m. Monday when Scotty Windham examines swine in various classes.

Tuesday opens with lamb judging by Buddy Logsdon at 9 a.m. That afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock, steers are to be judged by Jerry Adams.

Livestock judging by FFA and 4-H members is scheduled for 7:45 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 21.

Auctioneer Raymond Akin's gavel comes down at 2 p.m. Wednesday to start the traditional sale.

The five-day stock show officially concludes Thursday night, Feb. 22, with the banquet honoring 4-H and FFA exhibitors and their parents. Floyd County Farm Bureau will sponsor the banquet at Duncan Elementary School Cafeteria in Floydada.

## School Principals' Contracts Extended

### Trustee Election Called

The Lockney Independent School District board of trustees, in the regular monthly board meeting Monday night, extended the contracts of Jim Warren, athletic director; James Poole, high-school principal; and R.L. Knox, elementary-school principal. The school board made the one-year contract extensions after an executive session which was closed to the public.

Weldon Dodson, junior-high principal this year, is retiring at the end of the 1978-79 school term and did not seek an extension of his contract.

W.H. Hallmark, school superintendent, told The Beacon that the school district is considering hiring a part-time principal for junior high. The superintendent said if a part-time principal was hired, the junior-high principal would work closely with high-school principal Poole, since the buildings are connected.

**SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION**

Another major item on the school board agenda Monday night was the calling of an election to choose two trustees. The school-board terms of Tom Duvall and Austin Beedy expire in 1978, and the election to name successors to Duvall and Beedy was ordered to be held April 7.

Last day for candidates to file in the school board election is March 7. School board hopefuls may sign up during office hours (8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.) at the school district's administrative offices, 416 W. Willow.

G.B. Johnston was appointed election judge, and Billie Huggins was named absentee voting clerk. Voting in the school board election will take place in the foyer of the high-school building on Saturday, April 7.

**PROPERTY SOLD**

Also Monday night, the trustees accepted the only bid for the "old elementary school property" which they voted last month to offer for sale. Lockney Gin Co. submitted a bid of \$3239 for the property.

**DRESSING ROOMS BID APPROVED**

At last month's meeting, the school board also voted to ask for bids on the construction of dressing-room facilities in the practice gym (formerly an auditorium and before that the school gymnasium). Tolbert-Long, a construction company, has submitted a bid of \$100,000.

Floyd Philosopher Comes To Defense Of Congressmen Who Won't Serve On Ethics Committee



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm comes to the defense of Congress this week, perhaps.

Dear editor: Sometimes it's hard to believe what you read in the paper. For instance, an article in a newspaper that turned up out there the other day reported that both the House and Senate in Washington are having trouble finding members to serve on their Ethics Committees.

This puzzled me. I thought all members of Congress wanted on committees so if they lived long enough and kept getting re-elected they'd eventually become chairmen and powerful and could hold the job until they retired or were indicted, whichever came first.

Then I got to thinking. It's statesmanship that keeps members from accepting appointment to the Ethics Committee.

For example, you wouldn't expect a

Congressman from the Bronx to serve on the Agriculture Committee. "It wouldn't be fair," he'd say. "I couldn't represent agriculture, that's out of my field. Don't know anything about it."

So, you ask somebody to serve on the Ethics Committee and naturally he declines. "That's out of my field. Don't know anything about it."

That makes sense. You wouldn't want a linebacker in charge of atomic energy, would you? Or an illiterate teaching college English? Or a football coach running the New York Times?

We've got to stop criticizing Congress. If members don't feel they're qualified in the field of ethics, it's to their credit they decline, in a statesman-like way, to serve on any Ethics Committee.

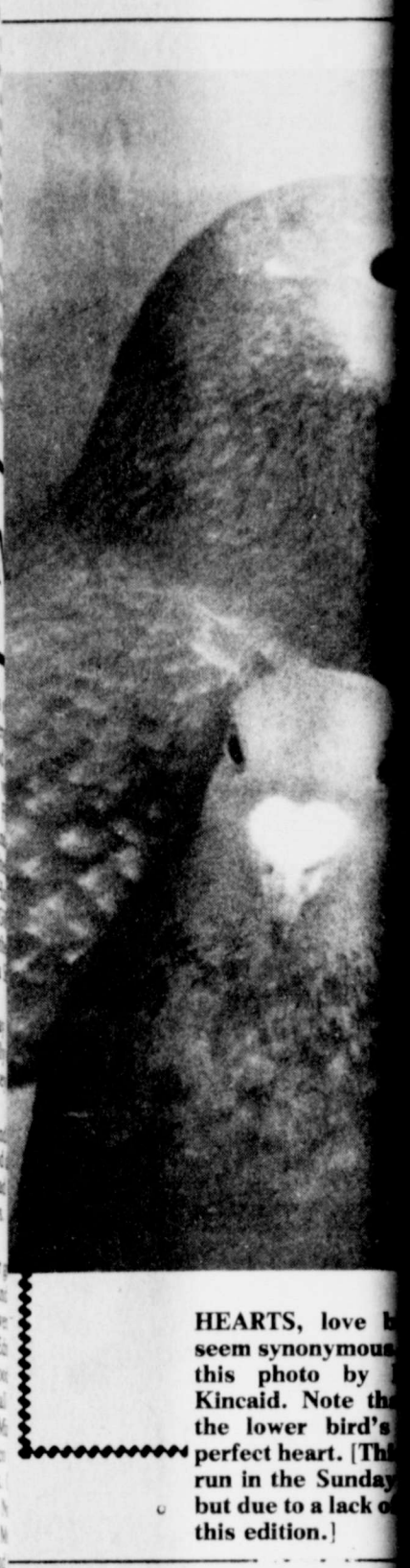

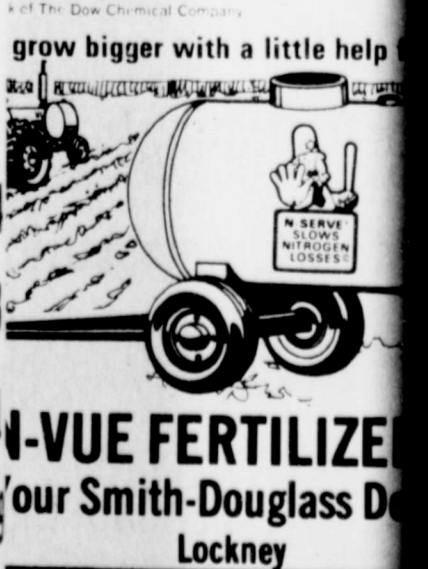

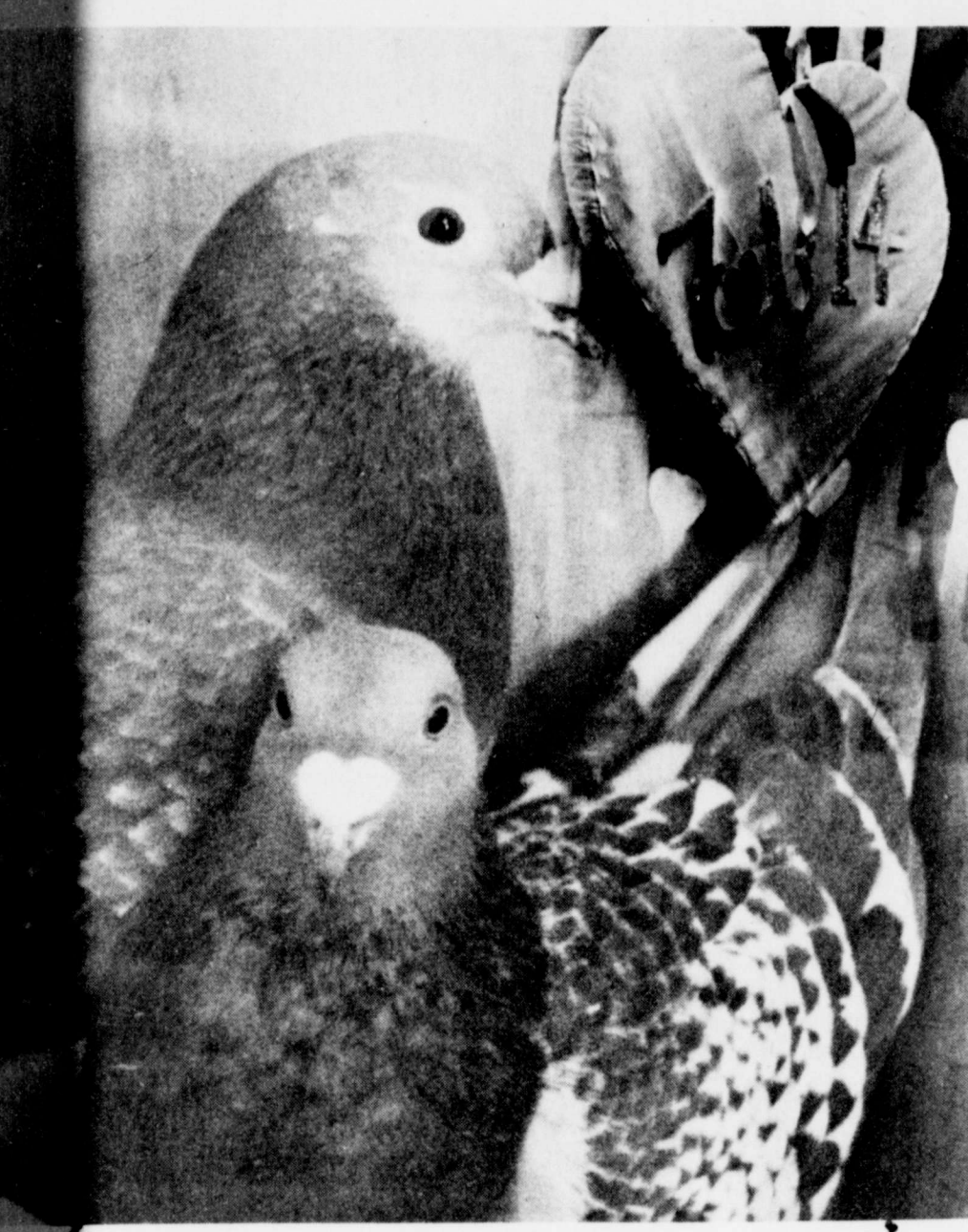

ABC TOP SEX PROGRAMMER

TUPELO, MISS. — ABC was the top programmer of sex on television, while CBS was the top network for profanity according to the report of the National Federation for Decency for last fall's monitoring program.

The NFD report showed ABC with 1212 scenes of suggested sexual intercourse and sexually suggestive comments. CBS was next with 968 while NBC was the least sex-oriented network with 518.

When ratings scenes defined by the NFD as undue and unnecessary emphasis on the female anatomy were added, ABC was rated 1948, CBS at 1579, and NBC at 1013.

The report covered 762.5 hours of prime-time programming between September 10 and December 2. It showed that 88 percent of all sex shown on television was depicted outside marriage.

Most of the sexually-oriented programming appeared on network movies. CBS Movies was the highest rated, with ABC Movies next and NBC Movies third. Other programs with high sex ratings included Soap, Love Boat, Three's Company, Dallas, The Big Event, Charlie's Angels, and Vega.

The least sexually-oriented programs were Grandpa Goes to Washington, World Series, American League Playoffs, Life Line, Project UFO, Different Strokes, Little House On The Prairie, The Waltons, Monday Night Football, and Donny and Marie.

ABC aired 4.76 sex incidents per hour not including the jiggly scenes, while CBS rated 3.86 and NBC 2.01. Adding the jiggly scenes, ABC aired 7.65 per hour, CBS 6.30 and NBC 3.91.

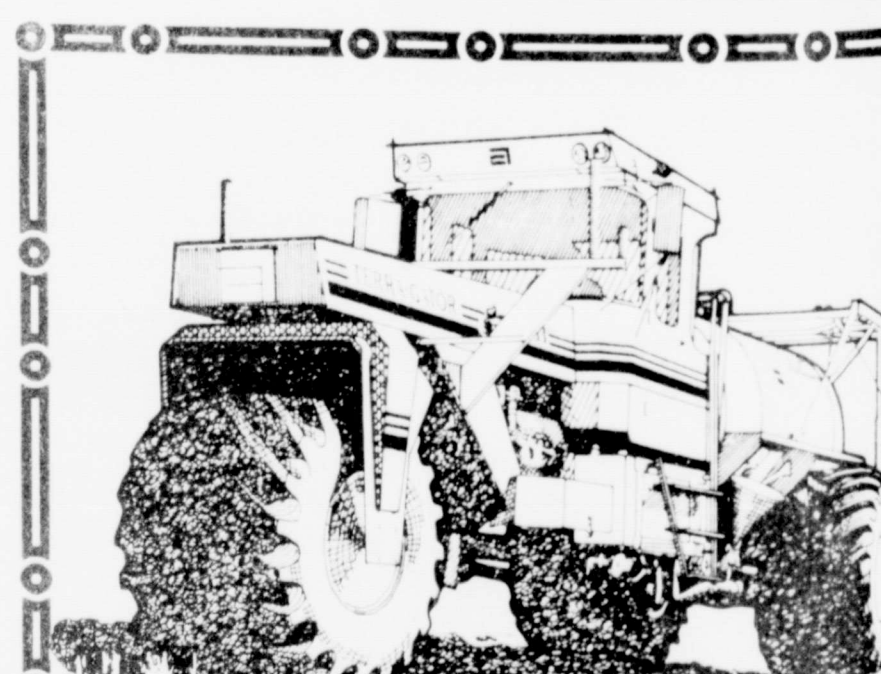
At the per hour rate viewers would be exposed to 11,619 sex incidents over a year of prime-time viewing not including jiggly scenes, and 19,578 sex incidents including the jiggly scenes. The amount of sex aired, not including the jiggly scenes, increased 25.6 percent over the monitoring report for the fall of 1977. The NFD did not include jiggly scenes in its 1977 report.

Top sponsors of sex on television were Procter & Gamble, Bristol Myers, American Home Products, General Foods, Unilever-Lever Brothers, Sterling Drug, Heublein (Kentucky Fried Chicken and Wendy's), Miles Laboratories, Johnson & Johnson, and American Motors.

The least sponsors of sex included Xerox, Nissan (Datsun), Hershey, Hallmark, Shell Oil, Whirlpool, Philip Morris, Litton Industries, I.T.T., and Pizza Hut.

In the profanity part of the report, CBS was tops with 497, followed by ABC at 274 and NBC with 266.

Most of the profanity, like the sex, appeared on network movies.

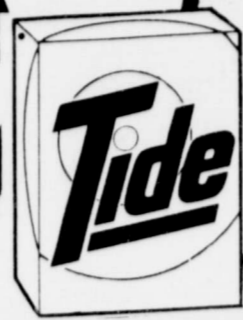

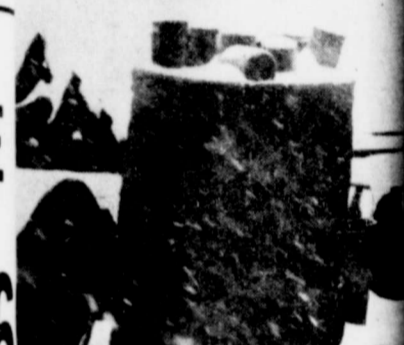
